### Car - train crash kills three youths

Witnesses to the accident were brother of the two boys, Benjamin Hall and Jerry Thompson; they said Eben Hall, driver of the death car, evidently did not see the light of approaching train. The right front of the station wagon was hit by the train and dragged down the tracks about 120

The diesel unit was damaged so that another engine from Greenville had to be called to haul the train away. Engineer of the Cheaspeake & Ohio freight train, Clinton F. Caszatt, 38, of Grand Rapids said he blew his whistle and rang the bell as the engine approached the crossing.

The crossing, scene of several accidents is marked with a sign but has no flasher. Deputy Raymond Heck
