A petition, signed by 32 residents, was presented to City Council at Monday night's meeting. It declared the proposed road "a public nulsance" and requested that planning be terminated.

Ernie Kauffman of 1149 Flat River Drive and John Vos of 403 Hunt Street ap-peared on behalf of the peti-

Though not a resident of the city, Kauffman complained that he, for one, was "not going to give property away.'

"I live just outside the city limits," Kauffman told council members, "but I know that as far as people in the city are concerned, they are not happy with the way things are shaping up."

Vos noted that his primary concern was the degree of benefit that could be derived for the money that property owners would have to spend to help provide construction of a thoroughfare that "I'm quite sure they do not want.'

The highway project, which is being handled jointly by the city and county, is designed to facilitate the north-south traffic movement through the city.

City Manager Bernard C. Olson pointed out to the spokesmen that Hudson would be the logical through-street since it now connects directly with M-91 from the south, but that much traffic is now chan-neled into Lincoln Lake, which provides the most adequate service from the north.

"I would like to know if there is a plan for side-walks," he declared. "There have been too many cases of near-miss accidents with youngsters walking on the streets in the area on their way to school."

Total assessment for the 1968 tax year for the city of Lowell rose \$821,350, it was reported by City Manager Bernard C. Olson today.

Olson reported to City Council Monday night that real property values rose from \$5,912,700 in 1967 to a present mark of \$6,343,700 while personal property went up from \$2,737,100 to \$3,127,450.

Total valuation now stands at \$9,471,150 compared to the '67 figure of \$8,649,800.






