Area residents are invited to celebrate the Fourth of July holiday with members of the West Central Michigan Historical Society at beautiful Fallsburg Park, north of Lowell.

Festivities will get underway at 1 p. m. with the "Ring of the Bells for Freedom," followed by an old-fashioned pot-luck dinner. After dinner, the guests will hear from several servicemen who have recently returned from the war zone in Viet Nam.

Army Sgt Benjamin Ball, with the 25th Division in Viet Nam, will tell of his experiences, and introduce his guests—Sgt James M. Schable; Sgt. Richard A. Falls, and Sgt. Harry T. Drago.

All men will be available during a question and answer period following their brief, but informative talks.

Interesting Exhibit

Of special interest this year will be the exhibit of Early American Arts and Crafts in the Recreation Building at the Park.

The committee, composed of Norton Louis Avery, Jan Johnson and Alice Bauer, are busy assembling the displays which will feature a collection of hand-crafted furniture reproductions by Albert Hermans; an historic collection of items used during the clam button making days on the Grand River near Lowell, by Dr. Ruth Herrick, and a collection of paintings, drawings and photographs depicting the early history of Michigan, and particularly, the Fallsburg area.

All exhibits must be delivered to the Recreation Building on Monday, July 3rd, between 1 p. m. and 5 p. m. for arranging and display.

Some items will be for sale, and part of the proceeds from the sales will go into the Fallsburg Pioneer Village Building Fund.

This annual get-together is sponsored by the Society each Fourth of July, with the express purpose of whetting the appetite of all who attend to learn more about Michigan's Historical Heritage.

New centennial farm designated

A farm owned by Robert and Judy Huver of 9283-36th Street, Ada, has been designated as a Centennial Farm by the Michigan Historical Commission.

The farm, located in Cascade Township, Kent County, has been in the possession of the family since 1860. It was originally purchased in May of 1860 by Loren Lewis Sr. great grandfather of the present owners, from Lucius Bolthouse.

According to Secretary of State James M. Hare, whose department directs the activities of the Historical Commission, the Centennial Farm program in Michigan was established in 1948. Since that time, certificates and metal markers have been awarded to more than 1,800 Michigan farms.

The program is administered under the direction of the Commission, while markers are provided by Detroit Edison and Consumers Power Companies.

According to Hare, a Centennial Farm is one which has been in the continuous possession of the same family for 100 years or more. For this purpose, the Historical Commission considers a farm to be 10 or more acres having estimated sales of more than \$50 yearly, or less than 10 acres but having estimated sales of \$250 annually.

Persons owning farms who wish to apply for Centennial Farm certificates are asked to write for an application to Michigan Historical Commission, Michigan Department of State, 3369 N. Logan St., Lansing, Michigan, 48918.

Grattan voters refuse school annexation

Voters in Grattan, Chittle and Orleans rural school districts turned down Monday a proposal that would annex their districts to the Belding School system.

Their refusal involves about 500 school age children and \$4 million dollars in state equalized valuation for the Belding district.

On the question of annexation, Chittle voted 26 to 22 against it. Orleans decided with a 48-27 vote, and Grattan voiced its opinion with a 71 no, 38 yes vote.

Figures released by Muri Conner, Belding's superintendent, concerned three separate issues on which each of the districts decided.

First proposal considered the question of annexation; the second asked for operating millage; and the third involved acceptance of debt services on the Belding high school.

Clayton Heffron, president of the school board at Grattan, refused to comment on the vote or the future policies of the board in regard to this problem at this time.

Refusal of the three districts to annex means school age children in these districts will not be able to attend school at Belding. Chittle's rural school extends through the seventh grade; Orleans and Grattan, the eighth grade.

Grattan youngsters will probably attend school at Cedar Springs, north of Rockford in the fall, since that district had said they will accept them.

However, Orleans and Chittle have been told by Greenville, Lowell, Central Montcalm, Rockford, Ionia and Saranac, they will not accept their tuition students.

Orleans and Chittle also face the problem of transportation, whereas Grattan has their own bus system.

Superintendent Conner, following receipt of the voting, stated he expects the Belding Board of Education will stand firm on its "no tuition policy," announced last year, and which prompted annexation votes in eight districts, six of which have now taken place.

The no vote from the three districts is the first decision against annexation since several rural districts began voting earlier this year.

Census figures for 1967 indicate there are about 280 students, ages 5 to 19 in the Grattan district; 118 in the Orleans district; and 124 in the Chittle area.

State equalized valuation figures for 1967 show Grattan's valuation at \$2,568,575; Orleans, \$2,134; and Chittle, \$57,136.

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Buy land for housing unit

The first step in constructing a senior-citizen housing unit, for Lowell, was taken last week with the purchase of 8 acres of land from Mr. and Mrs. George Hale.

The land, located on Boves Road, runs back to undeveloped Grand Street and has frontage along Cherry Creek.

The actual purchase of the property was made by the Schneider Fund at a cost of \$12,000. Members of the fund trustees are Ray Rittenger and Phillip Schneider, and Donald O. Johnson of the Old Kent Bank.

Approval for the purchase was given by the full senior-citizen housing committee Ray Rittenger, Phillip Schneider, Dr. Donald Gerard, Norton Avery, King Doyle, E. C. Foreman and C. H. Runciman.

C. H. Runciman, chairman of the committee, said this week that preliminary plans are underway by Kalamazoo Architect Robert Kiefer. Before the purchase of the land, a study was made of the location by a consultant of the committee, Dan Vos, Ada Contractor and Builder.

Runciman said that the study shows that there is no problem of high water on this land, which is higher than the surrounding area. Sewer hook-up is available across one end of the property and city water mains are adjacent to the location.

Larry Upton, representative of the Ford Foundation, has made a community study for the senior-citizen housing committee and approved the location. The committee agrees that this is the best location available which meets all the requirements of the needs of senior citizens of the community.

Building Plans

Plans for construction will be presented to the committee soon with several different styles, to be proposed by the architect.

One would be of separate units for 70 with a central administration building and common use lounge and activity areas. Another plan under consideration is for a connected series of units fanning out from a central use area.

Some consideration is being given for community dining facilities with one meal a day served at the option of the tenants.

Also under consideration by the committee, in connection with the 70 unit housing development, is a 20 bed convalescent home at the same location. This would have to wait for the completion of the housing for able-bodied senior citizens.

Under the plans now pending, eligibility for one of the housing units will be limited to persons or couples at least 61 years of age.

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Driver's licenses go back to 1919

Today's horsepower-conscious lawmaker may not realize it, but the grand old days of the first licensed drivers in Michigan.

Driver licenses in Michigan go back to 1919. The expiration date of the license was set up to correspond with the applicant's birthday. This spread the workload evenly through the year.

From that time, the need for progress and modernization of licensing in Michigan has accelerated, especially in recent years.

In 1964 new type "green" licenses were issued to drivers under 21.

Have explained: "Many underage youngsters were doctoring their licenses and using them as false proof of age."

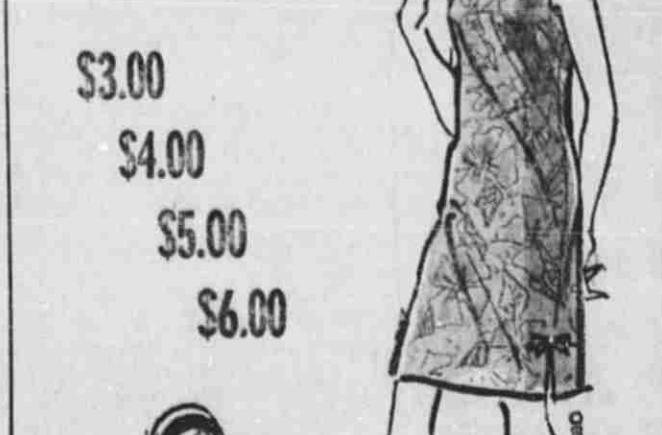
Subsequent legislation has made the Michigan license more resistant to tampering.

The same year the Legislature implemented a law which had been on the books by appropriating money to providing Michigan drivers with every driver a license.

The gigantic task of providing all Michigan drivers with the new license was begun in 1965. By early 1966, all Michigan drivers were having the new colorphoto license.

"Another basic change is taking place," said Hare. "Many Michigan drivers are no longer interested in issuing driver licenses. And more and more, it is becoming the job of the Department of State to handle driver license examining."

Michigan best sod producer

Michigan leads the nation in sod production. In 1966, the state's sod producers grew 29,000 acres of sod valued at \$27 million, according to James Beard, Michigan State University agronomy researcher. The total sod industry, including growing, harvesting, shipping and laying, is valued at \$72 million, he said. Michigan has been experiencing a boom in sod production during the last decade. Less than 1,000 acres were grown in the state in 1955. Excellent climate and soil conditions for growing good bluegrass sod are the chief reasons for this boom, commented Beard. And he said that sod acreage will continue to increase in the future as growers meet the demands of an expanding Michigan sod market.
