Charles Pierce retires as football coach

Charles Pierce, Lowell High School football coach for the past 10 years announced this week that he has asked the Board of Education to replace him as football coach next year. He did say that he planned to remain in Lowell in his teaching capacity.

"My decision to quit coaching football at the end of this season was made only after a considerable amount of thought, Pierce revealed. "For the good of all concerned, I know that the change at this time will be beneficial. I have thoroughly enjoyed my ten years of coaching in Lowell, and I look forward to many more happy years here as a teacher."

Pierce came to Lowell High in 1958 and only twice in the 9 years between 1958 and 1966 has one of his teams lost more games than they have won. His vintage year was of course 1964 when his team won seven, lost none and tied one. In the nine year period he has a 41 won, 30 lost and 2 tied record.

Members of his teams have been picked 26 times as all conference; in the 1964 season five members of the all conference team were from Lowell.

Students to be immunized

Immunizations against smallpox, tetanus and diphtheria will be offered to the fifth grade students of Lowell Area Schools on Thursday, October 26. The same immunizations will be given to the ninth grade on Wednesday, October 25.

The students will be given consent slips, which must be signed by their parents or guardians and returned to the school on or before Monday, October 23.

It is recommended that a booster for the above be taken every five years. The school urges the parents to see that the children receive them when necessary to maintain adequate immunity.

All slips should be returned—either signed or marked not needed.

Soldier's bravery wins Bronze Star

A ceremony posthumously honoring Randal Aylworth with a Bronze Star for bravery was held on Wednesday night, October 11, at the Grand Rapids Army Reserve Center. Col. John Wilkes, commanding officer of the 394th Station Hospital presented the award to Aylworth's mother, Mrs. Carl Aylworth of Jenison and his widow, the former Lorna Bygert, of 6872 Morse Lake Avenue, Alto.

Pfc Aylworth, who served as a radio-telephone operator, died in combat on May 22 in Vietnam when Company A, 3rd Battalion, 12th Infantry, was attacked. Although wounded, he crawled to the radio to call for help, firing as he moved. Death resulted from a grenade explosion.

The award commended him for "steadfast bravery and outstanding devotion to duty which reflect great credit on himself, his unit and the Army."

Interment followed at Oakwood Cemetery.

Court removes children from local home

At a hearing in Kent County Probate Court Monday, the four children of Mrs. Irene Manning, 423 S. Hudson St., Lowell, were taken from her custody.

The court heard several local witnesses, who told of her repeated neglect of the children. The children, 9, 7, 4 and 2 were made wards of the court and will be placed in foster homes.

Lowell police were first made aware of this condition this spring when the children were found wandering on Main St., on more than one occasion. During the trailer rally, the children appeared and told of not having enough to eat and some of the traileries fed them.

During the 4-11 fair it was brought to the attention of the local authorities, by an officer of the fair, that the seven-year-old girl was being molested by an uncle. This case was investigated by the Lowell police and the uncle taken into custody.

On September 5th, Lowell Police were called to the home by a neighbor who reported that the children were left for hours with no adult supervision. Investigation found the children poorly clothed, without food and needing medical attention. They were taken from the home and placed in Child Haven.

The children's father died of a heart attack last spring while driving through the town to work. The mother formerly lived in Ionia County. While a resident there, in 1953, that county court removed 3 children from her custody and made them wards of the court.

At the hearing on Monday she told of her plans to marry again.
