## Scalp 'Redskins'

The Lowell Varsity football team annexed its first victory of the season in a thrill-packed game by defeating the Belding Redskins on their own turf, 26 to 24, last Friday.

Every game has its heroes and outstanding performers and this contest was no exception. Every player that participated, contributed their share to ruin Belding's homecoming festivities.

The Red Arrows 'never say die' attitude, in a game in which they most certainly were rated as underdogs, ended a 5 game losing streak and knocked the Redskins to the conference cellar position.

Lowell unveiled its best offense thus far this season and exhibited a stubborn defense that wouldn't give up, in its come-from-behind victory.

### see-saw

Belding scored first in the see-saw contest when their defensive tackle, Joe Cooper, recovered a first-period Red Arrow fumble in the end zone, to give them six points. The try for the extra point was no good.

Lowell came back to tie the game early in the second quarter when Rick Foerster took a handoff on Belding's 40 yard line and scampered to paydirt. A pass to Curt Fonger for the point after touchdown was complete to move Lowell into the lead, 7 to 6.

### 12 to 7

Late in the second stanza, when it appeared that the Red Arrows might have a halftime advantage, Hube Ellis of Belding scored on a 35 yard pass

from Redskin quarterback Wayne King. This finished the scoring for the first half with the hosts enjoying a 12 to 7 advantage at intermission.

Following Lowell's kickoff to Belding, the Red Arrows regained the lead when Roger Kropf intercepted a Redskin aerial on their own 30 yard line and ran it into the end zone for Lowell's second TD. The 'point after' attempt was no good, leaving the Red Arrows with a slim 13 to 12 lead.

Belding struck back moments later with their third touchdown to overtake their visitors. Failing to make the extra point, the Redskins led 18 to 13.

### Foerster

Rick Foerster tallied his second touchdown of the evening to shoot Lowell into the lead once again. The 44 yard run from scrimmage ended the scoring for three quarters with Lowell on top 19 to 18.

The fourth quarter saw Lowell putting on a sustained drive with Steve Thurtell scoring from five yards out to boost the Red Arrows' lead to 25 to 18. Foersters' plunge for the extra point was good to give the local griders a 26 to 18 lead.

Not to be outdone, Belding followed Lowell's TD with one of their own—two minutes later, Hube Ellis carried the final 3 yards to cut Lowell's lead to two points, 26 to 24. This ended all scoring for the game but not the exciting action of the final minutes.

### foul

Late in the game, Belding moved the ball deep into Lowell territory. A 15 yard per-

sonal foul penalty against the Redskins nullified a nice run by a Belding halfback which could have led to another touchdown.

With time running out, and a fourth down situation confronting Belding, Lowell's defense 'rose to the occasion,' and 'smothered' the host's quarterback for a 15 yard loss. After regaining possession of the ball, Lowell ran out the clock to give them the well-deserved victory.

### notes

The offensive line, with some previously injured players back in the line-up, gave a much better showing in this game in comparison with the previous games.

Coaches Pierce and Smith's decision to insert Rick Foerster as a running back, paid off well as he personally gained 175 yards in 24 attempts for 7.3 yards per carry.

Belding's downfall was their inability to make an extra point. Ron Olson and Pat Giggins 'shot through the Redskin defense to block two of the place kicks.

Jack Thomet threw eleven passes and completed six for 40 yards.

The Red Arrows gained 248 yards on the ground and 40 in the air to give them an offensive output of 288 yards.

Lowell plays, here, this Friday at 7:30 p. m. with Middleville. This is Lowell's homecoming.

## Bank to expand



Lowell State Savings Bank received authority from the State Banking Commission this week, to build a new drive-in bank on the west side of town.

The new bank will be situated on the west corner of Valley Vista Drive and West Main Street; across from McQueen's new automobile agency, and adjacent to the recently opened Eberhard Shopping Center.

Work on plans for the drive-in facility, will be started at once. Construction will probably start next spring.

"The new drive-in bank," Harold J. Englehardt, State Savings Bank president revealed, "will be designed to serve the needs of the citizens. Under consideration are plans to have extended hours, to offer further banking services than are now provided. Englehardt stated, "the drive-in type banking service will only supplement the full service bank on East Main Street."

Under present plans, only two stations will be manned—a drive-in window for banking from your car, and a walk-in window for the not so lazy customers. The general services at this branch bank will be limited to those that can be provided from this type of a facility.

The State Savings Bank purchased the 150 x 150 parcel of land from Dok Realty Company. The location is ideal, and should be of great service to the bank's patrons who travel M-21 west daily.

Featured in the parade will be the Lowell High School Band, under the direction of William Mills, members of the City Council and other dignitaries.

A float, carrying Youth Honor Day Royalty, will have a prominent place in the parade. ## New M-91 bridge opened to traffic

The oldest bridge on Michigan's state highway system was "retired" Monday when a new bridge carrying M-91 over the Grand River, south of Lowell was opened to traffic.

The 83-year-old one-lane bridge, which also had the distinction of being the oldest steel bridge anywhere in Michigan, was replaced by a new \$358,158 two-lane concrete and steel structure. The old bridge will be torn down.

Built to horse and buggy specifications in 1884, the old bridge was financed under provisions of the 1850 Swampland Road Act, one of the earliest plans for federal-state cooperation in the building of roads, bridges, canals, dams, ditches and other drainage structures.

Ironically, the new bridge was financed entirely with state funds.

Under the 1850 Swampland Road Act, the federal government granted Michigan 5,836,900 acres of land which could be sold to finance construction of roads, bridges and other facilities.

The contract also calls for demolition of the old bridge by next May.

In 1861, the State Legislature authorized 24 construction projects, including a road from Hastings to Lowell. Four thousand acres of so-called swampland was authorized to finance the Hastings-Lowell Road. The contractors were to be paid either in acreage or from the sale of the land.

The term "swampland" was really a misnomer because much of the land in the federal grants turned out to be good timber and farm areas.

Records listing the name of the contractor and cost of the original bridge apparently were discarded many years ago because the information is not available in Highway Department files.

Brown Brothers, Inc., of Lansing, was contractor on the \$353,158 project which included construction and paving of approaches to the new bridge. Bids were taken last December and the bridge is being opened to traffic six weeks ahead of schedule.

## Gives approval unanimously

Approval was given on Monday night by the Lowell Planning Commission for rezoning of an area in the Valley Vista Plat, on West Main Street, to allow further construction of apartments. Vote on the approval was made unanimously by the Planning Commission; with little discussion.

Hearing on this request for rezoning was made before the City Council last February, but a misunderstanding by the Planning Commission and the developer, over conditions, have held up the approval. Members of the Planning Commission stated at the meeting, "that at no time did they disapprove the building of apartments."

Douglas Dok of Dok Realty, Inc., who was present at the action of the Planning Commission that he would be able to start construction of two new apartment buildings early in November.

Action still has to be taken by the City Council, at their next meeting on November 6—but no problems are expected here.

### bad news

The Planning Commission heard a report on the proposed fill of the Flat River, west of Lafayette Street, which indicated that this area will not be as easy to redevelop as first thought.

The engineer's reports show that the river bottom has 10 to 12 feet of muck and other material that will not even sup-

port a parking lot or any other surface use.

In order to fill the proposed area, the muck would have to be removed and solid earth moved in.

The cost of this type of fill is expected to be four times the estimated cost of using river bottom material for the fill. City Manager Bernard Olson estimated the cost for filling about 4 acres at \$80,000 to \$85,000.

### refused

Lowell's application for acceptance of a workable program for urban renewal funds was turned down by federal authorities. Application had been made through John Paul Jones and Associates, who were employed to draw up the preliminary applications.

The application was refused on the basis of a new federal requirement that a city must have building, fire and safety, plumbing and electrical codes in effect for six months and show effective enforcement. This new requirement was only put into effect, here, on September 7.

Shortage of federal funds for urban renewal was blamed for the tougher requirements. Up to September 7 it was only required that these codes be put in effect over a period of years. Until the Viet Nam war is over, and new funds are made available, there appears little chance of urban renewal funds for Lowell.

**Draft appeal folder issued**

Selective Service wants every registrant to know his rights to appeal his draft classification.

Colonel Arthur A. Holmes, the state director, has provided all Michigan local boards with a new pamphlet on "Taking Appeal" and other related information. Copies are free to all who ask.

Registrants, dependents and employers are urged to read this draft appeal folder following each classification. Most problems for local boards, however, because no one lets the board know the situation until the registrant is practically on his way to the army, Colonel Holmes reported.

He said if a registrant will use his right to request a personal appearance with his board and appeal to the State Appeal Board, most cases will be resolved with equity and justice for all concerned.

Recently Selective Service extended appeal periods from 10 to 30 days following classification. All that is required for appeal is a timely written statement "I appeal" signed by the registrant or other authorized person.

Local boards also have pamphlets explaining how the draft system operates and information for employers who wish to request temporary deferments of their workers. These pamphlets may also be obtained from state draft headquarters in Lansing.

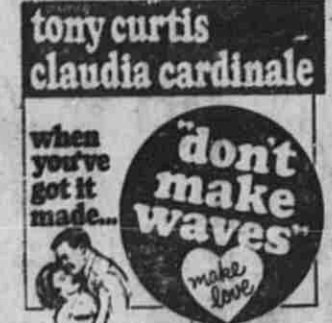
