School Board sells bonds for completion of Alto School

Lowell Area Schools sold \$140,000 in bonds on Monday night to First of Michigan Corporation to complete construc-tion of a four room addition to Alto Area Elementary School. The bonds will bear an average interest of 4.0983 percent and cost \$85,177.45 over the 25 year life of the bonds

The Alto school additions are presently under construction and are expected to be finished late

Also authorized was \$7,000 for new portable tables with built-in benches for the Runciman Elementary Cafeteria.

them away. All types of household discards that residents desire to dispose of will be picked up if placed at the edge of the road or at the curb. Small items should be placed in containers to facilitate handling.

Discarded or obsolete furniture, clothing magazines and newspapers are potential fire hazards and residents are urged to get rid of them at this time River. with city cooperation.

Junk cars, pianos, lumber from demolished buildings and other items too large to handle will not be picked up.
Don't forget to check the base-

ment and garage. Make sure that all combustibles are not stored near the heating units. Throw away all empty paint cans and worn out brushes Heed, your yard may need cleaning too. May unlicensed automobiles, some partially dis-mantled, are being stored in back yards in residential neigh-

borhoods, to the detriment of the community appearance and citizens are urged to dispose of them at this time. Repairs to buildings, fences,




