Lowell Schools will be dismissed at 1:30 p. m. on Wednesday, December 13, so that teacher meetings can be neld. Afternoon kindergarten students will not attend school at all on this date.

Christmas vacation will start at 3:30 p. m., on Thursday, De-cember 21, and school will re-open on Tuesday, January 2, at the regular time. In case of bad weather con-

ditions which might close school, parents are advised to listen to local radio and TV stations. If school is closed, the decision will be made by 7 a, m, and the stations will be notified by that time.

If school has to be dismissed during the school day, because weather or road conditions. the local radio stations will be notified as soon as the decision is made by school officials.

Mail early in the day

Postmaster Doyle today re-minded local residents that it just as important to mail early in the day as to mail early during the Christmas sea-

By mailing early in the day postal employees can assure that gifts, cards and letters can be sent on their way by the earliest possible transportation. Often there is only one connection per day for many distant points. If mail is deposited after that transportation has left there can be a one day delay in moving the mail on to its

next sorting point.

Because of the heavy nationwide Christmas mailing, Post-master Doyle asked that more than ever before, citizens mail early in the Season to assure that there are no jam ups in major cities where trains, trucks and planes converge with their mail.

"Early mailing assures an even flow of mail, not a sudden surge which could log-jam the postal system," the postmaster said. "According to Postmaster General Lawrence F. O'Brien's predictions, there will be over nine billion pieces of mail delivered during the Christmas Rush. If all that mail were to hit at one time there would not be enough workers or space to handle the mail and Christmas mail would be delayed."

Truck driver killed when thrown 42 feet

An lonia businessman was fatally injured early Friday morning, when his canteen truck went out of control and rolled over on M-21, about two miles west of the Lowell city

Earl J. "Andy" Anderson, 41, of 810 West Washington Street, Ionia, was pronounced dead on arrival at Blodgett Hospital in Grand Rapids by Kent County Medical examiner, Dr. Kool, of a fractured neck and skull. According to Kent County Sheriff's officers, Anderson was headed east on the highway and apparently lost control of the panel-type truck after rounding curve.

The vehicle rolled over at least twice, deputies reported, and the driver was thrown out, landing some 42 feet from the overturned truck.

He was born August 1, 1926, in Manistee, the son of Earl Anderson, sr., and Theresa Piekarski Anderson. Mr. Anderson and his wife,

the former Laura Blackford, moved to Ionia in 1953 from Grand Rapids, where he had been employed at Nash Kelvinator, and completed his studies at Davenport College. He was employed at Meijers super market in the meat de-

Transportation becomes job

students to and from school each day is becoming a big job for the Lowell Area Schools. Students were first transported in Lowell in 1937 when four school buses were purchased and 160 students from the rural

areas were transported to town. Today, the Lowell Schools have 28 buses and transport over 1,900 students to school over 40 bus routes. The school buses travel over 1,500 miles daily and this year will log a total of over 280,000 miles.

budget

The transportation budget will require eight percent of the total school general fund budget this year or about \$100,000. About two-thirds of this amount is re-imbursed by the state on a formula that considers the number of students transported, wages and equipment costs.

This year the schools pur chased five new buses for almost \$37,000 and this amount is included in the \$100,000 figure. The school district has an investment of \$150,000 in transportation equipment and em-ploys two full-time mechanics to maintain them. All minor repairs are done by school personnel and major repairs are done by local garages.

routes

The planning of bus routes, of drivers (making sure that they have chauffers licenses, pass physicals and at-

tend bus drivers' school), long range planning on purchase of equipment, filing required reports to the state and other items require many hours of work by a small dedicated

group of people.

Roger Buck, John Vos, Barbara Vos and Joe Green spend many hours on these items each year and they must be able to make quick decisions of equipment, roads and student loads.

Parents are helping the trans-porting of students by having their children ready to board buses on time and by helping with discipline problems on buses. In several cases parents have made suggestions on bus routes and stops that have eliminated many extra bus miles and stops

changes

All bus routes were changed this school year and it appears that many changes will be required next year due to costs and influx of students, Collective bus stops are being dis-cussed and possible double routes (one for elementary students and one for junior and senior high students) are some of the changes being considered. As these plans are being formulated, various groups will be contacted in regard to their

opinions and desires.
It is never possible to please everyone on a bus route, but parents can be assured that their children are riding safe equipment with a qualified driver behind the wheel

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




