Editorial... Monday's school election vital to community's advance in education

Monday, June 12, is an important day for the citizens of the Lowell Area School district; both in quantity and quality of the education to be offered our students in the future.

Election of two board members is no doubt first in order of importance. The decision of the citizens in this regard will influence the operation of the schools for at least four years. There are seven candidates, not one of whom has to my knowledge made any statements of what they are for or against in operation or management of the schools. So the election will be pretty much on the basis of personalities.

When the choice by the voters is made, let us hope that the winners go on the board not committed to any pet projects or grievances against the present or past administration. On the matter of increasing the operating millage from \$3 to \$7 per thousand of state equalized valuation, all agree that more money is needed to

operate the enlarged school system. The amount necessary in this case we feel is just an educated guess; it may be far short of the amount required or by some chance it might be over the requirements.

From all we have heard it may be October before a really accurate estimate can be made and that would be too late to be collected this year. As the amount of school aid from the state is still a question, and the increase in teachers salaries not settled, the administration has pulled a magic number of 7 mills out of the air.

This is based on how much they think the public will go for and what might be enough to do the job.

In any case, it is up to YOU to decide. If you're wrong, we're in trouble, but this is democracy at work... good or bad. The important thing is to get a representative turn-out of voters in the district; if enough go to the polls on Monday, the answer is at least that of the majority.

Besides his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Blough, sr., of Alto, he is survived by one brother, Dennis, of Alto; one sister, Gloria, at home; his paternal grandmother, Mrs. Emma Blough of Alto; and his maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Jesse Hensley of Stamford, Kentucky.

Lowell finished regular season's play with 4 wins, 10 losses and 2 ties.

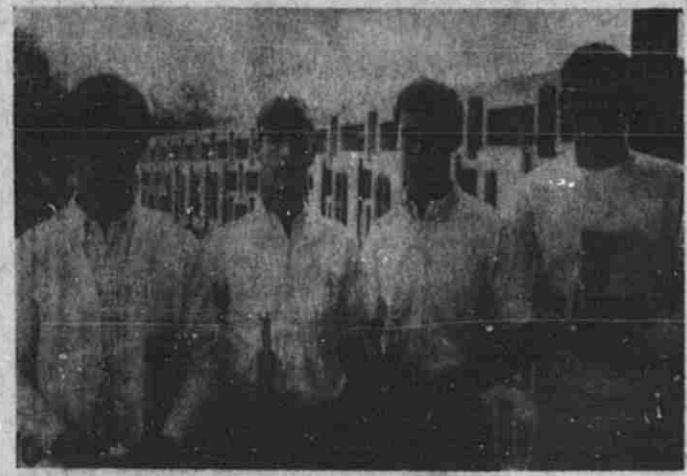

Murder, suicide claims 3

Lowell was shocked Monday morning with the discovery of the bodies of Lawrence W. Buck, 36, of Sparta and his two children, Wayne, 11, and Leann, 10, in a car on Fremont Street next to Oakwood Cemetery.

Buck had shot his two children in the head and then himself while evidently despondent over the breaking up of his second marriage.

The murder and suicide was discovered by Rex Hendricks who observed blood coming from the parked car while working in his garden at 6 a. m. He summoned police officer Lawrence Pelon, who was on duty, and the bodies were discovered. The two children were on some blankets in the rear of the station wagon, and Buck was slumped over in the front seat.

Police at first thought all were dead, but found Wayne breathing weakly and sent both children into Blodgett Memorial Hospital. The girl was dead on arrival, but Wayne lived several hours in the hospital before succumbing to his head wound.

Find Message

Discovered in a notebook in the car was a note addressed to Buck's second wife Lottie reading:

"Well, Lottie, I guess it is just about time for us to bow out for good... It's as close as I can get to that hole you kept talking about."

"You know something, though, the last 24 hours have been very nice and quiet. No screaming at or about us, just nice and peaceful. Now you can be the same. So long Lottie and may you three have a good long think."

A note written for Father's Day by one of the children was also found with the body. It said:

"Dear Dad: We love you very much and don't forget it. We love you better than Mom, Lloyd or Bill. I do not like them at all. You are very nice to us and we love you very, very much."

Police suggested that the note from the children referred to Buck's second wife, Lottie, 39, who has two children by a previous marriage, Lloyd, 16, and Bill, 14. The hole mentioned in Buck's letter evidently referred to Oakwood Cemetery where his father is buried.

Mother of the two children, Mrs. Barbara Buck, who lives in Grand Rapids; they were divorced about six years ago. Funeral services for Buck will be Friday at 1:30, with burial in Oakwood Cemetery. Besides his wife, he is survived by his mother, Mrs. Christine DeBoer of Grand Rapids; and a brother, Roger, of Lowell.

Services for the children are being held on Thursday at 2 p. m. with interment in Chapel Hill Cemetery.

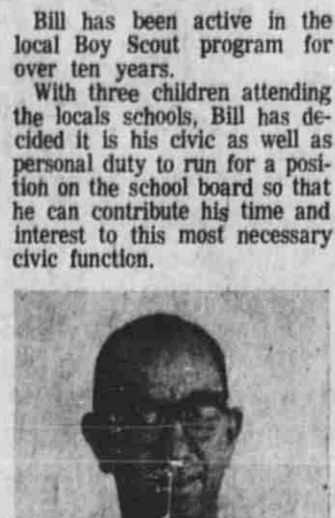

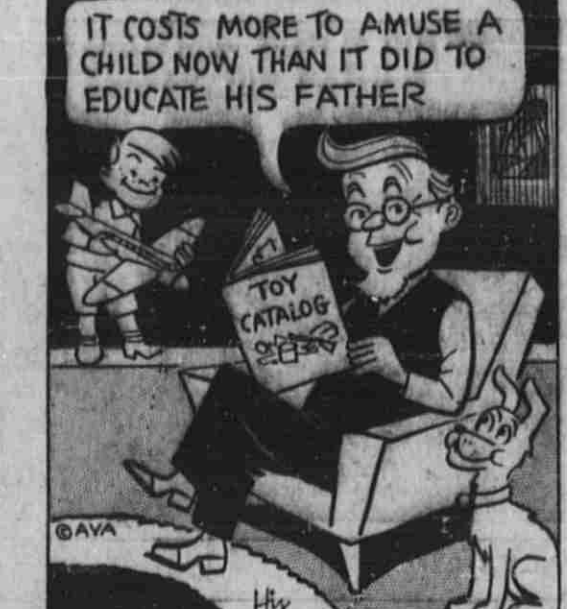

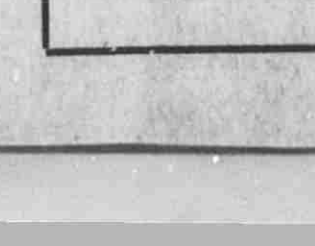
