An increase in international surface and airmail rates will go into effect Monday, May 1, Postmaster Charles Doyle announced today.

The new international rates, he said, will not apply to mail-ings for members of the Armed Forces overseas. Domestic postage rates are applicable to mail addressed through APO's and

The rate increases for both surface and airmail-averaging 13 percent-were first proposed on January 14 and publicly confirmed on March 1. The Department explained at that time that they were needed to help offset a deficit of about \$16 million in international mail opera-

Specific information on the new international rates can be obtained from the service window at the post office, Postmaster Charles Doyle said.






