Ground is broken for new treatment plant

Well, it's officially underway. The \$6.2 million sewage treatment plant for the city of Lowell and parts of Lowell Township is now under construction near the old waste water treatment plant. A group of dignitaries from the city, township, D.N.R., the city

attorney's office and city engineers were on hand Tuesday morning for an official groundbreaking ceremony.

The new treatment plant is scheduled to go into service about a year from now. The city has been under orders from the

E.P.A. and D.N.R. to upgrade the quality of the effluent entering the Flat River for some time. The beginning of construction on the new plant is the culmination of many years of studies, grant applications and working up priority lists. A court case filed against the city by the E.P.A. for violation of deadlines to put a new plant on line is still pending.

The dignitaries had lunch at Deer Run Golf Club following the ground breaking. Former Lowell City Manager Ray Quada served as master of ceremonies. Other speakers included Carl Huber from the city's engineering firm Fishbeck, Thompson, Huber and Carr, Dick Wendt from the city attorney firm of Clary, Nance, Wood, Hoffius, Rankin and Cooper, Ron Woods from The Department of Natural Resources, Lowell Township Supervisor Harry Yeiter, Lowell Mayor James Maatman and Lowell City Manager David M. Pasquale. The city attorneys' firm organized the ceremony and paid for the luncheon.

Planners OK five separate issues

The Lowell Planning Commission gave the green light to five requests from various businesses Monday evening. The planners first approved a special use request from George Converse, owner of G&E Auto Repair. Converse asked to be allowed to move the body shop portion of his business to the rear of the large building at 508 W. Main. The building is owned by Jim McFall, and Blue Crocodile Ceramics operates out of the front of the building. The building is in a C-2 zone (commercial general business), and a body shop does not qualify.

However, the planners made the exception when Converse guaranteed that all work and storage would be confined to the inside of the building, and that no cars or parts would be kept outside. Converse currently operates both a body shop and mechanical repair business at 834 W. Main. That location is too small for his needs, and many cars are stored outside. Converse explained that splitting the business between two locations would improve the appearance of his operation, which he admitted is somewhat of an eyesore. The planners agreed, and granted the special use request.

The Lowell City Council approved a site plan for an addition to the Lowell Plaza mall at 505 W. Main during their regular meeting held September 21. At that meeting, several neighbors on Chatham St. complained about the lack of adequate screening along the north wall of the proposed building. These residents attended the site plan review Monday night, and again voiced their concerns. Art, Phil and Lyle Johnson, developers of the mall, said they had trimmed an existing hedge, and expected that to fill in nicely as a screen. Jeff Barber, a neighbor, protested

that the hedge wouldn't be adequate, and argued that an earthen berm with a row of plantings on top would be a better alternative.

The issue was bantered back and forth for about forty-five minutes before a compromise was reached. The Johnson brothers agreed to extend the hedge for the full length of the north wall, plant three seven foot blue spruce trees behind it and keep the hedge trimmed.

A site plan for Sam's Factory Outlet Automotive at 2400 W. Main was approved by the planners. Sam Lombardo, the owner of the facility, plans to build a large retail and repair building on the site. The plan had come before the commission at their last meeting and several amendments were requested by the planners. The changes made include a 25 foot green belt along Main St. right of way, a row of trees planted along the rear property line, rear yard paving, remove a row of parking along Main St. and increase parking to 55 spaces to meet ordinance requirements.

A site plan was submitted for approval by Henry VanderVennen, owner of Vennen Chrysler, Dodge and Plymouth, Inc. VanderVennen owns the home at 930 W. Main St. and two parcels to the south. The lot the home sits on is already zoned commercial, and VanderVennen requested rezoning of the other two lots from residential to commercial. His plans call for the demolition of the home, and the construction of a parking lot over the entire three parcels. VanderVennen explained that the lot would be used for his used car department, and that someday he may construct a used car office and clean-up facility on the site.

The planners discussed many details of the site plan, but ap-

proved it pretty much as drawn. The re-zoning issue will be passed along the City Council for approval.

Wayne Lemmen presented two site plans for approval by the planners. Both plans concern the development of the Shell gas station at the corner of Hudson and Main. In either plan, Lemmen intends to raze the existing structure, and construct a new Shell service station and convenience store. Initially his plans also called for a pull-through car wash, but that idea has been dropped for now.

In one plan the building would be constructed in the center of the property with canopies and gas pumps on both the east and

west sides. In the other plan, the building would be constructed to the rear of the property, about where the existing building sits. In this plan the gas pumps and canopy are in front of the building.

The planners approved both site plans.

Mike Tummino was present to represent the Lowell First Congregational Church. Tummino explained that the church has purchased two parcels to the west of their building. The parishioners want to raze the buildings on those parcels and construct a parking lot. A public hearing regarding the issue was slated for the Planning Commission meeting.

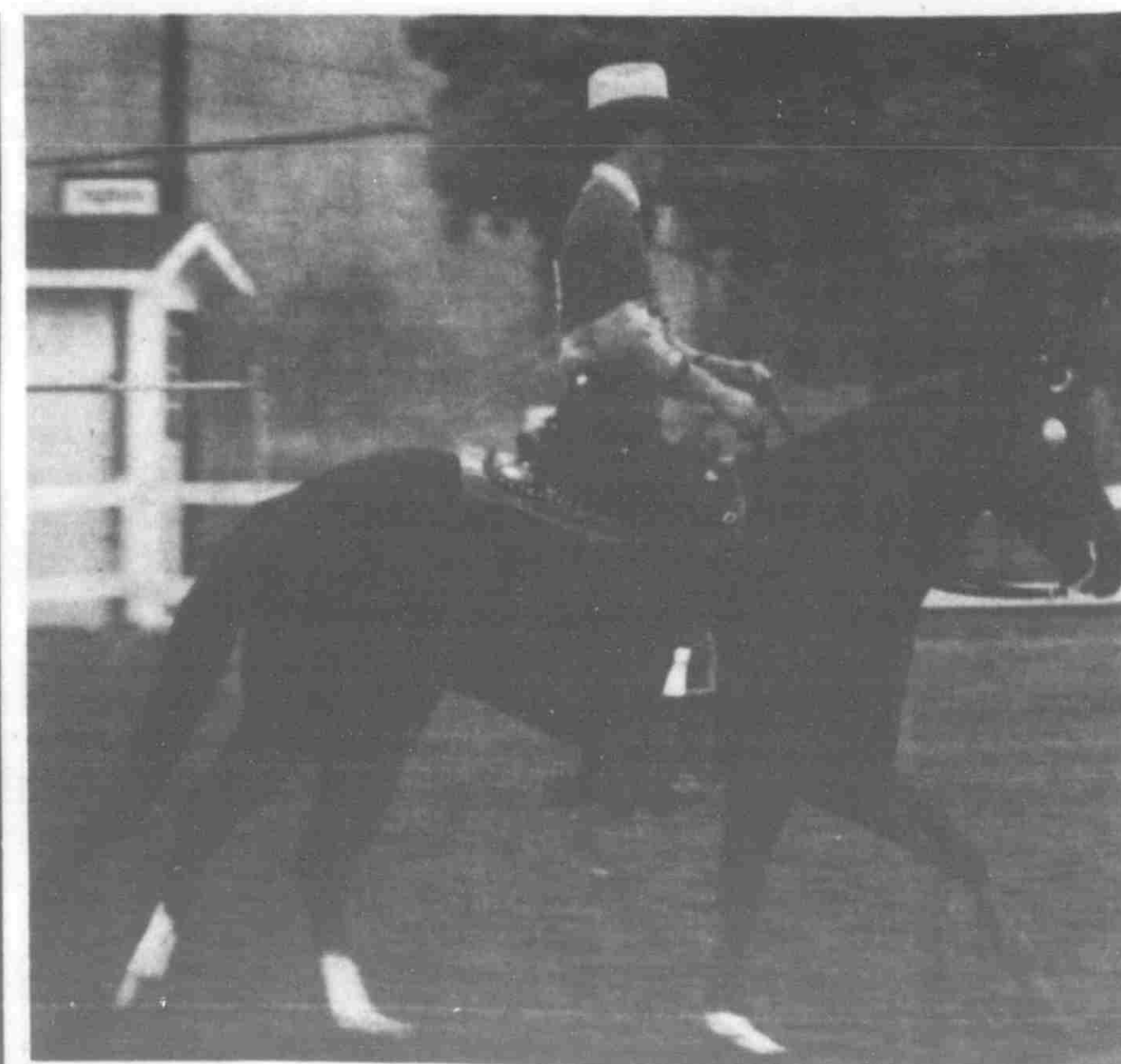

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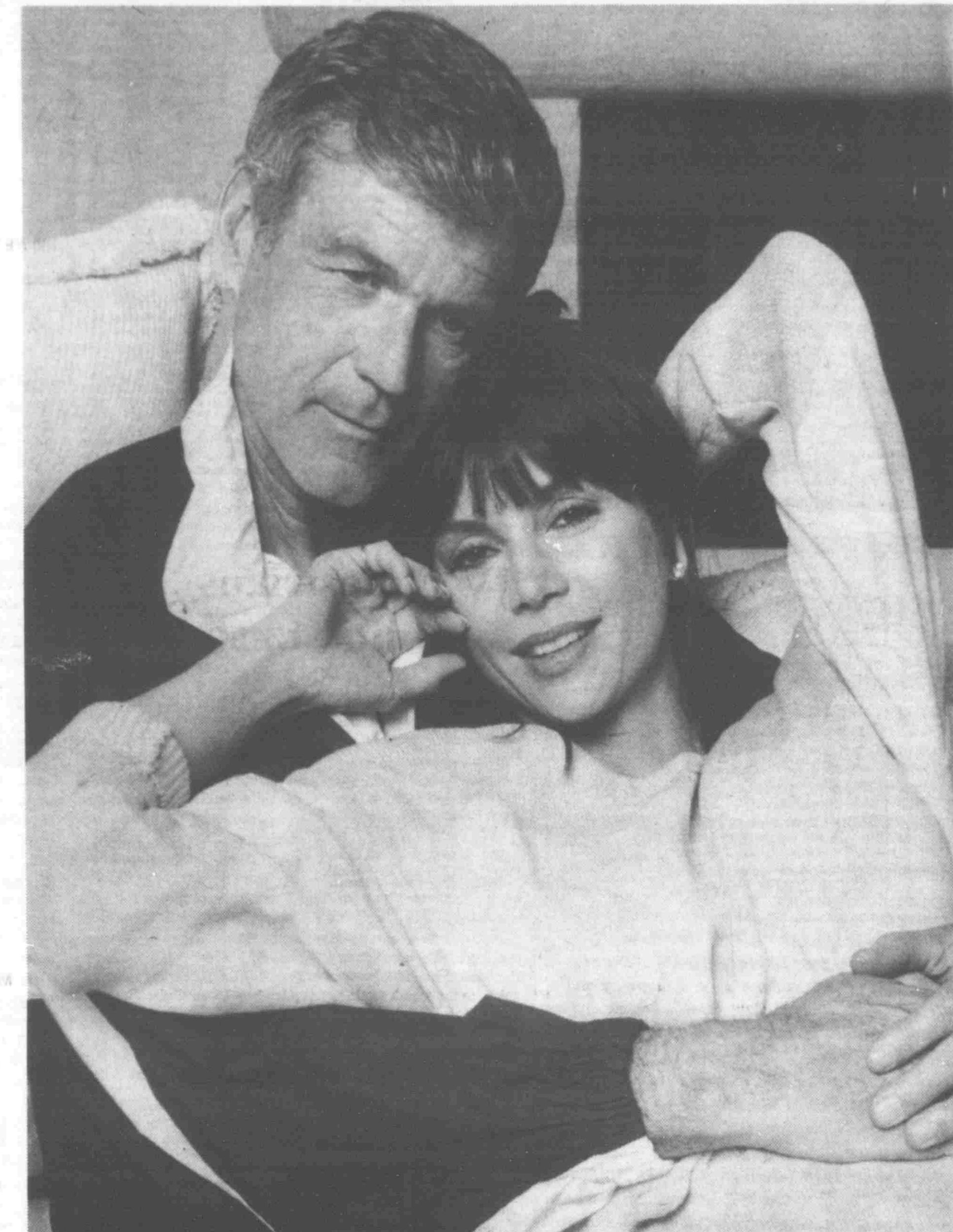

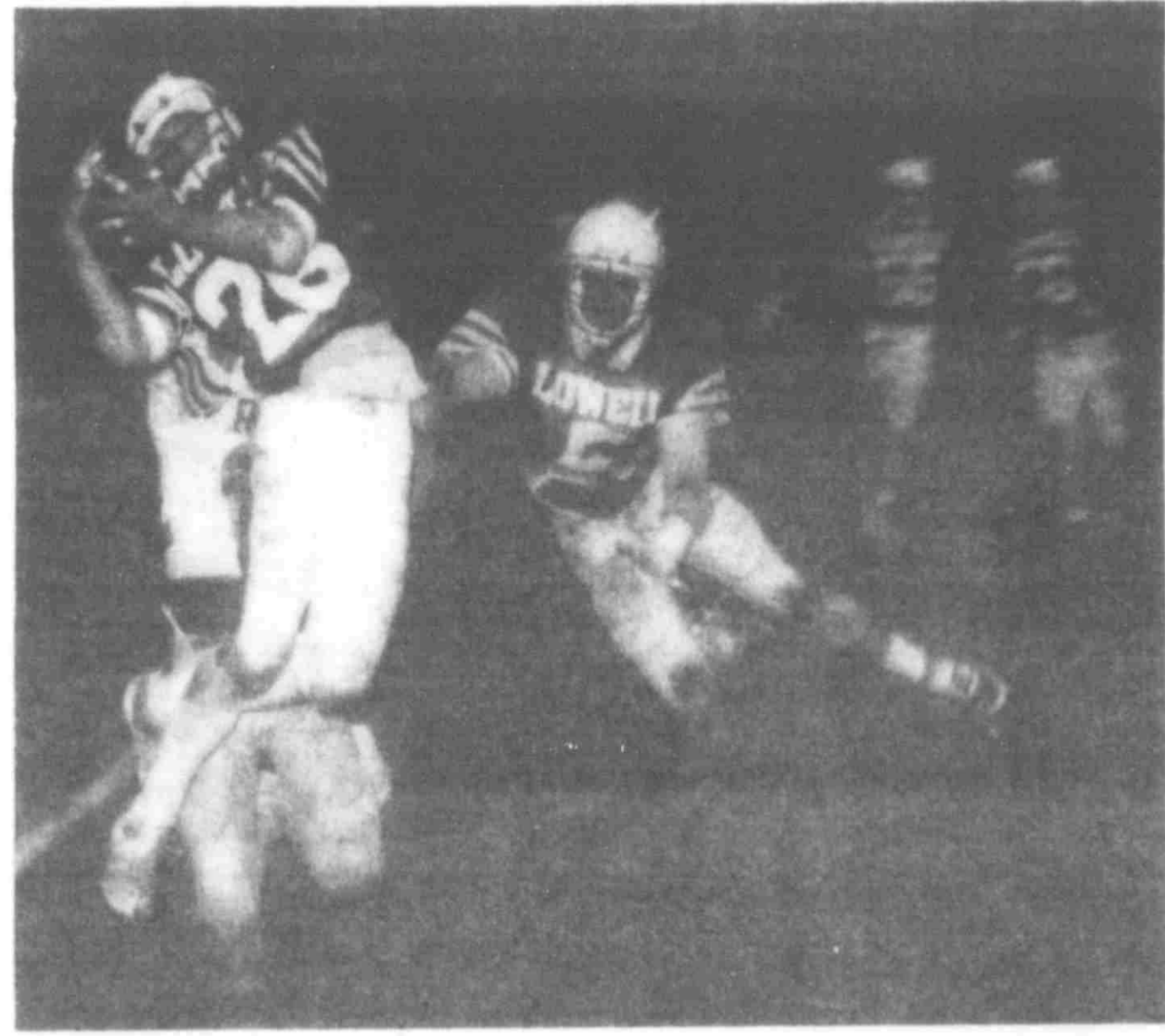

Freshman team bests Greenville 14-0

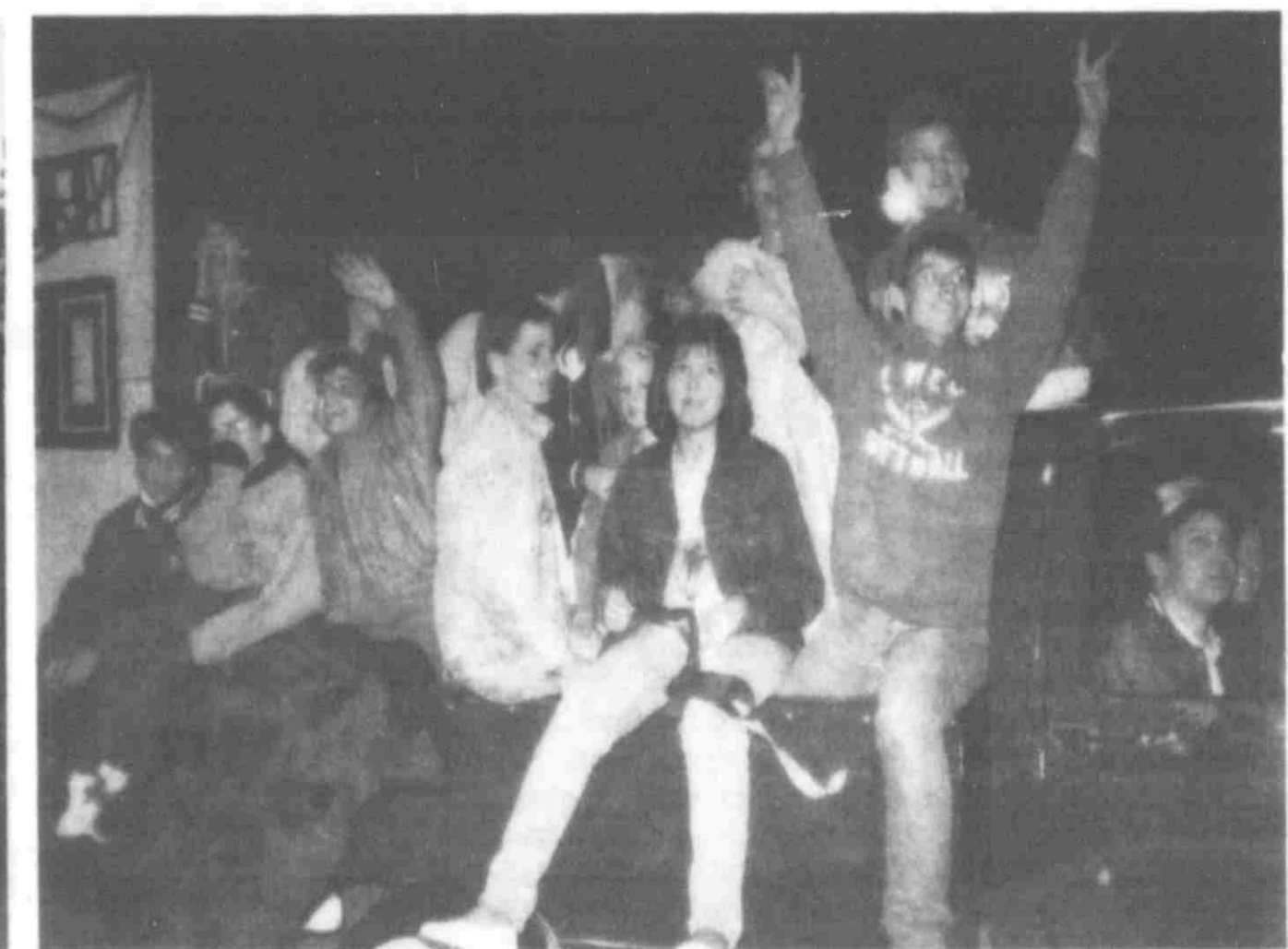

The adoption of the following ordinance was moved by Councilmember Thompson, seconded by Councilmember Doyle.

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND CHAPTER 12 ARTICLE I SECTIONS 12-1 THROUGH 12-4 OF AND TO ADD SECTIONS 12-30 TO 12-41 TO THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF LOWELL

THE CITY OF LOWELL ORDAINS:

SECTION 1. THAT SECTIONS 12-1, 12-2, 12-3, and 12-4 OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF LOWELL ARE HEREBY AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS:

SEC. 12-1. DEFINITIONS.

As used in this chapter, the following words and phrases shall have the meanings indicated:

(a) "Peddler" means any person, traveling by foot, wagon, automotive vehicle or any other type of conveyance, from place to place, from house to house, from street to street, carrying, conveying or transporting goods, wares, tickets, merchandise, means, fish, vegetables, fruits, garden truck, farm products or provisions, offering the same for retail sale, or making sales and delivering articles to purchasers, and anyone who solicits orders and as a separate transaction makes deliveries to purchasers. The word "peddler" shall include the words "hawker" and "huckster."

(b) "Transient merchant" means any person engaged temporarily in the retail sale of goods, wares, merchandise, in any place in the City and who, for the purpose of conducting such business, occupies or uses any lot, building, room or structure of any kind, including "itinerant merchants," "itinerant vendors" and persons engaged in selling goods, wares or merchandise at retail in the City and who are not on the property tax rolls of the City; and any person who commences a business of selling goods, wares and merchandise at retail in the City after the first day of January in any year and who is not assessed in connection with said business on the property tax roll of the City for that year and who conducts said business for a period of less than one hundred eighty (180) days.

SEC. 12-2. ENFORCEMENT OF CHAPTER PROVISIONS

It shall be the duty of any officer of the City to require any peddler or transient merchant, who is not known by such officer to be duly licensed as provided in Articles II or III hereof, to produce his license and to enforce the provisions of this Chapter against any person found to be violating the same.

SEC. 12-3. LOUD NOISES AND SPEAKING DEVICES

No peddler or transient merchant, nor any person in his behalf, shall shout, make any cryout, blow a horn, ring a bell, or use any sound device, including any loud speaking radio or sound amplifying system upon any of the streets, alleys, parks or other public places of the City or upon any private premises in the City where sound of sufficient volume is emitted or produced therefrom to be capable of being plainly heard upon the streets, avenues, alleys, parks, or other public places, for the purpose of attracting attention to any goods, wares or merchandise which such licensee proposes to sell.

SEC. 12-4. USE OF STREETS

No peddler or transient merchant shall have any exclusive right to any location in the public streets, nor shall he be permitted to operate in any congested area where his operations might impede or inconvenience the public.

SECTION 2. THAT THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF LOWELL IS HEREBY AMENDED BY ADDING SECTIONS 12-30 THROUGH 12-41 AS ARTICLE III TO CHAPTER 12, WHICH SECTIONS SHALL READ AS FOLLOWS:

ARTICLE III TRANSIENT MERCHANTS

SEC. 12-30. LICENSE REQUIRED.

It shall be unlawful for any person to engage in business as a transient merchant in the City without first having obtained a license from the City Clerk as provided in this Article. No license shall be granted except upon approval of the Chief of Police.

SEC. 12-31. STATE OR COUNTY LICENSE, NOT EXEMPTION.

The fact that a license or permit has been granted to any person by the state or county to engage in the operation, conduct, maintenance or management of any business or premises shall not exempt such person from the requirement to obtain a license from the City pursuant to this Article.

SEC. 12-32. APPLICATION FOR LICENSE; OATH, CONTENTS.

Each person required to procure a license from the City shall file an application with the City Clerk in the form and manner prescribed by the City Clerk and shall state under oath such facts as may be required for, or applicable to, the granting of such license, including the following:

(a) The full names, business addresses and residence addresses of all owners, proprietors, officers, managers and local employees of the applicant's business; the names and addresses of each officer, if the applicant is a corporation.

(b) The place or places in the City where it is proposed to maintain the applicant's business, and the length of time during which it is proposed that such business be conducted.

(c) The nature, character and quality of the goods, wares, merchandise or services to be sold or offered for sale by the applicant in the City.

(d) The nature and kind of business which the applicant proposes to conduct and the manner of operating same.

(e) A list of all assumed, trade or firm names under which the applicant intends to do business.

(f) The nature and character of any signs or advertising done or proposed to be done in order to attract customers.

(g) Whether or not the applicant or person conducting or managing the applicant's business has been convicted of a crime, misdemeanor or the violation of any municipal ordinance, and if so, full particulars in connection therewith.

(h) The length of time the applicant is proposing to do business.

(i) If the applicant does not own the property from which the applicant will conduct business, the applicant shall also submit a written and signed lease or statement by the property owner giving the applicant permission to use the property.

(j) A copy of the applicant's state sales tax license.

SEC. 12-33. EXPIRATION DATE, EXCEPTION.

The license shall terminate on the 180th day next after the issuance of such license and the expiration date shall be indicated on the face of the license. A license may not be renewed and a new license may not be granted within 180 days of the expiration of a license.

SEC. 12-34. STATE AND COUNTY LICENSE OR PERMIT PREREQUISITE TO ISSUANCE OF CITY LICENSE

No license or permit required by this Article shall be issued to any person who is required to have a license or permit from the state or county until such person shall submit evidence of such state or county license or permit and proof that all fees appertaining thereto have been paid.

SEC. 12-35. COMPLIANCE WITH CODE REQUIRED.

No license shall be granted to any applicant until the applicant has complied with all of the provisions of this Chapter and Code pertaining to the business for which application for the license is made, nor shall any license be granted where the approval of any officer of the City is required prior to the issuance thereof until such approval is made.

SEC. 12-36. PAYMENT OF FEES.

No license shall be issued until the fees in amounts established from time to time by resolution of the City Council shall be paid by the applicant to the City Clerk. No license shall be required from any person exempt from payment of the fee by state or federal law. Such persons shall comply with all other provisions of this Article. The City Clerk shall, in all such cases, issue to such persons licenses which are clearly marked as to said exemption and the reasons therefor.

SEC. 12-37. REFUSAL TO ISSUE LICENSE; SUSPENSION, REVOCATION.

(a) Licenses requested under this Article may be refused by the City Clerk or City Manager and licenses issued may be revoked by the City Clerk or City Manager at any time, for any of the following causes:

(1) Fraud, misrepresentation or false statement contained in the application for license.

(2) Fraud, misrepresentation or false statement made in the operation of a business.

(3) Any violation of this Chapter or any other provisions of the Code.

(4) Conducting a business in an unlawful manner or in such manner as to constitute a breach of the peace or to constitute a menace to the health, safety or welfare of the public.

(5) The failure or inability of an applicant to meet and satisfy the requirements and provisions of this Chapter and any other provisions of the Code.

(b) Written notice of suspension or revocation stating the cause or causes therefor shall be delivered to the licensee personally or mailed to his address as stated in his application for license.

(c) Any person whose license is revoked or suspended or any person whose request for a license is refused shall have the right to an informal hearing before the City Manager provided a written request therefor is filed with the City Clerk within ten days following the delivery or mailing of notice of revocation or suspension or within ten days following such refusal. The informal hearing shall be held within twenty-one days of the filing of the request therefor.

(d) A person aggrieved by the action of the City Manager may appeal to the City Council by filing a written request with the City Clerk within ten days of the delivery or mailing of the City Manager's action. The City Council shall consider the appeal at the next regular meeting of the City Council. The City Council may reverse any refusal to issue a license or any revocation or suspension of a license, and the City Council may grant or reinstate any license. No person shall operate any business during any time when his license has been revoked or suspended.

(e) All decisions of the City Council shall be final.

SEC. 12-38. CARRYING LICENSE; DISPLAY; REQUIREMENTS.

A licensee shall carry the license issued pursuant to this Article at all times when engaged in the operation, conduct or maintenance of any business for which the license was granted; except that where such business is operated, conducted or maintained at a fixed place or establishment, said license shall be displayed at all times in some conspicuous place in his place of business; and he shall produce the same for examination when requested to do so by any City officer.

SEC. 12-39. LICENSES NONTRANSFERABLE.

No license or permit issued under the provisions of this Article shall be transferable.

SEC. 12-40. SITE REQUIREMENTS.

Transient merchants may utilize only sites located in commercial zoning districts and must comply with all setback, side yard and rear yard zoning requirements. The site must be suitably large and suitably located to avoid any traffic congestion or hazards to the public health, safety and welfare. Off street parking must be available if the site does not abut on street parking spaces. If traffic congestion or other safety hazards result from the conduct of the business, the City Manager may suspend or revoke a license until the traffic congestion or other safety hazard is eliminated.

SEC. 12-41. SIGNS.

Any other ordinance provisions notwithstanding, no transient merchant may use signs exceeding a total of 45 square feet of surface area including any sign on vehicles from which items are sold. Signs shall be suitably located and anchored to prevent any sight disruption, traffic disruption or other hazard and shall, at a minimum, comply with the set back and other locational requirements of the City's zoning ordinance.

SECTION 3: THIS ORDINANCE SHALL TAKE EFFECT TEN (10) DAYS AFTER ITS PUBLICATION IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE CITY CHARTER.

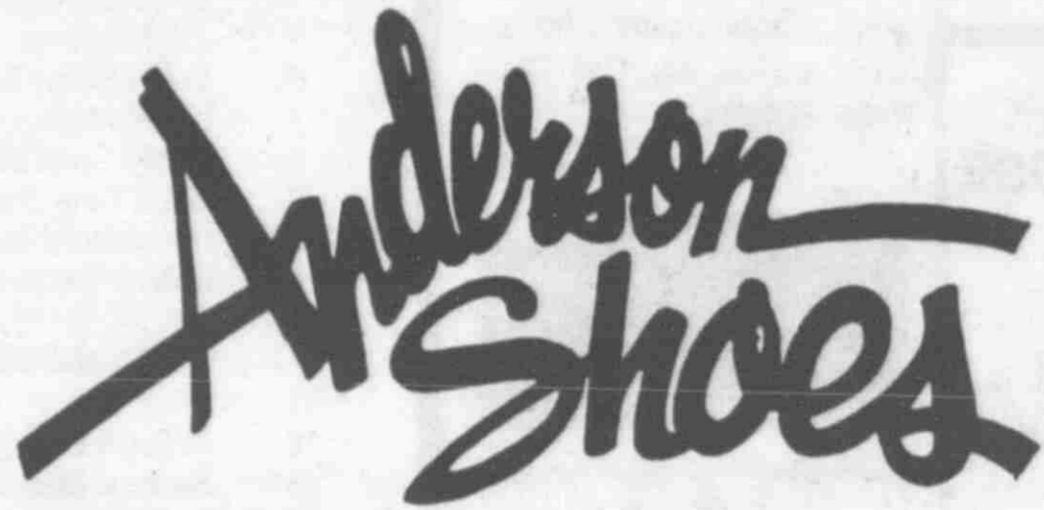
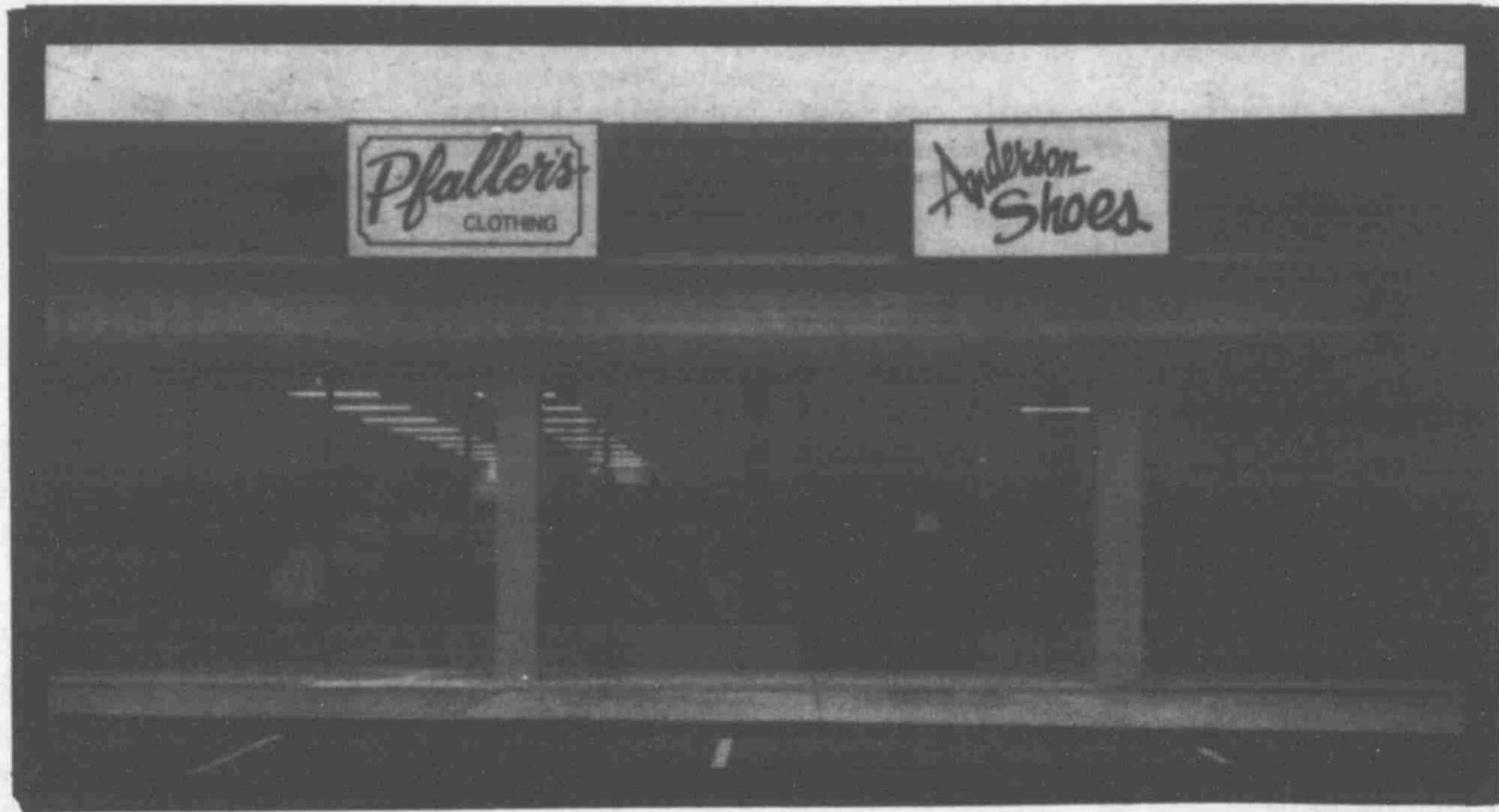
