## Car dealers donate car to Boosters Club

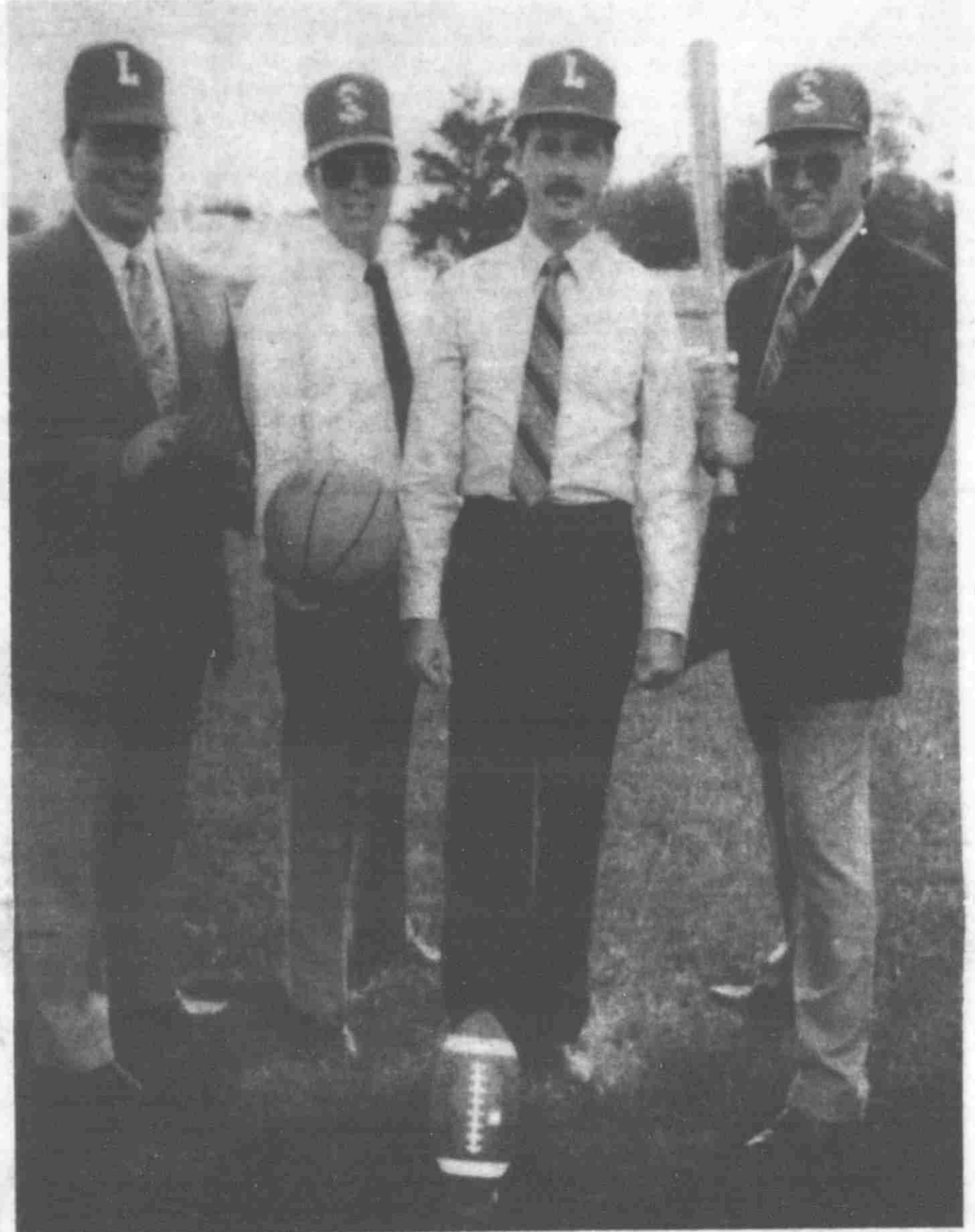

## Gus Macker contributes \$10,000

Scott McNeal, founder and director of the Gus Macker 3-on-3 Charity Basketball Tournament, sponsored by Saint Mary's Health Services SportsMed program, has awarded the Regional Center for the Treatment of Kidney Disease a check for \$10,000. Terence Green, Vice President of Community Relations, accepted the check, saying "We're extremely pleased to be involved with such a great event for this area as the Gus Macker. It's been a wonderful tournament through the years, and it seems to get better as time goes on."

The center, which specializes in the treatment of kidney disease and also performs transplant operations, will be using the funds to purchase new kidney dialysis machines. The dialysis center, located in Saint Mary's, has been operating since 1967 and this year will celebrate its 20th anniversary. During this time, thousands of patients have benefited from its services. The center is currently treating 130 chronic dialysis patients while an additional 45 are being treated in their homes.

The United Methodist Preschool will open its doors this fall for the 17th year of service to the children of the Lowell area.

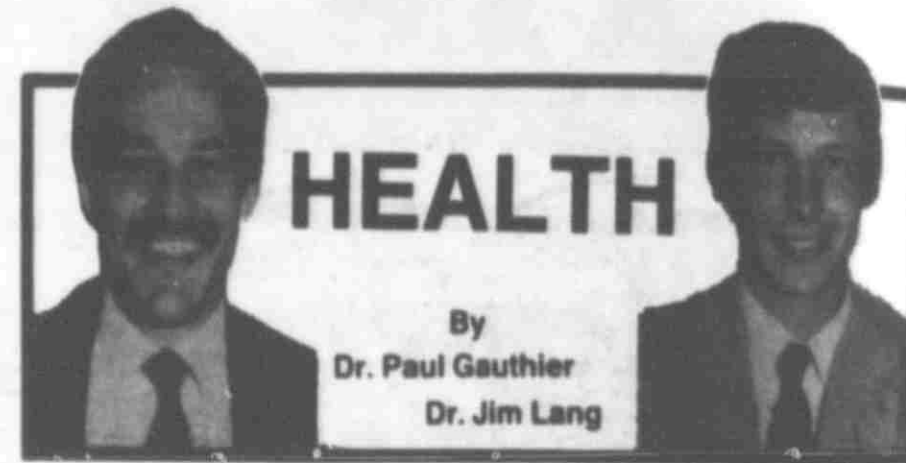

### HEALTH COLUMN WE NEED YOUR HELP

Again, this year, the Lowell Rotary is sponsoring a community blood drive, to be held at the Lowell Middle School from 3-8 p.m. on September 9th. We urge you to seriously consider donating blood for this very worthwhile cause.

The Grand Valley Blood Program is the sole supplier of blood for the entire Kent County area. This year, well over 32,000 pints will be needed, yet only 5% of the population actually donates blood.

The actual donation of blood takes about 7-8 minutes. Prior to drawing the blood your medical history, blood pressure, and temperature will be taken. After the blood is drawn you will remain for refreshments for 10-15 minutes and then you are free to return to work or home. The entire process only takes about 45 minutes.

Anyone between the ages of 17 and 76 that weighs at least 100 pounds can donate blood. Patients with history of hepatitis, cancer, blood disease, or those that are pregnant will not be eligible to donate blood. You cannot get AIDS or any other disease by donating blood.

We need all blood types. It is not right to believe that only rare blood types are needed. The more common the blood type, the larger the quantity that is needed. A single unit of blood can be separated into different components such as red cell, platelets or plasma.

About 100 units of blood are required daily in Kent County! Up to 12 donors a week are needed just to supply enough blood for the babies in Butterworth's neonatal unit! We urge you to take the time to give this valuable gift. As we stated last year, "Regardless of who you are or where you live, when YOU need blood it will be there, because people like YOU have taken time to give." 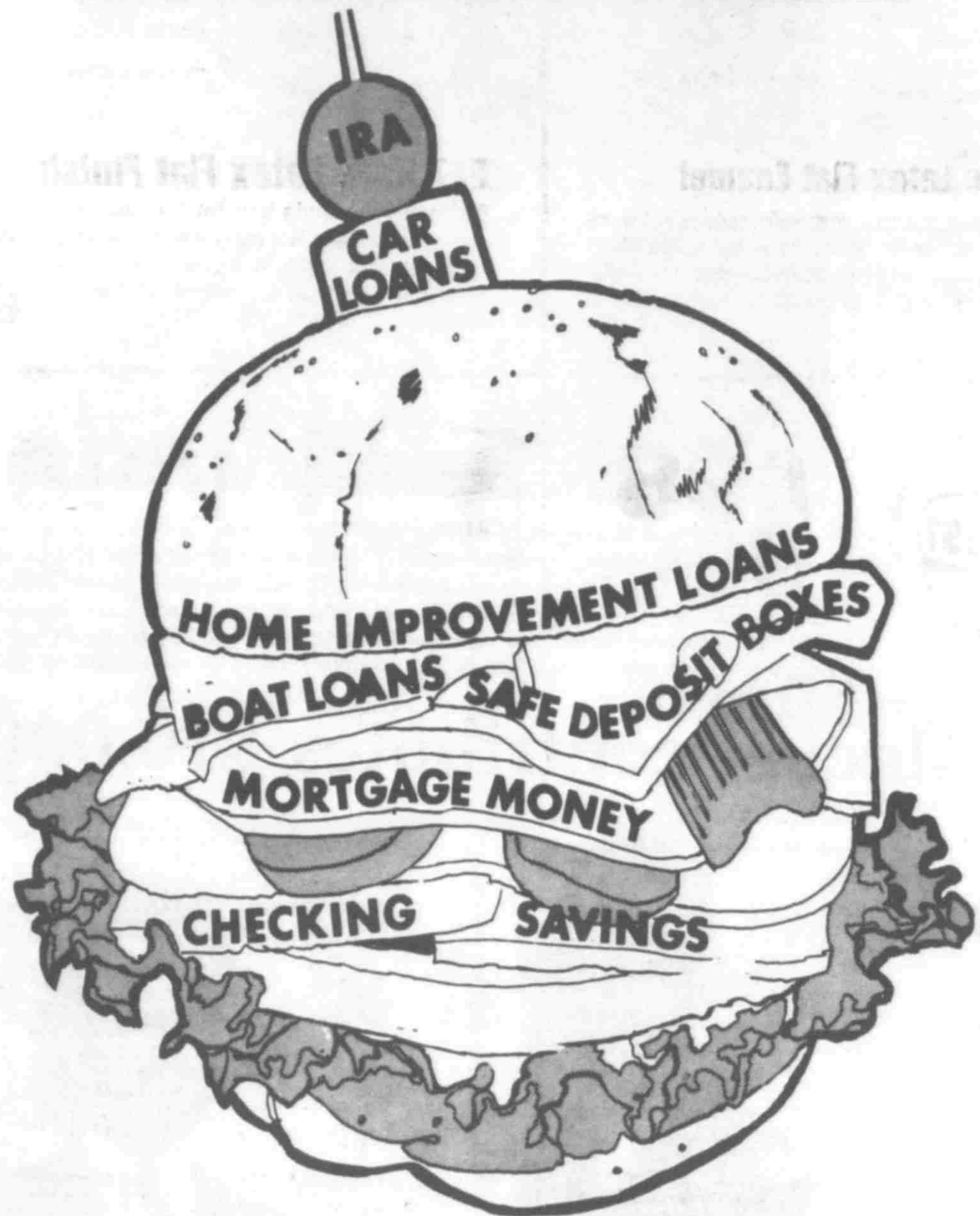
# Cubs reunion

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# Three developers approach Planning Commission

It took the Lowell Planning Commission two and one half hours to wade through four agenda items Monday night. The planners heard from three developers wishing to improve or expand existing facilities, and offered their thoughts on the value of a West Main parcel in an effort to help an appraiser. Wayne Lemmen, representing Lemmen Oil Co. of Coopersville, approached the planners with an, as yet, sketchy proposal for the old Shell gas station at the corner of Main and Hudson. Lemmen outlined three possibilities for the property.

One plan called for a 20' X 50' addition to the front of the existing building. The addition would accommodate a convenience store, and the car wash would be completely rebuilt. The second plan calls for demolition of the existing building, and constructing a 30' X 60' convenience store on the same site. There is no car wash proposed in this plan. Plan three calls for demolition of the existing building, and the construction of a 30' X 60' convenience store at the east edge of the property. Again, no car wash is proposed in plan three.

In each case new pumps would be installed and a 14' canopy would be erected over the pumps. Lemmen told the planners he is leaning toward plan one, but is still undecided. Lemmen passed around photos of a similar store in Houston, Texas that incorporates Shell's new gas station decor. Lemmen said he plans to use the new motif, and the station would be one of the first of its kind in West Michigan. The property is currently zoned Commercial 3, and a gas station is not an approved use. In an effort to comply with Lem-

men's time constraints, the planners will ask the City Council to grant a zoning variance, allowing the site plan to be approved at next month's Planning Commission meeting. Lowell City Manager David Pasquale did recommend that Lemmen should seek re-zoning for the parcel to avoid variance requests in the future. Sam Lombardo, owner of Sam's Factory Outlet Store on West Main St., approached the planners with a site plan calling for an addition to the east of a large four bay service garage. The addition will more than double the size of the present structure, and will be used as retail sales space. The planners were concerned about a row of parking along Main St., screening to the rear of the building and pavement for parking, rather than gravel. Lombardo's spokesman, Roger Froling, assured the planners that these items could be corrected. The planners conditionally approved the plan, providing a revised site plan meets with the approval of both the City Manager and the City Planner.

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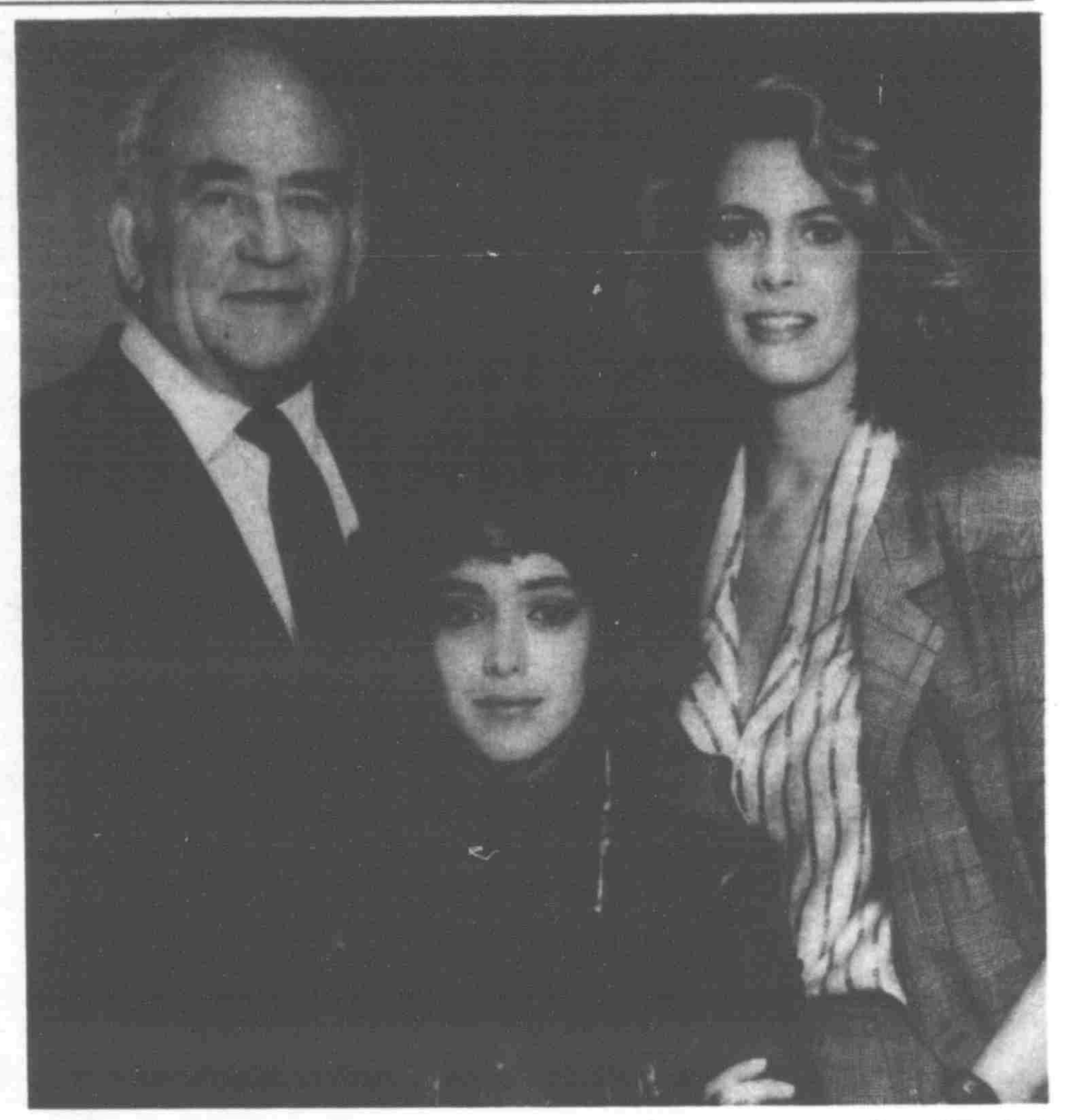

### Ed Asner is back in 'The Bronx Zoo'

Ed Asner is used to controversy. After his stint on "The Mary Tyler Moore Show" as the gruff Lou Grant, he parlayed that role into the acclaimed series of the same name. When the show was canceled in 1982, it was shrouded in a haze of political intrigue and allegations. Asner, then president of the Screen Actors Guild, had spoken out on issues such as apartheid and aid to El Salvador, and it was alleged he had become too hot for CBS to handle. It's still unclear whether CBS bowed to pressure from conservative groups, or simply canceled the show because the ratings were down, as they claimed. Now, as a high-school principal on NBC's "The Bronx Zoo," Asner is feeling the heat again. Last spring, when "The Bronx Zoo" debuted, objections were raised over the title of the show. Critics thought it was offensive to the community and the Bronx school system.

"In the beginning, I had doubts about the name," Asner admits. "But that was prompted by the paranoia of the people who lived in the Bronx. Once we reassured them that we didn't mean any harm, everything was OK. Anything after that was just publicity." Asner says he doesn't regret any of the political

stands he took. "I just have to be more careful now," he claims. "There are people waiting out there to red-bait me, but I'm not going to stop supporting causes I believe in. I made a lot of mistakes, but I learned from them." The best way to raise support for various causes, Asner believes, is through attracting media attention. "It's good to give money, but it's also important for me to act as a conduit and get infor-

mation in the press. But the most important thing," he says, "is to be well-informed about whatever it is I'm talking about, so I don't make a fool out of myself." Asner has more time to give to causes these days. "Working on 'The Bronx Zoo' is much easier than 'Lou Grant,'" he says. "I felt like I was carrying a ton of bricks when I was doing that. It was really an insurmountable load - to take a comedy char-

acter and turn him into the lead character of a primarily dramatic show. There was a lot of angst the whole time." With an ensemble show, Asner feels he can relax. "It's a great cast," he says. "And there are opportunities to talk about important issues, like teenage birth control." But that doesn't mean that he is steering clear of controversy. "Oh, no," he says. "It keeps them from getting boring."

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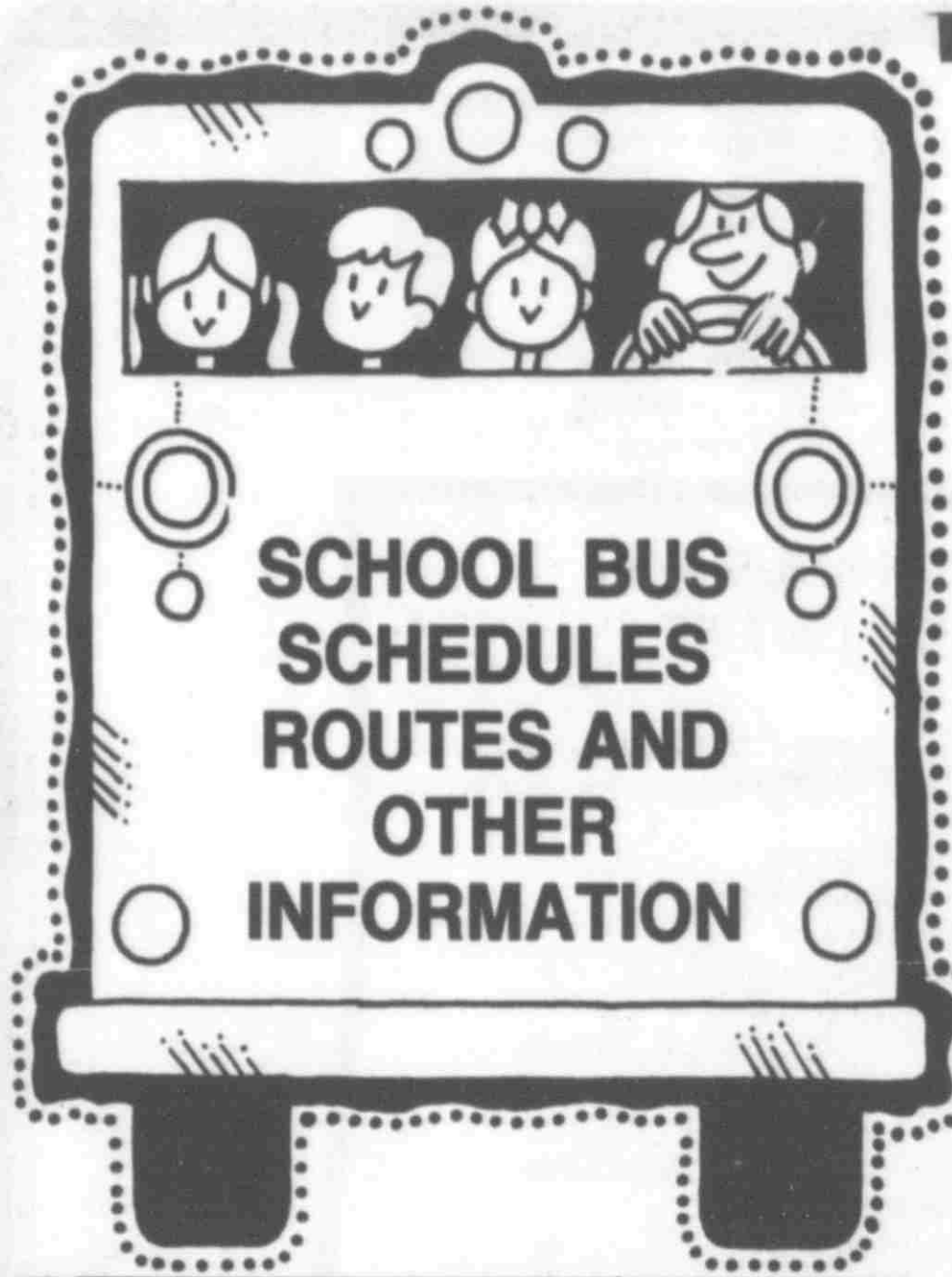
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## Bus Rider Rules & Regulations

To the parents of children riding school buses: The rules and regulations listed below are the result of careful study based upon the experiences we have had in the operation of a school bus system. Cooperation and courtesy in following these suggestions will permit us to better serve your child. Please go over the rules with your children so they will know what is expected of them when they ride the bus.

The Uniform Code of Discipline and Students Rights and Responsibilities for the Lowell Area Schools will be followed in all discipline reports.

1. Be on time at designated bus stops. BUSES CANNOT WAIT FOR TARDY PUPILS.
2. Obey the driver's suggestions cheerfully. Help the driver to assure safety at all times.
3. Expect to walk some distance to a bus stop when required to.
4. Stay off roadway while waiting for bus. Form a line to get on the bus.
5. Cross in FRONT of bus when crossing the road. NOT IN BACK OF BUS.
6. Remain seated while bus is in motion. Wait until bus has come to a complete stop before attempting to enter or leave the bus. Enter or leave the bus only at the front door, except in case of emergency.
7. Do not leave the bus without the driver's consent, except at home or school. No unauthorized stops will be made.
8. Occupy any seat assigned by the driver. Keep feet

9. Sit three in a seat by filling back seats first when conditions require it.
10. Musical instruments must be held by owner. Do not leave in aisles.
11. Keep head, arms, and hands inside the bus.
12. Observe classroom conduct. Avoid unnecessary disturbing noises. The driver should not be distracted while bus is in motion. Do not shout at passing persons or vehicles.
13. Be courteous. Use no profane or vulgar language.
14. Help keep the bus clean. No eating, No pop, and No Smoking on the Bus.
15. Inform driver when absence is expected from school.
16. FIGHTING, PUSHING, SHOVING, or other rowdiness will not be tolerated.
17. Report any damage you observe to driver. Damage to interior or exterior of the bus will result in payment for damages and in suspended bus privileges.
18. Remember, school bus transportation is a privilege not a right!
19. There will be no extra riders on busses unless there is an emergency. If there is an emergency, permission must be given by the bus garage.
20. The principal may suspend students from riding the bus when such action is advisable.

- 1. A student may be discharged at other regular stops on his regular bus route if the student presents a written request to the building principal prior to when the exception occurs. The student is then responsible to have the principal or his designee countersign the request with approval from the transportation office.
- 2. Parents may request in writing that their children be transported to a baby-sitter provided the pick-up and discharge is at the same regular bus stop in the assigned attendance area every day.
- 3. Students being transported out of the district to regular programs or special activities are discharged at the site of the program or activity and then shall ride the bus back to the original pick-up site unless parental request is made in writing to the principal prior to the activity.

# Lowell Area Schools Food Service Program

The School Food Service personnel are busy getting ready to start another school year. We will serve lunches the first day of school on Tuesday, September 1, 1987. At this time we will not raise the price of lunches and milk. We hope we can maintain the same prices for the entire school year. It depends on Federal reimbursement, food and labor costs. The prices are: Alto, Bushnell and Runciman/Riverside Schools 85¢, Middle and Sr. High Schools 90¢. These prices include milk. Adult lunches will be \$1.50 in all schools. Milk alone, for both students and adults, will be 25¢.

We again invite the students from St. Mary's School to join us for lunch in the Bushnell School Cafeteria. Students may purchase lunch tickets every morning before school at Alto, Bushnell and Middle School and in their rooms at the Runciman School. St. Mary's and Sr. High students may pay when they go through the lunch lines. Students may, if they wish, bring their money for the whole week on Monday morning in all the schools. This is not mandatory but we will provide this service for the parents if they wish to take advantage of it.

Free and reduced price lunches are available upon proper application to families who qualify for the program. Free milk is not available in grades 1-12 as there is no federal reimbursement for it. A letter to the parents and an application is included in this publication. Because of strict federal regulations the application is more detailed and must be made out in full before students may receive free or reduced priced lunches. Applications will also be available in all school offices. Parents who think they may be eligible must have their application in by Thursday, August 20, 1987, to be eligible for the first day of school lunches on Tuesday, September 1, 1987.

The cooks of the Lowell Area Schools will still offer good, nutritious meals with many choices every day. The students may choose all five components of the meal (protein, bread, vegetables, fruit and milk) or as few as three of the items and we will still be able to count it for federal reimbursement. We have found this eliminates plate waste. If cost allows, we will continue to bake our own bread, dinner rolls, cookies, casseroles, etc. "from scratch." We offer fresh fruits every day and fresh vegetables at least three times a week. We will offer a minimum of two entrees and a chef's salad, with a choice of cheese or meat, every day in the Middle and Sr. High Schools. In the Sr. High School, students may, if they wish, pick out individually priced items from our a la carte line. This, of course, costs more than the unit priced school lunch which includes milk. We sell ice cream, milk, orange drink and fresh fruits at our snack bar which will be open in the morning and after school. In addition, at noon we sell hot sandwiches, pizzas and chef's salads.

We do not sell carbonated drinks, candy, gum or potato chips in our schools. It is because of the sincere dedication of our 24 cooks and van drivers that we are able to serve good nutritious food, at the low prices, to our Lowell Area School students.

The Lowell Area Schools serves nutritious meals every school day. Students may buy lunch for 85¢ in the Alto, Bushnell and Runciman/Riverside Schools and 90¢ in the Middle and High Schools. Milk is included in the price of lunch. For those who wish to buy just milk, it will cost 25¢.

Children from families whose income falls within the levels shown on the scale below are eligible for either free meals or reduced-price meals at 40¢.

**FOOD STAMP/AFDC HOUSEHOLDS:** If you currently receive Food Stamps or "Aid to Families with Dependent Children" for your child, you only have to list your child's name and food stamp or AFDC case number, print your name, and sign the application. Since you have already given income information to the welfare office, the school can confirm your eligibility.

**ALL OTHER HOUSEHOLDS:** To apply for free or reduced-price meals, please fill out the attached application as soon as possible, sign it and return it to the school. Please answer all questions on the form. An application which does not contain the following information cannot be processed by the school.

- (1) the total household income AND the amount and source of income received by each household member (such as wages, child support, etc.) Multiply weekly income by 4.33 to get monthly income.
- (2) names of all household members;
- (3) social security numbers of all household members 21 years of age or older or the word "NONE" for any adult household member who does not have a social security number; and
- (4) the signature of an adult household member.

**VERIFICATION:** The information on the applications may be verified by the school or other officials at any time during the year. **REPORTING CHANGES:** If your child is approved for meal benefits, you must tell the school when your household income increases by more than \$50 per month (\$600 per year) or when your household size or income decreases.

**RE-APPLICATION:** You may apply for benefits at any time during the school year. If you are not now eligible but have a decrease in household income, become unemployed or have an increase in household size, fill out an application at that time.

**FOSTER CHILDREN:** If you have foster children living with you, they may be eligible for these benefits regardless of your household's income. If you wish to apply for these benefits for them, please contact the school and they will help you complete the application.

**NONDISCRIMINATION:** Children who receive free or reduced-price meal benefits are treated the same as children who pay for their meals. In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, color, national origin, age, sex or handicap. If you believe you have been discriminated against, write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.

**FAIR HEARING:** If you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the result of verification, you may wish to discuss it with the school. You also have the right to a fair hearing. This can be done by calling or writing the following official:

If you wish to be eligible the first day of school lunches, September 1, 1987, the application must be in my office by Thursday, August 20, 1987.

### CHILD CARE PROPOSED BY YMCA

The Lowell YMCA is in the process of obtaining a license for child care services for a before and after school center.

Y-Director Jim Hodges reports that this pilot program would be to initially serve children at Bushnell Elementary School in grades 1 thru 5. Alto and Runciman schools could be added in the future when suitable locations and qualified supervisors can be hired. 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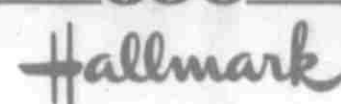


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
