

Heart attack victim crashes into loaded school bus; dies at scene

Main Street was the scene of a car-school bus accident on Thursday morning when Donald Taylor, 60, 2517 Timpson Ave., Lowell, suffered a fatal heart attack while driving down Riverside Drive, and crashed into a school bus going east on Main St. His daughter, Bonnie, 11, grabbed the wheel and caused the car to hit the bus a glancing blow. None of the the 32 children on the bus, or the driver, Bob Perry, or Miss Taylor were injured.



Donald Taylor, 60, died at the scene of a car-school bus accident Thursday morning on West Main Street, Lowell. The accident occurred, police said, when Taylor, who had a history of heart trouble, suffered a heart attack while driving south on Riverside Drive.

Council submits

Much of the time at the Council meeting Monday night was devoted to a plan for ambulance service for Lowell and the surrounding townships

City Manager Bernard Olson had drawn up a plan, and it has been submitted to the Kent County Board of Supervisors. for help from the county. The plan calls for Lowell Police to man an ambulance and would require extra men and a vehicle and equipment; it was estimated to cost \$14,000 per year.

The Kent County Safety Com-mittee has agreed to submit a proposal to the Board of Supervisors to provide \$6,000 a year to subsidize the ambulance service. Lowell City, Lowell and Vergennes Townships would be asked to provide the rest of the money needed.

Under the City Manager's plan the Lowell ambulance service would cover both emergency and routine calls and a charge of \$25 to \$35 would be made to help cover costs.

There are an average of 150 ambulance runs of all types each year it has been estimated; only about 10 percent of these are of an emergency na-

The City Council was told that the Lowell Lions Club are discussing a plan whereby several of their members take required first aid courses and serve as auxiliary police and ambulance assistants

Two men are required on all ambulance runs, in many cases extra help would be needed by Lowell Police.

Until the plan can be put in effect, which will not be until sometime after the supervisors meet on January 10, the Lowell Police who have been trained in first aid will do their best give aid until Grand Rapids Ionia ambulance can arrive.

Specialist Fourth Class Lloyd Slack, 23, was fatally injured by sniper fire last Thursday, December 14, while fulfilling a combat operation. He was a member of the 3rd Batallion of the 12th Infantry Regiment, 4th

Lloyd, a popular and active member of the class of 1963 at Lowell high school, starred on the football, basketball, and track teams. Selected as the most valuable member of the 1962 Lowell football team and named to the backfield of the Tri-River all-star football team, he won the Frank Mailizia athletic scholarship to Grand Rapids Junior College where he continued his fabulous athletic ca-

In addition, while attending Lowell high school, he was a member of the Varsity Club, Varsity and General Choir, and Prom. Homecoming and Play Committees. He served as treasurer of his class in his freshman year and was a Junior Rotarian in his senior year.

Before he was drafted last February, he worked for Michigan Bell Telephone Company as an installer. He is survived by his mother and stepfather, Mr. and Mrs. Silas Riley, jr, of 15 Pleasant Street, SE, in Grand Rapids, &
