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## Timpson on FMB Bank Board

## Nat'l. Guard chopper visits L.H.S.

The Michigan National Guard dropped in on Lowell Senior High School Tuesday morning. . . literally! Sergeant Rick Mis, a recruiter for the Michigan National Guard arranged for a UH-1 "Huey" helicopter to pay a visit to the school as a recruiting promotion. Mis is based in Ionia, but lives in Lowell.

The UH-1 has been a mainstay of the United States armed forces, especially the Army, for more than twenty years. Though the Hueys are rapidly being replaced by newer, more sophisticated helicopters in the Army, the UH-1 still serves an active role in National Guard aviation. Mis explained that Huey crews are trained in evacuation and medi-vac techniques that can be used during emergencies where the Guard's trucks are ineffective.

The Huey carried a crew of three. Mis, another recruiter and two National Guardsmen in combat fatigues. The group answered questions as curious throngs of students poured over the helicopter. The students were allowed to peer inside, and some even sat in the pilot's seat.

Jamie Cook, a junior at Lowell High School, has been selected to represent Lowell in Public Speaking at the 60th National FFA Convention in Kansas City, Missouri, during the week of November 9-14.

Cook and eight other students, including Stacy Beute, Mindy Kuyt, Chris Wieland, Jon Grieser, Joe Grieser, Ryan Brandt, and Matt Howard, (alternate Shawn Wenger) will join more than 22,000 FFA members, advisors, supporters, and guests who will be representing all fifty states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands at the world's largest annual student gathering.

All these students are members of the Lowell FFA Chapter. The chapter advisor is Mr. Pete Siler, who along with Mrs. Sue Beute, will accompany the FFA members to Kansas City. The 60th anniversary convention will feature keynote addresses from V.P. George Bush, Chrysler Corporation Chairman and Chief Executive Officer Lee Iacocca, Secretary of Education William Bennett and former Dallas Cowboys quarterback Roger Staubach. Along with these speakers, the students will have the opportunity to hear FFA's finest during public speaking contests, which will include Jamie Cook's state-winning speech entitled, "A Future for Agriculture."

The FFA was founded in Kansas City in 1928 at the Old Baltimore Hotel, located just a few blocks from the Municipal Auditorium where the convention currently takes place. Since then, the gathering has grown from fewer than fifty attendees to the world's largest annual youth gathering.

"The convention is an excellent opportunity to motivate members and train them for their futures in the ever-changing agricultural industry," said Kevin Eblen, national FFA president from Creston, Iowa.

"The convention will introduce the national FFA theme for 1987-88, 'FFA-Agriculture's New Spirit,' which emphasizes FFA's contribution to the agricultural industry."

"There's no doubt agriculture is facing some major challenges today," said Dr. Larry Case, national advisor. "But if you're looking for the future of this industry, it will be found at the national FFA convention. These young people represent the new generation of leadership that will carry American agriculture into the 21st century."

### Homespun Devotions

As many as I love, I rebuke and chasten... (Revelations 3:19)

My grandmother had a cartoon pasted in her cookbook. It was there when my mother was a little girl. Later, she told us children about it. When we visited Grandma, we asked to see the picture. We laughed at it just as Mom had done when she was a child.

The cartoon dated back to the time when trains were a novelty. It pictured two boys. One of them was down on all fours with his ear glued to the track, listening for the approaching of the train. When he heard the locomotive coming in the distance, he exclaimed excitedly to his companion, "She's a-comin' boys. She ain't very far away!"

But what the boy didn't know was that his mother was close

behind him with a rod in her up-raised hand, preparing to wallop him in the place nature intended for boys to be walloped when they need punishment and discipline.

Chastisement is for our good to teach us lessons we need to learn. We may not appreciate discipline, but our Heavenly Father is all-wise and knows what is best. He knows the dangers lurking near us. ## D.N.R. News

A record number of wild turkeys were taken in the 1987 Spring Turkey hunt according to the results of a survey taken by the Department of Natural Resources (DNR).

A post-season mail survey of hunters determined 3,260 turkeys were harvested, 38 percent more than were taken in 1986. Spring turkey hunting began in 1968.

A total of 16,696 licenses were issued, providing an estimated 58,114 hunter recreation days.

According to hunter comments, turkey hunting continues to provide the highest level of hunter satisfaction compared with all other forms of hunting. More than 77 percent of hunters enjoyed their hunt.

Weather conditions were excellent for 70 percent of the spring season, compared to an average 50 percent good to excellent days which is considered "normal".

A \$1,000 reward is being offered in an effort to locate those responsible for shooting twin nine-month-old bear cubs in Montmorency County.

The Department of Natural Resources (DNR) is offering the reward through its Report-All-Poaching (RAP) program, and DNR Law Enforcement Division officials say the money will be paid for information which results in the arrest and conviction of the person or persons who killed the cubs.

## Halloween safety tips

A bright light placed inside a carved pumpkin makes the face look eerily and sinister. After all, that's what makes Halloween so much fun, right?

Consumers Power Company says lighting in other areas can make it a safe Halloween, too. If residents turn their lights on, ghosts and goblins in search of tricks and treats can find their way more easily.

A well-lit home will help youngsters avoid obstacles like uneven sidewalks and driveways, low-hanging tree limbs, dark steps and passing vehicles.

Dusk is perhaps the most difficult time for drivers to see pedestrians. So it is helpful if the lights are on during that transition from daylight to dark. It is worth the extra few cents they might cost and makes it safer for children and adults who want to make Halloween an evening of fun and excitement.

In order to keep this a safe Halloween, Consumers Power suggests these guidelines for parents:

Limit trick or treating to the early evening; it's safest before dark.

Children should stay in their neighborhood and only stop at homes they know. Younger children should be accompanied by an adult.

In order to be more visible, costumes should be light-colored or have reflective tape. It also helps if the child carries a flashlight.

Costumes should be nonflammable. The eye-holes in masks should be large enough to easily see through.

Candy and other treats should be inspected by parents before being eaten. Drivers, be aware of youngsters out trick or treating; drive with care.

So keep your lights on, watch out, and have a safe and happy Halloween!

The cubs were discovered by DNR conservation officers near a bear baiting pile located north of Atlanta early this month.

"We are outraged by the sense-

less killing of these cubs," said Bruce Gustafson, supervisor of special investigations for the DNR. "We intend to pursue this investigation with every means at our disposal."

Bear cubs are protected in Michigan until they reach 18 months of age. Those responsible for killing the cubs face a fine of up to \$1,000, 90 days in

jail and loss of hunting privileges for three years.

Persons who were issued white back tag/kill tags when they purchased senior hunting or

sportsperson licenses last spring for the 1987-88 season are reminded those tags are not valid and may not be used while hunting.

The Department of Natural Resources (DNR) has now

mailed replacement back tag/kill tags to who could be reached. Any person who has not received a replacement tag should contact the DNR Lansing Office (517) 373-1204 or their local DNR District Office.

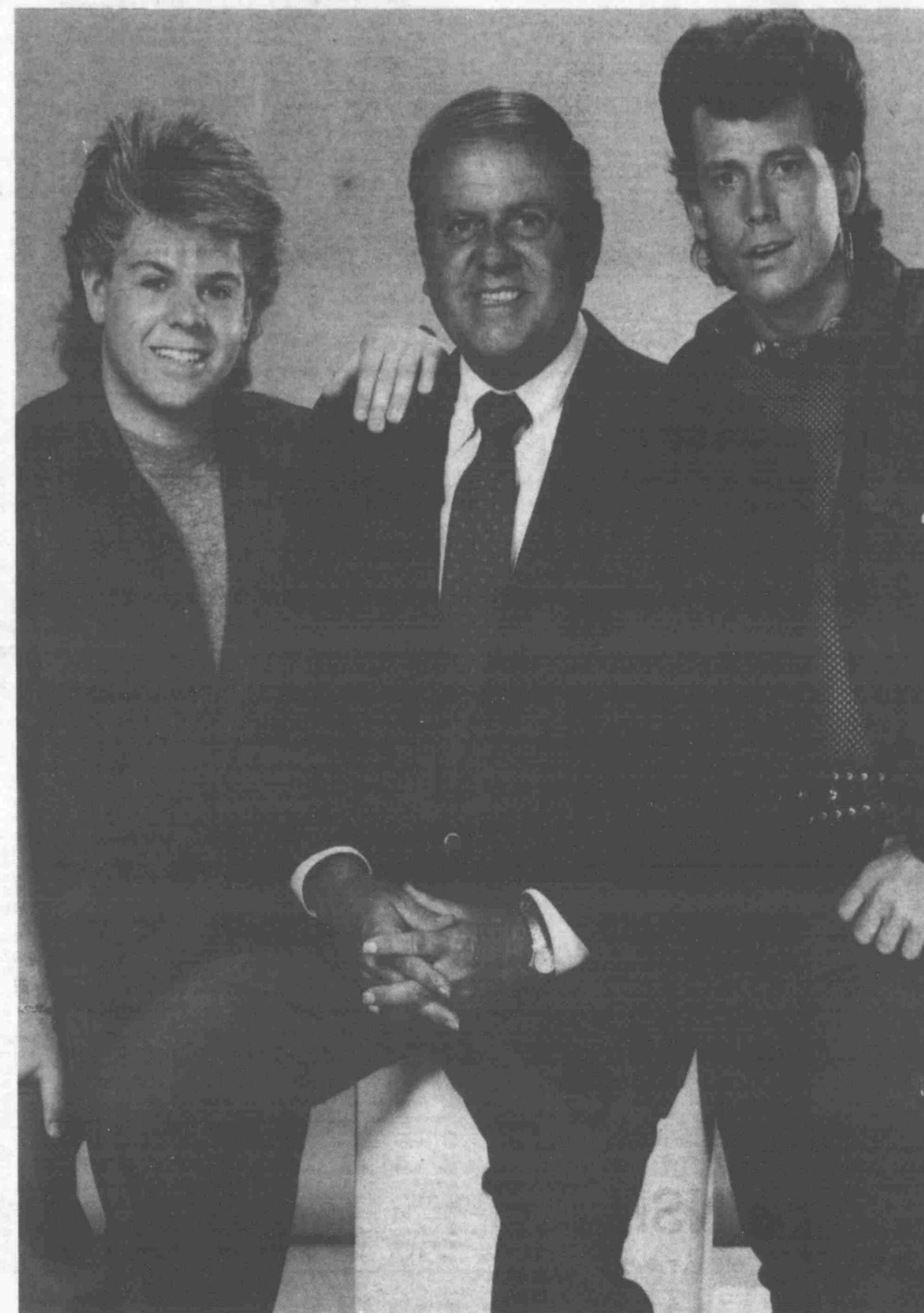

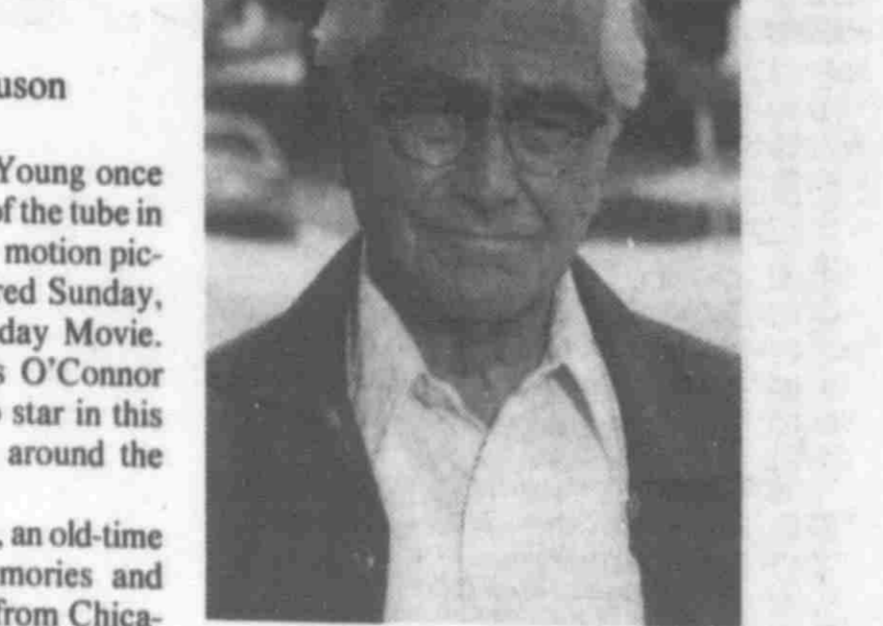

I called my dad last Thursday to tell him I had passed my flight exam for my private pilot's license. My exuberance apparently transcended the phone lines. A few minutes into the conversation he said, "Gee, you are more excited about this than when you graduated from high school". I responded to that with, "Hey, I put more effort into this than I ever did into high school". Getting my license was kind of like having a baby. It took just nine months. I've heard of people getting their private license in as little as seven weeks. All I can figure is, they must of had baby rabbits.

Actually, I got off to a pretty good start in January, and progressed at a pace that would have finished me with the course in about four months. I had set Memorial Day as my goal. About the first of May we kicked off the East Kent Shopper's Guide, and my flight instructor flew out the window. Luckily, I had completed ground school and passed my written examination by then. I found that I couldn't juggle three businesses, the print shop, Ledger and Shopper, and still find the time for flight training. I shelved my flying for about three months while we worked at getting the business oiled and running smoothly. I guess the point I'm trying to make, is that I'm not quite as dumb as my snail's pace through this course might indicate.

I have to hand it to my instructor for sticking with me. I didn't make it easy for him. One of the first things they teach in flight training is stall recognition and recovery. Contrary to what many people think, a stall in flying is not an engine failure. A stall occurs when wing is pitched at too steep an angle for the air to flow over it and create lift. When an airplane is placed into a stall, it literally begins to fall out of the sky. Needless to say, it's important to be able to recognize a stall in its early stages, and know how to recover. After all, you aren't allowed too many chances to fall out of the sky. One is usually the maximum. My first attempt at simulating a departure stall and recovering turned my instructor white. I'm not sure what color I turned. The proper recovery technique is to push the nose of the airplane down to gain air flow over the wings, then quickly, but gently, pull the yoke back and climb out of the stall. In my first try, I put the plane into a stall, jerked back on the yoke and kicked in left rudder. The plane rolled into a spin, and the instructor wrestled the controls away from me. Fortunately, we practice these maneuvers at about 3,000 feet rather than in an actual take off or departure situation.

My instructor stuck with me, even though there were other instances of student stupidity. One day he had me stop the plane at the end of the runway. He hopped out, and asked for my student license so that he could sign me off and send me solo. The only problem was, my license was in my file in the instructor's desk. I didn't know it at the time, but I had been busting FAA regulations by not carrying it with me.

Once during our pre-flight inspection, we forgot to untie the tail tie-down rope. It was one of those, "I thought you got it" deals. When I gave the plane some throttle to taxi, the nose came off the ground. The instructor jumped out and quickly untied the thing. As we taxied away, we both quietly hoped no one had seen that fiasco. There were other incidents, but the bottom line is I never crashed. I almost nailed a runway light once while practicing soft field take offs in a crosswind, but I was solo and a miss is as good as a mile if nobody sees you.

I've been taking a lot of ribbing from my friends and relatives over these past nine months. Some say they'll fly with me, others say no way, and still others say they won't even go outdoors if they know I'm flying. Well, a private license allows me to take passengers, so we'll see how many from that first group want to join the second group... or even the third group.

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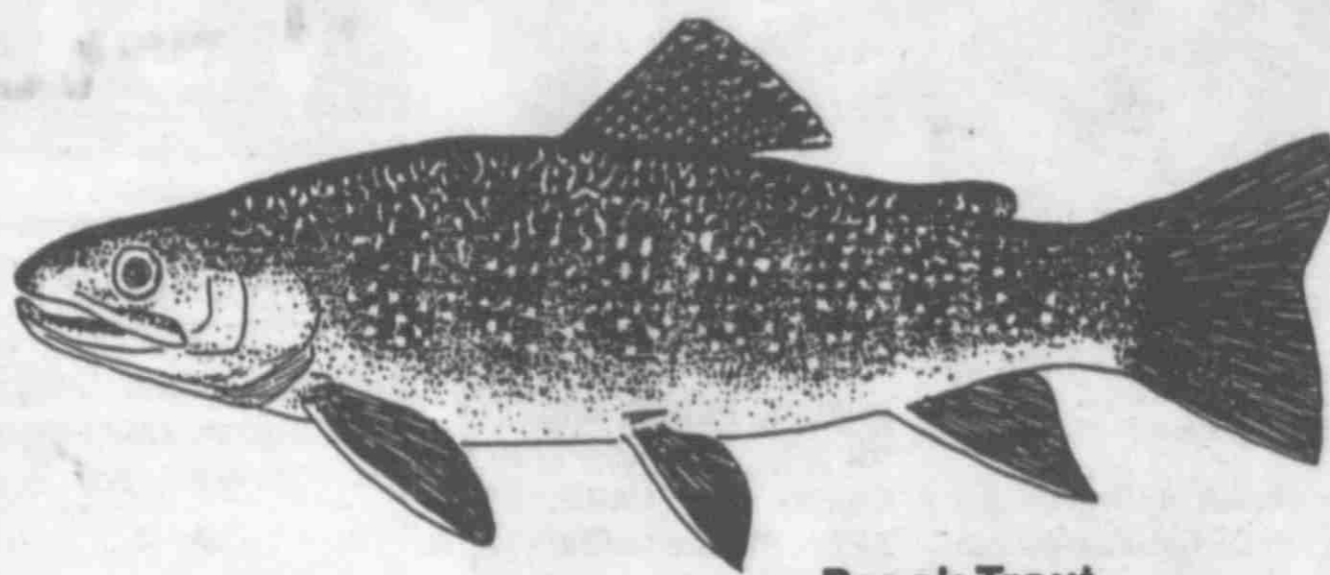
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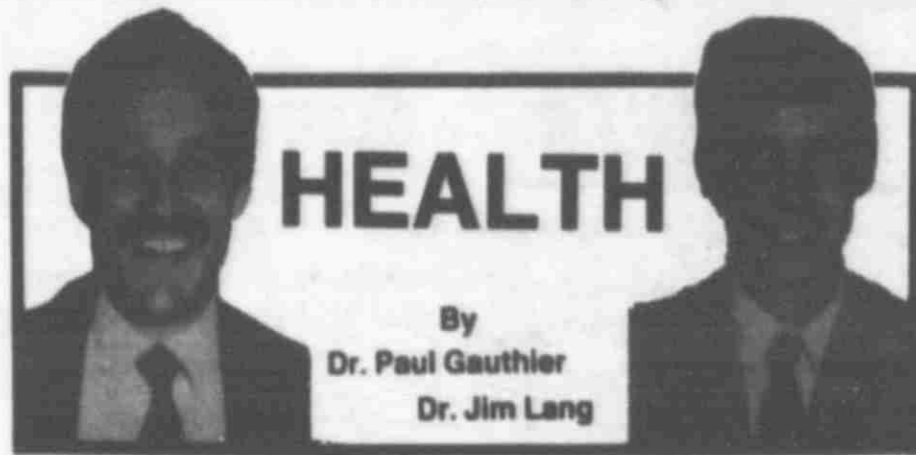

## THE "FLU" VACCINE

The new influenza vaccine is now available for the 1987-1988 flu season. In today's column we are going to review some of the latest recommendations regarding the "flu shot".

The vaccination is recommended for anyone with chronic lung, heart or kidney disease. It is also recommended for anyone over the age of 65 regardless of their health status. Every year, thousands are hospitalized with complications that can be attributed to the flu. Immunizations will decrease the likelihood of getting the flu or its complications because it leads to production of protective antibodies.

The vaccine is usually given in the upper arm after cleansing the skin with alcohol. You will experience a stinging sensation as the needle is injected. You may also notice local redness, some soreness, or swelling at the vaccination site for a day or two. Occasionally, you may experience a low grade fever, chills, muscle aches or fatigue for a few days. Allergic reactions to the immunizations are very rare, but anyone who has had a serious allergic reaction to eggs or egg products should probably not receive the immunization.

Large flu outbreaks usually begin in December and can last into early spring. Protection from the vaccine will last about 6 months and begin about 2 weeks after receiving the immunization. We usually administer flu immunizations in late September through November. As stated previously any individual with chronic disease should be vaccinated. Anyone that provides medical care or home care to chronically ill patients should also be immunized. All those over age 65 should probably be immunized. Actually, anyone who wishes to reduce their chance of acquiring the flu can get the vaccine although it is usually not given to pregnant women.

Annual vaccination is the single most important measure used to prevent widespread flu epidemics. In past years only about 20% of the high risk population has been immunized. Until we increase the number of high risk patients immunized, we will continue to experience serious complications from the flu.

Ehler's legislation, Senate Bill 333, wouldn't change our state fish - just clarify a specific variety of trout. The bill was approved today by the Senate Natural Resources and Environmental Affairs Committee.

"The trout currently is our state fish, but because there are so many varieties of trout it's important that we know which one we're talking about," said Ehlers, committee chairperson. "We specify that the state flower is the apple blossom and the state tree the white pine. I think it's time that we make the state fish a brook trout."

Ehlers said the brook trout is the logical choice since it is the only stream trout native to Michigan waters. Trout Unlimited, a statewide group comprised of several local chapters of trout fishing enthusiasts, originally brought the issue to Ehler's attention.

"Under current designations, it's difficult to promote our trout because the term could mean brook, rainbow, brown or even lake trout. My proposal is designed to clarify this matter once and for all, and would increase the visibility and promotional value of our state fish," he said.

Brook trout are said to be the easiest catch of Michigan's stream trout. They like deep holes, dark pockets under stream banks, secret little places behind logs or hiding under stumps and rock ledges. Anglers should gently drift their bait down into those areas, and keep changing their methods until successful.

"This bill isn't controversial; it has the support of the state Department of Natural Resources; and it won't cost local government or state taxpayers one cent," Ehlers concluded. "I urge the Legislature to approve SB 333 so it can become law, and so the brook trout can become our official state fish."
