DUCH - Mr. Matthew G. Duch, of Wyoming, passed away Mon-

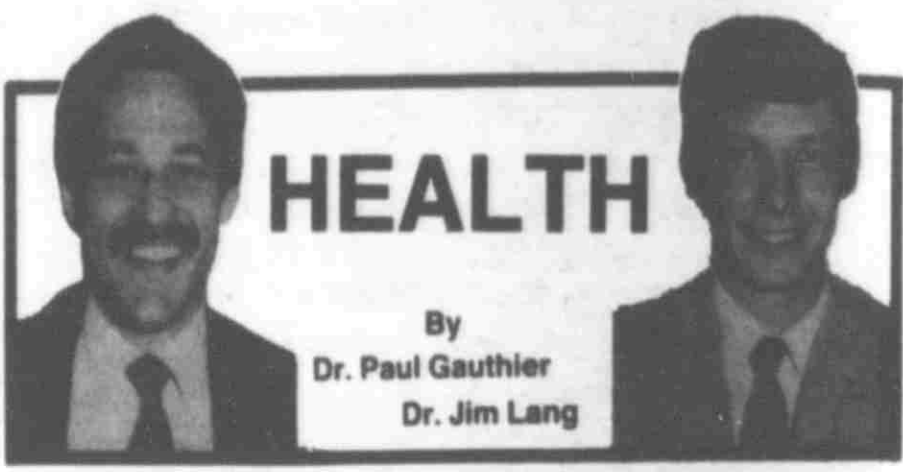

URINARY INCONTINENCE

Loss of urine control is a very common problem encountered by older women and men. Approximately 10% of those over 65 years old will experience this problem. The problem can be minor with occasional leakage of urine or disabling with frequent uncontrolled urination. Unfortunately, those individuals experiencing problems with bladder control are often reluctant to seek medical care because of embarrassment. Incontinence can usually be controlled with adequate treatment. Even in severe cases, when complete control is not possible, correct management of the condition will prevent discomfort and allow the individual to maintain an active lifestyle.

Incontinence has many causes. Urinary tract infection can lead to incontinence and is easily diagnosed in the office. Changes in the shape or position of the bladder is a frequent cause of incontinence in women after menopause. In men, prostatic enlargement can lead to overflow incontinence. Incontinence is often seen as a secondary problem in another medical process such as diabetes or neurologic disorders like stroke or multiple sclerosis. An often overlooked cause of incontinence is medications.

The two main types of incontinence are stress and urge incontinence. Loss of urine control or slight leakage or urine when coughing, sneezing or laughing is termed stress incontinence. This occurs when the intra-abdominal pressure exceeds a certain limit. This type of incontinence is seen more frequently in women. Urge incontinence is described as the inability to hold the urine once the urge to go is recognized. The individual with the problem is unable to reach the bathroom prior to leakage of urine.

Diagnosis of the cause of incontinence is mandatory so that correct treatment can be initiated. Your doctor will examine a urine specimen and usually recommend kidney or bladder x-rays. Occasionally your doctor will recommend referral to a urologist for cystoscopy (direct visualization of the bladder through a small tube inserted through the urethra). This test may be performed in the urologist's office or as an outpatient in the hospital.

Treatment of incontinence varies, depending on the cause. Frequently, medication will control symptoms but sometimes side effects can limit their usefulness. A special exercise program can be helpful in strengthening muscles that maintain continence. Several types of surgery can cure incontinence when the cause is due to a structural problem in the urinary tract. Occasionally a prosthetic device can be implanted that will control urine flow.

Remember, urinary incontinence is not an inevitable result of aging, and can usually be treated successfully. Even incurable incontinence can be managed effectively with absorbent underclothing that can be worn under normal clothing so that the individual can maintain an independent lifestyle.

He has also doubled for the stars in the movies CARTIER AFFAIR, THE GREAT WALDO PEPPER, and CAPRICORN ONE. His specialties include wingwalking at speeds of more than 20 mph.

600 horsepower Bi-plane, coming to Muskegon from his New Mexico home, Franklin and his WACO Mystery Ship hold the world's record for the lowest ribbon pickup. This requires flying upside down and catching a ribbon with the tail of the plane.

The ALIEN ZAR and his Starship Pride are from the planet Zufrinia, billions of light years from the planet Earth. Zufrinia is being held captive by evil dictator Itola, and the ALIEN ZAR hopes to recruit earthlings in his efforts to free his captive planet. ZAR will take time to talk with the children at the Air Fair about his mission and sign autographs.

A demonstration that lives up to the phrase That's Incredible is the Human Firewall Crash. Dangling from a rope ladder underneath a speeding plane, a daredevil aerialist will smash through a flaming wall. The danger is obvious and the risks are real. This act has to be seen to be believed.

The 1987 Muskegon Air Fair is scheduled for July 18th and 19th. Gates open at 10 a.m. and the feature shows begin at 2 p.m. Tickets are \$6 for adults, \$4 for children ages 5 to 12, children 4 and under are admitted free. \$1 discounts on tickets are available at Wesco Stores, Pizza Hut, Little Caesar Pizza, and Viking Food Stores.

Dedication planned for Historical Museum

Old timers and newcomers alike will gather in Grattan on Sunday, July 5, 1987 for the dedication of the newly renovated Grattan Township Historical Museum. Festivities will begin at 1:00 p.m. with music by The Keena Memory Lane Strings, featuring nonagenarian and former Grattan resident, Ernie Keena on the violin. State Representative Victor Krause will introduce Paul Henry, U.S. Congressman of the 5th District who will give the dedicatory address.

Patrick Malone, Grattan Township Supervisor, will preside at the ribbon cutting. Local musicians will perform between 3 and 6 p.m. and refreshments will be available.

The Grattan Township Historical Society had its beginnings in December 1984, when a group of residents determined it would be a good idea to preserve the history of the area. Officers were elected and a constitution

adopted. A membership drive was begun and at present there are 260 member families. Eighty to 100 people regularly attend the bi-monthly meetings, at which time guest speakers have covered topics ranging from early settlers and family histories to the topography of Michigan and the Grand Valley in particular.

For over a year the Society met in the township hall at 11676 Old Belding Road, but the rapidly growing membership was packing the hall at each meeting and a facility was needed to house and display the photos, records, furniture, and other artifacts that were accumulating. By mid-summer 1986, work was begun on renovation of the former township hall located across the road. The building was made available to the Historical Society by the township board and financing for the project was made possible through the Community Development Fund. The

history of the building is unique in itself. It was built originally as a Methodist Episcopal Church, at Steele's Corners in Cannon Township around 1848. The church building was later moved to Grattan to establish a Methodist Church there and a few years later the Township of Grattan bought it to be used as the Town Hall.

The Museum will contain a library that will be known as the Fr. John W. McGee Memorial Library and a plaque will be unveiled at the dedication ceremonies. The late Fr. McGee was pastor of St. Paul the Apostle Catholic Church in Grand Rapids and died on June 1, 1987, after a long battle with cancer. Fr. McGee was proud of his Irish heritage and although a native of

Grand Rapids and resident there for most of his life, he had a special love for St. Patrick parish in Parnell and the Irish families that populate the area. He was an avid historian of West Michigan, especially the Irish settlements and authored three historical books: "The Catholic Church in Grand River Valley", "Passing of the Gael", and "Bend in the River."

"Capitol Column"

Michigan taxpayers will have higher personal income tax exemptions to take advantage of federal tax reform under Senate Bills 8 and 98 approved by the Senate. Senate Bill 8 increases

the personal exemption on state income taxes from the current \$1,500 to \$1,800 in 1987, \$1,950 in 1988, and \$2,000 in 1990. SB 8 is tied to Senate Bill 98 which allows Michigan to take advantage of federal tax reform. The state is expected to receive \$170 million as a result of federal tax changes, and these Senate bills will return the money to state taxpayers through higher exemptions.

By raising the personal exemptions, substantial tax reductions for our citizens can be provided. Raising the personal exemptions will save taxpayers \$97.8 million in 1987, \$173.9 million in 1988, and \$188.5 million in 1989. SB 8 would also protect senior citizens and blind taxpayers by giving them a total exemption of \$3,000. Since seniors and the blind will lose their second exemption under federal tax reform it's only fair to keep their \$3,000 exemption at the state level. These exemption bills have been returned to the House for either a final vote, or to put the issue in conference committee. When agreement is reached there, the bills will be referred to the Governor to be signed into law.

Prior to approving both bills, however, the Senate broke the House's tie-bar to the Governor's property tax reform plan. SB 8 was tied to eight of nine House bills that together comprised the Governor's property tax plan.

While the approach of returning the federal windfall is a reasonable one, the tie-bar to the governor's property tax proposal is not. The Governor's proposal raises taxes in one place to reduce them a fraction somewhere else. It increases taxes on insurance policies, savings and checking accounts and other types of hidden taxes, which will ultimately be passed on to the consumer.

The Senate is focusing on more permanent solutions to Michigan's property tax system than the Governor's short-term, one-time plan. Senate involvement with the Harden Commission and recommendations of the Citizen's Property Tax Commission will result in more comprehensive long-term property tax reform during the coming months. It will get the exclusive attention it deserves, instead of being tacked on as an afterthought to income tax reform.

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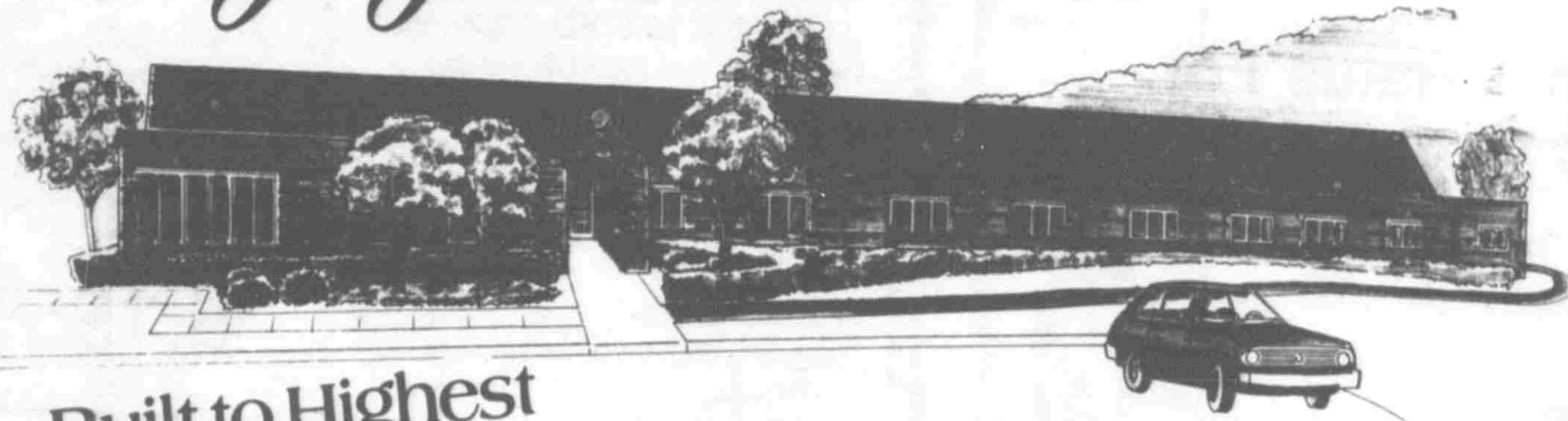

PBS highlights 'American Masters'

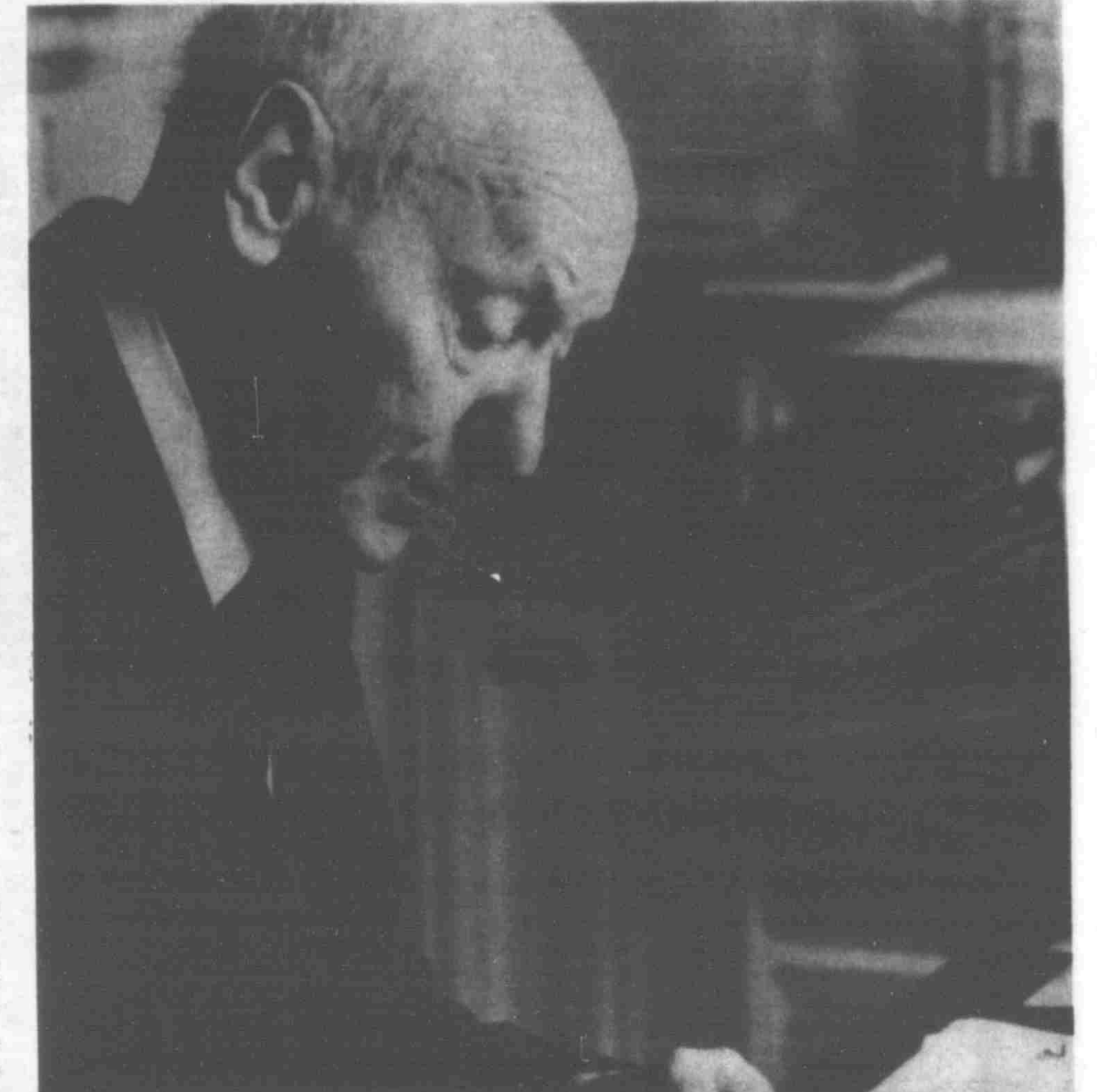
"When I was born, my mother asked the midwife, 'Is it a boy or a girl?' And the midwife said, 'Neither one. It's a writer.'"

With these words, Isaac Bashevis Singer, the 1978 Nobel Prize winner for Literature, begins the documentary that opens PBS's "American Masters" series on Monday, July 6. (Check local listings.) It is an anthology series of documentaries, each of which profiles one of America's native-born and/or adopted "masters" of the creative arts. In addition to Singer, illustrator Maurice Sendak, pianist Artur Schnabel and film comedian Charlie Chaplin will also be included. William Wyler, who directed such classic films as "Jezebel" and members of the Negro Ensemble Company are also profiled.

Rather than being heavy-handed attempts at pure narrative, the documentaries show the artists working, talking, lecturing. Rare footage from Chaplin's films is used (these episodes are rebroadcasts), while Rubinstein and Wyler are each remembered from a unique perspective by their children. The episode on Singer, directed by Amram Nowack, also contains a great deal of humor. He is seen eating in the cafeteria on New York's Lower East Side that inspired

many of his stories. He is also seen refusing to clean up his study. "There was chaos before the world was created," says Singer. "Before God said, 'Let there be light,' there was chaos." Judd Hirsch is occasionally heard throughout the one-hour film on Singer, which was nominated for an Academy Award in 1986. He reads from Singer's work and occasionally adds some narration. But the 83-year-old Singer

himself does much of the talking. "I look for you in Miami but I can never find you," says a fan. "I'm in the book," Singer tells her. "Good," she says. "I'll call you sometime." Singer speaks passionately and eloquently about his Polish roots, his love for the short story, and his need to write in Yiddish, which he constantly refutes as being a dying language. "They've been saying it's dying for 200

years," he claims. The writer is pleased with the documentary. "They used me a lot, and listened to what I said," he offers. As to winning the Nobel Prize, Singer said it was "nice." Nice? "It's good that people read me more and are more interested in me because of it," he admits. "I'll say this. It didn't do me any damage." The "American Masters" series will run through September 28.
