

Occupying the farthest point from Mac's command post were Mark McKee, Jr., and myself.

This was the editorial office ... and, as you can determine from the foregoing, it was the busiest place in town.

This is recalled at this particular moment because word has just been received that Ed Racine passed away suddenly while on a vacation trip down south.

He joins Mac and Des, who no doubt are busy chronicling events taking place in Heaven.

I learned the business under these three gostlemen, I don't believe I could have found better teachers had I

Mac was a firm managing editor. Des was a master of the soft word, both written and spoken. And Ed was the "listening post,"as befits a city editor. A firm man, but fair . . . th there were some, mainly politicians and police authorities, who thought otherwise upon frequent occasion.

Of the five who occupied the editorial room in the Fall of 1947, only Mark and I remain, He's now publisher of The Ma-comb Daily, which replaced the Monitor-Leader.

It seems like exily yesterday . . . unth I look at Mark and see a thatch of gray hair . . . and examine new wrinkles each day in my own face . . . and remember Mac and Des and Ed.
