



Now is the best time of year to attack and destroy the fly and mosquito, Dr. W. B. Pro-thro, City-County Health Officer reported today. Dr. Prothro explained both the fly and mosquito can be controlled most effectively by eliminating their hatching places. If the hatching places are destroyed the egg stage of each insect also is eliminated and the life cycle stopped. ELECTRONIC WEATHER_ Y activities The world's first "electronic weatherman" will join hands with what's termed the world's most sophisticated control con-sole to take care of the climate The YMCA kick-off of their ummer baseball and softball eagues officially got underway n May 31. The following is a inside Dallas' newest skyscrap-er-the \$40-million "One Main Place."

The "electronic weatherman" is composed of supersensitive sensors. It will sit on the roof of the 33-story building, moni-toring outdoor temperatures, humidities, wind conditions and even sunshine. Readings will be releaved to a Data Center masrelayed to a Data Center mas-ter control console on the top floor, which will make contin-uous corrections in the buildings air-conditioning system.

Besides keeping a weather eye on the weather, the master console will be linked to a net-work of sensitive devices scat-tered throughout the million-square-foot office building to measure heat given off by of-fice machines, lights and even people.





"The setup will be so sensi-tive," according to S. J. Nelson, "it will be able to tell when a secretary goes from one office to another."

Main purpose of the system is not to outguess the Dallas weatherman, but to wring max-imum performance out of the building's mechanical system.
