Developing body-space perception

In physical education in elementary schools, a 'trill' or 'fringing' on the cante, or is a basic and prerequisite to all learning? Purdue psychologist, Newell Kephart, Child development specialist, Gessell, Ft. Lauderdale, Fla., is a common cause of learning difficulties. As Florence E. Sutphen, Winter Haven Lions Research Foundation, Inc., states, 'It is an accepted fact, established by neurologists, that the command a child has over his body is indicative of how well he might be expected to succeed academically.' Within an environment conducive to learning the physical education teacher arranges and guides activities and experiences of children, based upon the growth and developmental needs of the children. They strive to develop—motor and visual perceptual skills, attitudes and understanding, thinking, manual dexterity, healthy relief of excess energy, stress and tensions, basic sports skills, enjoyable leisure activities and self-understanding. To promote and strengthen social, psychological and motor percept. There is much evidence from various reliable sources, that activities which stimulate sensory-motor performance enhance the later stages of learning (reading, writing, etc.). The young child must physically experience form, direction and space first in relation to his own body, then in relation to other objects and other people. An accurate perception of his own body, its parts and his relation to the space around him is the first step in developing the child's concept of errors. We encourage motor responses to an aural cue, which give the child practice in control of body parts, singly and in combination. Give him a sense of laterality (right and left) and become aware of the position of his arms and legs in space relative to his own body. Requesting him to move slowly or quickly helps him perceive his movements simultaneously, both as a sequence in time and a change in space. Give him practice in motorial reception of positions and directions such as, in front, behind, at the side, around, higher than and lower than, with the child's own verbal description to these physical activities, in motor response to aural cues. Provide opportunities to practice such motor skills as: coordinating eye and hand movements, locomotor activities such as walking, running, jumping, hopping, sliding, crawling, and activities to develop balance, within a framework designed to develop space perception, directionality and laterality. As they progress we provide more difficult movements, that require more balance and better gross coordination. Some clinicians have suggested that perceptual motor activities constitute magical panaceas for children with mild and severe learning difficulties. Other authorities take no such position, but they do constitute an important part of the educational program for all, exceptional children as well as children with mild or severe learning problems. An ultimate goal is to help the child understand his capabilities and limitations by knowing himself. His self-knowledge in turn, helps him to develop a self-concept which can be pleasing to him. The concepts are based on experiences, primarily motor at an early level. The school cannot do it all in the area of perceptual motor problems. The home needs to provide opportunities for motor tasks also. The following are some Per-
