

P.O. May Face More Cutbacks

A further cutback in local mail delivery may be necessary in the near future, Postmaster Charles R. Doyle of Lowell said today.

Effective this Saturday (July 27), the general delivery window will be open only for one hour—from 8 a. m. to 9 a. m.—to deliver mail to general delivery patrons and area business firms that normally call for mail at the post office.

Doyle said that curtailment of other postal services, including planned extensions of city and rural delivery routes, are in keeping with an order from Postmaster General W. Marvin Watson to reduce some services and curtail new hiring.

At this time there are no plans to provide mail delivery service to new housing subdivisions and apartment projects, Doyle said.

The U. S. Post Office and other government agencies were recently told by Congress to cut back employment to the June, 1966 level, which includes 83,228 postal employees nationally.

"This is not a matter of dollars but of people," Postmaster General Watson explained. "Under the manpower restrictions imposed by the tax bill, we simply will not have enough people to continue all postal services at their present level."

Postmaster Doyle emphasized that the Post Office Department agreed to the reduction in funds for the 1969 fiscal year that began July 1 and is not asking for a restoration of any money cut from its budget.

"The Postmaster General," Doyle explained "told us we could operate within our budget and maintain postal services at or near their present level if we did not have to reduce employment to the June, 1966 level."

Doyle also noted that he has been directed to submit his plans by September 1, regarding his proposals on how and when Saturday delivery on city residential routes should be handled locally.

An effective date for the elimination of Saturday residential delivery here and nationally is then expected to be established by the Department the postmaster explained.

Board Continues Budget Trim Prior to School Millage Vote

Concerned officials of the Lowell Area School District continued today to pour over proposed budget figures in an attempt to make further cuts from projected 1968-69 operating costs.

The Board of Education met Monday night, but came up with no firm millage proposal to lay before district voters in a special millage election scheduled for Monday, August 26.

Approximately \$45,000 has been pared from the original budget of \$1,357,813 proposed by Supt. James C. Pace and further cuts are anticipated as the board members seek to bring about financial stability.

The district finished the 1967-68 school year with a deficit of some \$85,000 pending final audit figures. Much of the deficit was the result of reduction in anticipated state aid.

To offset the deficit and bring about a balanced budget for next year, the board is expected to seek voter approval of approximately three additional mills for operating.

Lowell presently is operating on a 10.1-mill allocation from Kent County and seven mills approved for three years by district voters last summer.

The new millage, if approved, would be for but one year, according to the board members.

Of 18 school systems in the Kent Intermediate District, Lowell ranks near the bottom both in state equalized valuation and in voter-approved millage, according to Superintendent Pace.

The special meeting of Monday night can be re-convened at anytime at the request of board President Dr. Robert Reagan. It is expected that board members will return to the budget table again before week's end.

Voters not currently eligible to participate in the August 26 election have until tomorrow (July 26) at 5 p. m. to register with the township or city clerk of their residency, according to Pace.

A new state law now permits clerks to accept registrations for later elections even though registrations for the August 6 primary have been closed since July 5.

School officials emphasized that the special election is open to all qualified residents, not just property owners.

In other action Monday, the board disclosed it is now seeking applications to fill the dual-capacity position of assistant high school principal and athletic director created by the resignation last week of Dale Holgren.

Applicants have until 4:00 p. m. on Monday, August 12, to submit their qualifications. The board is scheduled for its regular monthly meeting the same night.

Ask Trial on B&E Charge

Two Lowell area men have been bound over to Kent County Circuit Court to await trial on a charge of breaking and entering.

Victor Tidd, 21, of 928 North Hudson, and Joseph Troske, 17, of 11451 Vergennes Road, appeared last Thursday in Grand Rapids Municipal Court for arraignment.

Tidd's wife, Judy, 19, who had been named in the original warrant, was released for lack of sufficient evidence.

He got them back safely but not until 2:30 a. m. and anxious parents were still waiting at school to pick up the players.


Many who rode his bus remember him as an important person in their young lives. Harold looked after his students' best interests as a teacher and as a man.

One mother recalls: "My son was so little and skinny that Mr. Buck was literally afraid he'd blow away. If it was windy out he'd bring him right to the door instead of leaving him off at the corner."

Trim P.O. Service in Ada

Ada Postmaster Milton Hein has announced that mail service limitations will start locally this Saturday in accordance with the congressional mandate to cut back Federal employment to the June 1968 level.

Advised by Postmaster General W. Marvin Watson to comply with the cutback required by Congress by a recently-enacted tax bill, Hein announced the following reduction of postal services and curtailment of hiring.

As of Saturday (July 27), all regular Saturday window service will be discontinued. General delivery windows will be open for one hour on Saturdays from 9:00 a. m. to 9:30 a. m. to deliver mail to General Delivery patrons, and to firms that normally call for their mail at the post office.

Residential customers who have received a notice that parcels are being held for them at the post office may also call for them at that time.

Hein also noted that beginning July 1, all planned extensions of city and rural delivery were curtailed. At present there are no plans to provide delivery service to new housing subdivisions and to apartment projects.

The precise total of the local employment cut is not yet known.

Post offices have been ordered to fill only three out of four vacancies as they occur in order to make the overall cutback to the June 1968 level.

Today's lecture... if one would consider some of the nonsense that appears here from time to time as lecture material... concerns itself with an important date in the immediate offing.

And that is the matter of nominating party candidates on August 6 for next fall's general election... plus other matters as they appear on the various local ballots.

There is often a reluctance on the part of some voters to "let the other guy do it" when it comes to voting in the primary.

Yet, in a county like Kent... just as it is in my former haunts of Macomb... the dominance of one political faction makes the primary more important than the November run-off. It is especially true this year... perhaps more so than in any other previous primary... that every voter should exercise his franchise.

For one thing, by judicial mandate the system of running county governments is being altered radically. Whether for the best or not remains to be seen. But the fact that the county board of supervisors will, in the future, be composed of 21 members representing the population on a one-man, one-vote basis makes it important that every voter seriously consider the qualifications of each candidate and cast his or her ballot accordingly.

Likewise, there is a drastic change forthcoming in the lower judicial system with district courts replacing long-established local courts.

This is not meant to imply that the quality of justice dispensed will be any better or any worse than in the past. What really matters here is that, due to various maneuverings in Lansing, reorganization of the lower court system... and its impact upon the voter... is, by and large, almost a secret to the electorate.

There are, of course, traditional offices being contested and, in several cases, the gang is hot and heavy as a time of decision nears.

But that's politics, as they say, and words that are tossed out in apparent anger today will soon be forgotten once you... the voter... has cast your important ballot.

And we sincerely urge that you set all other projects aside that day and get down to the polls.

There was particular joy here the other day when that sweet swain from North Carolina named Julie Boros emerged as winner of the PGA golf tournament.

During many years of covering golf for various newspapers, radio and TV, this is one man who strikes me as being a horse of a different color.

Now 48, big Julie had reached golf's retirement age at a time when some of the youngsters now dominating the professional ranks were barely old enough to swing a club... much less hit the ball.

ELECTION Spotlight

BY AL HEEMSTRA Editor's Note: A good citizen is an informed voter. The new district court system in Michigan marks a revolutionary change in the law procedures. It is destined to have far-reaching effects on our judicial process. This article is Part 1 of a series on this vital subject by the Clerk of Cascade Township.

The new district court system which becomes operative January 1, 1969 will replace all Justice of the Peace Courts, Circuit Court Commissioners' Court, Municipal Courts and Police Courts everywhere in Michigan. The Legislature's lower court reorganization plan, known as Public Act 154 of 1968, was required by the provisions of the new Michigan Constitution. Its purpose is to achieve a more uniform approach to judicial procedure.

Few Michigan electors will ever read the full text of this major work of the 74th Legislature which adds six new chapters (31-35) and eight new sections (301-320) to Act 236 of 1961, called the "Revised Judiciary Act," and abbreviated RJA.

The RJA was itself a tremendous contemporary accomplishment. It required to perform a delicate operation and to provide post-operative care for the younger, including use of an artificial kidney.

ed in one of three classes. A first-class district consists of one or more counties in which each county in the district is itself responsible for operating the district court in its own county.

The 64th district, for example, consists of the counties of Montcalm and Ionia. Each of these counties will be an election division of the 64th district and each will have one judge.

A second-class district consists of a group of political subdivisions within a county. The 63rd district is such and consists of the county of Kent except the cities of Grand Rapids, Walker, Grandville, Wyoming and Kentwood. The 63rd (Kent County, exclusive of the 5 cities) is divided into two election divisions, a and b again each division will have one judge.

The first division of the 63rd district includes the cities of Cedar Springs and Rockford, and all the Townships in the north half of Kent County.

The second division includes the cities of East Grand Rapids and Lowell and all of the townships in the south half of Kent County and this includes, of course, Ada, Cascade, Cascade, Lowell and Vergennes Townships. We are part of District 63-2.

A third-class district consists of one or more political subdivisions responsible for its own district court. Grand Rapids has this designation and will have five judges.

In the next issue, we will elaborate on the duties, salaries and jurisdictions of this new lower court.




