# Fault RR of Blazes

Sparks from a C&O engine stack, which ignited a three-mile long series of grass fires along the railroad route on Monday, also has touched off sparks of criticism from Low-ell and Vergennes Township

A number of the complaints have reached the offices of the Lowell Ledger.

According to Fire Chief Frank Baker, the first of a series of alarms came in at 12:30 noon Monday, when 12 members of the local volunteer were called out to fight a grass fire at the railroad crossing at Three-Mile Road, between Lincoln Lake Road and Alden Nash.

After putting out the blaze, and within a half-hour of the first alarm, the volunteers re-sponded to a second alarm sponded to a second which took the firemen and two rigs to a blazing field near a railroad corssing on

"After we put out that fire," Chief Baker said, "we were forced to work our way south to handle grass fires along the railroad route.

"In fact the situation be-ame serious enough to warcame serious enough to war-rant calling in the Grattan Township volunteers to help out. We were three hours

Asked about the cause of the series of blaving grass fields along the C&O tracks, Fire Chief Baker said:

"We believe that the stack of the diesel engine of a freight train which had passed through earlier was defective, and that a protective screen on the obably wasn't worki for the number of grass fires which broke out all along the C&O line?"

# City Readies Final Plans for New Connector Road

A \$25,000 road building program, designed to link Linceln Lake and Hudson streets, moved closer to reality today.

thorized City Manager Ber-nard C. Olson at its Monday night meeting to proceed with finalizing arrangements with

The city's share of the project is estimated at \$17,-615 and will include pay-ment of construction, land

of a new storm drain to service the area.

The highway connector is part of an overall play by highway engineers to develop Lincoln Lake as a major artery in the county's primary road system.

When completed, the new road will allow a smoother flow of traffic through Lowell. A new access road to the south from the city to the I-96 freeway, also nearing final preparations, will complete the local realignment.

Council also voted to relinquish jurisdiction over Hudson Street Kent County will, when the state abandons M-91, maintain the street.

During their lengthy threehour session, council mem-bers acted on several other projects calling for street improvements.

A public hearing was called for July 1 on the matter of installing curbs and gutters on Laurie Gail Drive, Eleven of 18 property owners on the street have petitioned for the

A street located on the west side, soon to be dedicated, was named Church Street.

Approval was granted to Lowell Development Corporation to proceed with the Valley Vista No. 5 Plat, which has met all the requirements of the new subdivision ordi-

It is expected that 25 new homes will be developed in the subdivision, according to developer Doug Dok.

Council instructed Olson to meet with Dok to work out plans for engineering plans and specifications for a proposed new lift station on the

A public hearing was called for July 1 on the matter of installing a sewer on Kent Street between Jackson and Jefferson, The petitioner for the installation was Mrs. Charles Manciu

After considerable discussion, council tabled for more study by the city manager a plan to purchase a 39-acre tract of land in Vergennes Township to be used as a site for a new cemetery, a park and for possible airport ex-

Olson said that an opinion by City Attorney George Cook will permit purchase of the property for \$21,000 over a 10year period at the rate of \$2,000 per year with \$2,000

The city's charter prohibits purchase arrangements for longer than a 10-year contract

Olson also produced a report outlining a plan to change the present care program at the city cemetery from an annual basis to a perpetual status. He suggests allowing credits on previous annual care pay-ments providing that lot owners pay in advance the balance of a \$200 charge.

One phase of the plan would call for increasing the annual care fee from \$6 to \$15 for these not wishing the pay in advance.

A public hearing was called for July 15 on the matter of amending the Zoning Ordinance to permit construction of duplex apartments in several areas of the city that face or abut commercial or public-use facilities.

Olson also reported that the city's share for the Cherry Creek Drain project, which was to have been completed by June 14, will be \$1,400. The drain is being re-developed to accommodate new industry in the northwest sector of the city.

The city manager also set forth a plan to create an estimated 25 to 30 percent more parking space in the east side


