





Signals, gates ordered installed at Bowne Township crossing

The Michigan Public Service Commission has ordered the Chesapeake and Ohio Railway Company to upgrade protective devices at its crossing with Pratt Lake Avenue in Bowne Township of Kent County.

Subsequent to an inspection of the crossing by MPSC staff, along with representatives of the Kent County Road Commission and the railway company, the Commission ordered the installation of automatic flashinglight signals and half-roadway gates.

The crossing presently is protected by advance warning signs and reflectorized crossbucks. "Because of the restricted visibility in the crossing quadrants, the high volume and speed of the railroad traffic and the importance of the roadway, the

Public Service Commission feels this crossing should be protected automatic devices,' Peter by B. Spivak, Commission Chairman, said.

"Pratt Lake Road is a Federal-Aid Secondary route which is the main north and south road from the village of Freeport to Interstate Highway 96 and to the city of Lowell," Spivak said. "The railway company has two tracks over the crossing with 10 freight trains each way daily and three passenger trains each way Monday through Saturday. Rail speeds are 60 mph for freight trains

and 70 mph for the passenger trains. The two tracks make possible simultaneous train movements over the crossing," said.
