

## Supervisors Posts Hang in Balance:

# County Apportionment Decision Near

Next Tuesday may well be "day of decision," for Lowell's future role in the affairs on the Kent County Board of Super-According to George Cook, county legal counsel, the Michigan Supreme Court may issue a decision on May 7 wherein county supervisors must be elected from newly apportioned dis-

Based on a "one man, one vote" decree affecting repre-sentatives to be elected to the county board, Lowell would be absorbed into an apportioned district comprising of town-

If the Supreme Court rules in favor of reapportionment, Lowell will lose its two current representatives on the board of supervisors, and in their stead one supervisor from a 40,000 populated district would be elected to serve the area.

Currently the Kent County board has 73 members, but under the new system that number would be greatly reduced, probably to some 20 or 25 members.

If the Supreme Court decides on the reduced number of

supervisors, candidates for the post would be required to file nomination petitions before deadline date, which is June 18.

No elective official, such as city councilmen, township supervisors, or village officials, would be eligible to run for the office and still remain in office

According to County Clerk Jack Bronkema, a member of the Kent County Apportionment Commission, a hearing will be held on the apportionment on May 9. However, citizens may file appeals within 30 days of this hearing.


