Master of ceremonies for the evening was WZZM-TV and WLAV radio personality Bill Merchant.

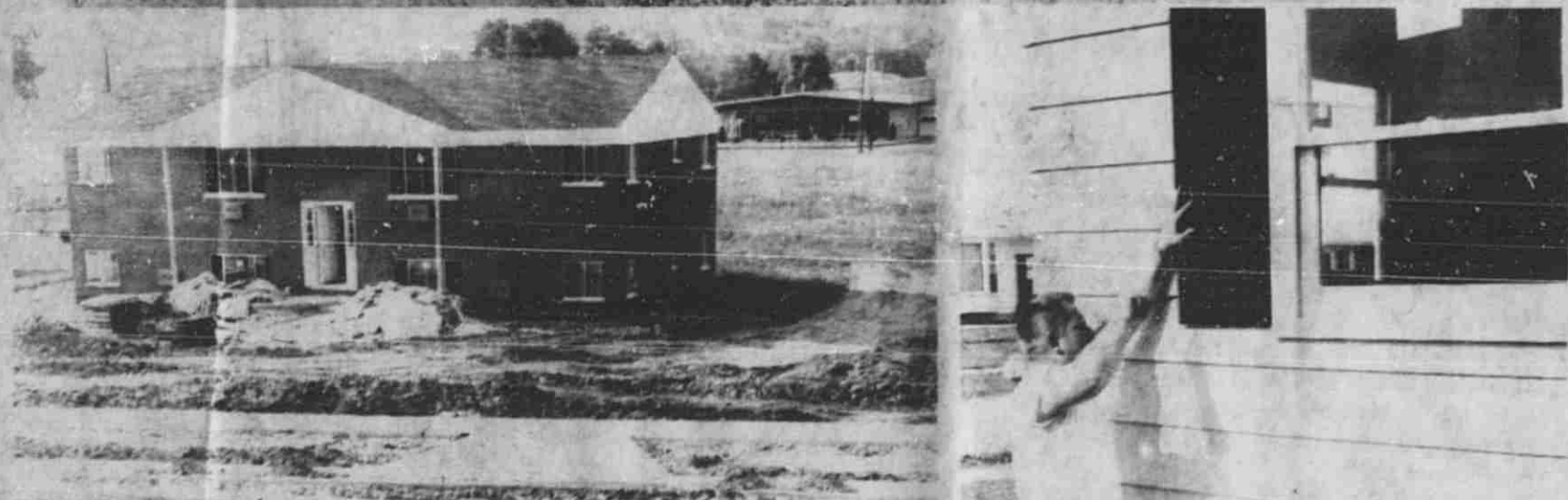
The six acts selected to perform during Showboat week are:

New construction of all sorts, involving more than \$2,000,000, is presently underway or will be in the near future as the city witnesses unprecedented growth.

calling for \$300,150 in construction of six new homes, a new apartment building and additions and remodeling were issued by City Manager Bernard C. Olson.

Several weeks ago, Root-Lowell Corporation began construction of a new plant that will cost, with equipment, an estimated \$1,000,000.

Recently completed was the new Dog 'n Suds Restaurant, designed and developed by Douglas Dok of Dok Realty, which has been the prime mover in new construction on the city's west side.

This week, highway and city officials witnessed crowd-breaking ceremonies for the new M-91 access road, a \$457,500 project that will link Lowell with I-96.

Soon to be started, following right-of-way acquisition, is the Lincoln Lake-Hudson St. interceptor in the north end of the city.

These two road projects, tied together with the new M-91 bridge over the Grand River, are considered key segments of the Kent County primary road system.

In addition to projects a-building or on the drawing boards, the Lowell Chamber of Commerce has initiated a move to establish an industrial development site and presently is looking over several possible sites that would be geared to attract new industry to the area.

A "little city?" Perhaps now... but not for long.



AWARD ROAD CONTRACT FOR M-44 CONSTRUCTION

Reconstruction of a five-mile stretch of M-44 (Belding Rd.) between Lincoln Lake Avenue and Ramsdell Road is scheduled for completion by December 15, 1969.

This was the report from the State Highway Commission which has awarded a contract to J. V. Burkett of St. Joseph for the project.

## Millage Decision Due Soon

Official word on determination of a millage request to be sought by the Lowell Area District Board of Education was expected sometime late this week.

Members of the board had been expected to arrive at the decision last week, but continued instead to seek means of cutting the projected 1968-69 budget further before placing the matter in the hands of qualified electors in a special vote on Monday, August 26.

In all likelihood, it was learned, the board will seek a three-mill levy for one year for operating expenses to be assessed concurrently with a seven-mill operating millage approved a year ago by district voters for a three-year period.

Much of the new millage, if approved, would be used to eliminate a deficit of approximately \$80,000 that the school system incurred during the 1967-68 year.

An estimated \$40,000 loss was the result of fewer state aid funds than had been expected. Rising costs of supplies and non-payment of tax revenues (most of which still remain collectable) contributed heavily to the remaining portion of the deficit.

All voters who were previously eligible or who registered before the deadline last Friday will be able to cast ballots in the August 26 election.

## Two Area Girls in Running

Six girls, chosen from a group of sixteen, face further tests of personality and charm on Wednesday before a panel of judges in a competition which will result in the choice of one of them as Queen of the Kent County 4-H Fair.

The lucky miss will reign over the fair which is scheduled to take place in Lowell August 12-16.

Selected as members of the queens court in an elimination contest Monday night were Carol Wittenbach of Lowell and Sandy VanderBoon of Ada. Both girls remain in the top six from which the queen will be chosen. Jackie Shade of Lowell was also selected as a representative of her area for the contests.

August is fair month in this vicinity with both the Kent County 4-H Fair in Lowell and the Ionia Free Fair coming on strong as big attractions.

The Ionia fair opens Saturday, August 3, for a nine day run which will include two weekends. All the excitement of the big fair will be there with the midway rides and attractions, grandstand shows and exhibits of most everything from horses and cows to flowers and baked goods plus numerous commercial exhibits.

Many attractions are scheduled for the Ionia grandstand including a hit show every evening and new thrills such as their first Demolition Derby slated for the final day of the fair, August 11.

The Kent County fair opens on Monday, August 12, when the judging begins with the 4-H horse projects.

Activities have been planned for each day Monday thru Friday in rapid succession with judging and demonstrations during the day and an evening program is planned to end each fair day with a flourish. Of course the midway will be open featuring rides and concessions to provide the proper fair atmosphere.

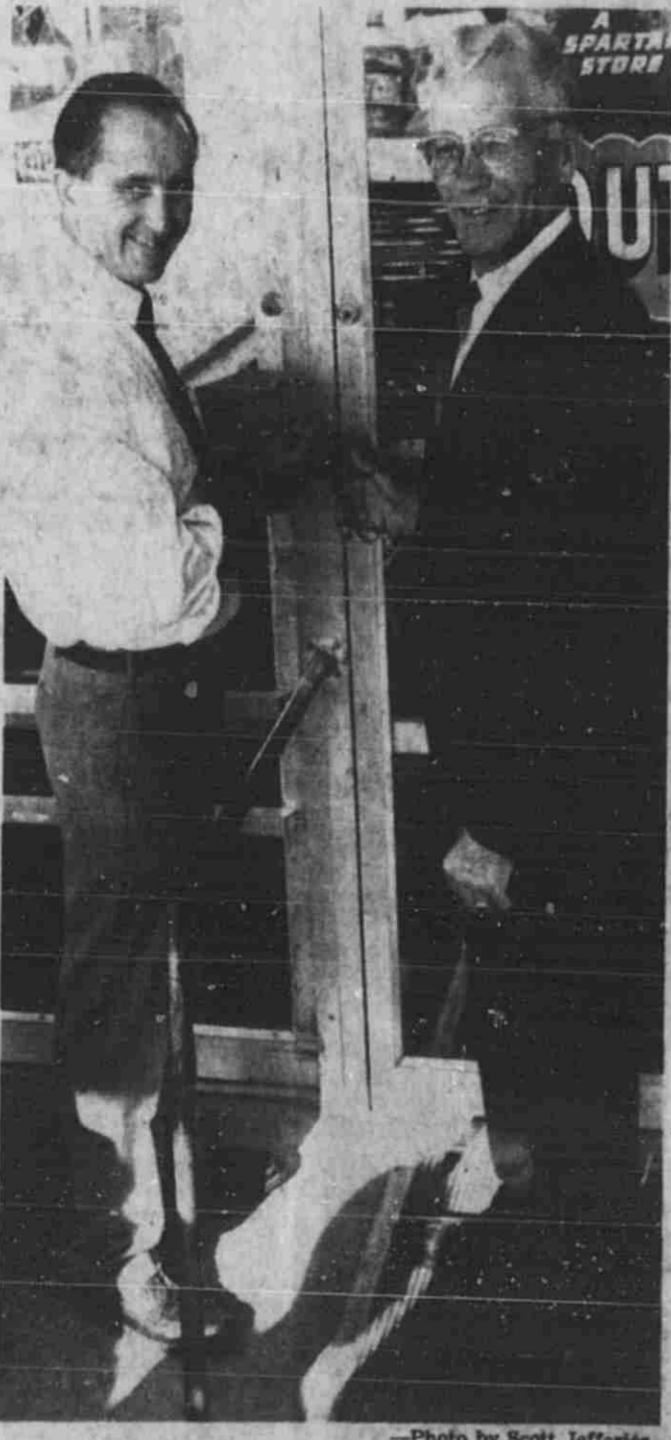

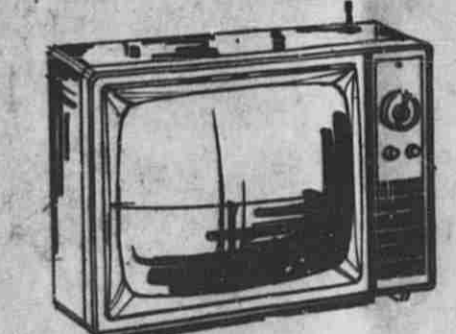

### ELECTION Spotlight

BY AL HEEMSTRA

One of the more important aspects of next week's primary election will be the nomination of judges for the new district court.

Effective January 1, 1969, the lower court reorganization does completely away with the era of the layman turned judge for a day. In place of the local Justice of the Peace and several other minor courts we will have, it is hoped, a "more uniform judicial process."

Elected on a non-partisan basis to a six-year term, judges of the new court will be only those licensed to practice law. They will receive a salary of \$18,000 paid by the State and each can receive such other supplemental pay as the governing legislative body of the local district court unit may wish to provide, up to a total salary of \$37,500. Judges will be eligible for pensions under the 1951 Retirement system and will be full-time jurists.

As Division 2 of District 63 (one-half part of a Second-Class district and consolidated as a group of political subdivisions in Kent County) the cities of East Grand Rapids and Lowell and the townships of Grand Rapids, Ada, Vergennes, Cascade, Lowell, Byron, Gaines, Caledonia and Botwe will have one judge.

The court is required to sit at the county seat within the district and at each city or incorporated village having a population of 3,250 or more.

The district court will have exclusive jurisdiction in civil actions when the amount in controversy does not exceed \$3,000. It will have jurisdiction of all misdemeanors, ordinances and charter violations and may conduct preliminary examinations in all felony cases; it may fix bail and accept bond.

Trials for criminal actions in violation of state laws will be prosecuted by the County Prosecutor; those involving city, village and township laws will be arranged by the attorney for the political subdivision whose law was violated. Appeals will be to the Circuit court.

District judges will not handle divorce proceedings. They may perform marriages for which the fee will be \$10, pay-

able to the treasury. In District 63-2, all fines and costs (other than those for violation of the state penal code) are to be divided one-third to the city, village or township in which the violation occurred and two-thirds to the county.

In a recent editorial in "Official Michigan," the legislature was attacked for having "frittered away" too much of the last five years since the new Michigan Constitution was adopted before completing the lower court reorganization bill. This delay, until the last part of the last year, kept the State Supreme Court from setting up the needed transition guide-lines. There are more than a half million traffic cases pending in justice and municipal courts.

It should be interesting to see just how the huge accumulation of dusty old warrants and obsolete cases now pending in the minor courts will be handled.

Be sure to vote next Tuesday, August 6. We'll be back in the Fall with more Election Spotlight to discuss the issues on the November 5 ballot.
