## Council seeks M-21 improvements...

The Lowell City Council Monday night passed a resolution asking the State Highway Department to improve M-21 to Lowell instead of halting improvements at Ada. The 2.8 million dollar project to rebuild M-21 from the I-96 freeway to Ada was announced by the highway department last week. A five lane highway in place of the inadequate 2 lanes was announced as part of the next five year plan. Work is scheduled to begin in 1971. Traffic is heavy from Grand Rapids to Lowell, surveys show, and accidents have occurred frequently along the entire 14 mile stretch of narrow highway. Lowell City Council in their resolution are requesting that plans include extension of the improvement from Ada to Lowell.

### rezone

The City Council passed amendments to the zoning ordinance to permit apartment buildings in the area on the north side of West Main Street, west of Valley Vista Drive. This will permit Dok Rista to build two additional apartment buildings. The Council also rezoned a 6 acre portion of residential area

in the north section of Lowell Development property to industrial to permit Root-Lowell Corporation to build a new factory. The six acres lay adjacent to other land being purchased by the company that is already zoned industrial.

### ask Council

Norm Borgerson, spark-plug of the effort to save the 1884 steel bridge over Grand River, now replaced by a new concrete structure appeared before the Council to get their support.

The Bridge, Norm explained to the Council, is a thing of beauty and can be admired while crossing the new river span. Save this bridge and Lowell will truly be a city of bridges, Norm pleaded.

We have a Main St. of three bridges, three covered bridges within a 9 mile area and now we have a chance to have the oldest steel bridge in the state highway system.

The Council made no comment on the Borgerson request. The old bridge is scheduled to be removed by Brown Brothers Construction Company under their contract with the State Highway Department by next May.

## Attwood strike is quickly settled

Production was shut down when a short-term strike against the Attwood Corporation went into effect last Friday. Differences were ironed out quickly between management and union officials and the new contract was accepted by union members on Saturday afternoon.

A short lived and comparatively calm strike at the Attwood Corporation in Lowell went into effect last Friday at 12:01 a. m. when the 250 workers belonging to Metal Workers, Buffers, Platers and Helpers, Local No. 7 AFL-CIO, refused to work until a satisfactory new contract could be drawn between company and union.

Workers had voted on Wednesday, November first, to turn down the contract presented to them by their negotiating committee. A new three year contract in which minor changes had been made was finally accepted by the union membership on Saturday and signed by company and union officials on Monday.

### excitement

Picket lines were orderly and quiet and only two incidents of excitement lived up to the otherwise dull routine. On Friday, when over 200 workers showed up in the rain to claim pay checks, the complicated traffic

situation blocked access to the plant from time to time.

Herman Dreger, 47, of Ionia, was slightly injured on Saturday when he was hit while on picket duty by the side mirror on a pick-up truck which was attempting to cross the picket line. Police commented that this was strictly accidental and not in any way an outbreak of strike-related violence.

### fewer jobs

One immediate result of the strike was the loss of all production of automotive parts. The dies were removed from the plant after the union members turned down the contract on Wednesday.

Company officials indicated that some workers are being recalled this week as the plant returns to partial production. They also stated that they are seeking new jobs to replace those lost by the threat of lost production time because of a long strike.

## Alto car-train crash takes life of Mrs. Anna E. Bloomer, 66

Mrs. Anna E. Bloomer, aged 66, of Ada was pronounced dead at the scene of a car-train crash which occurred when her husband Leo, aged 69, drove his car into the path of an oncoming Chesapeake and Ohio freight train at the Bancroft Avenue crossing in Alto, Monday morning.

The cause of death was listed as multiple head injuries. Injured in the accident were Mr. Bloomer and their four-year-old granddaughter, Michelle Marentette. Both were admitted to Butterworth Hospital in Grand Rapids. Mr. Bloomer is listed in good condition. Michelle was listed as being in fair condition. She suffered head injuries in the crash. Mr. and Mrs. Bloomer were on their way to the Alto elementary

school to pick up Michelle's sister at the time of the accident.

Michelle is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Raymond (Ruth Ann) Marentette of Lowell.

Surviving Mrs. Bloomer besides her husband and the Marentette family are one son, Floyd of Wyoming; one other daughter, Mrs. Robert (Lorraine) Meeuwisen of Lowell; 4 other grandchildren; one great-grandson and one brother, Seymour Heschke of Mesa, Arizona. Funeral services will be held on Thursday afternoon at the Roth Funeral Home in Lowell with the Rev. James Bailard and the Rev. Earl Hardyman officiating.

Interment will take place in Cascade Cemetery.

Mrs. Gray told Kent County Sheriff's officers that she was going east on Cascade Road, in the Pratt Lake area, and came upon a farm tractor, as she came over a hill. She swerved, and applied the brakes to avoid a collision. The car skidded into a guard rail, rolled down an embankment, throwing Mrs. Gray out, and bursting into flames.

The Wittenbach boys, operators of the tractor, which Police said carried proper lights & a slow-moving vehicle sign, ran to pull Mrs. Gray away from the burning car.

She was taken to the Grand Rapids Osteopathic Hospital, suffering from neck, wrist and elbow injuries. Lowell Fire Department was called to the scene, but the car was completely destroyed by the engulfing flames.

### Veterans' Day November 11

November 11th will be Veterans' Day. It used to be Armistice Day.

In 1954 Congress changed its name and its meaning. It was established to celebrate the ending of WW I. It was a time of prayers and a time of parades, honoring those who had died "to save the world" and to give thanks that the deed had been accomplished. Throughout the world it was observed, especially at 11 a. m., the time the fighting ceased.

But history marched on. Human nature did not change overnight. Now November 11th is Veterans' Day in order to honor all service men and women who have served and are serving the United States. Are we observing it enough?

The old Armistice Day served another special function. It taught children the emotions and the meanings of patriotism. In the schools at 11 a. m. children would stand, close their eyes and say a prayer. They were allowed to say prayers, they were encouraged to say prayers, and even though the youngest did not fully understand, they were made aware that they were part of a team, a country, of which they should be proud. Where is the good, old fashioned flag waving today? We need it now.

Witness the anti-war demonstrations which are occurring around the country. Witness the wholesale burning of draft cards. Witness the efforts to block induction centers. Witness the contempt for law and order, and for that matter common decency. Witness the attitude of complete irresponsibility on the part of some. Witness the strange non-involvement policy which some assume; they take from this country, but are not willing to give. Witness those who race impatiently sweating down all of the sameless corridors of the spent life, opening rusty doors on dusty riddles, eager to wring the first and last drops of patriotism in one twist. They run unceasingly from one job to another, one experience to others, reaching desperately for a way of life not yet earned but deemed a right, ignoring the ancient truth that man must fight and win his privileges, in any society, in any age.

Then ask yourself, how sick is America? How have we allowed a sizeable number of our people to contact a malady which is not natural, but abnormal? Watch out for the sickness! To the depths will we allow these people to go before corrective action is taken? There are those who give aid to our enemies. Is this a game they are playing? Not when our young men die.

The sickness is neither natural nor feigned. It stems from the cleverly planned idea of rebellion, and there now seems to be little doubt as to the beginning of that idea. Even official Washington now admits that there is a subversive force at work behind the demonstrations. Honest folk have been swept up into the action, not realizing that it is a coordinated effort on the part of our mortal enemies. They see only what their emotions radiate. They can't tell the forest for the trees.

It takes a lot of practice to become as sick as so many of our folks are now, and the practice sessions are certainly not under the direction of those to whom loyalty and patriotism are part of their general make-up. The directors of the practice—cleverly hidden from view—are those who, through worming their way into the hearts and minds of impressionable youth, hope to complete the breakthrough, and finally take over the nation. **Samantha finds new shop for chair caning**

Dear Polly and David: Did you ever feel that the art of caning a chair was lost? I certainly did. I remember calling practically everyone that I knew to find someone to do a chair for me. I never did get a good lead. There was only one man I could find and he was so busy that he wouldn't take any more orders.

Well, now we can all rest easily. George and Pat McClellan on 28th Street (that's the part off Buttrick, not the south belt-line) have opened their own shop. They do cane weaving, web seats, rush and fibre and splint work.

Although the shop is new, they have been at this for many years for their own benefit. Pat first learned how to cane about twenty years ago and when she married, she taught George. Together they have had the thrill of picking up bargains at auctions and refinishing them. Because they could do the caning, they were able to buy items that others had to pass by.

Recently they discovered an heirloom of their own. George's grandfather was Rev. Clark of the former Ada Baptist Church. When they wanted to revitalize his pulpit chair, Pat removed the red velvet cushion and discovered caning holes in the seat. So now new material has been worked on the seat and it is completely refinished.

Something I never knew before was the difference between the cane weaving and web seats. The first is done when there are holes drilled in the wood around the outside of the seat area. The second method is used when there is a spline and there are no holes.

The splint work is done with hickory and is hard to do. It is usually on porch furniture or footstools, but doesn't appear in this part of the country as much as in the south. Fibre work looks just like rush, but lasts longer which surprised me. Pat says that very often people don't even know that they have fibre because it imitates the appearance of rush so well.

And there you are. I just thought I'd let you know that you can now go ahead and bid on a bargain even though the seat of the matter is missing. Samantha
