## Major R. L. Stuart Honored by Army in Medal Award

A Lowell officer of the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers was awarded an Army Commendation Medal in recent ceremonies at Fairbanks, Alaska.

He is Major Robert Lee Stuart, son of Mrs. Julia K. Stuart of 319 Washington St.

The award, a first Oak Leaf Cluster, was presented to Major Stuart by Brig. Gen. Elmer Y. Yates, for "meritorious service during the period of the Tanana Valley flood and restoration in 1957."

In his citation Gen. Yates said: "As the Army Corps Engineers representative, Major Stuart was responsible for the organization and employment of all State, Federal and local resources."

"His leadership was most evident when it became evident that the flood waters would overtop the protective works, and his quick decision to evacuate the people from their homes."

"Later, he supervised the construction and the rehabilitation of all schools, public buildings, city streets and public utilities."

## Remains Critical Following Roof Collapse at GVC

A 25-year-old Lowell man who was seriously injured when a comed roof crashed last Wednesday at a new fieldhouse at Grand Valley College, remains in critical condition, Butterworth Hospital surgeons reported today.

George Taggart, of 2929 Alden Nash Rd., employed by the Delta Electric Co., a sub-contractor, Grand Rapids, was directly under the section when it collapsed.

Taken to Butterworth Hospital, Taggart was immediately placed in the intensive care unit with a fractured back and rib injuries.

Cause of the roof collapse has not been determined, building inspectors report.

## Two Fall-Out Shelters Near OK in City

Construction of two fall-out shelters in Lowell, after many months on the planning boards, moved closer to reality today following an inspection tour by Kent County Civil Defense Director Ray Blett and Regional Director Spencer Swanson.

Both of the Civil Defense directors said they were in town to approve licensing of the shelters, one to be located at the junior high school and the other at the King Milling plant.

Following final approval, the shelters are to be stocked with canned and packaged food, sanitary and medical supplies, and radio detectors, they said.

While in town, the two directors talked with Police Chief Avery Block, local Civil Defense director.

## Michigan Bell Records Area Payroll Mark



## 'Y' Task Force Opens Drive to Secure Members

Terry Bambrick, local YMCA Director, announced today that the annual YMCA Membership Campaign is now underway.

The campaign officially started Wednesday with a "kickoff" dinner for the 60 men and women that comprise the campaign force.

THIS "TASK FORCE" will, over the next three weeks, contact all expired memberships to obtain renewals and to make new contacts for possible memberships.

Membership fees account for about 10 percent of the total operating budget.

IN ADDITION, the Lowell YMCA is initiating a change in membership fees, the first in several years. Due to increased costs for operating and program expenses, membership rates as of March 1, 1968 are as follows:

Youth, \$3. (a raise of one dollar), Adult, \$7.00 (a raise of two dollars), Family, \$14.00 (a raise of two dollars).

This raise in rates is necessary to meet ever-increasing costs and to allow the membership to participate to a greater degree in assuming the responsibility of operation while depending less on the King Fund for additional funds.

If all goes well... and things seldom do in this crazy, mixed-up business... these will be the last words printed on a press that has been meeting deadlines for some 35 to 40 years.

Yes, the wheels are in motion to convert to "offset," which will be explained more fully in future editions.

In brief, however, it means that the reproductive standards... particularly with pictures... will be dramatically improved.

The old Goss Comet which has been responsible for delivery of your paper every week will grind out the paper, then sit and gather dust for awhile.

It's a fine old machine, one still capable of printing papers. But the methods of getting the printed word into type no longer are fast or efficient enough.

We have another machine in the plant called the Ludlow, which sets much headline and ad type. This one was kicking up this week and, for awhile, it appeared our date with offset might have to be pushed ahead of schedule.

## Job Calls For Jack-Of-All-Trades

Now what all this really gets around to is the several discussions I have had down through the years with an old friend and confidante named Judd Arnett, who authors a daily column for the Detroit Free Press when that well-known paper is in operation.

Judd received most of his newspaper training in the weekly field down at Liberty Center, Ohio, which you may have some difficulty locating on the map.

Just as he stepped over the edge, one of his partners asked if he was willing to play on the morrow. The answer came echoing back: "What time... time... time... time?" Funny story... and one that we hope the old Goss Comet will appreciate in its long days of retirement.

## Police Ticket Driver in Two-Car Crash

A Lowell police cruiser was dispatched at 9:15 p. m. Monday to the corner of Gee Dr. and Alden Nash to investigate a two-car crash.

According to reports, Larry Snyder, 21 of Five Mile, ran into a car operated by Terry Lee Buck, 27, of 1119 Cumberland. Neither was injured. However, police ticketed Snyder for failure to yield the right of way.

Lowell City Council today has before it a request from Douglas Dok, who heads up the Lowell Development Corporation, to expedite installation of a lift station to service the west end of the city.

Dok appeared before the council Monday night and outlined plans for new home and apartment construction in the Valley Vista subdivision.

The three council members in attendance... Mayor Pro-tem Herb Reynolds, Dick Schliernitzer and Carl Anderson... questioned both Dok and City Manager Bernard C. Olson at some length to determine a course of action on the builder's request.

DOK SAID he is hopeful of getting construction underway as soon as possible on 27 new single-family dwellings and either three or seven new multiple-family apartment buildings.

He showed council a new plat plan for the proposed Valley Vista No. 5 project that includes wider lots, which will be necessary if a new subdivision ordinance now in the hands of the Lowell Planning Commission is adopted.

The council deferred the proposal to the planning commission for consideration.

ALSO FORWARDED to the planners was Dok's request for approval of four additional lots on which he proposes to construct apartments.

Olson told council that the planning commission has before it several plans for installation of a lift station in the western area of the city.

"Our consulting engineers have given the city several alternate proposals for the lift station," Olson said, "but a full study is needed to determine site location and cost factors that will give us best future usage and economy."

Dok has indicated willingness to install the sewer facility on Sibley Drive at no cost to the city. However, maintenance of the station would be the responsibility of the city.

ALTERNATE PLANS now being considered by the Planning Commission, Olson noted, call for installation of the station at a point further west, but at additional expense to the city.

"We're hopeful that some formula for financing the extra cost can be worked out," Olson explained. "Everything seems to be moving west... there's good potential for development there."

Councilman Anderson noted that "the planning commission has definite ideas on development of the west area and I'll go along with their thinking."

Councilman Reynolds, serving in the absence of vacationing Mayor Arnold Wittenbach, observed that much of the city manager's time is presently being spent on tax assessment matters and that, of necessity, study of a number of projects, such as the lift station, have been set aside temporarily.

## OTHER MATTERS taken up by the council included:

1. Passage of a resolution granting approval to proceed with the municipal employee retirement benefit plan which went into effect last week;

2. Approval of a request for transfer of an SDM license from Urban Kesser to Erna G. Bartlette, wife of Charles Bartlette, who recently negotiated to purchase the Village Inn.

3. Appointment to a four-year term of Mrs. Gerald Staal to the Board of Commissioners, replacing Miss Margaret Hull. Mrs. Hull had requested that she be allowed to resign the position due to health reasons. Councilman Reynolds asked that a letter of commendation be forwarded to Miss Hull for her service on the board.

4. Report from City Manager Olson on the Lowell Fire Department activities for 1967, during which the department answered 40 calls, 15 within the city and the remainder under mutual assistance agreements with adjacent areas.

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## Rangers Bow in Finale

It was a case of too little, too late... an effective last-minute stall by rival Rogers... that led to a 67-43 loss for Forest Hills High in its final regular season game of the 1967-68 basketball season.

The RANGERS fell behind by six points in the early going and were never able to overtake Rogers.

With Steve Russ showing the way, Forest Hills closed the gap to three points with about a minute remaining. Rogers then went into a controlled offense that forced Coach Don Kemp's cagers to foul in an attempt to make up the deficit.

Russ banged in 25 points and picked off 12 rebounds in the losing effort and received valuable assistance from junior Scott Winger, who finished 14 tallies and grabbed 12 rebounds.

Bill Cardinel lost to state finalist Art Cantu of Godwin in the deciding contest while Forest Hills' Curt Inman, who placed second in the 118- and 119-pound divisions, respectively.

Other fourth-place finishers for Lowell were Bob Van Dyke, Bob Graham, Jerry Ruver, Non Olson and Steve Foss. Forest Hills got a fourth-place finish from Steve Mollo.

Belding took the team championship, scoring 73 points in the final game. Forest Hills finished with 62 points while Lowell took fourth in the 26, 5 spot at 45 points each.

Two Forest Hills High wrestlers won championships in the state regional tournament held last week in Wyoming and will join two others from the area in quest of state championships this weekend.


