The drums will be used to float the new boat, which is now under construction, and will be ready for this year's show which will feature Louis Armstrong.


The styrafoam for the project was donated by the Dow Chemi-cal Company of Midland, Mich-







A note written for Father's Day by one of the children was also found with the body. It said

"Dear Dad: We love you very much and don't forget it. We love you better than Mom, Lloyd or Bill. I do not like them at all. You are very nice to us and we love you very, very, very much." Police suggested that the note from the children referred to

Buck's second wife, Lottie, 39, who has two children by a previous marriage, Lloyd, 16, and Bill, 14. The hole mentioned in Buck's letter evidently referred Oakwood Cemetery where
