4-H Fair will feature many diverse clubs

A new club at this year's Kent Co. 4-H Fair, The Guiding Paws Club, is a good example of how 4-H does not consist solely of farm animals. A junior leader dog club has three dogs in preliminary training for the Leader Dogs for the Blind School in Rochester, Michigan. Judy Anderson and Liduina Williams are the leaders of the club, and supervise the training of the dogs now being raised by their two families. Deanna Anderson, 17, is raising Taffy, an eight-month-old golden retriever. Her sister,

Dawn, 14, is raising Ashley, a two-month-old black Labrador retriever. Twin brothers, Gregory and Geofery Williams are sharing the raising of Emma, a five-month-old chocolate Labrador retriever.

The dogs are selected under strict breeding and health guidelines set by the school. Host families then raise the dogs for one year to 14 months. The dogs are then turned over to the school for their formal training as leader dogs for the blind. "The 4-H Puppy Program dramati-

cally increases a dog's chances of making it through the leader dog program", Judy said. "We teach them basic family living habits and the simple commands such as come, sit, stay, up, down, etc. But, the most important thing we do is to give them lots of love and introduce them to as many people, places and things as possible in the time we have them".

Taffy has been to church, libraries, the beach, barber shops, at the dentist office and have even marched in two parades. "We were a little concerned about the rifle salute in the Lowell Memorial Day Parade, so we took the dogs out back and fired off some guns. We started with a BB gun, then a .22 and finally a shotgun. When they fired the guns during the parade, the dogs couldn't have cared less, because they had already been exposed to that noise", Judy said. This type of progressive introduction to various environments and situations is exactly what the training is meant to accomplish.

Judy and Liduina went through the basic 4-H Leader training at the Kent Cooperative Extension Office, then completed a three day course about leader dog training at Kettunen Center north of Big Rapids. "It was really strange to sit in a room with about 200 people and 150 dogs. None of the dogs were barking or whining or fighting with each other. They all just laid quietly at their master's feet" Judy said of the seminar.

The obvious question is how tough it's going to be to give up these dogs when the time comes. Judy hopes it won't be too bad because of the comfort in knowing what a good cause the program is. The host family can get a first option on possession of the dog if it washes out of the leader dog school. Otherwise, unsatisfactory dogs go into a pool for adoption by people on a one and a half year waiting list.

The club will compete in the dog obedience competition at 3:30 Monday afternoon. They also will have a booth in the Foreman Building where they will pass out brochures about the school in Rochester and the 4-H Puppy Program. Judy says the club is actively seeking new members, and would be glad to explain the entire program to those visiting their booth at the fair. Also, if you are interested, and would like to give her a call, her phone number is 794-3512.

The leader Dog Club will join scores of other clubs throughout the week at the Kent County 4-H Fair. The Fair runs August 3-8 and features 4-H competition, demonstrations and displays. Of course the fair will also feature carnival rides, food booths and games. Some special discount programs are being offered for

Planners nix several requests

Nobody came through Monday's meeting of the Lowell Planning Commission unscathed. A final site plan review of the proposed Honeysuckle Apartments on N. Center St. was approved, but two ordinance violations in the proposed plan will need variances. The bedrooms in six of the eight buildings are 40 sq. ft. below the minimum square footage requirement and a carport is too close to a rear lot line. The variance requests will be considered at a public hearing on August 17.

A site plan for an L-shaped addition to the Lowell Plaza met with considerable opposition from the commissioners. The plan shows the present building extended to the north to Chatham St. and then running east to Lincoln Lk. The planners envisioned problems with a lack of employee parking, a lack of dumpster space, inadequate screening and several other items. Phil and Lyle Johnson, developers of the property, were instructed to meet with City Planner Paul LeBlanc of W.B.D.C. Sam Lombardo, owner of Sam's Factory Outlet Automotive at 2400 West Main asked the planners to allow him to con-

struct and operate a retail automotive parts and repair establishment on his industrially zoned property. The planners also told Lombardo to confer with LeBlanc and hammer out several problems planners had with the proposal.

Family Dollar, a variety chain store that will occupy part of the Ridgeview Mall adjacent to Family Fare asked for two sign

variances. One variance was for a large 8 foot by 12 foot double sided road sign and a 5 foot by 32 foot sign on the front of their building. The planners agreed that both signs were well out of ordinance restrictions and should not be allowed. The variance request will go on to the City Council with the Planning Commission's recommendation to disapprove it.

Lowell man dies in crash early Sunday

The Lowell community was shocked and saddened by the death of Thomas C. (Tom) Fonger, 38, early Sunday morning from injuries suffered in an auto accident when his car went off Cannonsburg Road and struck the Cannon Township Fire Department building. Fonger was taken to Butterworth Hospital where he died. He was returning home from his Lowell High School 20-year class reunion which was held earlier at the Cannonsburg Ski Lodge. According to State Police reports, he was not wearing a seat belt

and the cause of the accident is still under investigation.

Among his survivors are his wife, Gale and children, Craig and Kacey, and his parents, Mac and Rosemary Fonger and four brothers, all of Lowell.

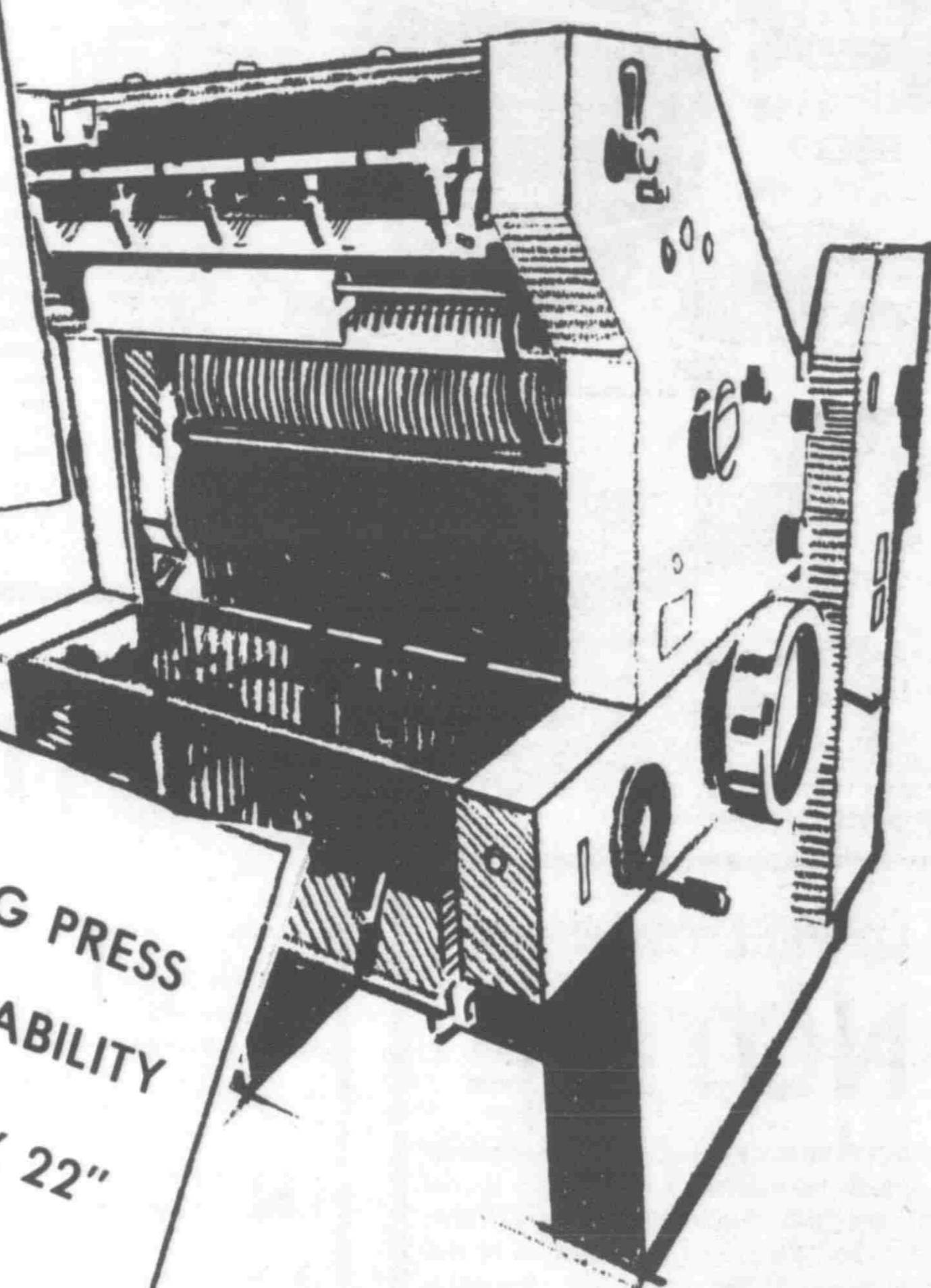

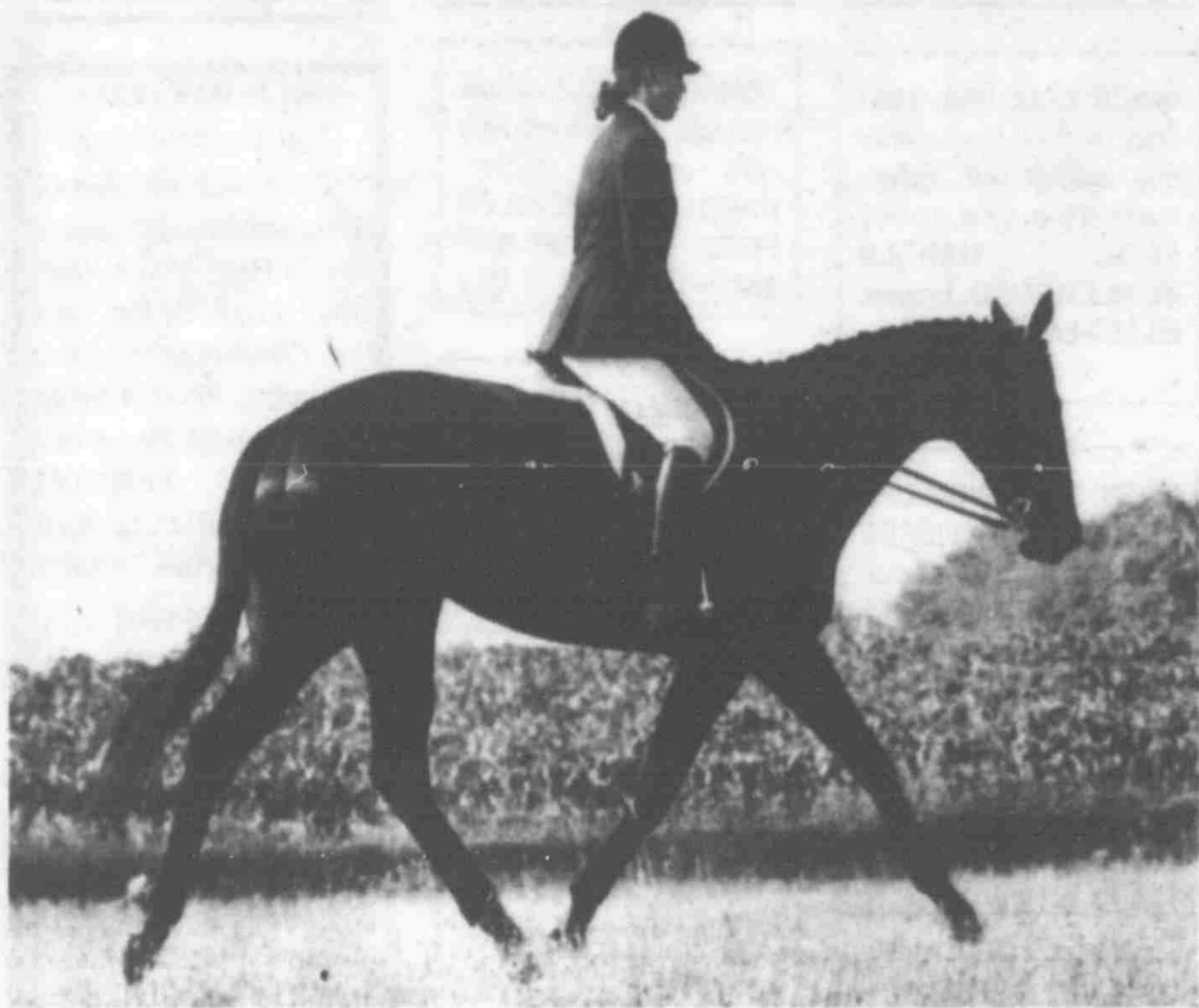

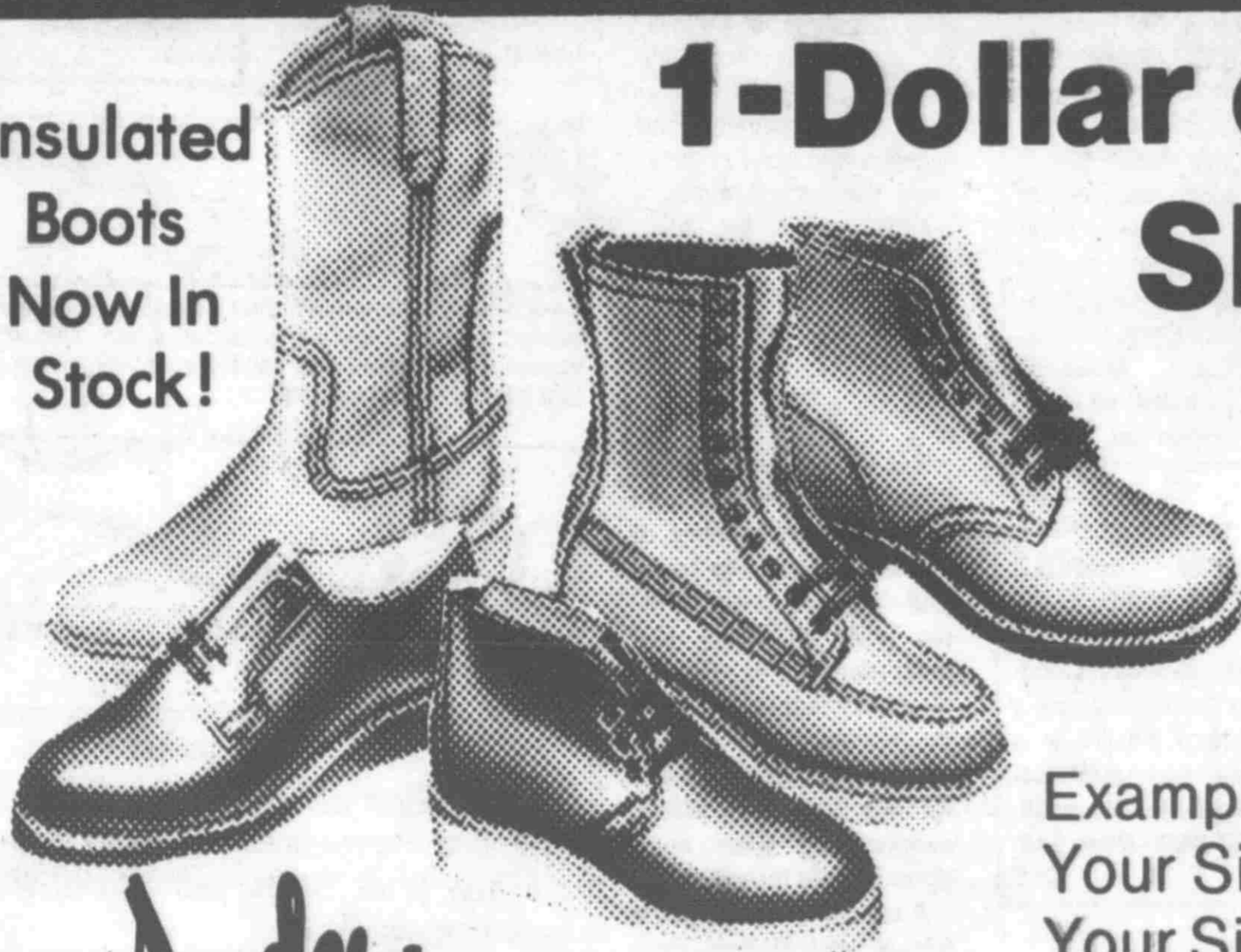
