## Cost-effective and efficient waste management

One of the most important issues facing our state today is the need for cost-effective and efficient waste management. Without it, the health of our residents and the environmental beauty of our state will be threatened. The Senate is currently taking steps to protect both.

Two pieces of legislation target one of the leading problems in waste management -- the dangers presented by landfills. SB 48, which imposes a surcharge on all waste disposed of in landfills, is currently in the Senate Natural Resources and Environmental Affairs Committee. SB 41, which would promote funding for landfill alternatives, has already passed the Senate and is now in the House.

Both bills attempt to painlessly but firmly start moving our dependence on landfills toward more efficient, cost-effective and safe alternatives such as recycling, energy-producing incinerators, and composting. SB 41 approaches the problem by drawing on 10 percent of the state's common cash, investing the money and using the return to "buy-down" interest rates on municipal bonds. The bonds would be used by municipalities to develop new waste management alternatives.

When SB 41 offers incentives to move toward better waste management methods, SB 48 attempts to make waste operations reflect the true cost of landfilling solid waste and to help provide funds for closure and maintenance of landfill sites. Price competition has left some landfills without the necessary money to handle the future problem of closing and maintaining an inoperative landfill. Although the Clean Michigan Fund provides some funding for this, there isn't really enough money for all the state's landfills that need to be closed. SB 48 places a 75-cent per ton surcharge on landfill owners, and a \$2 surcharge on waste haulers for every ton deliv-

ered. Money from the 75-cent surcharge would be placed in a perpetual care trust fund to cover closures and maintenance in the future. The state would collect the \$2 surcharge, with the early monies going to close landfills now and provide for transfer stations for areas that need them. Over time, those funds would instead be used to repay state general obligation bonds for solid waste management projects -- assuming such bonds are approved by voters. Otherwise, the money goes into the Clean Michigan Fund.

Some people oppose the surcharge bill, and in reality, SB 41 still needs some "fine-tuning." But both bills have the fundamental support of legislators, the Department of Natural Resources and environmentalists. Michigan contains some of the most hazardous landfill sites in

the nation, and is already facing contaminated water in some communities as a result. Similar problems plague most other states. The size of this problem becomes more understandable when you realize that the average family of four generates about one ton of solid waste a year. The fact is, we may simply be running out of anywhere to "throw away" garbage anymore.

Environmental action is a priority for the Senate this year. There have been some dazzling legislative initiatives over the years, but few bills have really faced the tedious and "dirty" job of developing tough, workable answers to the problem. With the passage of SB 41 and the introduction of SB 48, the Senate has made a good start toward achieving long-lasting success in the battle for a clean and healthy future for Michigan.

## Crime victims have certain rights

Three major law enforcement agencies have combined efforts to improve treatment and enforce the rights of victims of crime in Ionia and surrounding counties.

Members of the Ionia County Sheriff's Department, Prosecuting Attorney's Office and Michigan Sheriff's Association's Victim/Witness Assistance Network have joined forces to promote awareness of a new county-wide training program that sensitizes law enforcement officers to the plight of the victim of crime.

"Our goal is to attract the interest of not only law enforcement, but also service providers, civic organizations and religious groups so a broad effort to recognize the needs and rights of local crime victims is established," said Judy Nichols, MSA Victim/Witness Program Director, who became a victim when her son was murdered in 1983.

Ionia County Sheriff Terrence Jungel said that in the past, emphasis has been placed on protecting the rights of the criminal while the victim stood alone.

"We're here to change that," said Jungel. "Crime victims have certain rights they are entitled to according to Michigan law. This program emphasizes those rights and promotes a greater awareness as to why the crime victim is so important to the entire criminal justice system."

Nichols, Jungel and Ionia County Prosecuting Attorney Gary Gabry will host a four-hour overview on crime victimization Thursday, May 28 at the Candlestone Inn, 8100 Story Rd., Belding. All concerned citizens and members of law enforcement are invited to attend. Call the Ionia County Sheriff's Department at (616) 527-0400 for further information.

**Share America with a foreign exchange student**

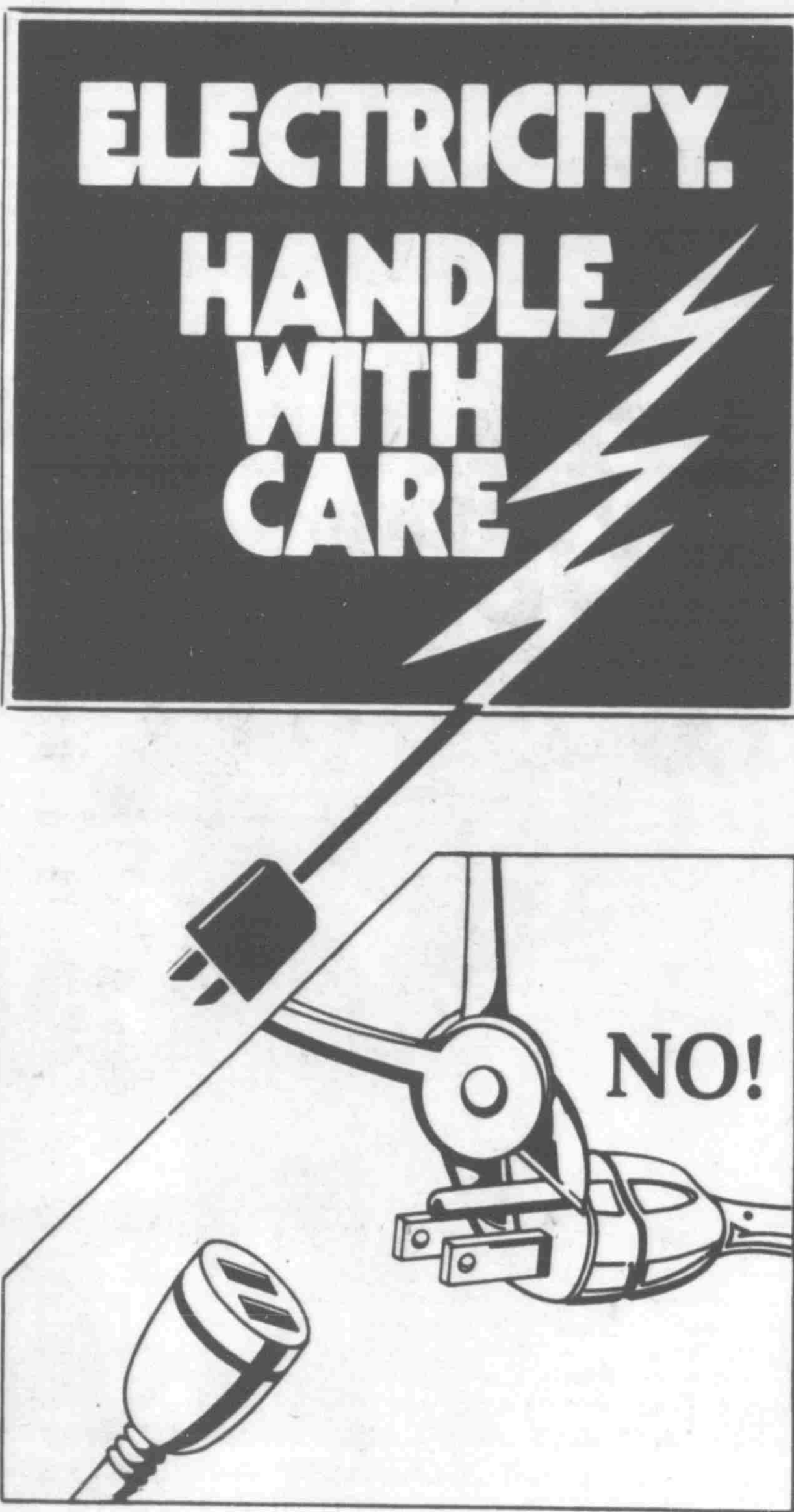

## Homespun Devotions

But covet earnestly the best gifts... (1 Corinthians 12:31).

When you visit the grocery store, you expect to take home only that for which you are willing to pay. There is a difference in the price of a loaf of day-old bread and a quart of milk and a steak with all the trimmings. There is a difference in the eating, too.

Bread and milk make for good eating when they are all one can afford. But who wouldn't prefer steak, topped off with warm apple pi à la mode? The type of food one enjoys depends on whether or not one is willing (and able) to liquidate the food bill.

#### Julia Duffy plays a wealthy maid

With a dust rag perched incongruously at the end of her perfectly manicured fingernails, heiress-turned-maid Stephanie Vanderkellen, played by Julia Duffy on CBS's "Newhart" (airing Mondays), is something of a rarity on television. A me-me attitude masking a heart of gold and a fortune to match, spoiled-brat Stephanie is a new breed: the girl who has her cake, eats it, flaunts it, then has to go clean the bathroom.

"Part of Stephanie is something everyone identifies with," says Duffy, who has just finished her fifth year on the show. "I think people identify with her immaturity, the part of her who never grew up."

Stephanie's charm lies partly in her total self-obsession, her almost complete disregard for other people's feelings - and her lack of apology for it. "She wouldn't be funny if she were totally likable; she must have flaws," argues Duffy. "Although now she's more three-dimensional. In the beginning she was so innocent. I hope I've brought a kind of edge to her, a darker side."

Along with characters such as the oddball trio of Larry, Darryl and Darryl,

Stephanie is one of the supporting characters that make "Newhart" a true ensemble show, a show where even a minor character's idiosyncrasies are developed to the fullest. "Even though Stephanie's problems are so strange - like the time she and Michael (Peter Scolari) were afraid there was another couple in town who were cuter than they were - we approach it like they're normal people. We looked at it like someone was after our jobs.

"I don't consciously try to act more broadly than normal. Michael and Stephanie are a real couple with real difficulties. I love playing her because it gives me a chance to play so many kinds of comedy."

One of Stephanie's trademarks has become the "Ooh!" that she squeals when she's pleased (read: been given a large present). "That just escaped the first time," admits Duffy. "It was supposed to be 'oh.' Then when it worked, I

incorporated it into the character."

Duffy is somewhat surprised by the favorable reaction to Stephanie, a reaction so favorable that a spinoff may be in the works. "I'm a little surprised that people think she's so adorable," she confesses. "She's not a very nice person. I get all these love letters from men addressed to Stephanie. I can't believe it. I mean, who would want to live with Stephanie?"

Rural Field Day is won by Farrell School edging out Snow School, 101-100. North Bell, Talbot and Mapes are also-rans.

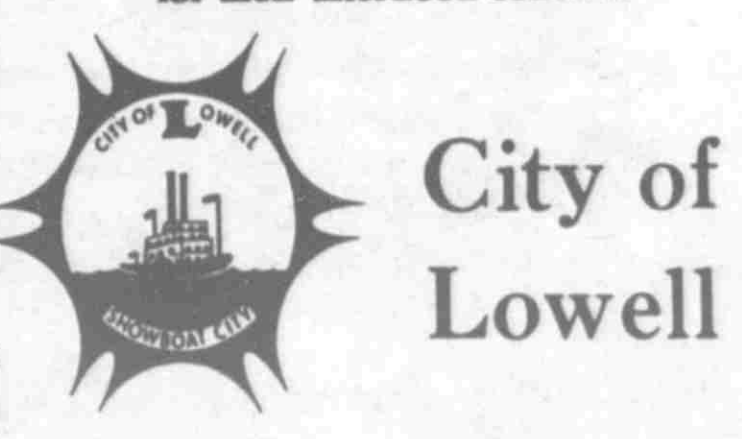

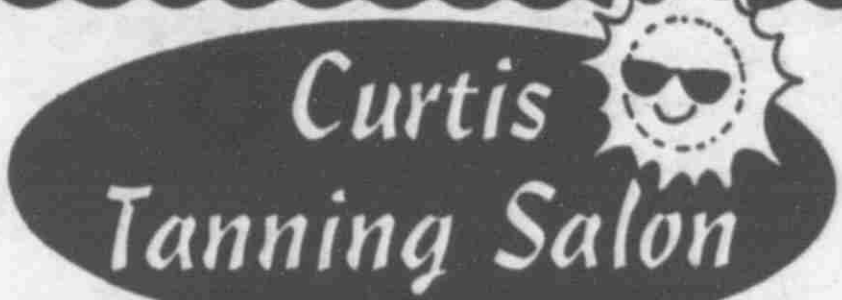

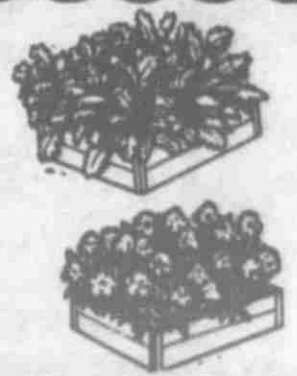
