Sesquicentennial voyageurs stop in Lowell

The "Gabagouache", a large replica of a native American canoe stopped in Lowell on Monday as part of a Michigan Sesquicentennial project sponsored by the city of Grand Haven. With a little imagination, a spectator could envision long ago times when traders and trappers often

beached their canoes here where the Flat River joins the Grand. The project is called the Trans Mitchi Asugyeen River Odyssey. The odyssey began on April 6 in Bay City. Over the past month the canoeists, dressed in authentic voyageur garb, have visited dozens of cities, towns and vil-

lages along their route which includes several rivers and streams. These communities are a link to the past when settlements formed along the rivers, used by trappers, voyageurs, lumbermen, missionaries and traders as they traveled about the state. A proclamation issued by Lowell Mayor James Maatman said in part, "These villages, towns and cities which developed along these fabled water arteries sensed the pulse of the land, first when it was a territory, and next as an emerging state."

Maatman, along with City Councilmen Dean Collins, Bill Thompson and Charlie Doyle were on hand to greet the paddlers when they beached their canoe at the Grand River boat launch. Acting City Manager Barry Emmons and Lowell Police Sergeant Al Eckman also participated in the greeting ceremonies. Lowell High School Seniors Doug Kidder and T.C. DeBold helped paddle the canoe from Saranac into a very stiff westerly wind. Both students received certificates proclaiming them honorary voyageurs.

Dr. David Seibold, leader of the expedition, presented Maatman with a commemorative

parchment scroll signed by Governor James Blanchard.

Boosters announce new track project

The Lowell Area Schools Athletic Booster's Club announced the beginning of a major project at Monday's Lowell School Board meeting. Denise Dommer, chairperson of the project, began her announcement by presenting the Board with a check for \$15,000 to be used for a new track complex. The Boosters intend to raise the money necessary to construct an eight-lane, all-weather, rubberized track. Lowell Superintendent of Schools Fritz Esch predicts that in today's dollars such a track would cost approximately \$200,000. Other expenses for equipment, site work and fixtures such as bleachers, would add to the cost.

Esch says the school district may be able to help with some site planning work and perhaps a few other phases of the project, but for the most part the money will have to be raised by the Boosters.

The Boosters have proven to be capable of raising substantial sums of money. They have funded various athletic programs when the district was sometimes forced to cancel certain sports because of financial difficulties. Esch said the new track project is an excellent area for the Boosters to concentrate their fund raising efforts.

Dommer told the Board members that over 100 high school and 60 middle school students are participating in track this spring. With numbers like that, coupled with use by physical education classes and access by members of the community,

Dommer feels a new track is a very worthwhile project.

The OK White Conference, which the Red Arrows compete in, does not allow meets on cinder tracks like Lowell's track at Burch Field. Consequently, Lowell has been forced to hold their home meets at either Kenowa Hills or Sparta over the past three years.

Dommer says various committees are now forming, and interested parties should contact her at 897-9678.

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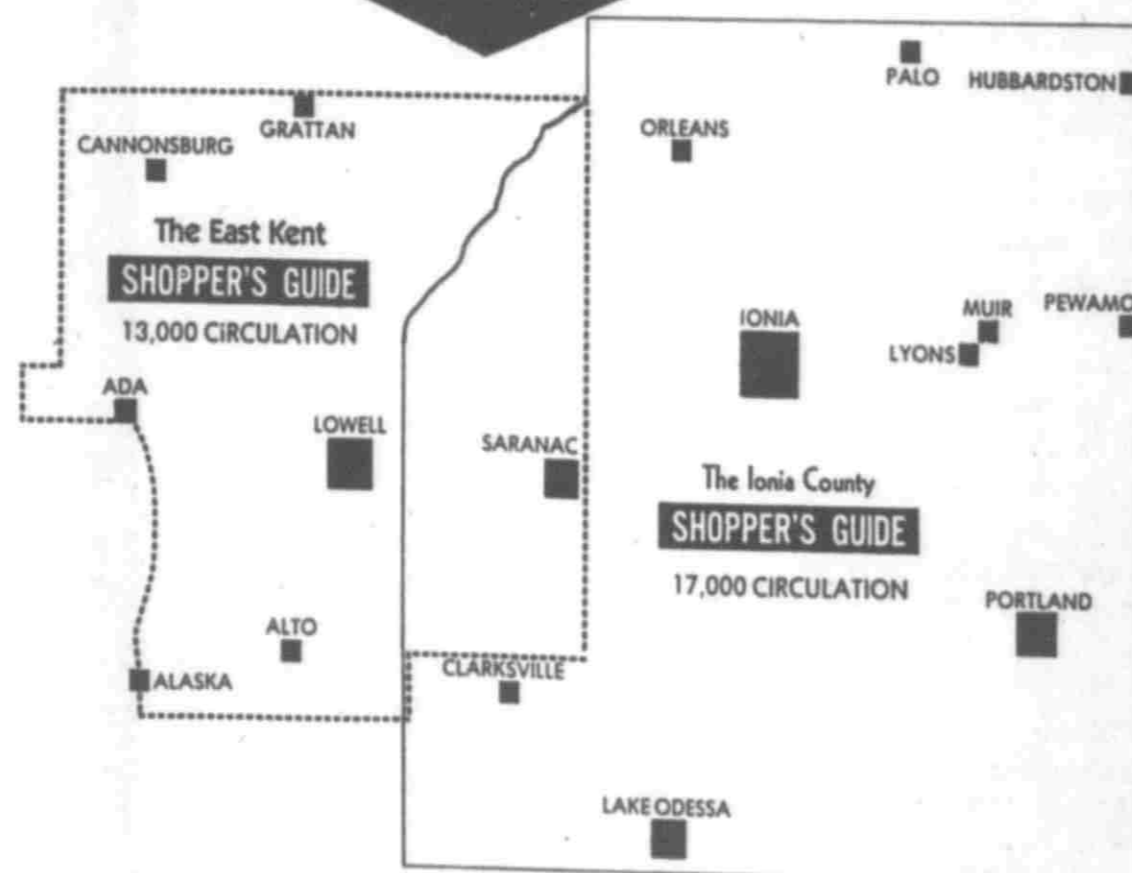

Ferris Students Restore Truck

Automotive students at Ferris State College are busy restoring a vintage truck from the era of their grandparents.

Students and faculty from the automotive department in the School of Technology agreed to complete a portion of the renovation of an Apex truck for the Grand Haven Area Historical Society and have been working on the project since early December.

Associate professor Bill Routley said, through this project, students are given a guided application to restoration techniques, as well as having "a good contrast" between working on present-day models and antiques.

"The students develop an appreciation of how far technology has advanced in 70 years," said

Routley. "They're understanding the basics of putting things back together and discovering exactly how the automotive industry has changed."

Repairs on the steering mechanism and other front-end parts, as well as re-manufacturing old parts, will be done for the cost of the materials. Doug Chase, assistant professor of machine tool, is supervising the production of new parts. Students are working on the project for experience only. Ferris students previously renovated an International truck, both in appearance and mechanical condition.

Routley said complete restoration of a vintage model can take anywhere from six weeks to six years, depending on the condition of the vehicle.

The Grand Haven Area Historical Society is particularly interested in the Apex "C" model because it was manufactured by the Apex-Hamilton Motors Co. of Grand Haven, probably in 1920. It was an unsold truck from a small dealership in Pennsylvania and was taken to Georgia by the dealer's son for use on a farm. After a few years of service, it was stored from 1938 until 1974, when it was sold and transported back to Michigan.

Tentative plans have been made to display the truck in an all-glass garage on a side of the Historical Society's museum. The complete restoration is expected to be completed this year in celebration of Michigan's Sesquicentennial.

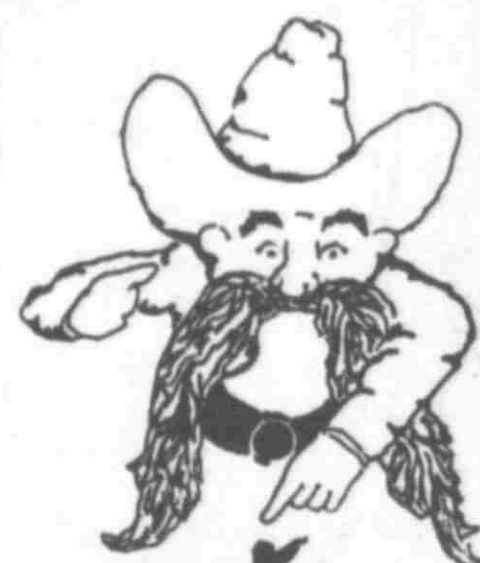

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When You Need Help....

When a medical emergency occurs, it is quite often a traumatic experience for everyone involved. It can be very difficult to remain calm when a loved one is seriously sick or injured, but that can be one of the most important things to do. You also need to know how to call for help. The quicker and more efficiently you do that, the faster you can get help to the person who needs it.

- Things to remember:
1. KEEP CALM.
 2. KNOW THE PROPER TELEPHONE NUMBER. Take the time to look it up before the emergency occurs and keep it near your telephone.
 3. GIVE CORRECT INFORMATION. The dispatcher will need to know briefly what the problem is and the exact location where help is needed. Along with the address, the nearest intersecting street is also helpful. If you live outside the City limits, let the dispatcher know if your address is N.E., S.E., N.W., or S.W.
 4. DON'T HANG UP FIRST. The dispatcher may need to ask more questions or clarify information. Let them hang up first.
 5. HELP US FIND YOUR HOME. If you're calling us to your home, make sure your

The Lowell Board of Education held its regular meeting on Monday, May 11, 1987.

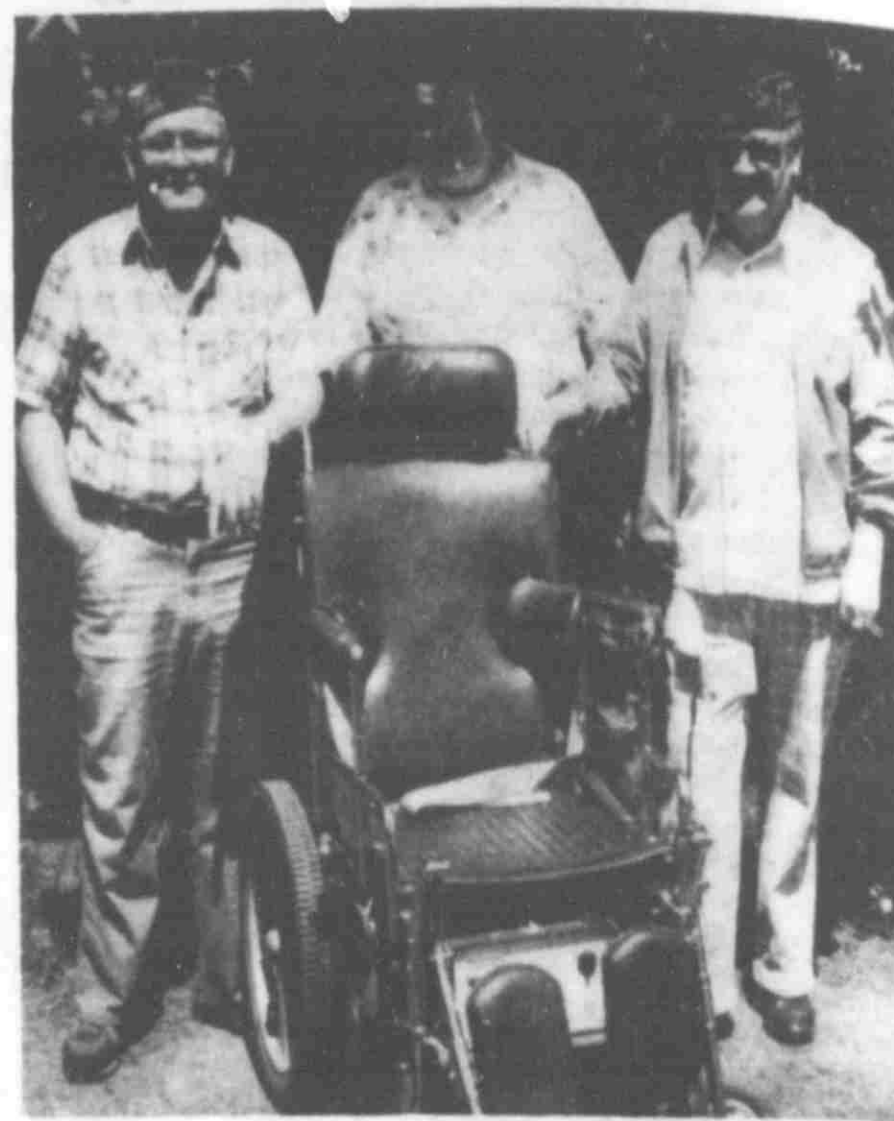

Superman had nothing on this guy. OK, so he had tights, but this hero had something better - he was bionic. This meant that he could literally leap tall buildings with a single bound. He was Steve Austin (Lee Majors), the Six-Million-Dollar Man, whose successful show started a wave of TV superheroes in the mid-1970s. Among these was the spinoff, "The Bionic Woman," with Lindsay Wagner in the title role. Both series were about ordinary people who were given bionic replacements after being in debilitating accidents. In addition to a premise, the shows shared the brooding presence of Richard Anderson as Oscar Goldman, the government agent who recruits the superhumans. And now, the fearless trio is back in NBC's "The Return of the Six-Million-Dollar Man and the Bionic Woman," airing Sunday, May 17.

Anderson, who plays Buck Fallmont on "Dynasty," not only stars in the movie, but is credited with the story idea. "I knew the time was right," he explains. "I knew that the audience who grew up with the characters would want to see what they look like now. "I'd had the idea for a couple of years. I talked it over with Lindsay (Wagner), who was enthusiastic. Lee (Majors) was tentative, but he

agreed to do it." Futuristic technology and the "man in the white hat," as Anderson calls it, meet in this movie. It focuses on Austin's relationship with his son, Michael (played by Tom Schanley), who, like dad, is rebuilt with bionic parts after a plane crash. When a terrorist organization threatens to use Michael as a hostage, the bionic duo reunite to make sure good triumphs. "Introducing Steve's son

was my idea," says Anderson. "I wanted to update the show, to incorporate new technology. I wanted it to appeal to people with an interest in medical technology. Part of the original interest in the show was that it gave people with medical disabilities hope. "That's really why I wanted to bring it back," admits Anderson, who had starred in both series simultaneously. "I wanted more humanity

in programming. From the first, I saw that this went beyond cardboard figures." Does this mean another series is on the way? "Could be," admits Anderson. "The first time around, I knew we had a winner. After the first episode, my daughter came home and said, 'Everyone's running around the schoolyard in slow motion.' The only question left remains: Whatever happened to Max, the bionic dog?"

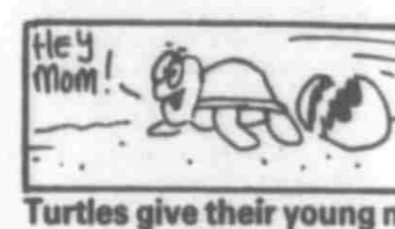
