Apply now for driver education

Applications for enrollment in Driver Education for the 1967 program are now available in the Principal's Office at Lowell High School and Lowell Junior High School, All young people living within the Lowell Area School District who have reached their fifteenth birthday before the class starts are eligible

to participate. The class will be offered three times during the summer as follows: June 12 - June 30; July 10 - July 28; and August 7 -August 25,

Enrollees turning their enrollment cards in by May 15 will be assigned into the program according to their age-the oldest enrollees being assigned in their first choice of dates. Enrollments turned in after May 15 will be accepted as there are openings

Monday, May 22 at 7:30 p. m. there will be a meeting in the wer questions of students and parents and to try to resolve any conflicts that remain. All enrollees must fill

their enrollment cards carefully and completely. When returning the cards to the office, it will be "necessary" to bring your birth certificate (other legal papers as a baptismal certificate are acceptable in lieu of a birth certificate) along with the card and have it checked. This is necessary for information required in making out Driver Education certifi-

The Driver Education class consists of thirty hours of classroom instruction and twentyfour hours of instruction in the car. The in-the-car instruction includes six hours on the range and 3 hours on the road of actual behind the wheel driving. The remaining time is observation time as there are 4 students in the car while on the road and two students in the car while on the range.

Three of the hours on the road will be driven in an evening session to gain night driving experience. Other experiences will include parking, city, rural, and freeway driving, etc.

A \$24,000 increase in the pro-posed budget for 1967-68 fiscal

The proposed budget which will come up for public hearing at the council meeting on Monday, May 15, proposes to spend \$203,693 during the next year. City taxes will have to be increased from 10 mills to 12 mills on the city assessed valuation to cover the increases. The budget reveals most of the additional costs is in salary in-

Council members who had met in private session with the manager previous to the presentation on Monday night generally agree with the need for increased taxes. One member expressed his feelings that the city has done well to only increase taxes by 3 mills since 1961. At that time the total city budget was \$125,676 and the new budget is only slightly over a third higher while other operations such as the schools have increased 100 per cent dur-

creases in the various depart-

ing the same period.

Salary Increases As the manager pointed out most of the increased costs for the coming year are for increased salaries. City Manager Olson has a \$225 pay increase to \$9,225; the clerk has a \$280 raise; clerical assistant was increased during the current year from estimated 1966-67 of \$2,500 to estimated \$4,200

for the coming year. Police Chief Avery Block will receive a \$400 raise to \$6,650; city police officers received raises during the year from an estimated total for four officers during the past year of \$16,200 to an estimate for next year of

Street department costs which are to a big extent salaries, have gone up from an estimated \$38,490 for the past year to a total for the coming year of \$47,740. Other city departments have increased estimates for

Boost city taxes

posed budget for 1967-68 fiscal year of the City of Lowell will require a tax increase of 2 mills, City Manager Olson told the City Council on Monday

The proposed budget which will come up for public hearing

at the council meeting on Monday, May 15, proposes to spend \$203,693 during the next year. City taxes will have to be increased from 10 mills to 12 mills on the city assessed valu-ation to cover the increases. The budget reveals most of the additional costs is in salary increases in the various depart-

Council members who had met in private session with the manager previous to the pre-sentation on Monday night generally agree with the need for increased taxes. One member expressed his feelings that the has done well to only increase taxes by 3 mills since 1961. At that time the total city budget was \$125,676 and the new budget is only slightly over a third higher while other operations such as the schools have increased 100 per cent during the same period.

Salary Increases

As the manager pointed out most of the increased costs for the coming year are for increased salaries. City Manager Olson has a \$225 pay increase to \$9,225; the clerk has a \$280 raise; clerical assistant was increased during the current year from estimated 1966-67 of \$2,500 to estimated \$4,200 for the coming year.

Police Chief Avery Block will receive a \$400 raise to \$6,650; city police officers received raises during the year from an estimated total for four officers during the past year of \$16,200 to an estimate for next year of

Street department costs which are to a big extent salaries, have gone up from an estimated \$38,490 for the past year to a total for the coming year of \$47,740. Other city departments have increased estimates for have increased estimates for
