No major change is seen for M-21

A Michigan state highway department official announced last week the department has discarded plans to build a limited access freeway from Grand Rapids to Flint, replacing the present M-21.

He said the proposed Grand Rapids to Flint freeway had been based on a 1960 highway needs survey, but completion of I-96 in late 1962 had altered the picture. M-21 is now scheduled to remain an area service route, its function having chaning of I-96 between Grand Rapids and Lansing, with the free-way construction of a part of M-78 between Lansing and Fl-

int, according to the report. The spokesman said these routes, in combination with M-43 through the city of Lansing, provide adequate multi-lane facilities between Grand Rapids and Flint. Future plans involv-ing a north bypass of Lansing will further improve the route

he added. The north bypass around Lansing would connect I-96 from a point northwest of Lansing in almost a direct east-west route with a point near Perry on M-78. It will be completed after

Plans indicate the difference between the direct route, route from Grand Rapids to Flint, which has now been abandoned, and the I-96, M-43, M-78 route now in use, is less than ten

The department plans to continue to improve M-21 between Ionia and Lowell as an area service route, servicing mostly intra-regional traffic needs terminating in communities along the road's length, according to the office of E. A. Bellenbaum, chief planning engineer in the department's planning office.

Area service routes provide state highway connections be-tween smaller towns and regional centers, service as alter-nate or relief routes to major trunkline systems, and provide service to special interest centers or serve major recreation trip desires.

Department improvements on M-21 now call for its relocation north of Muir and straightening of curves south of Pe-

Bellenbaum now rates 12.9 miles of M-21 from Grand Rapids to Ionia as critical in capacity and-or structure and the base, Reports show 8.2 miles of this critical area lie between Saranac and Ionia.

M-21, which was built 40 years ago, handles from 2,800 to 7,200 vehicles on an average day but is not scheduled for major improvement, through June 30, 1972, according to the depart-

Eberhard's new super market facility, under construction on West Main Street, is expected to open about August 15, it was revealed this week.

So far this year King Milling has taken in a total of 350,000 bushels of wheat, including an all-time record of 57,700 bushels in one day during the height of the season.

All this wheat has been handled with a minimum of effort due to more efficient equipment and especially the new hoist which speeds the unloading process. As a result of this increased efficiency, the long line of trucks and wagons, which in past years extended along Main Street as far as Keiser's Kitchen, was completely eliminated. The farmers were glad to avoid the long wait and the traffic problems caused by the line becoming non-existant.

Wheat crop

good, harvest

almost complete

With the 1967 wheat harvest slowing to a stop, some inter-esting statistics have been giv-

en out by King Doyle, president of the King Milling Company

In general the wheat crop has been high in quality with most of the later truckloads received high in moisture content necessitating the drying of the wheat for storage. Wheat is abundant this year due to increased government acreage allotments which, incidentally, have al-ready been cut about 12 percent for next year.

As wheat producers already know, the price of wheat is down this year, about 40 cents lower than the going price last year at this time.

The wheat season began officially at the King Milling Com-pany at 5 o'clock July 18 when Carl Gasper of Ionia trucked in the first load of 1967 wheat.

Mr. Doyle reported that their large storage capacity is full and the only wheat they are handling now is the comparatively small amount for daily




