Citizens fight TAX increase

Several taxpayers were present at the Lowell City Council meeting Monday evening to protest an increase in the city tax rate from \$10 per thousand of assessed valuation to \$12 per thousand; a 20 percent increase. Spokesman for businessmen

in the community was Cary Stiff, who operates two stores in the community. He pointed out that in past years, the city has had a surplus at the end of the year and asked if that would not be true this year as well. He was told that the City would not be true this year as well. would not have any surplus funds left on June 30.

Mr. Stiff also pointed to the 8 percent gain in tax money

the city would receive from increased valuation, which would be in addition to the 20 percent

increase in City taxes.

Charles Doyle, former city council member and postmaster, asked about what steps were being taken to receive some compensation for providsome compensation for provid-ing fire protection for the surrounding townships

Mayor Arnold Wittenbach said that further discussions were being planned with Lowell and Vergennes Township officials, to ask for added fire department compensation. This would not be enough to help the coming year's budget much.

Figure Doubles

William S. Doyle asked about the \$53,320 miscellaneous ex-pense item in the budget; this was nearly double the figure used last year. He was told the two big items under this cate-gory was \$10,000 that was being placed in a storm sewer fund; \$5,000 in an improvement fund; and \$9,000 for catch basin rent-

The manager, Bernard Olson, explained that the two funds were the same as previous years; a way of saving for the future. The catch basin rental is a way to pay for handling storm water in our new waste water treatment plant which would otherwise have to be covered by a higher sewer service charge.

Steve Wittenbach also spoke out against higher and higher taxes that were a big burden on business.

The Council listened to the citizens and then postponed fin-al action on the budget until later when a special meeting will be held.

Several of the citizens after the meeting indicated that continued raising of the tax rate would lead to a charter amend-

Clean-up drive is urged to beautify city

Spring Clean-Up Week is being observed in the City of Low-ell this week, May 15-20, in con-junction with the Michigan Week programming, and home-owners have been asked to participate in the drive to rid homes of accumulations trash, old newspapers and other combustibles which may have piled up during the win-

In sprucing up homes, two tasks can be performed at the same time; first, make your home cleaner and brighter, and second, by getting rid of un-needed things that are combustible, eliminating potential fire hazards.

'Spring Clean-up campaigns play a vital role in keeping fire fatalities and fire losses from rising sharply," says Frank Baker, Fire Chief of the local Fire Department. "Last year, there were more

than 12,000 fire fatalities in the United States, and property damage exceeded \$1.4 billion. More and more communities are observing Spring Clean-up week each year, and this is a gratifying trend, as one of the keystones in an over-all fire prevention effort," Baker reported.

According to City officials, Spring Clean-up should not be confined to the cleaning up of homes, but should include local industrial plants, retail stores, churches, church halls, schools, municipal buildings, &

nursing homes. City crews will pick up refuse, if placed next to the roadway in containers or bundles of reasonable size and weight, throughout the remainder of the week. Thursday pick up will be confined to the area west of the Flat River, and Friday, pick-ups will be made around the entire city.

The Department of State Highways has started distributing Motor Vehicle Highway Fund collections for the first quarter of 1967 to Michigan counties and incorporated cities and villages.

The following amounts will be paid to area counties from first quarter collections: Barry County, \$252,516; Ionia County, \$275,209; Kent County,

\$1,535.332; and Montcalm County, \$312.625 Lowell's share of the quarterly amount, \$99,813.197, as an incorporated city will be \$11.208. State Highway Director Howard E. Hill said gross collections during January, February, and March of 1967 amounted to \$101,812,791 from which collection costs of \$1,778,109 and the

Waterways Commission's share amounting to \$221.485 were deducted before distribution, The net amount of Motor Vehicle Highway Fund revenues available for distribution for the quarter amounted to \$99.813.197. an increase of \$2.819.081 over revenues distributed for the

same period of 1966. All state gasoline and diesel fuel taxes, license plate fees and a small amount of miscellaneous fees are deposited in the Motor Vehicle Highway

After deductions, the money is distributed under provisions of state law which provides that 47 percent goes to the Department of State Highways for use on state highways, 35 percent to the state's 83 counties for use on county roads, and 18 percent to 522 incorporated cities and villages for their roads and streets.

Under this formula, the Department of State Highways will receive \$46 912 203 as its share of the collections, while the counties will receive \$34,934,619 and the incorporated cities and villages will get \$17,966,376.
