In 3 days of investigation, two Lowell Police officers, Lar-ry Pelon and Jim Hutson, solv-ed the robbery of Posteric the robbery of Parker's Service Station; recovered \$1,-200 in tools; and impounded property stolen in several other West Michigan thefts.

Chronologically the story started on Monday, July 17, at 3:50 a.m., when Officer Leo Rowland of the Lowell department on routine patrol discovered a broken window in the rear of Parker's Service Station on West Main Street.

Officer Jim Hutson was called to assist Rowland and later in the morning Officer Larry Pelon arrived to take prints. Joe Parker estimated that abbout \$1,200 in tools was taken

Monday morning at 9 a. m. Officers Pelon and Hutson who were investigating, received a tip that the thieves were from went to Ionia and worked on leads until 4 a. m. Tuesday. They questioned sev-eral suspects and investigated the leads they had received.

On Tuesday, after a few hours sleep, the two officers made trips to Ionia, Greenville and Belding checking on additional leads. No headway was made Tuesday and the officers returned to Lowell at 3 p. m. for a

July 19, at 8 a, m, the Lowell officers received a call from the Ottawa County Sheriff's Department reporting that they had a Kenneth Elco in jail and that he admitted to robbing a service station near Ada. The officers went to Grand Haven and spent several hours questioning Elco.



Felty of Grand Rapids died as a result of chest injuries received when his small foreign car crashed it. ... truck owned by the Lowell Granite Company late Thursday afternoon, Doctors say a probable heart seizure caused the accident which followed a wild, high-speed ride south on Monroe Street, which endangered many others, before Felty's car came to a jarring crash 147 feet south of Main Street,

Blaine R. Felty, 46, of 2203 Edgeworth, NE, Grand Rapids, was dead on arrival at Butterworth Hospital in Grand Rapids following an automobile-truck crash which occurred 147 feet south of Lowell's Main Street at 4:05 p. m. Mr. Felty died of severe chest injuries, but a probable heart seizure contributed to the accident.

Felty, driving south on Monroe from Attwood Brass Corporation where he was employed as a packaging engineer, was observed by Mel Hewitt an employee of Clark Plumbing & Heating Company. Hewitt said Felty had passed him and then slowed to a near stop, slumped over the wheel and then accelerated full speed ahead going down Monroe.

Other witnesses, including Lowell Police Officer Jim Hut-son, state that Felty passed them at high speed, narrowly missing Officer Hutson by the City Hall and two cars as he careened across Main Street; one car being drive by Helen Converse of Route 1, Lowell; before he crashed into a truck owned by the Lowell Granite Company. His small foreign car

struck the truck with such force that it was moved from its previous position and did considerable damage to its right front side rupturing the gas tank which fortunately did not ex-

Hutson said eight bystanders helped pick up the car and move it back far enough to remove Felty from the wreckage. A local doctor was called to examine him. Felty was still alive at the scene, but died in the ambulance on the way to the

hospital.

Mr. Felty is survived by his wife, Williamette J.; two sons, Garry R. of Standale and Pfc. Stephan Felty serving in Viet Nam; five grandchildren; his mother, Mrs. C. W. Meadows of Mancelona; one sister, Mrs. Luke Bradley of Walloon Lake. He is also survived by three He is also survived by three brothers, Wayne E. of Grand Rapids, Joseph B. of Mancelona and Rodger N. of Indianapolis, Indiana, and several nieces &

White Oaks here to stay

First the stately Elm and now the sturdy Oak, are we to lose them both?

The frightening aspect of hundreds and hundreds of White Oaks going down to defeat against the dreaded Oak Wilt has been dispelled by an explanation of what is really happen-

ing to these hardwoods. Lt. Mike Wagner, forestry officer of the Kent County Conservation Department, described the condition as being caused by miner-as in tunneling-in-

The eggs are laid on the leaf and when the larvae are hatched, they immediately bore in-to the leaf where they begin to feed on the interior. Here they remain chewing throughout the leaf until it dies from the center outward or until the insect quits that leaf and advances to

Often you can pick up a leaf, hold it to the light and actually see the tiny culprit. "We always have some of these insects with us," declar-

ed Lt. Wagner, "but this year has been a particularly good one for their growth." The combination of moist, hot spells & cool periods was favorable to Although the population of

miner insects is great this year, we probably won't see as many bronzed and dead leaves next year, unless the weather conditions are similar. Our fine White Oaks are here to stay for awhile longer,


