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Charles Pierce retires as football coach

Charles Pierce, Lowell High School football coach for the past 10 years announced this week that he has asked the Board of Education to replace him as football coach next year. He did say that he planned to, remain in Lowell in his teach-

ing capacity. "My decision to quit coach-ing football at the end of this season was made only after a considerable amount of thought, Pierce revealed. "For the good of all concerned, I know that the change at this time will be beneficial. I have thoroughly enjoyed my ten years of coaching in Lowell, and I look forward to many more happy years here as a teacher."

Pierce came to Lowell High in 1958 and only twice in the years between 1958 and 1966 has one of his teams lost more games than they have won. His vintage year was of course 1964 when his team won seven, lost

when his team won seven, lost none and tied one. In the nine year period he has a 41 won, 30 lost and 2 tied record. Members of his teams have been picked 26 times as all con-ference; in the 1964 season five members of the all conference team were from Lowell.

Drastic action needed to halt dog disease

A Michigan State University veterinary researcher has urged drastic action to control newly recognized, highly conta-gious disease of dogs.

Dr. John A. Morre said that efforts similar to those used to control brucellosis in cattle are necessary to combat epizootic canine abortion, which poses the greatest problem of any disease to breeders and large-scale users of dogs, especially beagles.
