## New sewer rates and ordinances adopted

Lowell's new City Manager, David M. Pasquale, may have wondered what in the world he's gotten himself into during Monday's special meeting of the

Lowell City Council. It was Pasquale's first day on the job, and the Councilmen were busy passing no less than seven ordinances and obligating the city to a 25

year, \$2,250,000 bond issue. The ordinances and the bond issue are all related to the new secondary waste water treatment plant.

City Attorney Dick Wendt spent well over an hour reviewing the seven lengthy ordinances for the benefit of the council and Pasquale. The ordinances authorize the sale of bonds, set up a new system for establishing sewer rates, and authorize an agreement between the city and Lowell Township to share in the new plant's capacity.

Water rates will remain the same for all customers, but sewer rates will nearly double for the average homeowner. The cost per 1,000 gallons was set at \$1.08, up from .52 cents per 1,000 gallons. The monthly debt service charge, formerly referred to as the readiness to serve charge, was set at \$9.06. Wendt said the average residential monthly bill is perhaps the best indicator of how the new charges affect the homeowner. "The average Lowell residential sewer customer is now paying \$9.42 per month. When the new rates go into effect that average bill will be \$18.24," Wendt said. Wendt admitted that all the new rates are estimates made from past usage. They will likely change annually when the actual usage can be reviewed. The new rates go into effect September 15, 1987.

Wendt and former City Manager Ray Quada did point out that the new rates are far lower than estimated a year or two ago. Quada said, "We were realistically looking at sewer bills of \$75.00 to \$80.00 per month if we had been forced to build the plant ordered by the E.P.A. without federal and state funding". The rates are also much lower than estimated even after funding had been granted. Wendt explained that favorable bids on the construction and very good interest rates have lowered the estimated average monthly bills from about \$26.00 to \$18.24 level.

The ordinances obligate 18% of the plant's capacity to use by Lowell Township. The township will also be responsible for 18% of the unfunded share of the plant's construction. Wendt told the council that the township will be regarded as a "wholesale customer", and will be responsible for their own billing and collection. Lowell Township will adopt a similar set of ordinances at a meeting to be held Monday, August 17.

Mayor James Maatman asked Wendt if there are any plans to explain to city sewer customers what the new plant is all about, why it was necessary and why the rates are going up. Pasquale told Maatman that he plans to send a letter to each sewer cus-

tommer. Maatman suggested that perhaps some professional advice might be sought in an effort to draft a clear and concise letter.

Wendt wondered if the city's engineering firm might not have a staff person available to help with the project.

The council adopted all seven ordinances clearing the way for the construction of the new \$5,917,000 plant.

## New manager sworn in

David M. Pasquale, 40, was sworn in as Lowell's City Manager at Monday evening's special meeting of the Lowell City Council. Pasquale came here from his post as Assistant City Manager in Mt. Pleasant, a position he has held for the past six years. The new manager has nearly 15 years experience in

city government and holds three Masters Degrees. Most of his formal education is related to city government.

Pasquale's family includes his wife Anne and three children, Michael, 13; Cathy, 12 and Elizabeth, 9. The Pasquales have purchased a home on North

Washington St., but will live in an apartment until they gain possession of their new home in a few weeks.

An informal reception was held Monday morning to welcome the new City Manager and give him a chance to meet city employees and officials.

In other matters, candidates were chosen for the Board of Directors for the Michigan Association of School Boards, and secretary Linda Beers was appointed as the Board's liaison to the MASB Legislative Commit-

tee. Wernet Distributors was awarded the bid for the 1987-88 milk supplier and approval was given to seek bids on the purchase of milk coolers.



### CHILD CARE PROPOSED BY YMCA

The Lowell YMCA is in the process of obtaining a license for child care services for a before and after school center.

Y-Director Jim Hodges reports that this pilot program would be to initially serve children at Bushnell Elementary School in grades 1 thru 5. Alto and Runciman schools could be added in the future when suitable locations and qualified supervisors can be hired. The Y's program committee has adopted the name "Y-Care Club" as the name for this program that is sometimes referred to as "latch-key".

The National YMCA has produced a program guide for such centers which will be an important resource for our centers, says Hodges. While it is a bit early to announce all of the details about the YMCA's Care Club Program, interested parents of Bushnell School children can call the YMCA to be placed on the contact list. The Y hopes to start the Y-Care Club in early fall.

## "Capitol Column"

Michigan's thousands of miles of interstate and main roads may not have the flash and dazzle of supercomputers and space shuttles, but in many ways, they're the key to the future. Our roads and bridges are the foundation of a transportation system that's essential to economic growth.

Managing and maintaining our vital transportation system is a problem the Legislature has been working on this summer. A joint Senate-House Ad Hoc Committee is working on budget bills for state transportation spending and seeking to develop new alternatives for raising the funds necessary to handle the job. That's no small task.

Our transportation system is always decaying while the cost of repairs is always growing. According to the Michigan Road Builders Association, about 25,000 miles of roadway and more than 3,300 bridges are worn out and require immediate replacement or repair. The Association estimates the cost of meeting those needs is likely to exceed half a billion dollars in

the next decade without even taking inflation into account. And if the budget-cutting Gramm-Rudman-Hollings legislation at the federal level is upheld, Michigan could also face a loss of \$50 million a year in highway aid.

The committee has been meeting throughout the summer to work on key elements such as the core distribution formula. But the committee is also considering a number of new ways to provide the ever-increasing amounts of money required to maintain good roads.

Senate Republicans have suggested a number of ways to help local governments raise funds to meet their highway obligations. These include possibly the authority to raise license fees for out-of-state diesel trucks, creating a \$3.00 fee for driver's licenses statewide, and a small increase in fuel taxes. The committee is also studying the idea of authorizing counties to place proposals for local road improvement fees on county-wide election ballots. Because county

road departments get their money from state-collected taxes, ideas like this are innovative, and place greater control of highway spending in the hands of local residents.

The committee is working through the summer, because the Legislature recognizes the importance of this issue to economic growth—and because we know that an answer must be found by October 1, when the current funding formula expires. Although many of the bills before the committee were approved by the Senate this spring, the House failed to approve the package prior to summer recess. When the recommendations of the committee face the Legislature again this fall, we are hopeful they will receive quick approval. We can't allow further delays in our efforts to put Michigan back on the road to a strong economic future.

I had my old Escort flying low to our rendezvous point, and we made it just in time. We threw all the gear in the back of the plane, and headed out across Lake Michigan on a simply beautiful evening. Once airborne, I had a chance to relax a little, and the guilt began to settle in. I had it out with my conscience right then and there. The old conscience began telling me how rotten it was to dump all those responsibilities and run off to an air show. I argued back that I'd been working very, very hard and needed a break, and I'd be darned if I'd let some guilt complex ruin my day off. I must be getting more assertive with age, because that was the last I heard of my conscience for the entire trip.

What a day it was! The weather was absolutely beautiful. We saw thousands of airplanes from ultralights to bombers, antiques to experimentals, the Voyager to a Jenny and a Spad to an F-14. We watched over four hours of aerobatics and saw several flights of WWII aircraft as they flew over the field. I was enthralled! Of course Casey went absolutely bonkers.

I'm not saying I'm going to drop the ball every time I get a chance to do something like this, but it sure did feel good to give my old sense of responsibility a swift kick in the pants for a change.

### Better Way To Settle Minor Legal Disputes

In today's society, even minor disagreements end up in a courtroom. The result has been a backlog of work and an overloaded judicial system. A House Republican lawmaker has an idea on how to reduce this caseload.

State Representative Rick Bandstra (R-Grand Rapids) has introduced legislation (House Bills 4823, 4824) that help establish problem-solving centers where opposing sides could sit down and talk over their problems.

The concept has been tried successfully in Grand Rapids, Detroit, Flint and Ann Arbor. The services have been called "alternative dispute resolution centers." Up to now they have been unpaid volunteers from all walks of life. In Grand Rapids, trained mediators have handled more than 50 cases since last fall and reached a settlement in 93 percent of the cases.

The Bandstra bill would add \$2 onto the current fee for filing circuit court lawsuits and \$1 onto the district court filing fee. The resulting \$450,000 would be used to help communities start their own mediation centers.

I co-sponsored the Bandstra bill. It will save time and money. These mediation centers could reduce backlogs and cut down on lawsuits. If the legislation is enacted into law, it could mean less aggravation and cost for everyone.

creasingly more cynical," she continues. "I think that's why I was drawn to someone like Mona. She's so naive and innocent."

# CITY OF LOWELL ORDINANCE AMENDMENT

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTIONS 25-202(p), 25-202(kk), 25-205, 25-246, 25-262 AND ADD TO SECTION 25.235A OF ARTICLE V OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF LOWELL.

THE CITY OF LOWELL ORDAINS:

**Section 1.** That subsection 25-202(p) of Article V, Chapter 25 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Lowell, Michigan is hereby amended to read as follows:

(p) "Domestic waste" shall mean the water carried wastes from sanitary conveniences such as toilets, sinks, garbage disposals, dishwashers and clothes washing machines located in a domicile. Domestic waste has a strength not exceeding 300 parts per million of BOD, 300 parts per million of suspended solids and 10 parts per million of phosphorus at the point of discharge.

**Section 2.** That subsection 25-202(kk) of Article V, Chapter 25 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Lowell is hereby amended to read as follows:

(kk) "Pretreatment standards" shall mean National Categorical Pretreatment Standards, Alternative Discharge Limits, or other federal, state, or local standards, whichever are applicable, including those in or promulgated pursuant to subsection 307(a) of the Clean Water Act, 33 U.S.C. §1317(a).

**Section 3.** That subsection 25-205 of Article V, Chapter 25 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Lowell is hereby amended to read as follows:

All structures in which sanitary sewage originates which is located on premises with an available City sanitary sewer shall, at the expense of the owner thereof and in accordance with the provisions of this Article, be connected to the City sanitary sewer within 180 days after the City sanitary sewer becomes available or, if it is presently unoccupied and unused, prior to any occupancy or use. Provided, however, no new connection to the sanitary sewer will be required or permitted unless there is sufficient available capacity in all downstream sewage collection lines, force mains and lift stations and in the sewage treatment plant, including capacity for treating BOD and suspended solids.

**Section 4.** That section 25-246 of Article V, Chapter 25 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Lowell, Michigan is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 25-246. Surcharges and Contracts.

The City may, by rule, establish surcharges for discharges of specified compatible substances in quantities or concentrations exceeding, to a specified extent, specified limits and requirements. The City may, notwithstanding any provision of this Article, contract with a user for the treatment of wastewater exceeding applicable discharge limitations pursuant to which contract the user shall pay additional fees, costs and/or surcharges provided such wastewater does not contain an incompatible substance, would not interfere with sewage treatment and would not damage the system.

**Section 5.** That section 25-262 of Article V, Chapter 25 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Lowell is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 25-262. Appeal Procedure.

(a) An informal appeal by any user may be made for relief regarding user billing, user flow, flow concentration, user rate application and regulatory application. An informal appeal is initiated by written application to the City Manager within 10 days after the date the user deems itself aggrieved stating the reasons therefore with supporting documents and data.

(b) The informal hearing shall be scheduled at the earliest practicable date, but not later than five (5) days after receipt of the request, unless extended by mutual written agreement. The hearing shall be conducted on an informal basis at the City Hall or at such place as designated by the City Manager.

(c) Formal appeals from orders of the City Manager, including a ruling following an informal appeal, may be made to the City Council, acting as a board of appeals (the "Board"), within thirty (30) days from the date of any citation, order, charge, fee, surcharge, penalty or other action. Such appeal may be taken by any person aggrieved even if no informal appeal was made. The appellant shall file a notice of appeal with the City Manager and with the Board, specifying the grounds therefore. Prior to a hearing, the City Manager shall transmit to the Board a summary report of all previous action taken. The Board may, at its discretion, call upon the City Manager to explain the action. The final

disposition of the appeal shall be in the form of a resolution, either reversing, modifying, or affirming, in whole or in part, the appealed decision or determination. In order to find for the appellant, three members of the Board must concur.

(d) The Board shall fix a reasonable time for the hearing of the appeal, give due notice thereof to interested parties, and decide the same within a reasonable time. Within the limits of its jurisdiction, the Board may reverse or affirm, in whole or in part, or may make such order, requirements, decision or determination as, in its opinion, ought to be made in the case under consideration, and to that end shall have all the powers of the City Manager.

(e) The decision of said Board shall be final, except that said Board or the members thereof may be required, under proper mandamus proceedings, to show cause why certain actions were taken or decisions rendered.

(f) The Board shall meet at such times as it may determine. There shall be a fixed place of meeting and all meetings shall be open to the public in accordance with applicable laws. The Board may adopt its own rules of procedure and keep a record of its proceedings, showing findings of fact, the action of the Board, and the vote of each member upon each issue considered. The presence of three members shall be necessary to constitute a quorum.

(g) The Board may prescribe the sending of notice to such persons as it deems to be interested in any hearing by the Board.

(h) All charges for service, penalties, fees, or surcharges outstanding during any appeal process shall be due and payable to the City. Upon resolution of any appeal, the City shall adjust such amounts accordingly; however, such adjustments shall be limited to the previous four quarters billing unless otherwise directed by court order.

(i) If an informal or formal hearing is not demanded within the periods specified herein, such administrative action shall be deemed final. In the event either or both such hearings are demanded, the action shall be suspended until a final determination has been made, except for Immediate Cease and Desist Orders issued pursuant to this Ordinance.

(j) Appeals from the determinations of the Board may be made to the Circuit Court for the County of Kent as provided by law. Such appeals shall be governed procedurally by the Administrative Procedures Act of the State of Michigan (1979 P.A. No. 306, MCL 24.201 et seq.). All findings of fact, if supported by the evidence, made by the Board shall be conclusive upon the court.

**Section 6.** That section 25-235A of Article V, Chapter 25 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Lowell, Michigan be added between sections 25-235 and 25-236 to read as follows:

Sec. 25-235A. Test Procedures.

All tests required to be made pursuant to this Article shall be performed in compliance with the Guidelines for Establishing Test Procedures in 40 C.F.R., Part 136.

**Section 7.** This ordinance shall take effect ten (10) days after its publication in the Grand Valley Ledger, a newspaper of general circulation in the City of Lowell.

# CITY OF LOWELL ORDINANCE AMENDMENT

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND CHAPTER 25 OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF LOWELL, "WATER SEWERS AND SEWAGE DISPOSAL," BY ADDING ARTICLE III, AND BY REPEALING SECTION 25-102, AND AMENDING SECTIONS 25-100, 25-103, 25-104, 25-108 AND 25-109 OF ARTICLE IV.

THE CITY OF LOWELL ORDAINS:

**Section 1.** That the Code of Ordinances of the City of Lowell, Michigan is hereby amended by adding a new Article to be numbered Article III, to Chapter 25, which Article III shall read as follows:

**ARTICLE III. SEWER USER CHARGES AND SURCHARGES**

- (a) "City" shall mean the City of Lowell, Kent County, Michigan.
- (b) "City Council" shall mean the City Council of the City.
- (c) "City Manager" shall mean the City Manager of the City or his duly authorized designee.
- (d) "Commercial User" shall mean a user engaged in the purchase or sale of

goods, transaction of business, or otherwise rendering a service.

(e) "Debt service charge" shall mean a charge levied on the users of the sewer system for the user's proportionate share of the principal and interest payable on all indebtedness issued to finance the acquisition of the sewer system and the treatment plant.

(f) "Governmental User" shall mean a federal, state or local government user which has executive, legislative, judicial, administrative or regulatory activities.

(g) "Interjurisdictional Sanitary Sewer Use Agreement" shall mean the agreement between the City and the Township dated as of August 1, 1987, relating to the use of the sewer system and the treatment of sanitary sewage at the treatment plant as such agreement may be amended from time to time.

(h) "Industrial User" shall mean a manufacturing or process facility engaged in a productive or profit making venture that discharges a trade or process waste to the system and all users who discharge industrial waste into the system.

(i) "Institutional User" shall mean a user involved in a social, charitable, religious, educational or other special purpose activity.

(j) "Operation, Maintenance and Repair (or OMSR) Cost" shall mean the cost to operate and maintain the system and treatment plant plus replacement costs.

(k) "Person" shall mean any individual, partnership, co-partnership, firm, company, corporation, association, joint stock company, trust estate, governmental entity or any other legal entity or its legal representatives, agents or assigns. The masculine gender shall include the feminine and the singular shall include the plural where indicated by the context.

(l) "Replacement Costs" shall mean expenditures for obtaining and installing equipment, accessories, or appurtenances which are necessary to maintain the capacity and performance during the service life of the system and treatment works for which they were designed and constructed.

(m) "Residential User" shall mean a user whose premises or building is used primarily as a domicile for one or more persons and whose wastes originate from normal living activities of its inhabitants.

(n) "Sewer service charge" shall mean the sum of the user charge and the debt service charge.

(o) "Sewer system" or "system" shall mean all sanitary sewer lines, lift stations, pumping facilities, sanitary sewer collection facilities and their appurtenances which the City has or shall have possession of and operating responsibility for (whether owned by the City or not), either now in existence in the City or hereafter acquired or constructed in the City, together with all works, plants, instrumentalities and properties used or useful in connection therewith in collecting sanitary sewage and transmitting and conveying such collected sanitary sewage to the treatment plant, and all extension, enlargements and improvements thereto in the City.

(p) "Surcharge" shall mean an extra charge to cover the cost of treating and sludge disposal of extra strength sewage or slugs.

(q) "Township" shall mean the Township of Lowell, Kent County, Michigan.

(r) "Township Board" shall mean the Township Board of the Township.

(s) "Treatment plant" or "treatment works" shall mean the City's wastewater treatment plant and all equipment and appurtenances, either now in existence or hereafter acquired or constructed by the City and all extensions, enlargements and improvements thereto in the City.

(t) "User" shall mean any person who contributes, causes or permits the contribution of sewage into the treatment works.

(u) "User charge" shall mean a charge levied on the users of the sewer system for the user's proportionate share of the cost of the operation and maintenance (including replacement costs) of the sewer system and treatment plant.

(v) "User Charge System" shall mean the system of charges levied on users of the system.

(w) "User class" shall mean the classification (residential, commercial, industrial, institutional or governmental) into which each user is categorized.

Sec. 25-41. Additional Definitions. Definitions of terms not defined in the

CONTINUED

preceding section 25-40 shall be the same as those in section 25-202 of this Code, if they are so defined in that section.

**Sec. 25-42. Abbreviations.** The meaning of abbreviations used in this Article and rules promulgated pursuant hereto shall be as follows:

- (a) "gpd" shall mean gallons per day.
- (b) "l" shall mean liter.
- (c) "MG" shall mean million gallons.
- (d) "mg" shall mean milligrams.
- (e) "mg/l" shall mean milligrams per liter.
- (f) "ppm" shall mean parts per million.
- (g) "u" shall mean microgram.
- (h) "u/l" shall mean micrograms per liter.
- (i) "g" shall mean gallons.
- (j) "g" shall mean one thousand (10000) gallons.

**Sec. 25-43. Sewer Service Charges**

(a) Sewer service charges including any late payment penalties, interest and charges shall be established from time to time by resolution of the City Council. The sewer service charges shall be based upon the water usage by the user, upon the actual sewer discharge flow or upon residential equivalencies. The user charge and the debt service charge for sewer service shall be specified separately. No free service shall be furnished by the system to the City or to any person, public or private, or to any public agency or instrumentality. The City shall pay for sewer service supplied to it or any of its departments or agencies at the rates established pursuant to this section from time to time. User charges for the Township shall be based on the actual costs of transmitting and treating the wastewater of the Township as determined by the Interjurisdictional Sanitary Sewer Use Agreement. Debt service charges for the Township shall be based on the Township's proportional share of the capital costs of the sewer system as determined by the Interjurisdictional Sanitary Sewer Use Agreement.

(b) If a user is connected to the sewer system but not to the City's water system, the City may, at the user's expense install a water meter with a remote reader on the user's well or other water supply. The user charge will then be based on the readings from that meter in the same manner and at the same rates applicable to users who are also connected to the City's water system. All users which are not residential users shall, at their expense, have meters installed and their rates so based. Residential users who are not connected to the City's water system and who do not have a water meter on the user's well or other water supply, shall be billed based upon a table of residential equivalencies to be adopted from time to time by resolution of the City Council.

(c) Industrial users may be established from time to time by resolution of the City Council be required to install, at their own expense, a sewage meter and sewage sampling equipment of a type and at a location acceptable to the City, for the purpose of determining their user charges.

(d) If there is evidence of a malfunctioning meter, the City Manager shall have the authority to estimate the quantity of water on which the billing is made until such time as the malfunctioning meter is repaired or replaced. The estimate of usage shall be based on previous months of similar usage.

(e) Rates and charges established hereunder shall be reviewed annually by the City Council and adjusted as needed to provide needed revenue to cover the system's costs and expenses.

(f) All users shall be notified at least annually of the amount of the user charge and of the amount of the debt service charges per user class.

**Sec. 25-44. Surcharges.** Surcharges shall be established from time to time by resolution of the City Council and shall be billed and collected with sewer service charges.

**Sec. 25-45. Billing and Enforcement.**

(a) **Lien.** Sewer service charges, including any late payment penalties, interest and charges, shall constitute a lien on all premises served which lien shall become effective immediately upon the provision of sewer system service to the premises. Whenever such charges are delinquent and remain unpaid, the charges shall be entered on the next ad valorem property tax roll for the property served and collected in the same manner as ad valorem property taxes. The City Treasurer shall, on or before March 1 of each year, turn such delinquent and unpaid charges over to the County Treasurer in the same fashion as delinquent and unpaid ad valorem property taxes. Provided, however, such charges shall not be a lien on the property served if the owner of that property has leased the property, the owner, is not, according to

a lease provision, liable for such sewer service charges, the City is so notified in a writing signed by both the owner and lessee and proof of such lease is provided the City as required by applicable law. Where the owner is not responsible for such charges, the lessee shall, before the commencement of sewer services to the premises, cause to be deposited with the City Treasurer an amount equal to an estimated three (3) months sewer service charges and shall cause such deposit to continue at that level throughout the lease term. The City shall apply the funds in that deposit against any and all delinquent charges of the lessee.

(b) **Discontinuance.** The City shall have the right to shut off and discontinue the supply of water to any premises for the nonpayment of sewer service charges and rates when due. If sewer rates and charges for service furnished to any premises are not paid within twenty (20) days after the due date thereof, water service to such premises will be shut off and discontinued and will not be restored until all such charges and penalties have been paid and a deposit equal to that provided in subsection (a) has been paid.

(c) **Other Remedies.** The remedies provided in this section shall be cumulative of any and all other remedies under state law, common law and these codified ordinances.

(d) **Billings.** The City will bill users periodically as provided by resolution of the City Council.

**Sec. 25-45. Hearing.** The City Manager may send to a user who has not paid sewer service charges within twenty (20) days of the date due, a notice that at the user's request a hearing will be scheduled with the City Manager to show cause why the user's billing is incorrect. If the City is considering discontinuing the user's City water service, such a notice shall be sent giving the user an opportunity to request a hearing with the City Manager to show cause why such service should not be discontinued. Such hearings shall be informal and the decision of the City Manager shall be final.

**Sec. 25-47. Audit.** The system shall be audited annually as part of the annual City audit.

**Section 2.** That section 25-102 of Article IV, Chapter 25 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Lowell, entitled "Sewage Utility Fund Created," is hereby repealed.

**Section 3.** That sections 25-100, 25-104 and 25-109 of Article IV, Chapter 25 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Lowell are hereby amended to read as follows:

**Sec. 25-100. Fiscal and Operating Year for Water System.** The water system shall be operated on the basis of the fiscal and operating year commencing July first and ending June thirtieth.

**Sec. 25-104. Utility Bond and Interest Redemption Fund.** There shall also be established and maintained a separate depository account designated "Water Utility Bond and Interest Redemption Fund" which shall be used solely for the purpose of paying principal and interest of water utility bonds. The monies in said Bond and Interest Redemption Fund shall be deposited in such bank duly qualified to do business in the State of Michigan as the City Council may designate. Out of the revenues remaining in the water utility fund after provision has been made for expenses of operation and maintenance of the water utility system, there shall next be set aside quarterly in the Water Utility Bond and Interest Redemption Fund, sums proportionately sufficient to provide for the payment of the principal and interest upon all outstanding bonds payable from the revenues of the system as and when the same become due and payable; provided, however, that should there not be sufficient funds available in either or both utility funds respectively, the deficit shall be made up in such manner as the City Council may designate.

**Sec. 25-109. Water Service Charges.**

(a) Effective July 1, 1986, the charges for water service to each of the premises connected with the system shall be as follows:

- (1) Meter readiness-to-serve charge (excluding mobile home parks and apartment buildings). Minimum charge regardless of use (prices quoted are charges per month):
  - (1) Meter Size 5/8 inch \$ 6.50
  - (2) Meter Size 3/4 inch \$ 6.50
  - (3) Meter Size 1 inch \$ 10.80
  - (4) Meter Size 1 1/4 inch \$ 16.25
  - (5) Meter Size 1 1/2 inch \$ 22.75
  - (6) Meter Size 2 inch \$ 43.30
  - (7) Meter Size 3 inch \$ 97.45
  - (8) Meter Size 4 inch \$ 173.30
  - (9) Meter Size 6 inch \$ 389.90

(2) **Commodity charge** (excluding mobile home parks and apartment buildings). All users located within the City limits shall pay \$0.80 per thousand gallons per month up to a usage of fifty thousand (50,000) gallons, and \$0.58 per thousand gallons in excess of fifty thousand (50,000) gallons per month. All users located outside the City limits shall pay \$1.47 per thousand gallons per month up to a usage of fifty thousand (50,000) gallons, and \$1.23 per thousand gallons in excess of fifty thousand (50,000) gallons per month.

(3) **Unmetered fire protection service.** All unmetered fire protection services will be billed at eighty-five dollars (\$85.00) per connection per year.

(4) **Meter Readiness to Serve Charge** (mobile home parks and apartment buildings). Charges for water service in mobile home parks and apartment buildings will be based on a readiness-to-serve charge to each mobile home or apartment of:

Per trailer pad \$6.50  
Per apartment unit \$6.50

(5) **Commodity Charge** (mobile home parks and apartment buildings). The owner of the mobile home park or apartment building which is located within the City limits shall pay a commodity charge of \$0.47 per thousand (1,000) gallons of water used per month up to a usage of fifty thousand (50,000) gallons and a charge of \$0.39 per thousand (1,000) gallons in excess of fifty thousand (50,000) gallons per month. The owner of a mobile home park or apartment building which is located outside the City limits shall pay a commodity charge of \$0.39 per thousand (1,000) gallons of water used per month up to a usage of fifty thousand (50,000) gallons and a water commodity charge of \$0.78 per thousand (1,000) gallons in excess of fifty thousand (50,000) gallons per month.

(b) The Lowell City Council may, by resolution adopted from time to time, amend the readiness-to-serve charges and the commodity charges set forth herein and establish and amend late payment penalties and charges.

**Section 4.** This Ordinance shall take effect ten (10) days after its publication in the Grand Valley Ledger, a newspaper of general circulation in the City of Lowell.

# CITY OF LOWELL RESOLUTION ADOPTING SEWER SYSTEM SERVICE CHARGES

WHEREAS, section 25-43 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Lowell authorizes the City Council to establish sanitary sewer system service charges from time to time by resolution; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED AS FOLLOWS:

1. The terms used in the resolution shall have the meanings defined in section 25-40 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Lowell.

2. User charges shall be as follows:

(a) \$1.08 per one thousand (1,000) gallons of metered water usage for those users within the City limits of the City connected to the City's water system and \$9.18 per residential equivalent unit for those users within the City who are not connected to the City's water system.

3. Residential equivalent units shall be determined using the table attached as Table I hereto and incorporated herein by reference.

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4. Debt service charges shall be in the amount of \$9.06 per residential equivalent unit per month for each user within the City.

5. Surcharges shall be made in accordance with the table attached as Table II hereto which is incorporated herein by reference.

6. Billings shall be made monthly for services rendered from the 15th day of one month to the 15th day of the next month. Bills shall be mailed on or before the first day of the succeeding month and shall be due and payable on the 15th day of the month in which they are sent. If bills are not paid by their due date, they are delinquent. There will be a penalty charge of five dollars (\$5.00) for delinquent bills.

7. These rates shall take effect September 15, 1987.

8. All resolutions and parts of resolutions to the extent of any conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

9. The City Manager shall cause this resolution to be published in the Grand Valley Ledger, a newspaper of general circulation in the City of Lowell.

# CITY OF LOWELL ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE TO PROVIDE FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF A WASTEWATER SECONDARY TREATMENT FACILITY AND THE REHABILITATION OF A PORTION OF THE SANITARY SEWER COLLECTION SYSTEM OF THE CITY OF LOWELL; TO AUTHORIZE THE ISSUANCE OF CITY OF LOWELL WASTEWATER SYSTEM REVENUE BONDS, SERIES 1987, BY THE CITY OF LOWELL, PURSUANT TO THE PROVISIONS OF ACT 94 OF THE PUBLIC ACTS OF MICHIGAN OF 1933, AS AMENDED, FOR THE PURPOSE OF FINANCING THE COSTS OF

CONSTRUCTING A WASTEWATER SECONDARY TREATMENT FACILITY AND REHABILITATING A PORTION OF THE SANITARY SEWER COLLECTION SYSTEM; TO PRESCRIBE THE FORM OF BONDS; TO PROVIDE FOR THE COLLECTION OF REVENUES FOR THE PURPOSE OF PAYING THE BONDS; TO PROVIDE FOR THE PAYMENT AND SECURITY OF SAID BONDS; AND TO PROVIDE FOR THE RIGHTS OF THE HOLDERS OF SAID BONDS IN ENFORCEMENT THEREOF AND OTHER MATTERS RELATIVE TO SAID BONDS AND SAID FACILITY AND SYSTEM AND FOR THE USE THEREOF FOR THE PRESERVATION OF THE PUBLIC HEALTH, SAFETY AND WELFARE.

THE CITY OF LOWELL ORDAINS:

Section 1. Definitions. Whenever used in this Ordinance or in the bonds to be issued hereunder, except when otherwise indicated by context, the following definitions shall apply:

(a) "Act 94" means the Revenue Bond Act, Act 94 of the Public Acts of Michigan of 1933, as amended (MCL 141.101, et. seq.).

(b) "Bonds" means the \$2,220,000 City of Lowell Wastewater System Revenue Bonds, Series 1987-Qualified Obligation, authorized and issued pursuant to Act 94 and this Ordinance.

(c) "City" means the City of Lowell, Kent County, Michigan.

(d) "Council" means the City Council of the City of Lowell, the legislative and governing body thereof.

(e) "Net Revenues" means the revenues of the Wastewater System after deduction of the expenses of administration, operation and maintenance of said System.

(f) "Project" means the improvements to the Wastewater System described in Section 2 hereof.

(g) "Wastewater System" means the complete system of the City including all appurtenances thereto now owned by the City, and all extensions and improvements thereto now owned by the City, and all extensions, additions, enlargements and improvements thereto hereafter made.

Section 2. Necessity; Description of Project.

It is hereby determined to be necessary for the public health, safety and welfare of the City to construct a wastewater secondary treatment facility and to rehabilitate a portion of the City's sanitary sewer collection system in accordance with plans and specifications therefor prepared by Fishbeck, Thompson, Carr & Huber, Inc., consulting engineers of Ada, Michigan.

Section 3. Estimated Cost; Period of Useful-

ness. The cost of the Project has been estimated to be Five Million Nine Hundred Seventeen Thousand Seven Hundred Twenty-Eight Dollars (\$5,917,728), including the payment of incidental expenses as are hereafter specified in Section 4 hereof, which estimate of cost is hereby approved and confirmed, and the period of usefulness of the public improvements is estimated to be not less than twenty-six (26) years.

Section 4. Issuance of Bonds. To defray a portion of the cost of the Project, including the payment of legal, engineering, financial and other expenses incident thereto and incident to the issuance and sale of the Bonds, it is hereby determined that the City borrow the sum of Two Million Two Hundred Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$2,200,000) and that revenue bonds be issued therefor pursuant to the provisions of Act 94.

Section 5. Bond Information. The Bonds shall be revenue bonds payable out of the net revenues collected by the City from users of the Wastewater System and other revenues derived from or pledged to the operation of the Wastewater System after provisions have been made for the payment of expenses of administration, operation and

maintenance; shall be dated August 1, 1987; shall be numbered consecutively in the direct order of their maturities from 1 upward; shall be in the denomination of \$5,000 or whole multiples thereof within each maturity; and shall bear interest at a rate or rates to be hereafter determined not exceeding a net interest rate of ten percent (10%) per annum, expressed in multiples of 1/8 or 1/20 of 1% both (the difference between the highest and lowest interest rate shall not exceed four percentage points), payable on February 1, 1988 and semi-annually thereafter on the first day of August and February of each year until the principal of, premium, if any, and interest on said Bonds is fully paid. Said Bonds shall mature serially on February 1 of each year as follows:

Bonds maturing in the years 1988 to 1996, both inclusive, shall not be subject to redemption prior to maturity. Bonds maturing in the years 1997 to 2012, both inclusive, shall be subject to redemption prior to maturity, at the option of the City, in whole or in part in \$5,000 increments or multiples thereof within each maturity in such order of maturity as the City shall determine and within any maturity by lot, at any time on or after February 1, 1996 at par and accrued interest to the date fixed for redemption, plus a premium as follows:

2.0% of the par value of each Bond or portion thereof called for redemption on or after February 1, 1996, but prior to February 1, 1999;

1.5% of the par value of each Bond or portion thereof called for redemption on or after February 1, 1999, but prior to February 1, 2002;

1.0% of the par value of each Bond or portion thereof called for redemption on or after February 1, 2002, but prior to February 1, 2005;

.5% of the par value of each Bond or portion thereof called for redemption on or after February 1, 2005, but prior to February 1, 2008.

No premium shall be paid on Bonds called for redemption on or after February 1, 2008.

Written notice of redemption shall be given to the registered holders of the Bonds to be redeemed not less than thirty (30) days prior to the date fixed for redemption by first-class mail to the address of such registered holders as shown on the bond register on the date such notice is given, kept on behalf of the City by the Bond Registrar/Paying Agent, hereinafter defined. Bond so called for redemption shall not bear interest after the date fixed for redemption, provided funds are on hand with the Bond Registrar/Paying Agent to redeem said Bonds.

The principal of and premium, if any, on the Bonds shall be payable in lawful money of the United States of America at the corporate trust office of First of America Bank-Detroit, N.A., Detroit, Michigan, as paying agent (the "Bond Registrar/Paying Agent"), to the registered holder thereof. Interest on the Bonds shall be payable by check mailed to the registered holder thereof as shown on the registration books of the City kept by the Bond Registrar/Paying Agent as of the fifteenth (15th) day of the month preceding any interest payment date.

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Section 6. Registration and Execution. The Bonds shall be registered as to both principal and interest on the bond register kept for that purpose by the Bond Registrar/Paying Agent. The Bonds are transferable only upon presentation to the Bond Registrar/Paying Agent with a written transfer by the registered holder or its attorney-in-fact. The Bonds shall be signed by original or facsimile signature of the Mayor of the City and City Clerk, and they are hereby authorized and directed to execute said Bonds for and on behalf of the City and to impress or have printed the seal of the City thereon. Upon the execution of said Bonds, the same shall be delivered to the City Manager of the City who is hereby authorized and directed to deliver said Bonds to the original purchaser thereof, upon receipt of the purchase price therefor, plus the accrued interest, if any, to the date of delivery.

Section 7. Bond Form. The form of the Bonds shall be substantially as follows:

Interest on this Bond is payable by check mailed to the registered holder hereof as shown on the registration books of the City kept by the Bond Registrar/Paying Agent as of the fifteenth (15th) day of the month preceding any interest payment date.

This Bond is one of a series of bonds entitled the "\$2,220,000 City of Lowell Wastewater System Revenue Bonds, Series 1987-Qualified Obligations (the "Bonds") of even date and like tenor, except as to principal amount, date of maturity, and interest rate, aggregating the principal sum of \$2,200,000, issued pursuant to a bond authorizing ordinance (the "Bond Ordinance"), duly adopted by the City Council on August 10, 1987, and under and in substantial compliance with the constitution and law of the State of Michigan, including specifically Act 94 of the Public Acts of Michigan of 1933, as amended ("Act 94"), for the purpose of defraying in part the cost of constructing a wastewater secondary treatment facility and rehabilitating a portion of the sanitary sewer collection system of the wastewater system of the City. For a complete statement of the revenues from which, and the conditions under which, this Bond is payable, a statement of the conditions under which additional bonds of equal standing may hereafter be issued, and the general covenants and provisions pursuant to which this Bond is issued, reference is made to the Ordinance.

FURTHER PROVISIONS OF THIS BOND ARE SET FORTH ON THE REVERSE HEREOF.

This Bond is transferable by the Registered Owner hereof in person or by its legal representative duly authorized in writing at the office of the Bond Registrar/Paying Agent, upon surrender and cancellation of this Bond. Upon such transfer, a new fully registered bond or bonds of the same maturity and authorized denominations will be issued in exchange therefor. THE TAX EXEMPT STATUS OF INTEREST ON THIS BOND MAY BE AFFECTED BY NON-COMPLIANCE WITH THIS PROVISION.

It is hereby certified and recited that all acts, conditions and things required by law precedent to and in the issuance of this Bond and the series of Bonds of which this is one have been done and performed in regular and due time and form as required by law.

This Bond is payable from the net revenues of the Wastewater System of the City as provided in Act 94 and the Bond Ordinance. The City hereby covenants and agrees to fix and maintain, at all times while any of such Bonds shall be outstanding, such rates for service furnished by said Wastewater System as shall be sufficient, together with other revenues derived from or pledged to the operation of the Wastewater System, to provide for payment of the principal of, premium, if any, and interest on the Bonds as and when the same become due and payable, and to create a bond and interest redemption fund and bond and interest redemption reserve fund therefor, to provide for the payment of expenses of administration, operation and maintenance of said Wastewater System as are necessary to preserve the same in good repair and working order, and to provide for such other expenditures and funds for said Wastewater System as are required by the Bond Ordinance.

The revenues of the Wastewater System of the City, less reasonable expenses of operation, administration and maintenance, are hereby irrevocably pledged and a statutory lien thereon is hereby created for the payment of principal of and interest hereon and on all other Bonds of this series. Principal of and interest on this Bond is additionally secured by the City's full faith and credit which includes the City's limited tax obligation, within applicable charter, statutory and constitutional limitations and its general funds. The City does not, however, have the power to levy any taxes for the payment of principal of and interest on this Bond in excess of its Charter Statutory and Constitutional limitations.

Bonds maturing in the years 1988 to 1996, both inclusive, shall not be subject to redemption prior to maturity. Bonds maturing in the years 1997 to 2012, both inclusive, shall be subject to redemption prior to maturity, at the option of the City, in whole or in part in \$5,000 increments or multiples thereof within each maturity in such order of maturity as the City shall determine and within any maturity by lot, at any time on or after February 1, 1996 at par and accrued interest to the date fixed for redemption, plus a premium as follows:

2.0% of the par value of each Bond or portion thereof called for redemption on or after February 1, 1996, but prior to February 1, 1999;

1.5% of the par value of each Bond or portion thereof called for redemption on or after February 1, 1999, but prior to February 1, 2002;

1.0% of the par value of each Bond or portion thereof called for redemption on or after February 1, 2002, but prior to February 1, 2005; and

.5% of the par value of each Bond or portion thereof called for redemption on or after February 1, 2005, but prior to February 1, 2008.

No premium shall be paid on Bonds called for redemption on or after February 1, 2008.

Written notice of redemption shall be given to the registered holders of the Bonds to be redeemed not less than thirty (30) days prior to the date fixed for redemption by first-class mail to the address of such registered holders as shown on the bond register on the date such notice is given, kept on behalf of the City by the Bond Registrar/Paying Agent. Bonds so called for redemption shall not bear interest after the date fixed for redemption, provided funds are on hand with the Bond Registrar/Paying Agent to redeem said Bonds.

Section 8. Net Revenue as Security. The principal of and interest on the Bonds shall be payable from the net revenues derived from the operation of the Wastewater System, including future improvements, enlargements and extensions thereof. The net revenues from the Wastewater System, including future enlargements, improvements and extensions thereto, are hereby pledged to the payment of the principal of and interest on the Bonds. To secure the payment of the principal of and interest on the Bonds issued hereunder and on

any additional bonds of equal standing which may be issued as provided by the terms of this Ordinance, there is hereby created to and in favor of the holders of the Bonds a statutory lien upon the net revenues of the Wastewater System, including future enlargements, improvements and extensions thereof.

Section 9. Additional Security-Limited Full Faith and Credit Pledge. The principal of and interest on the Bonds shall be additionally secured by the City's full faith and credit which includes the City's limited tax obligation, within applicable charter, statutory and constitutional limitations and its general funds. The City does not, however, have the power to levy any taxes for the payment of principal of and interest on the Bonds in excess of its charter, statutory and constitutional limitations.

Section 10. Rights of Bondholders. The holder or holders of said Bonds representing in the aggregate not less than twenty percent (20%) of the entire issue then outstanding may, either at law or in equity, by suit, action, mandamus, or other proceedings, protect and enforce the statutory lien set forth in Section 8 hereof and the full faith and credit pledge of the City set forth in Section 9 hereof and enforce and compel the performance of all duties of the officers of the City, including the fixing of sufficient rates, the collection of revenues, the proper segregation of revenues and the proper application thereof. Provided, however, that said statutory lien shall not be construed to give any holder or owner of any Bond authority to compel the sale of the Wastewater System, including the Project, the revenues of which are pledged thereto.

If there be any default in the payment of the principal of or interest on the Bonds, any court having jurisdiction in any proper action may appoint a receiver to administer and operate the Wastewater System on behalf of the City and under the direction of said court, and by and with the approval of said court, to fix and charge fees, rates and charges and collect revenues sufficient to provide for the payment of the Bonds or other obligations outstanding against the revenues of the Wastewater System and for the payment of the expenses of administering, operating and maintaining the Wastewater System and to apply the income and revenues of the Wastewater System in conformity with Act 94 and this Ordinance.

The holder or holders, from time to time, of the Bonds shall have all the rights and remedies given by law including particularly Act 94 for the enforcement of the City's obligations under this Ordinance and in the Bonds.

Section 11. Management of System. The management and operation of the Wastewater System shall be under the general control and supervision of the City Council. The Council may employ such persons in such capacities as it deems advisable to carry out the efficient management and operation of the Wastewater System. The Council may make such rules and regulations as it deems advisable and necessary to assure the efficient management and operation of the Wastewater System.

Section 12. Custodian and Deposit of Funds. The City Treasurer shall be custodian of all funds of the Wastewater System and such funds shall be deposited in a bank or trust company approved by the City and which is a member of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation, provided, however,

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money in the Bond and Interest Redemption Fund and Bond and Interest Redemption Reserve Fund (both hereinafter described) shall be kept on deposit with First of America Bank-Detroit, N.A., Detroit, Michigan, the bond registrar and paying agent for the Bonds.

Section 13. Establishment of Funds. The City Treasurer is hereby directed to establish the following funds into which the bond proceeds and the revenues and income from the Wastewater System shall be deposited, which funds shall be established and maintained, except as otherwise provided, so long as any of the Bonds remain outstanding.

A. CONSTRUCTION FUND. After deducting a sum equal to the amount of any accrued interest from the date of the Bonds to the date of delivery thereof, which sum shall be deposited in the Bond and Interest Redemption Fund (hereinafter described), the balance of the proceeds of the Bonds hereby authorized shall be deposited in a separate depository account designated the Wastewater System Revenue Bonds, Series 1987 - Construction Fund (the "Construction Fund") at a bank or trust company approved by the City and which is a member of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation. Said moneys shall be used solely for the purpose for which the Bonds were issued.

Any unexpended balance in the Construction Fund remaining after completion of the Project shall be used for such purposes as permitted by law.

Upon completion of the Project and disposition of any remaining proceeds of the Bonds, pursuant to the provisions of this Section 13, the Construction Fund shall be closed.

B. RECEIVING FUND. The gross income and revenue of the Wastewater System shall be set aside in a fund designated the Wastewater System Receiving Fund (the "Receiving Fund") and moneys so deposited therein shall be expended and used only in the manner and order as follows:

(1) Operation and Maintenance

Fund. The City shall maintain a fund known as the Operation and Maintenance Fund (the "O & M Fund"). Prior to the beginning of each fiscal year, the Council shall approve an annual budget of the Wastewater System for the ensuing fiscal year. Out of the moneys in the Receiving Fund, there shall be periodically set aside and deposited into the O & M Fund a sum sufficient to pay the reasonable and necessary current expenses of administering, operating and maintaining said Wastewater System.

(2) Bond and Interest Redemp-

tion Fund. There is hereby established as a separate depository account a fund known as the Wastewater System Revenue Bonds, Series 1987 - Bond and Interest Redemption Fund (the "Bond and Interest Redemption Fund") at First of America Bank-Detroit, N.A., Detroit,

Michigan. After transfer to the O & M Fund required in (1) above, there shall be transferred from the Receiving Fund and deposited in the Bond and Interest Redemption Fund, for payment of principal and interest on the Bonds, just prior to the date a payment is due, a sum equal to the principal of Bonds maturing and/or interest due on the Bonds on said due date.

(3) Bond and Interest Redemp-  
tion Reserve Fund. There is hereby established as a separate depository account a fund known as the Wastewater System Revenue Bonds, Series 1987, Bond and Interest Redemption Reserve Fund (the "Bond and Interest Redemption Reserve Fund") at First of America Bank-Detroit, N.A., Detroit, Michigan. This Fund is intended to insure the timely payment of principal of, and interest on the Bonds and to provide for the redemption of Bonds prior to their stated maturities. Prior to the delivery of the Bonds, there shall be deposited in the Bond and Interest Redemption Reserve Fund an amount equal to the lesser of the maximum annual principal and interest requirements of the Bonds or ten percent (10%) of the original principal amount of the Bonds. At

all times while any of the Bonds are outstanding, the market value of cash and securities in the Bond and Interest Redemption Reserve Fund shall be equal to the lesser of the maximum annual principal and interest requirements of outstanding Bonds or ten percent (10%) of the original principal amount of the Bonds.

Money in the Bond and Interest Redemption Reserve Fund shall be used for the following purposes, and for no other:

- (a) to prevent a default in the payment of principal of or interest on the Bonds by reason of the fact that money in the Bond and Interest Redemption Fund is insufficient for such purposes;
- (b) to pay the principal of, interest on, and redemption premium of the Bonds in the event all outstanding Bonds are redeemed in whole;
- (c) to effect partial redemption of the Bonds, provided that subsequent to partial redemption the market value of cash and securities in the Bond and Interest Redemption Reserve Fund shall not be less than the amount required to be maintained

in the Fund; and

(d) transferred to the Receiving Fund, if permitted by law, provided at the time of such transfer the market value of cash and securities in the Bond and Interest Redemption Reserve Fund shall not be less than the amount required to be maintained in the Fund.

The market value of cash and securities in the Bond and Interest Redemption Reserve Fund shall be established on the first day of July of each year and within forty-five

(45) days of such date in order to determine if the Fund contains the amount required by this Ordinance and to the extent to which payments therefor must be made or withdrawals therefrom may be made. If the Bond and Interest Redemption Reserve Fund does not at any time contain in cash and securities the amount required to be maintained in the Fund, on the first day of the month following such determination and on the first day of each of the next succeeding ten (10) months, one-eleventh (1/11) of the amount necessary to re-establish the required amount shall be paid into the Fund.

(4) Improvement and Repair

Fund. There is hereby established an Improvement and Repair Fund, into which there shall be placed, after meeting the foregoing requirements, such sums as the Council shall determine to be used for the purpose of acquiring and constructing improvements, additions and extensions to the Wastewater System and

for the purpose of making repairs and replacements to the Wastewater System.

(5) Surplus Moneys.

All moneys remaining in the Receiving Fund at the end of any fiscal year after satisfying the above requirements may be transferred to the Bond and Interest Redemption Fund and used as authorized in this Ordinance or at the option of the City transferred to the Improvement and Repair Fund and used for the purposes for which said Fund was established. Provided, however, that if there should be a deficit in the O & M Fund, Bond and Interest Redemption Fund or Bond and Interest Redemption Reserve Fund, on account of defaults in setting aside therein or maintaining the amounts hereinbefore required, then transfers shall be made from the moneys remaining in the Receiving Fund at the end of any fiscal year to such Funds in the priority and order named, to the extent of such deficits. Provided

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it is permitted by law, available surplus moneys may be used to retire any outstanding obligations of the City incurred for the construction, expansion or addition to the Wastewater System including additional bonds, the issuance of which is authorized by this Ordinance, or if no other disposition has been provided for, such moneys may be used for such other purpose or purposes as the Council may deem to be for the best interest of the City.

Section 14. Investment of Funds. Moneys in the several funds and accounts herein established, including the moneys derived from the proceeds of sale of the Bonds, may be invested in obligations of the United States of America or obligations the principal and interest of which are, in the opinion of the Attorney General of the United States, fully and unconditionally guaranteed by the United States or certificates of deposit, subject to the limitation provided in Act 94, provided, however, investment of moneys in the Bond and Interest Redemption Fund shall be limited to obligations of the United States of America bearing maturity dates before the date of the next principal or interest payment. All investments shall be subject to the applicable limitations imposed by arbitrage regulations, including proposed and temporary regulations, issued pursuant to Section 103(c) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, as amended, or Section 148 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended (collectively the "Code") and to the rebate requirements of Section 148(f) of the Code including all applicable regulations. In the event such investments are made, the securities representing the same shall be kept on deposit with the bank or trust company having on deposit the fund or funds from which such purchase was made. Income received from such investments shall be credited to the fund from which said investments were made.

Section 15. Rates and Charges. Prior to the issuance of the Bonds, the Council shall have established rates and charges for the use of the Wastewater System in an amount sufficient, together with other revenues derived from or pledged to the operation of the Wastewater System, to pay (i) the expenses of administration and the costs of operation and maintenance of the Wastewater System; (ii) principal of and interest on the Bonds and any such additional bonds issued pursuant to this Ordinance; and (iii) the cost of replacement, repairs and improvements to the Wastewater System and the cost of all other requirements provided herein. The rates and charges for all services and facilities rendered by the Wastewater System shall be reasonable and just, taking into consideration the costs and value of the Wastewater System and the cost of administering, operating and maintaining the same and the amounts necessary for the retirement of all Bonds and accruing interest on all Bonds.

The City covenants and agrees that it will, at all times, prescribe and maintain and thereafter collect rates and charges which, together with other revenues derived from or pledged to the operation of the Wastewater System, are reasonably expected to produce net revenues in the current operating year of the Wastewater System equal to at least one hundred percent (100%) of the principal and interest payments due on the Bonds in such

operating year. Promptly upon any material change in the circumstances which were contemplated at the time such rates and charges were most recently reviewed, but not less frequently than once in each operating year, the City shall review rates and charges as necessary to comply with the foregoing requirement.

Section 16. Lien. There is hereby created a statutory lien by Section 8 of Act 94 upon the net revenues of the Wastewater System pledged to the payment of the principal of and interest on the Bonds, to and in favor of the holders of such Bonds, which lien shall be a first lien upon such net revenues.

By Section 21 of Act 94 and this Ordinance, the rates and charges for services furnished by the Wastewater System are made liens thereon, and those rates and charges delinquent for six (6) months or more shall be certified by the City annually on March 1 of each year to the City tax assessing officer who shall enter the same upon the next tax roll against the premises to which the service shall have been rendered, and the rates and charges shall be collected and the lien shall be enforced in the same manner as provided for the collection of taxes assessed upon such roll and the enforcement of the lien therefor. However, in all cases where a tenant is responsible for the payment of the charges and the City is so notified in writing (including a true copy of any lease, if one exists), then the charges shall not become a lien against the premises from and after the date of the notice. From and after such notice, no further service shall be rendered to the premises until a cash deposit of not less than three (3) months' service shall have been made as a security for payment of the rates and charges.

Section 17. No Free Service. No free service shall be furnished by the Wastewater System to the City or to any individual, firm or corporation, public or private, or to any agency or instrumentality.

Section 18. Covenants. The City covenants and agrees, so long as any of the Bonds remain outstanding, as follows:

A. That, with reference to the Wastewater System, it will punctually perform all duties and comply with applicable federal and State of Michigan laws, rules and regulations and continually operate and maintain the Wastewater System in good condition.

B. That it will construct and rehabilitate the Project substantially in accordance with the plans and specifications referred to in Section 2 hereof, and that it will not sell, lease, mortgage or in any manner dispose of the Wastewater System, including the Project, or any substantial part thereof until all bonds, where the net revenues of the Wastewater System have been pledged as security thereof, shall have been paid in full or all such bonds shall have been fully defeased.

C. That it will maintain complete books and records relating to the operation of the Wastewater System and its financial affairs and will cause such books and records to be audited annually at the end of each fiscal year and an audit report prepared, and furnish any holder of any Bonds a copy of such report

upon written request.

D. That it will prepare, keep and file such records, statements and accounts as may be required by law and that it will file with the Michigan Department of Treasury each year, as soon as is possible, but not later than one hundred twenty (120) days after the close of the fiscal year, a report, made in accordance with the accounting methods of the City, completely setting forth the financial operation of such fiscal year.

E. That it will maintain and carry insurance on all physical properties of the Wastewater System, of the kinds and in the amounts normally carried by municipalities engaged in the operation of similar systems. All moneys received for losses under any such insurance policies shall be applied first to the repair, replacement and restoration of the property damaged or destroyed.

Section 19. Additional Bonds. The City may issue additional bonds of equal standing and priority of liens with the Bonds in an amount necessary to complete construction and rehabilitation of the Project or for the purpose of making repair, replacement, expansion or extension of the Wastewater System. Additional bonds for repair, replacement, expansion or extension of the Wastewater System may be issued only if (a) the net revenues of the Wastewater System for the fiscal year next preceding the year for which an audit has been completed and filed with the Michigan Department of Treasury in which such additional bonds are to be issued or (b) the average of the net revenues of the Wastewater System for the two fiscal years next preceding the year for which audits have been completed and filed with the Michigan Department of Treasury in which such additional bonds are to be issued were at least one hundred and thirty percent (130%) of the average annual debt service requirements on all bonds then outstanding and those proposed to be issued when supplemented by the net revenues estimated to accrue from the said repair, replacement, expansion or extension for which the proceeds of the additional bonds will be used.

Any additional bonds shall be subject to the various funds herein established as if said bonds were part of the original bond issue herein authorized, and all income and revenue from any such repair, replacement, expansion or extension constructed with the proceeds of an additional bond issue shall be paid to the Receiving Fund.

Section 20. Sale of Bonds. The Bonds are hereby authorized to be sold at a discount not to exceed two percent (2%) by sealed competitive bids at a net interest rate of not to exceed ten percent (10%) per annum.

Section 21. Execution of Documents. The Mayor of the City and the City Clerk are hereby authorized to execute such certificates, affidavits or other documents or instruments as may be required in connection with the issuance, sale and delivery of the Bonds.

Section 22. Ordinance Shall Constitute Contract. The provisions of this Ordinance shall constitute a contract between the City and the holders of the Bonds and after the issuance of such Bonds this Ordinance shall not be repealed or

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amended in any respect which will adversely affect the rights and interests of the holders of the Bonds, nor shall the City adopt any law, ordinance or resolution which in any way adversely affects the rights of the holders of the Bonds so long as the Bonds or interest thereon remains outstanding.

**Section 23. Default of City.** If there shall be default in this Ordinance or in the payment of principal of or interest on any of the Bonds, upon the filing of a suit by twenty percent (20%) of the holders of the Bonds then outstanding, any court having jurisdiction of the action may appoint a receiver to administer the Wastewater System on behalf of the City with power to charge and collect rates and charges sufficient to provide for the payment of principal of and interest on the Bonds and for payment of the expenses of administering, operating and maintaining the Wastewater System and to apply income and revenues in accordance with this Ordinance and the laws of the State of Michigan.

The City hereby agrees to transfer to any bona fide receiver or other subsequent operator of the Wastewater System, pursuant to any valid court order in a proceeding brought to enforce collection or payment of City obligations, all contracts or other rights of the City conditionally, for such time only as such receiver or operator shall operate by authority of the court.

The holders of twenty percent (20%) of the Bonds in the event of default may require by mandatory injunction the raising of rates and charges of the Automobile Parking System in a reasonable amount.

**Section 24. Ordinance Subject to Michigan Law.** The provisions of this Ordinance are subject to the laws of the State of Michigan.

**Section 25. Operating Year of System.** The operating year of the Wastewater System shall coincide with the fiscal year of the City which currently begins July 1 and ends June 30.

**Section 26. Paragraph Headings.** The paragraph headings in this Ordinance are furnished for convenience of reference only and shall not be considered to be a part of this Ordinance.

**Section 27. Publication and Recordation.** This Ordinance shall be published in full in the Grand Valley Ledger, a newspaper of general circulation in the City, promptly after its adoption and the same shall be recorded in the ordinance book of the City and such recording authenticated by the signatures of the Mayor of the City and City Clerk.

**Section 28. Severability.** If any section, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase of this Ordinance shall be held invalid, the same shall not affect any other part of this Ordinance.

**Section 29. Conflict.** All ordinances and resolutions or parts thereof, insofar as the same may be in conflict herewith, are hereby repealed; provided that the foregoing shall not operate to repeal any provision thereof, the repeal of which would impair the obligation on the 1962 Bonds or the Bonds.

**Section 30. Effective Date.** This Ordinance is effective immediately upon its adoption.

## Safe Drivers are honored by P.O.

The National Safety Council Safe Driver Award is the recognized trademark of professional drivers who have proven their skill in avoiding traffic accidents. The more than six million drivers who have earned the award since 1930 have made it the highest award for professional safe driving performance.

The award plan is more than a means of rewarding drivers with good safety records. The rules spell out what is expected of professional drivers in the way of safety performance—the ability to operate a motor vehicle without having a preventable accident. The award rules constitute a yardstick by which drivers can measure their own performance and by which supervisors can measure the performance of individual drivers. When this standard of performance is clearly understood by both drivers and supervisors, it becomes a logical, fair, and workable basis for effective safety supervision. These rules are for Safe Driver Award Administration only. These rules are not to be used for disciplinary purposes. Discipline should be a separate consideration and action covered by specific postal regulations.

The Safe Driver Award emblem is a gold-plated metal shield bearing the words "National Safety Council Safe Driver Award" in gold on a hard-fired blue enamel background
