NEW YORK (AP) — Doctors writing for a medical journal have concluded that pre-marital sex is increasing among young Americans because of a change in social patterns and a more liberal use of contraceptives. Articles published in the New York State Journal of Medicine said the much-talked about sex-ual revolution really is taking

As evidence, Dr. Graham B. Blaine, chief of psychiatry at Harvard University Health

Services, cited statistics that one of every 18 babies born in the country is out of wedlock, despite widespread knowledge and availability of contracep-

"Statistics as well as professional opinion support the con-clusion that more college men have intercourse with the girls they date instead of with prostitutes or pickups as in previous years," Blaine wrote.

Cited as key factors in chang-ing behavior were the greater "training" is the use of contraceptive devices, a decline in the impact and effectiveness of church training, and changes in the attitudes of parents and
