# Surgery follows shooting

Mrs. Judy Tidd, 18, of 928 North Hudson Stret, was in good condition Wednesday in Butterworth Hospital after be-ing shot in the abdomen with a .22 automatic rifle about 1:30 a. m. that morning

Mrs. Tidd told Lowell Police after she had undergone surger-gery, "I did it." The bullet pen-etrated the intestines and required over an hour on the op-erating table, to repair the gun-

Lowell Police received the call at 1:39 a. m. from Victor Tidd, 20, husband of the victim. She was rushed, by ambulance to Butterworth Hos-

Tidd told the officers that during a family quarrel, his wife had taken the gun into the bathroom, locked the door and

Tidd broke down the door & found her on the floor, and immediately called the authorites. Police said that the apparently self-inflicted gun shot wound occurred, following the departture of several guests who had been visiting at the Tidd home.

# Avoid slip-ups on delivery of Christmas mail

The use of slips to avoid slipups on delivery of Christmas parcels is being re-emphasized this year by the Post Office

By placing a paper inside a parcel post package, containing both the address and the return address, mailers can facilitate delivery where the cover has been torn or removed, Post-master General Lawrence F.

O'Brien noted. The Postal Manual will contain new sections calling on all postal personnel at all facilities to emphasize to the public the importance of this device to insure that the parcel reaches its destination, or if returned, even when the outside cover has been

Damage to the outer wrapper s probably the principal cause of delay on Christmas parcels, studies show. Parcels can be sent to "rewrap" sections when there is no actual damage to the contents, but if the cover with the address and return ad-dress is missing, it may wind up in the dead parcel section

Frequently, the use of inade-quate flimsy wrapping material is at fault, the studies indicate. A calling card placed in the parcel with the senders name and address, with the destina-tion address added, is one easy way of insuring delivery when the cover is damaged.



# Heroic action earns medals

In a ceremony September 21, at Headquarters, VI United States Army Corps, Battle Creek, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Bost of Route 1, Lowell, received the Silver Star Medal, Bronze Star Medal, and Purple Heart Medal awarded posthumously to their son, Corporal Michael J. Bost.

The awards were prosented to Mr. and Mrs. Robert Bost by Major General Charles S. D'-Orsa, Commanding General of the VI United States Army Corps, Battle Creek,

Also attending the ceremony were Charles Bost, a brother to the late Corporal Bost, and Mrs. Joanne Bost, Mrs. Leah Jourdan, Richard Jourdan, Miss Terri Shepard, Miss Jean Hick-ey, and Walter Basham. Corporal Michael J. Bost was

killed in action while on a combat operation in Vietnam, May 14, 1967. He was awarded the Silver Star Medal, the third highest decoration awarded by the Army, for gallantry in ac-

The citation reads in part: "Corporal, then Private First Class Bost distinguished himself by valorous actions on 14 May 1967 while attached to Company A, 1st Battalion, 327th Infantry on a search and destroy mission. At this time, the 2d Platoon of Company A came under intensive automatic and small arms fire from a well entrenched enemy force in defensive po-

"Private First Class Bost was the leading man in the assault that started upon the hill. He advanced up the hill in the face of the fortified and bunkered

enemy positions. The insurgents opened fire with automatic weapons, grenades and machine guns. With bullets and grenades pitting and raking the area around him he ran and maneuvered to within 40 meters of the enemy emplacements. Here he

was seriously wounded." "At this time, three enemy insurgents assaulted a position manned by wounded comrades of Private First Class Bost. Seeing that the rest of the platoon was pinned down by enemy fire, and knowing that his wounded comrades were unable to defend themselves, Private First Class Bost rose and killed the three insurgents, despite his agonizing wound. He was still firing when an enemy machine

gun zeroed in on him.' "At this time he was fatally wounded Private First Class Bost's unquestionable valor in close combat against numerically superior hostile forces is in keeping with finest traditions of the military service and re-flects great credit upon himself, Task Force OREGON, and the United States Army.' Bost, a 1965 graduate of Low-

ell high school, enlisted in the Army on December 7, 1965, and had been on active duty in Viet Nam since September of 1966.




