# Youth jailed; trys to outrun **State Police**

James Shade, 18, Segwun Ave-nue, Lowell, was arrested by Michigan State Police officers Friday night after a high speed chase, which reached speeds over 100 miles per hour.

Troopers R. Kenyon and M. Holton, of the Rockford Post, were on routine patrol, going east on Cascade Road (old US-16) when the Shade car passed them, going in the opposite di-rection, with a noisy muffler.

The officers turned around to stop the car, and it took off to escape the police, hoping to out-run them. Shade turned south on Segwun Avenue and ran 2 stop signs trying to lose the

At the dead end of Segwun Avenue and 60th Street, Shade's car rolled over while he was attempting to maneuver the high speed turn.

Passengers in the Shade car were Steven Wittenbach, 18, Chris Wittenbach, 17, and Jerry Metternick, 18, all of Route 3,

Lowell.

The driver was the only one injured, receiving minor lacerations and bruises. He was treated at Blodgett Memorial Hospital before being taken to the Kent County Jail.

He was sentenced to serve five days in jail, and was ordered to pay fine and costs of \$115.90 on a reckless driving charge.

# White's Bridge marks 98th year

White's Covered Bridge, the only covered bridge in Ionia County, and one of six in the state, will have another distinction to boost this Saturday, when it will mark its 98th birthday; two years short of the centen-

The bridge is still in use, although the Ionia County Road Commission has placed a two-ton axle load limit on the use of the structure.

The span was completed July 15, 1869, at a cost of \$1,775.54, and has served the county continuously since that time, according to the records of Earl Beattle, Keene Township clerk. The present bridge is the 3rd

on the site. The first one having been built shortly after the first settlers came to Ionia County. It received its name from Levi White, a carpenter, and one of Michigan's early pion-

The second bridge, built by Levi in 1840 was condemned in 1866. Then followed a period of about one year when there was no means of crossing the river, other than by boat, while the new bridge was being construc-

Two years ago a historical marker was erected on the sight in July. The marker, dedicated by Dr. Willis Dunbar of the Michigan Historical Commission is fitting recognition of a soundly made structure, and a typical

### More Students

Superintendent James Pace produced census figures for the past year, and the expected en-rollment for September shows that 92 additional students will enter school this Fall. This is an increase over last year's enrollment of 2,441, and will project the student count to 2,533 for the opening of school.

The census figures show that there are eight more children under one year of age this year than last. Last year a decided drop in this group was noted. In the 1966 census, there were 20 less in the group under one than the previous year; indicates that the Lowell district is following the falling birthrate average for the na-

The report also disclosed that there were evidently 30 dropouts of students who moved away during the school from the high school. While the projected enrollment would gain the total census only shows a gain of 39 children in the under 19 census age.

### North Bell Petitions

It was revealed that 21 peti-tions were filed by North Bell School District families to have their property transferred from the Saranac District to Lowell. These families have always attended Lowell schools but were included in the K-12 bulk transfer of the district to the

Saranac school system Four other pieces of property were asked to be transferred by the Lowell Board of Education in a petition. The hearing will be held in 60 days with a joint Ionia-Kent Board meeting.

A transfer of property Stewart Thomet from Caledonia to the Lowell district was tabled until August 21, A meeting with the Caledonia District will try to arrange an equitable property exchange.

### To Take Bids

In further action, the Board authorized the superintendent to bids to borrow up to \$100.000 to carry the expenses of the school until taxes and school aid is received this win-

The superintendent also reported that work necessary on the Alto School drain field and septic tank may exceed the estimate by \$10,000.

The Board met in private session with John Gabrion, Junior High School Principal, at the conclusion of the meeting. Gabrion was the only administrator who refused to sign his contract, as offered by the Board.

Members of the Board reviewed his case and did offer to cut his school duty from 11 months to 10 months as a concession. No report was received on whether this was acceptable to the principal or not.







# **Pound parcel** increase made

Mailers will be able to send 25 pound parcels between first class post offices which are 150 or more apart starting July 1, Lowell Postmaster Chas. reminded patrons this week. The present weight limit is 20 pounds, he said.

This is the first of five increases scheduled to take effect annually until 1971, when a 40 pound, 84 inch maximum size will be authorized between all first class post offices. Size limitations are now 72 inches in combined girth and length

The next increase, on July 1, 1968, will raise the weight limit to 30 pounds. On July 1, 1969, the weight limit will be increased from 30 to 40 pounds; on July 1, 1970, the size will be increased to 78 inches; and on July 1, 1971, the size is schedul

ed to be increased to 84 inches. Postmaster Doyle also reminded mailers that parcels weighing up to 40 pounds can be mailed between first class post offices less than 150 miles apart. Packages addressed to and from 2nd, 3rd, and 4th class post offices, Alaska and Hawaii are not affected by the increase in size and weight provisions of the Public Law 89-573, which became effective January 15, he said. Parcel post mailings to and from these offices remain at 70 pounds and
