Root-Lowell wins award

A local manufacturer of spraying equipment, the Root-Lowell Corporation, has been named to receive Kent County's Product-of-the-Year Award following the judging of various products submitted by Kent County manufacturers on Friday, April 21st.

The product submitted by Root-Lowell was the Atomist, an electric motor driven space sprayer designed primarily for the application of insecticides for fly control.

Following a three year design and development program, production of the Atomist began in the Spring of 1966. It received immediate acceptance by the industry, particularly from distributors dealing in dairy supply and sanitation equipment. Other markets have continually opened for this electric space sprayer. One of the most recent being hospital disinfectant spraying.

Root-Lowell markets the Atomist in two models: the No. 1020 Snap-Fast which fastens onto the top of standard one gallon containers, and the No. 1022 Canister type which features its own unbreakable 1 1/2 gallon container.

International mail rates rise

An increase in international surface and airmail rates will go into effect Monday, May 1, Postmaster Charles Doyle announced today.

The new international rates, he said, will not apply to mailings for members of the Armed Forces overseas. Domestic postage rates are applicable to mail addressed through APO's and FPO's.

The rate increases for both surface and airmail—averaging 13 percent—were first proposed on January 14 and publicly confirmed on March 1. The Department explained at that time that they were needed to help offset a deficit of about \$16 million in international mail operations.

Specific information on the new international rates can be obtained from the service window at the post office, Postmaster Charles Doyle said.

Area Catholic churches conduct fund campaign

Members of Catholic Churches in this area will participate in the 13th annual Diocesan Development Fund Campaign during the week of May 21.

This annual appeal was initiated by Bishop Allen J. Babcock in 1955. Contributions to the D. D. F. enables the Grand Rapids Catholic Diocese to provide funds for the education of young men to the Catholic priesthood, for a social services program and for religious instruction of children in non-parochial schools, and among migrant workers.

The Grand Rapids Catholic diocese includes 175 congregations in 29 counties of Western Michigan. Last year about 47,000 contributions donated approximately \$800,000 to the D. D. F. Campaign.

Bishop Babcock has appointed David A. Valenti, a department store executive of Grand Rapids, to be lay chairman for the 1967 Appeal. Monsignor Charles D. Brophy, pastor of St. Jude's Church in Grand Rapids is clergy chairman.

Pastors have selected parish lay chairmen to head the campaign at the parish level. A total of about 8,000 solicitors is recruited in the 29-county area to conduct the campaign.

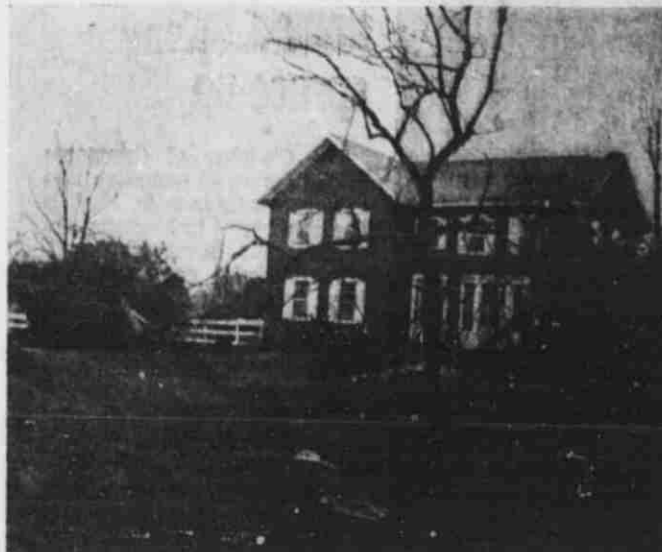


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The Joe Neath farm home at the corner of Conservation and Ferro was the last place the 7 p.m. tornado struck in its path across Grand Rapids, ending its trail of destruction here. Every one of the many trees were blown down, along with the garage. The barns and house were left standing. Ada firemen along with help from Cascade went to work clearing roads immediately after the tornado passed.

Tornado damages area

The fact that a series of tornadoes visited Western Michigan in general and the Ada-Cascade area in particular last Friday night is hardly last minute news. However, the real story is the clean-up campaign which will take months to complete. Repairs which were immediately necessary have been taken care of and the slow process of picking up and starting over again on families will be relocating and reestablishing themselves over the period of the next few weeks.

What happened Friday night?
The overall picture seems to indicate that the whirling black clouds did approximately \$200,000 worth of damage in this area. Damage varied from a broken window to the complete loss of homes. Trees, including some that had stood for over a hundred years, were uprooted like so many weeds.

To be specific, people in this area were hit by a tornado completely what a tornado really is, and appreciate in full the unbelievable force of the storm. The damage was not only personal injuries were received and no deaths resulted from the storm has been attributed to many by the local TV and radio stations in conjunction with Civil Defense.

Westminster's Wees
The westmen took their knecles too. WOOD-TV weatherman Buck Matthews lost his garage. This resulted in extensive damage to his pride and joy, a 1961 Chevrolet. Buck won't be able to drive his car in the annual Woodland Antique Car Tour this spring. He and his dog would sail skyward but the dog came home none the worse for wear.

Cascade Area
Thorncrest and Jeanlin were the hardest hit area in Cascade. Mr. and Mrs. S. Dykhouse of Jeanlin lost their garage and the fencing around their swimming pool. They hosted Mrs. Nellie Birman and her son, Franklin, who had no basement. Mrs. Dykhouse reports that they came out of the basement after the first all-clear was given. She doesn't remember hearing the second warning to go to the basement. She feels it hit Cascade before the second warning was given. It hit the Thorncrest area at 11 minutes to 9.

Ada Area
Grand River Drive was hit the hardest, with even the cemetery being damaged by falling trees. Grand River Drive off of 21, was impassable Friday evening and most of Saturday. Consumers Power and Michigan Bell Telephone Company had work crews clearing trees from the road and trying to get their services back into use for the residents. By Sunday when you could drive on the Road each place looked like a logging camp with new trees to be logged out.

Mr. and Mrs. Stanley Staskus, 620 Grand River Drive, were still shaking Sunday. They had just hit the basement when a storm came over taking two beautiful trees over 100 years old, extensive damage to their

Mr. and Mrs. Jack Munsey, 3059 Thorncrest, received the severest damage to their home. The roof was completely blown off. Everything in the house was completely exposed to the elements.

By noon Saturday they had hauled the remaining contents of the house to the dump until it could be gone through for salvage.
