Investigate arson in two Alto area barn fires Monday

Two barns set ablaze within a few minutes of each other in the Alto area at 3 a. m. on Monday morning has brought an arson investigator from Kent County Sheriff's Department, Detective Larry Flynn, and Kent County Pire Chief Jeff Geldersma and Alto Fire Chief Harold Metterick to the scene.

The first fire discovered was that of Alex Wingeier at 6780 Wingeier Avenue. Bob Krebs, a neighbor, was awake and saw the flames that already had engulfed the barn. Alto fire trucks summoned and found the fire out of control but not endangering any nearby buildings. This medium-sized barn contained a quantity of straw.

The second fire, spotted by a fireman on the way to fight the fire at Wingeiers, was at the Joe Oesch farm 2 miles south at 13042 84th St. This fire was also out of control by the time that two trucks of the Alto Fire Department arrived. The third truck remained at the Wingeier

The preliminary approval for the plat which will allow Dok Realty to build two more four family apartments came after an hour of discussion at the public hearing. No interested parties were present except Douglas Dok.

The vote by the Planning Com-nission to refuse to OK the two t plat, came on August 28th at the regular meeting of the Commission. Dok was given a preliminary go-ahead at a special meeting earlier in the month, but the Commission reversed its stand and asked for a revised plot plan which would eliminate frontage on M-21 for further commercial expansion.




