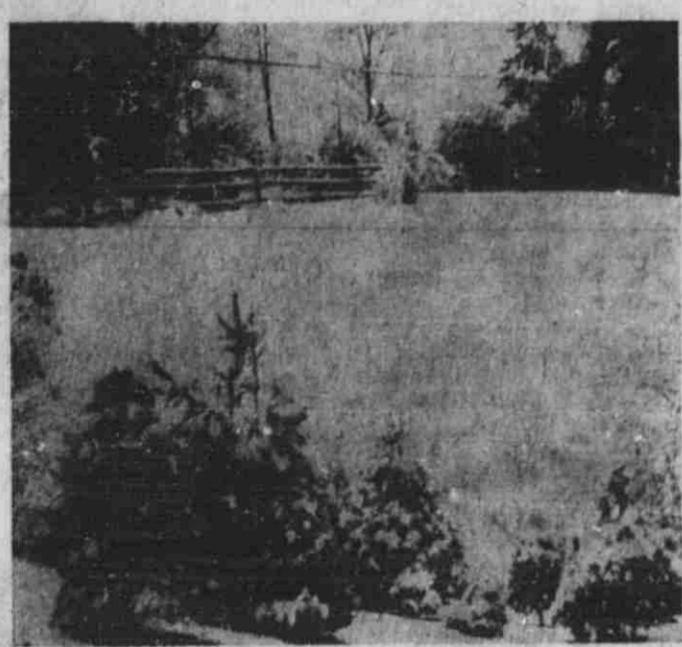

Fire takes life of elderly man

Fire destroyed the home and took the life of Edward A. Kotesky of 4966 Montcalm Avenue Thursday, October 26, at about 12:30 p. m.

The fire was discovered by Mr. and Mrs. Fred Klahn who live within one-half mile of the Kotesky residence. After calling the Lowell and Alto fire departments, the Klahns went to the house and searched for Mr. Kotesky, age 79, who was known to be at home at that time.

They were unable to enter one room on the first floor, which officers later designated as his bedroom. Investigators feel that the fire started in this room and spread throughout the house finally burning the structure to the ground.

Mr. Kotesky lived with his son, Frank, 41, who was away at work at the time of the blaze.

Besides Frank, Mr. Kotesky survived by another son, George of New Troy; one daughter, Mrs. Donald Stasser of Chicago, Illinois, and 6 grandchildren.

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon at the Roth Funeral Home in Lowell with the Rev. Rudy Wittenbach officiating.

Interment followed in South Boston Cemetery, Boston Township.

St. Patrick's asks Board to transport students

Public school transportation for parochial school children was the topic of a meeting held in St. Patrick's parish hall Monday evening.

The discussion was prompted by the controversial Public Act 241 which was passed by the Michigan State Legislature in 1964. This act promises public transportation to all students regardless of whether they attend private or public schools.

Present at the meeting, which was presided over by Father Edmund Farrell, pastor of St. Patrick's parish, was James A. Pace, Superintendent of Schools; Dr. Robert E. Reagan, president of the Lowell Area School Board; Roger Buck, head of transportation for the Lowell system; and John Vos, who is in charge of the buses, routes and drivers for the Lowell system.

In addition, James A. Byrne, president of St. Patrick's School Board; Donald Lennon, Assistant to the Superintendent of

Catholic Schools for the Grand Rapids Diocese; and Sister Mary Edona, RSM, principal of St. Patrick's school, were in attendance.

present

At present the children of St. Patrick's are transported to school in the main by their individual parents and by two buses, owned and operated by groups of parents, which are transporting children from the Grattan and Cannonsburg areas.

Lowell, at present, is transporting 482 public school students at a total of 179 miles on seven buses in this area. All seven buses are carrying peak loads.

Mr. Pace revealed that is has long been the policy of the Lowell Schools to cooperate with the parochial schools regarding transportation where convenient. He cited the fact that 80 students attending St. Mary's in Lowell and 20 Ada Christian

School students are brought in to Lowell on the public school buses which pass their homes. This is a simple solution with all buses converging on Lowell.

Ada Christian students are then taken to their school on a private bus and returned to Lowell in time to ride the public school buses home in the afternoon.

future

The very location of St. Patrick's school increases the magnitude of the problem. Their student load is fairly well divided between three districts, Rockford, Belding and Lowell, with Lowell the only one liable under the law to provide transportation.

A total of 29 families with a count of 82 St. Patrick's students are contained in the Lowell district. After the discussion was completed it looked as though it would be some time before the problem was solved to everyone's satisfaction.

Of the 29 families involved, it appeared that easy answers were available to bus about one-third of the children, immediately.

Some others are willing to continue to transport their children, but inquired about reimbursement as provided for by the law in question.

Supt. Pace indicated other possible solutions include the reimbursement of the privately owned buses for carrying Lowell area students, and held out the hope that next year a public school bus and driver could be allocated specifically to St. Patrick's for their use.

Everyone agreed that the welfare of the child was the primary concern of all, and the solution will have to be worked out slowly and constructively in the future. Any and all solutions must be approved by the Lowell Area Board of Education.



Game violations on the increase in Lowell area

The increased game violations since the start of the small game hunting season has prompted a crackdown by judges and conservation officials.

Lowell township and surrounding territory have the highest incidence of violations in Kent County. Officials indicate that hunters who break game regulations can be prepared to pay large fines when their violations come to light.

Recently James Wert of Lowell was arraigned before Justice Howard Rittenger on the charge of possessing a crossbow. Officer Arnold Richmond found the weapon in Wert's car in a game area.

The crossbow is not only an illegal hunting weapon in Michigan, but under criminal law is classed as a deadly weapon and to carry it concealed or in a vehicle is a felony.

Wert paid a fine of \$10 and \$7.30 in costs in Justice Rittenger's court. It was indicated that if he had been actually using the weapon for hunting the fine would have been much stiffer.

Last week a father and son, Orvis W. and Gerald Jones of Wyoming, Michigan, each were fined \$60 and costs of \$7.30 and charged \$50 each for one deer by Justice Andrew DeKracker of Wyoming.

The body of the deer was found by a local small game hunter near Lowell. He alerted conservation officers who waited nearby until the defendants came to retrieve it.

Other violations in the area have been reported and are being checked out by officials.

It is estimated that six or more deer were killed by small game hunters in the first three days of hunting season in the Grand Rapids area. Also reported are many instances when pheasant hunters couldn't wait for the opening day and did their hunting previously and illegally ahead of time.

Penalties, fines and costs will become increasingly stiffer as officials try to cope with this problem, the deer-sport hunter.

Annual address report program

Postmaster General Lawrence F. O'Brien said today that all post offices will again participate in the annual address reporting program for aliens during the month of January, 1968.

The 32,000 post offices in the 50 States, Guam, Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands, will participate by making available address report cards for submission to Immigration and Naturalization offices.

The Immigration and Nationality Act of 1952 requires each alien residing in the United States on January 1, 1968, to report his current address to the Commissioner of the Immigration and Naturalization Service within the period from January 1 to January 31, 1968.

The address report cards to be used—a manila punch-card similar to that which was used last January—will be furnished to postmasters next month, distribution to the public will not be made until the first day of January.

The cards, as they are completed by aliens, are turned in to their local postmaster, who in turn forwards them to designated Immigration and Naturalization office.

BBB warns of sales gimmicks

If an innocent looking lad stands on your doorstep, and asks you to buy magazine subscriptions because he's "working his way through college" the best thing you can do is check with the Grand Rapids Better Business Bureau.

The Bureau has recently issued a warning that they have received numerous calls during the past weeks concerning companies soliciting magazine subscriptions using a multitude of gimmicks, including the one noted above.

While there are many ethical companies working in the magazine subscription field in this area, this warning concerns only those who offer false claims, who use high-pressure tactics or who otherwise attempt to coerce people into buying unwanted subscriptions through misrepresentation or other pressure tactics.

It is better to be safe than sorry, and no reputable salesman will object to having his credentials checked or to having you call the BBB for information on his firm. The best policy is to be careful, and don't expect to get something for nothing.
