A proclamation issued by Lowell Mayor James Maatman said in part, "These villages, towns and cities which developed along these fabled water arteries sensed the pulse of the land, first when it was a territory, and next as an emerging state."

Maatman, along with City Councilmen Dean Collins, Bill Thompson and Charlie Doyle were on hand to greet the paddlers when they beached their canoe at the Grand River boat launch. Acting City Manager Barry Emmons and Lowell Police Sergeant Al Eckman also participated in the greeting ceremonies. Lowell High School Seniors Doug Kidder and T.C. DeBold helped paddle the canoe from Saranac into a very stiff westerly wind. Both students received certificates proclaiming them honorary voyageurs.

Boosters announce new track project

letic Booster's Club announced very worthwhile project. the beginning of a major project at Monday's Lowell School Board meeting. Denise Dommer, chairperson of the project, began her announcement by presenting the Board with a check for \$15,000 to be used for a new track complex. The Boosters intend to raise the money necessary to construct an eight-lane, all-weather, rubberized track. Lowell Superintendent of Schools Fritz Esch predicts that in today's dollars such a track would cost approximately \$200,000. Other expenses for equipment, site work and fixtures such as bleachers, would add to the cost.

Esch says the school district may be able to help with some site planning work and perhaps a few other phases of the project, but for the most part the money will have to raised by the Boos-

The Boosters have proven to be capable of raising substantial sums of money. They have funded various athletic programs when the district was sometimes forced to cancel certain sports because of financial difficulties. Esch said the new track project is an excellent area for the Boosters to concentrate their fund raising efforts.

Dommer told the Board members that over 100 high school and 60 middle school students are participating in track this spring. With numbers like that, coupled with use by physical education classes and access by members of the community,



The main goals in treating RA are to provide increased mobility in the affected joints, and to diminish pain. This is not always a simple matter, however. Once a definitive diagnosis of RA is made, treatment often begins with aspirin or nonsteroidal antiinflammatory drugs. A balanced diet, good posture and specially designed exercise programs are also encouraged. If these measures are unsuccessful, stronger drugs are used (cortisone, injectable gold). With the usage of these stronger agents, there is a more likely incidence of side effects, and it is generally recommended that the patient be followed closely in a doctor's office for any changes in the blood or urine.



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



I've never been big on yard work. In fact, if I had my druthers, I'd astro turf the whole yard and plant plastic shrubs. The problem

Of course, some people like to watch big time wrestling, too. Considering the fact that I detest yard work, I have three major problems. Number one, I have a fairly large yard with an excess of trees, shrubs, bushes, plants, flowers, etc. Two, I have a sprinkling system to help Mother Nature make all this stuff grow like crazy. And three, I have a wife that won't let me ignore the whole

The house is nearly a hundred years old, and I'm sure they built it among the shrubs that were on the site at the time. They're huge! I literally need a chain saw to trim them if I'm doing any more than clipping away the new growth. I almost feel like I should take a compass along when I wade into them with the trimmers. I'm waiting for the National Forest Service to approach me with an offer to make my shrubs one of their parks.

Trees are another problem. We have three huge soft maple trees in our yard. Those trees are intent on creating a mess all year long. They shed bark all the time. They shed dead branches every time the wind blows. They shed those little whirly birds in the spring. They shed their leaves in the fall. The list goes on and on but, I suppose I ought to be careful of what I say about them. They just might get me. Two of these soft maples are absolutely huge, and stand just outside our bedroom window. I just know I'm going to be sound asleep when the wind or ice brings one of those monsters down on me. The headline in the Ledger would read, "Ledger publisher dies when oft maligned tree strikes back."

The sprinkling system was in place when I bought the house. Besides making everything grow like crazy, it is also a perpetual maintainence problem. thing all trimmed up and the grass cut. But, I still admire the guy out east who made the news a couple of years ago when he defied city hall by insisting that he could allow his yard to grow wild. He was a self-proclaimed environmentalist, and argued that he was providing a natural setting for wildlife. Actually, I'd be willing to bet he was just a guy like me, and was itchy to sell his mower, trimmer, rake and shovel at a garage sale.





ABATE is not only challenging the Kent County Mass Burn Incinerator but all projects like it across the state. In addition, they are challenging facilities like the Fallasburg Park Dam. Five million dollars from the bond issue has been spent. The County is now forced to delve into General Fund monies to make sure this project can proceed. The Project Team is continuing to move ahead in areas such as licensing, but can the County afford to move ahead fully while the future of the MBI is in doubt?

Commissioner Lamoreaux asked the time required on the approach ABATE is using.

Civil Counsel Jon DeWitt indicated that ABATE has filed an appeal to the Public Service Commission ruling. They have 60 days to file the document reciting the specific issues they wish to take up on appeal. It normally takes from 9 months to one year for a decision from the Court of Appeals. Kent County cannot convert the bonds or commence construction without approval of the power purchase agreement. Counsel is asking the expedite that process. ABATE can then petition the Festival 87 Parade on June 6. for leave to appeal to the Michigan Supreme Court. The end result is that the appeal process could take one to two years. He further explained that if Ogden Martin is given direction to begin construction by October 1, 1987 the bid price is fixed . After October 1 it will escalate on a monthly basis of approximately \$150,000 the first month and increasing each month thereafter. Commissioner Lamoreaux asked if there was a

legislative solution. Civil Counsel DeWitt indicated that House Bill 4478 addresses one part of the problem. Counsel is working daily with the lobbyist to explore additional legisla-

Commissioner DeKraker stated that he is in favor of the MBI Project but cautioned that the Board of Commissioners should begin to think about discontinuance Commissioner Wahlfield asked if there is a point at

which time the County would decide to terminate the Civil Counsel DeWitt pointed out that this May 16, 1987 Commission and the six cities have stated that a tipping

fee of \$44 per ton is too high. Controller Richard Platte reminded Commissioners that in March, 1986 this Board approved \$4 million for an operational reserve for the MBI. That money has been set aside. This cash flow advance would come from the \$4 million reserve, to be paid back from the bond conversion. He indicated that \$5,273,000 was authorized from the bond issue for pre-construction costs and that has been spent. An advance of \$1,241,000 is estimated

She shares the frustration but stated that if the offer is withdrawn the County is playing into the hands of those who wish to stop something that is positive for

the entire community. The Zoo needs stable funding.

The \$800,000 in City revenue used annually in support of

the Zoo could be used to provide much needed services to the City of Grand Rapids. If the agreement is approved today, and if it is not approved by the City Commission by December 31, 1987 the offer becomes null and void. Commissioner DeVriendt stated the intent of the County from the beginning was a spirit of cooperation for the entire County. He stated he was not opposed to a City-wide election or referendum. He urged the Commission to not act hastily in withdrawing the offer. Commissioner Buth stated that if the City Commission could unify at some future time he would

welcome reconsideration at that time. Commissioner Vaughn suggested an amendment to the resolution advocating an amount to be funded by the County and to be decided by the County at a later time. It was determined that this suggestion was not germane to the motion to rescind the offer. Any


