# 4-H Fair will feature many diverse clubs

A new club at this year's Kent Co. 4-H Fair, The Guiding Paws Club, is a good example of how 4-H does not consist solely of farm animals. A junior leader dog club has three dogs in preliminary training for the Leader Dogs for the Blind School in Rochester, Michigan. Judy Anderson and Liduina Williams are the leaders of the club, and supervise the training of the dogs now being raised by their two families. Deanna Anderson, 17, is raising Taffy, an eight-month-

The dogs are selected under strict breeding and health guidelines set by the school. Host families then raise the dogs for one year to 14 months. The dogs are then turned over to the school for their formal training as leader dogs for the blind. "The old golden retriever. Her sister, 4-H Puppy Program dramati-

of making it through the leader dog program", Judy said. "We teach them basic family living habits and the simple commands such as come, sit, stay, up, down, etc. But, the most important thing we do is to give them lots of love and introduce them to as many people, places and things as possible in the time we have them".

Taffy has been to church, libraries, the beach, barber shops, at the dentist office and have even marched in two parades. "We were a little concerned about the rifle salute in the Lowell Memorial Day Parade, so we took the dogs out back and fired off some guns. We started with a BB gun, then a .22 and finally a shotgun. When they fired the guns during the parade, the dogs couldn't have cared less, because they had already been exposed to that noise", Judy said. This type of progressive introduction to various environments and situations is exactly what the training is meant to accomplish.

Judy and Liduina went through the basic 4-H Leader training at the Kent Cooperative Extension Office, then completed a three day course about leader dog training at Kettunen Center north of Big Rapids. "It was really strange to sit in a room with about 200 people and 150 dogs. None of the dogs were barking or whining or fighting with each other. They all just laid quietly at their master's feet" Judy said of the seminar.

The obvious question is how tough it's going to be to give up these dogs when the time comes. Judy hopes it won't be too bad because of the comfort in knowing what a good cause the program is. The host family can get a first option on possession of the dog if it washes out of the leader dog school. Otherwise, unsatisfactory dogs go into a pool for adoption by people on

a one and a half year waiting list. The club will compete in the dog obedience competition at 3:30 Monday afternoon. They also will have a booth in the Foreman Building where they will pass out brochures about the school in Rochester and the 4-H Puppy Program. Judy says the club is actively seeking new members, and would be glad to explain the entire program to those visiting their booth at the fair. Also, if you are interested, and would like to give her a call, her phone number is 794-3512.

The leader Dog Club will join scores of other clubs throughout the week at the Kent County 4-H Fair. The Fair runs August 3-8 and features 4-H competition, demonstrations and displays. # Planners nix several requests

Nobody came through Monday's meeting of the Lowell Planning Commission scathed. A final site plan review of the proposed Honeysuckle Apartments on N. Center St. was approved, but two ordinance violations in the proposed plan will need variances. The bedrooms in six of the eight buildings are 40 sq. ft. below the minumum square footage requirement and a carport is too close to a rear lot line. The variance requests will be considered at a public hearing on August 17.

A site plan for an L-shaped addition to the Lowell Plaza met with considerable opposition from the commissioners. The plan shows the present building extended to the north to Chatham St. and then running east to Lincoln Lk. The planners envisioned problems with a lack of employee parking, a lack of dumpster space, inadequate screening and several other items. 

**DIVERTICULITIS** 

In last week's column we discussed the condition called diverticulosis, in which small pockets form in the large bowel wall. This may cause symptoms of bloating, cramping, nausea, vomiting or constipation. Today we will talk about diverticulitis, a potentially more serious problem which occurs if these small pockets (diverticula) become inflamed.

If stool gets trapped in one of the diverticula, the pouch can become inflamed and infected. This inflammation, called diverticulitis, can also occur when small tears in the weakened colon wall around the diverticula are invaded by bacteria from the colon. It is estimated that less than 15% of people with diverticulosis develop diverticulities. Nevertheless, diverticulitis is a serious problem that requires a doctor's care.


The symptoms of diverticulitis may include pain and constipation. In addition, an infection can cause fever and abdominal swelling. In some cases, more severe complications of diverticulitis may arise. For example, in some cases, the inflamed area of the diverticulum may burst, causing bleeding and possibly spreading the infection to other areas of the abdomen.

Treatment of diverticulitis depends on the severity of your symptoms. In the rare cases that involve internal bleeding or obstruction of the colon, emergency surgery may be necessary. In less serious cases, the inflammation may subside on its own in a few days. Usually, your doctor will prescribe antibiotics and recommend bed rest, with or without a short hospital stay.

As a measure to rest the colon during an attack of diverticulitis. you should avoid high-fiber foods. Once the inflammation has passed, however, you should slowly switch to a doctor-supervised righ-fiber diet to keep your diverticulosis from worsening again

Resolution No . 7-87-121S funding Kent County Delinquent Taxes and the competitive sale of taxable notes was presented: (All have received copies.)

#### RESOLUTION BY COMMISSIONER LAMOREAUX

WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners of the County of Kent (the "County") has heretofore adopted a resolution establishing the Kent County Delinquent Tax Revolving Fund (the "Fund") pursuant to Section 87b of Act No. 206, Public Acts of Michigan, 1893, as amended ("Act 206"); and

WHEREAS, the purpose of the Fund is to allow the Kent County Treasurer to pay from the Fund any or all delinquent real property taxes which are due the County and any school district, intermediate school district, community college district, city, township, special assessment district, or any other political unit to which delinquent tax payments are due; and WHEREAS, the County has determined it to be

necessary for the County to borrow money and issue its notes for the purposes authorized by Act 206; and WHEREAS, the unpaid 1986 delinquent real property taxes (the "delinquent taxes") against which the County is borrowing, outstanding on July 1, 1987 was \$11,203,617 .01, exclusive of interest, fees and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Commissioners of the County of Kent, State of Michigan, as follows:

#### Authorization of Borrowing

1. Pursuant to and in accordance with the provisions of Act 206, Public Acts of Michigan, 1893, as amended, the County shall borrow the sum of Ten Million continuing the Fund for the 1986 tax year.

### Note Details

2. The notes shall be known as "General Obligation Limited Tax Notes, Series 1987"; shall be dated as of the date the notes are to be delivered to the purchaser thereof; shall be fully registered notes in the denomination of \$5,000 each or in any integral multiple thereof not exceeding the aggregate principal amount for each maturity at the option of the purchaser thereof; shall be sold for not less than 100% of the face amount of the notes; shall bear interest at a rate or rates not exceeding 11.5% per annum to be determined upon the sale thereof payable on January 1, 1988 and each January 1 and July 1 thereafter until maturity, and shall mature

Principal Amount

July 1, 1988 July 1, 1989 \$5,000,000

### Optional Redemption

3. The notes are not subject to redemption prior to maturity.

### Payment of Principal and Interest

4. The principal of and interest on the notes shall be payable in lawful money of the United States from such funds and accounts as provided herein . Principal shall be payable upon presentation and surrender of the notes to the note registrar and paying agent as they severally mature. Interest shall be paid to the registered owner of each note as shown on the registration books at the close of business on the 15th day of the calendar month preceding the month in which the interest payment is due . Interest shall be paid when due by check or draft drawn upon and mailed by the note registrar and paying agent to the registered owner at the registered address.

### Note Registrar and Paying Agent

5. The County Treasurer shall designate, and may enter into an agreement with, a note registrar and paying agent for the notes which shall be the County Treasurer or a bank or trust company located in the State of Michigan which is qualified to act in such capacity under the laws of the Unites States of America or the State of Michigan. The County Treasurer may from time to time as required designate a similarly qualified successor note registrar and paying agent.

### Disposition of Note Proceeds

6. The proceeds of the sale of the notes shall be deposited into a separate account in the Fund (the "1987 Account") and shall be used to continue the Fund. The County Treasurer shall pay therefrom (from collections of delinquent real property taxes and other moneys on hand, together with proceeds of the notes) the full amount of the delinquent tax roll delivered as uncollected by any tax collector in the County and which is outstanding and unpaid on or after March 1, 1987, in accordance with the provisions of Act 206.

### 1987 Collection Account

7. There is hereby established as part of the Fund an account (hereby designated the "1987 Collection Account") into which account the County Treasurer shall place the delinquent taxes against which the County has borrowed, and interest thereon, collected on and after July 1, 1987, all County property tax administration fees on such delinquent taxes, after expenses of issuance of the notes have been paid, and any amounts received by the County Treasurer from the County and any taxing unit within the County, because of the uncollectability of such delinquent taxes. The foregoing are hereby established as funds pledged to note repayment.

### Security for Payment of Notes

8 . All of the moneys in the 1987 Collection Account and all interest earned thereon are hereby pledged to the payment of the principal of and interest

on the notes and shall be used solely for that purpose

until such principal and interest have been paid in

#### Additional Security

9. This note issue, in addition, shall be a general obligation of the County of Kent, secured by its full faith and credit, which shall include this County's limited tax obligation, within applicable constitutional and statutory limits, and its general funds. The County budget shall provide that if the pledged delinquent taxes and any other pledged amounts are not collected in sufficient amounts to meet the payments of principal and interest due on these notes, the County, before paying any other budgeted amounts, will promptly advance from its general funds sufficient money to pay that principal and interest. The County shall not have the power to impose taxes for payment of the notes in excess of constitutional or statutory limitations. If moneys in the 1987 Collection Account are not sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on the notes, when due, the County shall pay the same in accordance with this paragraph, and may thereafter reimburse itself from the delinquent taxes collected.

### Release of Pledge of 1987 Collection Account

10 . Any moneys in the 1987 Collection Account pledged to pay principal of or interest on the notes pursuant to paragraph 8 hereof, may be released from such pledge and may be used to pay any or all delinquent real property taxes which are due the County and any school district, intermediate school district, community college district, city, township, special assessment district, or any other political unit to which delinquent tax payments are due for any other year or for any other purpose permitted by law upon the investment of moneys in direct obligations of the United States of America in amounts and with maturities which are sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on the notes when due without further collection of delinquent taxes.

#### Michigan Department of Treasury Approval

11. The County Treasurer is hereby authorized to apply, if necessary, to the Michigan Department of Treasury for an order permitting the County to issue the notes authorized by this resolution or to file a Notice Intent to Issue an Obligation and pay the requisite filing fee for an exception from prior approval to issue the notes.

#### Sale of Notes

12. The County Treasurer is hereby authorized to offer the notes at public or private sale, including sale of the notes to the Michigan Municipal Bond Authority. If the notes are to be sold publicly, sealed proposals for the purchase of the notes shall be received by the County Treasurer for such public sale to be held at such time as shall be determined by the County Treasurer and notice thereof shall be published in accordance with law, once in the Bond Buyer, Michigan Investor or Detroit Legal News, each of which is hereby designated as being a publication printed in the English language and circulated in this State which carries as a part of its regular service, notices of sale of municipal bonds. Such public sale shall be conducted in accordance with the terms and conditions set forth in Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$10,500,000) and issue the Official Notice of Sale which shall be in its notes (the "notes") therefor for the purpose of substantially the form set forth in paragraph 18 of this resolution with such changes as are approved by the County Treasurer.

### Execution and Delivery of Notes

13. The County Treasurer is hereby authorized and directed to execute the notes for the County . The County Treasurer may cause the facsimile signature of the County Treasurer and the County seal or a facsimile thereof to be impressed or imprinted on the notes. The INTEREST RATE notes shall be authenticated by the manual signature of the note registrar and paying agent. After the notes have been executed and authenticated for delivery to the original purchaser thereof, the County Treasurer shall deliver the notes to the purchaser or purchasers thereof upon receipt of the purchase price. Additional notes bearing the facsimile signature of the County Treasurer and upon which the seal of the County or a facsimile

thereof is impressed or imprinted may be delivered to the note registrar and paying agent for authentication and delivery in connection with the exchange or transfer of notes. The note registrar and paying agent shall indicate on each note the date of its authentication. The notes shall be delivered with the approving legal opinion of Dickinson, Wright, Moon, VanDusen & Freeman, attorneys of Detroit, Michigan.

### Exchange and Transfer of Notes

14. Any note, upon surrender thereof to the note registrar and paying agent with a written instrument of transfer satisfactory to the note registrar and paying agent duly executed by the registered owner or his or her duly authorized attorney, at the option of the registered owner thereof, may be exchanged for notes of any other authorized denominations of the same aggregate principal amount and maturity date and bearing the same rate of interest as the surrendered note.

Each note shall be transferable only upon the books the County, which shall be kept for that purpose by the note registrar and paying agent, upon surrender of such note together with a written instrument of transfer satisfactory to the note registrar and paying agent duly executed by the registered owner or his or her duly authorized attorney.

Upon exchange or transfer of any note, the note registrar and paying agent on behalf of the County shall cancel the surrendered note and shall authenticate and deliver to the transferee a new note or notes of any authorized denomination of the same aggregate principal amount and maturity date and bearing the same rate of interest as the surrendered note. If, at the time the note registrar and paying agent authenticates and delivers a new note pursuant to this section, payment of interest on the notes is in default, the note registrar and paying agent shall endorse upon the new note the "Payment of interest on this note is in default. The last date to which interest has been paid is (place date)

The County and the note registrar and paying agent may deem and treat the person in whose name any note shall be registered upon the books of the County as the absolute owner of such note, whether such note shall be overdue or not, for the purpose of receiving payment of the principal of and interest on such note and for all other purposes, and all payments made to any such registered owner, or upon his or her order, in accordance with the provisions of paragraph 4 of this resolution shall be valid and effectual to satisfy and discharge the liability upon such note to the extent of the sum or sums so paid, and neither the County nor the note registrar and paying agent shall be affected by any notice to the contrary. The County agrees to indemnify and save the note registrar and paying agent harmless from and against any and all loss, cost, charge, expense, judgment or liability incurred by it, acting in good faith and without negligence hereunder, in so

treating such registered owner. For every exchange or transfer of notes, the County or the note registrar and paying agent may make a charge sufficient to reimburse it for any tax, fee or other governmental charge required to be paid with respect to such exchange or transfer, which sum or sums shall be paid by the person requesting such exchange or transfer as a condition precedent to the exercise of the privilege of making such exchange or transfer.

#### Book Entry System

15. The County Treasurer is hereby authorized to enter into an agreement with a custodian or trustee for the purpose of establishing a "book entry" system for registration of the notes. Pursuant to provisions of such agreement, the notes may be registered in the name of the custodian or trustee for the benefit of other persons or entities. Such agreement shall provide for the keeping of accurate records and prompt transfer of funds by the custodian or trustee on behalf of such persons or entities. The agreement may provide for the ssuance by the custodian or trustee of certificates evidencing beneficial ownership of the notes of such persons or entities, subject to the initial approval of the form of such certificate by the Country Treasurer. For the purpose of payment of the principal of and interest on the notes, the County may deem payment of such principal and interest, whether overdue or not, to the custodian or trustee, as payment to the absolute owner of such note. Pursuant to provisions of such agreement, the book entry system for the notes may be used for registration of all or a portion of the notes and such system may be discontinued at any time by the County. The note registrar and paying agent for the notes may act as custodian or trustee for such purpose.

#### Issuance Expenses

16 . Expenses incurred in connection with the issuance of the notes, including without limitation any premiums for any insurance obtained for the notes or note rating agency fees, shall be paid by the County Treasurer from County property tax administration fees on the delinquent taxes or from any other moneys in the Fund not pledged to the repayment of notes or from general funds of the County.

#### Replacement of Notes

17. Upon receipt by the County Treasurer of satisfactory evidence that any outstanding note has been mutilated, destroyed, lost or stolen, and of security or indemnity complying with applicable law and satisfactory to the County Treasurer, the County Treasurer may execute or authorize the imprinting of the County Treasurer's facsimile signature thereon and thereupon a note registrar or paying agent shall authenticate and the County shall deliver a new note of like tenor as the note mutilated, destroyed, lost or stolen. Such new note shall be issued and delivered in exchange and substitution for and upon surrender and cancellation of. the mutilated note or in lieu of and in substitution for the note so destroyed, lost or stolen in compliance with applicable law. The note registrar and paying agent shall, for each new note authenticated and delivered as provided above, require the payment of expenses, including counsel fees, which may be incurred by the note registrar and paying agent and the County in the premises. Any note issued under the provisions of this paragraph in lieu of any note alleged to be destroyed, lost or stolen shall be on an equal basis with the note in substitution for which such note was issued.

# LOWELL **TOWNSHIP** NOTICE

The following amendments to the Zoning Ordinance of the Township of Lowell were approved and adopted by the Lowell Township Board at the regular Board meeting held on the 20th of July, 1987:

1. Add new Section 3.4 as follows:

#### 3.4 Planned Unit Developments

3.4.1 INTENT AND PURPOSE The purpose of this district is to allow for flexibility in design of residential or commercial areas, economy in the usage of land and conservation of sensitive physical and environmental features. It is designed to accomplish the objectives of the zoning ordinance through a land development project review process to achieve integration of the proposed development with the characteristics of the project area. Through this process, the district will permit and regulate the development of unified areas for various compatible uses permitted by the ordinance and for other special uses not otherwise authorized and which by their nature, may require specjal treatment.

The objectives of this district are to permit flexibility in the regulation of land development; encourage innovation in land use and variety in design, layout and type of structures constructed; achieve economy and efficiency in the use of land natural resources, energy and the provision of public services and utilities; encourage provision of useful open space and provide adequate housing, employment and shopping opportunities particularly suited to the needs of the community.

This district is intended to accommodate developments with mixed or varied uses, sites with unusual topography or unique settings within the community or on land which exhibits difficult or costly development problems. Planned developments shall not be allowed where the intended use is primarily to avoid the imposition of standards and requirements of other zoning classifications rather than to achieve the stated purposes of this section.

3.4.2 **DEFINITION** For purposes of this section, a planned unit development includes such terms as cluster zoning, planned development, community unit plan, planned residential development, and similar terminology. A planned unit development shall also be defined as land under unified control, to be planned and developed as a whole, in a single develop ment operation or a definitely programmed series of development operations, including all lands and buildings.

3.4.3 DISTRICT ESTABLISHMENT The PUD District may, in accordance with the requirements and procedures set forth herein, be hereafter established by amendment to the zoning ordinance in accordance with statutory requirements.

### 3.4.4 PROCEDURE

A. Pre-Application Conference. A prospective applicant may confer with a committee of the Planning Commission prior to the submission of an application for PUD zoning. The purpose of such conference is to benefit the prospective applicant by providing information and guidance before the prospective applicant has entered into binding commitments or incurred substantial expense in the preparation of plans, surveys, and other data.

- 1. A party wishing a pre-application conference shall submit to the Planning Commission a request, in writing, for such conference. The following shall also be submitted with said
- a. Payment of a fee determined by ordinance of the Township Board.
- b. Legal description of the subject land.
- c. Development concept plan.
- d. Narrative statement indicating the reason for PUD zoning and a general description of the proposed project.
- Such committee appointed of the Planning Commission shall review the pre-application submittals to determine:
- 3.4.2.
- proposed.
- c. Specific areas of concern to be addressed by the applicant in the final development plan.

- B. Final Development Plan. Request for the PUD district shall be in the form of an application for rezoning. Unless expressly waived as not being necessary, such application shall include a site plan in accordance with Section 4.8.
- C. Planning Commission Actions. Following receipt of an application for PUD zoning, the Planning Commission shall hold a public hearing in accordance with statutory requirements. At the public hearing or within a reasonable time thereafter, the Planning Commission shall meet for final consideration of the request, and recommend to the Township Board, denial, approval, or approval with conditions, of the request. The following standards shall be used in consideration of an application for PUD zoning, or for conditions to be attached thereto:
- 1. Whether the proposed use will be harmonious with, and not harmful, injurious, or detrimental to existing and anticipated uses in the area.
- 2. Whether the proposed plan will endanger the safety or impair the health of the residents of the vicinity.
- 3. Whether the proposed plan will be adequately served by necessary facilities and services, including but not limited water, sewer, roads, fire protection, police service, and

Reasonable conditions may be imposed with approval of a PUD plan. The conditions may include those necessary to insure that public services and facilities will be capable of accommodating increased service and facility loads caused by the proposed land use or activity, to protect the natural environment and conserve natural resources and energy, to insure compatibility with adjacent uses of land, and to promote the use of land in a socially and economically desirable man-Conditions imposed shall meet all of the following require-

- Be designed to protect natural resources, the health. safety and welfare and the social and economic well-being of those who will exercise the land use or activity under consideration, residents and landowners immediately adjacent to the proposed land use or activity, and the community as
- Be related to the valid exercise of the police power, and purposes (of the relevant zone, district or section of the Ordinance) which are affected by the proposed use or activity.
- 3. Be necessary to meet the intent and purpose of the zoning ordinance, be related to any standards established in the ordinance for the land use or activity under consideration, and be necessary to insure compliance with those standards.
- 4. The conditions imposed shall be recorded in the record the approval action, and shall remain unchanged except

The Planning Commission shall prepare a report stating its conclusions on the request, the decision, the basis for its decision, and any condition relating to an affirmative decision. Said report shall be transmitted to the applicant and to the Township Board for consideration in making a final decision.

- D. Township Board Action. In accordance with applicable regulations, the Township Board shall review the application, the final development plan, and the report of the Planning Commission, and shall deny, approve, or approve with conditions, the requested zoning, Any conditions imposed with respect to approval shall be recorded in the record of the approved action, and shall remain unchanged except as pro-
- 3.4.5 Required Conditions. The following provisions shall apply to all PUD developments.

. Site Eligibility. The minimum area necessary to qualify as PUD shall not be less than 15 contiguous acres of land for a Residential PUD and not less than two contiguous acres of land for a Commercial PUD. However, if the commercial PUD partially includes any residential dwelling units, the minimum area necessary shall not be less than 5 contiguous acres. An Owner of land with less than the minimum required area may apply if his (her) land is adjacent to a similar proposed or constructed PUD.

B. Gross Density for PUD Units. The gross density of buildings for a PUD may not exceed 1.25 times the maximum allowed under the most restrictive zone in existence at the time of a. Conformance with the provisions of Sections 3.4.1 and P.U.D. application. An equal amount of land gained through this increased density shall be set aside as open space. At b. General suitability of the property for the type of project least 50% of the total area shall be dedicated to open space for a Residential PUD

C. Ownership. The tract of land may be owned, leased or

individuals or corporations. An application may be filed by the owner or jointly by the owners of all property to be included in the proposed development. In the case of multiple ownership, a plan once approved, shall be binding on all owners.

D. Utilities. Unless specifically waived by the Planning Commission, a PUD shall have community water and sewer provided by the developer, and must be approved by all legal state, county and local agencies (health, conservation, etc.) who sit in authority and have jurisdiction.

E. Facility Site Standards. The site standards for all individual uses and facilities as provided in Section 5.4 of this Ordinance. must be observed unless waived by the Planning Commission for any (or all) of the specific uses and facilities.

- F. Public Easements on Common Property which is Privately Owned. When common property exists in private ownership. the owners shall grant easements over, under and through such property to the Township as required for public purposes
- G. Common Property in the Planned Developments. Common property in the PUD is a parcel or parcels of land, a privately owned road or roads, together with improvements thereon. the use and enjoyment of which are shared by the owners and occupants of the individual building sites. When common property exists, the ownership of such common property shall be private. When privately owned, arrangements must be made for the improvement, operation and maintenance of such common property and facilities, including private streets. drives, service parking and recreational areas.

H. Environmental Features. All sensitive natural features such as drainageways and streams, wetlands, lands within the 100-year floodplains, land on slopes of 12% or greater and stream or river banks (which by virtue of soil and slope may create highly erodible hazards and threaten the public health and safety) shall remain unencumbered by residential buildings and structures.

I. Drainageways and Streams. Drainageways and streams shall be protected by a twenty (20) feet public easement measured from the center line of such drainageway or

3.4.6 Site Design Standards. Unless otherwise modified in writing at the time of application approval, compliance with the following design standards is required.

A. All uses permitted in a PUD shall meet the bulk regulations specified in Section 4.1.2 for the most restrictive zoning district in existence at the time of P.U.D. application.

B. All PUD's consisting of any non-residential uses shall also meet the following requirements:

- 1. Ingress and egress opening from the development onto a public road shall be limited to one per six hundred (600) feet.
- 2. Planted or landscaped buffer areas of 100 feet in width are required along all front yards and along any property line abutting a residential use or district. Landscaping shall be provided so as to insure that proposed uses will be adequately buffered from one another and from surrounding public and private property
- Off-street parking is required pursuant to Section 4.1.1. A minimum of 10% of the parking area shall be landscaped. The joint use of parking facilities by two or more uses is encouraged whenever practical and satisfactory to each of the uses to be served. A reduction of individual parking requirements may be permitted in cases where neighboring uses have significantly different hours of operation. However, each use shall provide a minimum of 50% of its individual off-street parking requirements.
- 4. Vehicular and pedestrian circulation, allowing safe, convenient, uncongested and well-defined circulation within and to the district shall be provided.

3.4.7 Change in Plan. Subsequent to zoning approval by the Township Board, no change in the development plan shall be made without Planning Commission approval. Approval to a change in the development plan which conforms to the zoning ordinance may be granted by the mutual agreement of the landowner and the Planning Commission.

If the Planning Commission does not approve such change in the development plan, the landowner may seek approval of the proposed change in accordance with the procedures established in Section 3.4.4 of this zoning ordinance, provided, however, no Township Board action shall be required for approval of a change in plan.

without jurisdiction to accept appeals or grant variances from the regulations of the PUD District.

- 3.4.9 Site Plan Approval. Site plan approval is required in accordance with Section 4.8.
- 3.4.10 Public Hearings. A public hearing is required for all Planned Unit Developments.
- 2. Revise Section 4.2.2(A) as follows:

4.2.2(A) In the case of detached accessory buildings and structures, a building permit is required for accessories only where the total gross floor area to be constructed is greater than 100 square feet and is built on a permanent foundation.

- 3. Revise Section 4.2.4(C) as follows:
- 4.2.4(C) Every dwelling shall:

a. Comply with the minimum requirements of this ordinance for the zone in which it is located, including living area requirements, area, height, width and dimension regulations.

- b. Have a minimum width across any front, side or rear elevation of 22 feet and complies in all respects with the current BOCA standards, including minimum heights for habitable rooms. Where a dwelling is required by law to comply with any federal or state standards or regulations for construction and where such standards or regulations for construction are different than those imposed by the current BOCA standards, then and in that event such federal or state standard or regulation shall apply.
- c. Be firmly attached to a permanent foundation or footings buried beneath the frost line in accordance with the current BOCA standards and shall have a wall of the same perimeter dimension of the dwelling and constructed of such materials and type as required in the applicable building code for singlefamily dwellings. In the event that the dwelling is a mobile home, as defined herein, such dwelling shall be installed pursuant to the manufacturer's setup instructions and shall be secured to the premises by an anchoring system or device complying with the rules and regulations of the Michigan Mobile Home Commission and shall have a perimeter wall as required above.
- d. Be installed with the wheels removed, in the event that a dwelling is a mobile home as defined herein. Additionally, no dwelling shall have any exposed towing mechanism, undercarriage or chassis. The perimeter of the mobile home shall have a skirting of permanent nature similar to that used for on site built housing.
- e. Connected to a public sewer and water supply or to such private facilities approved by the Kent County Health Department. All drainfields, absorption beds or seepage pits shall not be closer than 100 feet from any lake, stream or river.
- f. Contain a storage capability area in a basement located under the dwelling, in an attic area, in closet areas or in a separate structure of standard construction similar to or of better quality than the principal dwelling, which storage area shall be equal to 10% of the square footage of the dwelling or 100 square feet, whichever shall be less.
- g. Be aesthetically compatible in design and appearance with other residences in the vicinity, with either a roof overhang of no less than six inches on all sides, or alternatively, with window sills and roof drainage systems concentrating roof drainage at collection points along the sides of the dwelling; has not less than two exterior doors with the second one being in either the rear or side of the dwelling; and contains permanently attached steps connected to said exterior door areas or to porches connected to said door areas where difference in elevation requires the same.

The compatibility of design and appearance shall be deter mined in the first instance by the township zoning official upon review of the plans submitted for a particular dwelling, subject to appeal by an aggrieved part to the zoning board of appeals within a period of 15 days from the receipt of notice of said zoning inspector's decision. Any determination of compatibility shall be based upon the standards set forth in this section, as well as the character, design and appearance of one or more residential dwellings located outside of mobile home parks throughout the township. The foregoing shall not be construed to prohibit innovative design concepts involving such matters as solar energy, view, unique land contour or relief from the common or standard designed home.

h. Contain no additions or rooms or other areas which are not constructed with similar quality workmanship as the original structure, including permanent attachment to the principal structure and construction of a foundation as required herein.

i. Comply with all pertinent building and fire codes. In the case of a mobile home, all construction and all plumbing, electrical apparatus and insulation within and connected to said mobile home shall be of a type and quality conforming to the "Mobile Home Construction and Safety Standards" as promulgated by the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development, being 24 CFR 3280, and as from time to time such standards may be amended. Additionally, all dwellings shall meet or exceed all applicable roof snow load and strength requirements.

j. Have windows with glass area equal to not less than 10% of the floor area of each room, storage closets and interior bathrooms excepted.

k. Have a minimum livable floor area of 750 square feet for a one-story dwelling, exclusive of any attached garage porch, or breezeway; and a two-story dwelling shall have a minimum livable floor area of 900 square feet with at least 600 square feet on the first floor, exclusive of any attached garage, porch or breezeway.

 Have at least one livable floor area of which the exterior walls are entirely above grade.

m. The foregoing standards shall not apply to a mobile home located in a licensed mobile home park except to the extent required by state or federal law or otherwise specifically required in the ordinance of the township pertaining to such

n. All construction required herein shall be commenced only after a building permit has been obtained in accordance with the current BOCA standards.

### 4. Revise Section 4.2.4(F) as follows:

4.2.4(F) Accessory Buildings. No accessory building shall be erected in any required front or side yard or within five (5) feet of any other building or within ten (10) feet of any property line. No Accessory Building in a rear yard in an AG-1 or AG-2 District shall be located within 50 feet of any property line. Every accessory building hereafter erected or moved shall be on a lot adjacent to a public street, or with access to an approved street, and all structures shall be so located on lots as to provide safe and convenient access for servicing, fire protection, and required off-street parking.

Accessory buildings shall be located on the same lot or land as the main building except for accessory buildings in The Flood Hazard District provided they meet the provisions of

### 5. Revise Section 4.2.4(H) as follows:

### 4.2.4(H) Mobile Homes.

The following temporary or special uses of mobile homes constructed to 1976 HUD specifications may also be permitted, contingent upon meeting the requirements provided:

- a. Mobile homes may be used as a seasonal or accessory building to an agricultural operation from which owner derives a minimum of 50% of his/her net income, for a maximum of six months per year upon application to the Building Official.
- b. Mobile homes may be placed in a licensed mobile home dealership in commercial zoning district; and
- c. Mobile homes may be used as temporary living quarters in a residential or agricultural zoning district during construction of a permanent dwelling, or as a temporary field office in a commercial zoning district for a period of one year. Two extension periods of six months each are permitted upon application to the Building Official.
- d. All temporary mobile homes shall be installed pursuant to the manufacturer's setup instructions and shall be secured to the premises by an anchoring system or device complying with the rules and regulations of the Michigan Mobile Home Commission and shall be connected to a public sewer and water supply or to such private facilities approved by the Kent County Health Department.

### 6. Revise Section 4.3.1(G)(a)

a. Exemption From Construction Standards of Section 4.3. A-G. In the Flood Hazard Area, an applicant shall have the option to apply for a building permit in the flood hazard area without conformance to the standards set forth in Section 4.3.1 provided the following procedures are complied with:

(1) A sketch plan is submitted by the applicant to the Planning Commission showing the general location and legal description of the property;

- (2) Following review by the Planning Commission, the applicant forwards the sketch plan to the Michigan Department of Natural Resources for their determination of the elevation of the site and whether it is or is not within the 100 Year Flood Plain:
- (3) Provided that the site is found to be within the 100 Year Flood Plain, the applicant shall apply for a Special Use Permit pursuant to Section 4.7 and provide a detailed site plan pursuant to Section 4.8;
- (4) Prior to consideration of the Special Use Permit request, the Planning Commission shall hold at least one duly advertised public hearing;
- (5) If appropriate, the applicant shall provide a statement by a registered professional engineer or licensed land surveyor that the flood proofing measures undertaken are consistent with the flood protection elevation and associated flood factors for the particular area;
- (6) If the applicant is given a Special Use Permit, the building inspector shall be authorized to grant a building permit provided that all applicable building codes are complied with for buildings within a flood plain.

### 7. Revise Section 4.5 as follows:

#### 4.5 PRIVATE STREETS

4.5.1 Location Permitted. Private streets are permitted in the Rural Agricultural District (AG-2) and in the Rural Low Density Residential District (R-1).

Private streets are permitted only when they provide access to a minimum of five (5) adjacent properties. Private streets used to serve less than five parcels which do not have adequate frontage on a public street will not be permitted.

4.5.2 Preliminary Private Road Permit. The Owner shall submit an application for a Preliminary Private Road Permit, together with the application review fee to the Township Planning Commission. The application package shall include a written description of the proposed development to be served. detailed site plans and construction plans (see Section 4.5.4), detailed description of how the road will be operated and maintained, and how the costs of operation and maintenance will be apportioned and paid for by benefitting property own-

In reviewing the preliminary application, the Planning Commission shall consider the impact of the proposed development on adjacent properties, whether the health, safety and general welfare of persons or property using or affected by the private road will be adequately protected and whether the precedent set by allowing the private road in the circumstances under consideration will adversely affect the long term development policies of Lowell Township. An architect, engineer or other persons will be consulted if deemed necessary. If the Planning Commission approves the preliminary application, the Building Official shall issue a preliminary Private Road Permit to the Owner upon payment of the Construc-

4.5.3 Final Private Road Permit. No construction shall begin on the private road or on adjacent properties which depend on the private road for access until the Preliminary Private Road Permit has been issued. The Owner shall notify the Township at least 72 hours prior to initiation of construction of the Private Road. During construction, the Owner shall allow the Township to review construction progress for compliance with the approved site plan and construction drawings. Upon completion of construction, the Township will complete a final review of the private road improvement to check compliance with the approved site plan and construction plans. The Owner shall correct any deficiencies identified during either an interim or final review. Upon final review and approval of the completed Private Road improvement, the Township Clerk shall issue a Final Private Road Permit to the owner. Building permits for construction on properties served by the Private Road shall not be issued until the Final Private Road Permit has been issued

4.5.4 Site Plans and Construction Plans. A site plan and construction plans showing the proposed location, adjacent properties, proposed street grades, drainage and proposed improvements, shall be prepared by a registered engineer or registered land surveyor and shall be submitted to the Township Planning Commission as part of the preliminary private road permit application and approval.

4.5.5 Maintenance and Repair. Maintenance and repair and liability for private streets shall be the responsibility of property owners adjacent to the private street and not the responsibility or liability of the Township.

(b) The layout of private streets in respect to their location, intersections, cul-de-sacs, vertical street alignment, street grades, street signs, horizontal curves, curb openings at intersecting streets, etc., shall conform to the Kent County Road Commission standards for platted streets.

(c) Where private streets intersect any public or private road, the private street shall require paving and curbs and gutters extending as per Kent County Road Commission standards for a platted street.

(d) The construction of the roadway shall conform to the Kent County Road Commission standards for a local road 22' wide with 7" gravel base (MDSH 22A), 7' wide grass shoulders, side ditches with 1 on 3 front slope and 1 on 2 backslope at 0.5% grade minimum or current requirements. Ditches shall outlet into a cross culvert or drainage course In impervious soils (clay or other unsuitable materials), a 12" sand sub-base, graded parallel to the road surface (extending into the front ditch slope), shall be constructed. Bituminous surfacing and storm sewer will not be required.

(e) Culverts shall be placed at all natural drainage courses or other waterways. Culvert sizes and grades shall be determined using the Kent County Road Commission storm runoff calculations formula. Materials for culverts shall also conform to their requirements.

8. Delete Section 5.4.1(p)

9. Add new Section 4.9 as follows:

Satellite Dish or Antennas. No free standing satellite dish or other antenna shall be located in a front yard. A free standing satellite dish or antenna shall meet the side and rear yard requirements for accessory buildings. All satellite dishes shall be solid in color and shall not be used for advertising pur-

10. Add new Section 4.10 as follows:

4.10 Solar Panels. Free standing solar panels shall be considered an accessory structure and shall meet all front, side and rear yard requirements specified for such buildings.

11. Revise Section 5.1 as follows:

5.1 Mobile Home Parks. In recognition of the growing trend the Township. toward mobile homes and mobile home parks and the need for well-located and properly developed areas to accommo- Effective date: date them, mobile home park regulations are hereby prescribed for such use with appropriate construction and development standards to promote the health, safety and general welfare of the residents of such areas as well as the residents of adjoining and neighboring premises.

5.1.1 Eligibility. The site of a mobile home park must be within an MH - Mobile Home Park Zoning district in order to be eligible for approval of a special use permit.

5.1.2 Special Use Permit Required. Before any other type of permit for a mobile home park can be secured, a special use permit by the Planning Commission must first be obtained. All standards for a special use permit, and all requirements, including site plan approval by the Planning Commission must be met. See Article VI for special use permit application procedures.

5.1.3 Special Conditions and Limitations for Mobile Home Parks. In addition to satisfying the requirements for a special use permit, the following shall also govern the development of a mobile home park.

A. All mobile home parks shall conform to the standards specified in Act 419 of the Public Acts of 1976 as amended. the Mobile Home Commission Rules, October, 1985 as amended and the Department of Public Health, Bureau of Environmental and Occupational Health, Mobile Home Parks and Seasonal Mobile Home Parks Health Standards, May 26, 1984, as amended.

B. All mobile homes shall be skirted within thirty (30) days of placement within the mobile home park and must meet the standards of Act 419 of the Public Acts of 1976, as amended.

C. All mobile homes shall be anchored when installed in a mobile home park with only those systems which are approved by Act 419 of the Public Acts of 1976, as amended.


