## 10,000 gallon sewage spill discovered in Alto

Kent County Department of Public Works' officials said frost was responsible for pulling a pipe out of its joint, causing a sewage spill into Denny Hawk's cornfield at 64th and Bancroft Avenue.

The 10,000-gallon sewage spill which was reported on Wednesday, Feb. 17, took 4-6 hours to clean up Thursday, Feb. 18.

"The pipe separated at the mechanical joint causing the spill, which drained into a low

spot of Hawk's corn field," Kent County Department of Public Works' utility worker James Welmarink said.

He adds that no streams, lakes or water tables were affected by the spill. "It (10,000 gallons) sounds worse than it is. It is probably no worse than a farmer dumping manure on the ground."

Hawk is not quite as comfortable with that summation. "I just want an answer from somebody knowledgeable." He adds, "I called the DNR Emergency Spillage Service in Detroit and was told that something would be done."

Ernie Jousma, an Environmental Quality Analyst from the Department of Natural Resources adds, "Ordinarily if we can recover what's spilled we do, but from my understanding, this is not recoverable."

He continues, "The spill is well isolated from homes and there is no threat of exposure in terms of the ground water."

Keiser's requested the variance to expand the building up to 2,000 square feet, allowing for extensive renovation. Their eventual intent is to petition for rezoning the property to commercial.

Cahoon adds that being on the quieter end of town, their shouldn't be the in-and-out of traffic problems that occurred at the corner of Amity and W. Main.

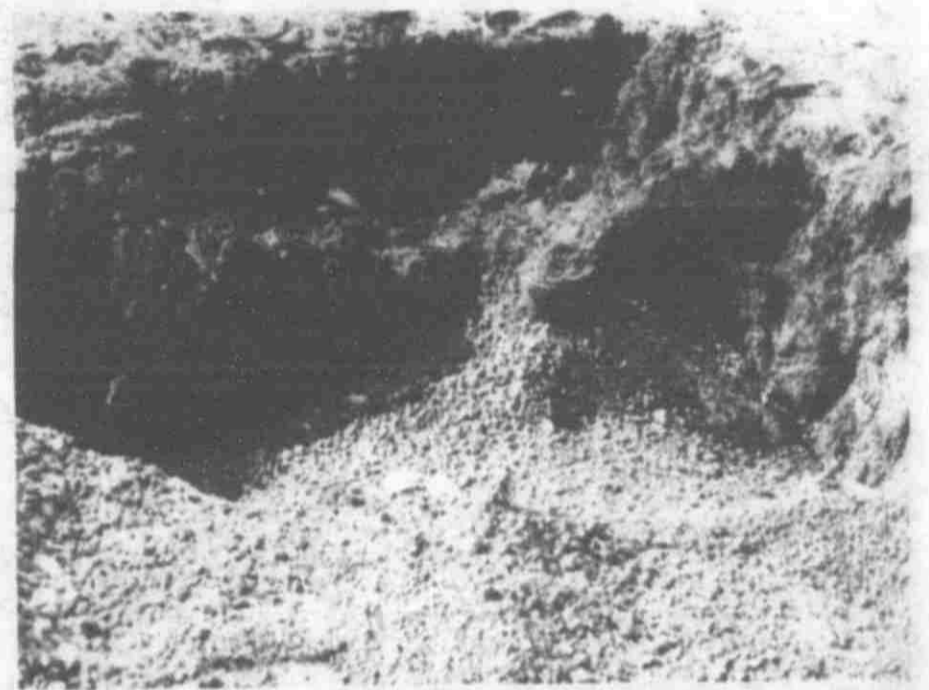
"We've already gutted the inside and are down to four walls, and ready to rebuild," West said.

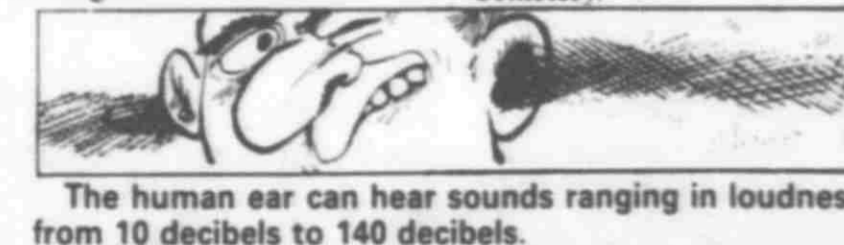

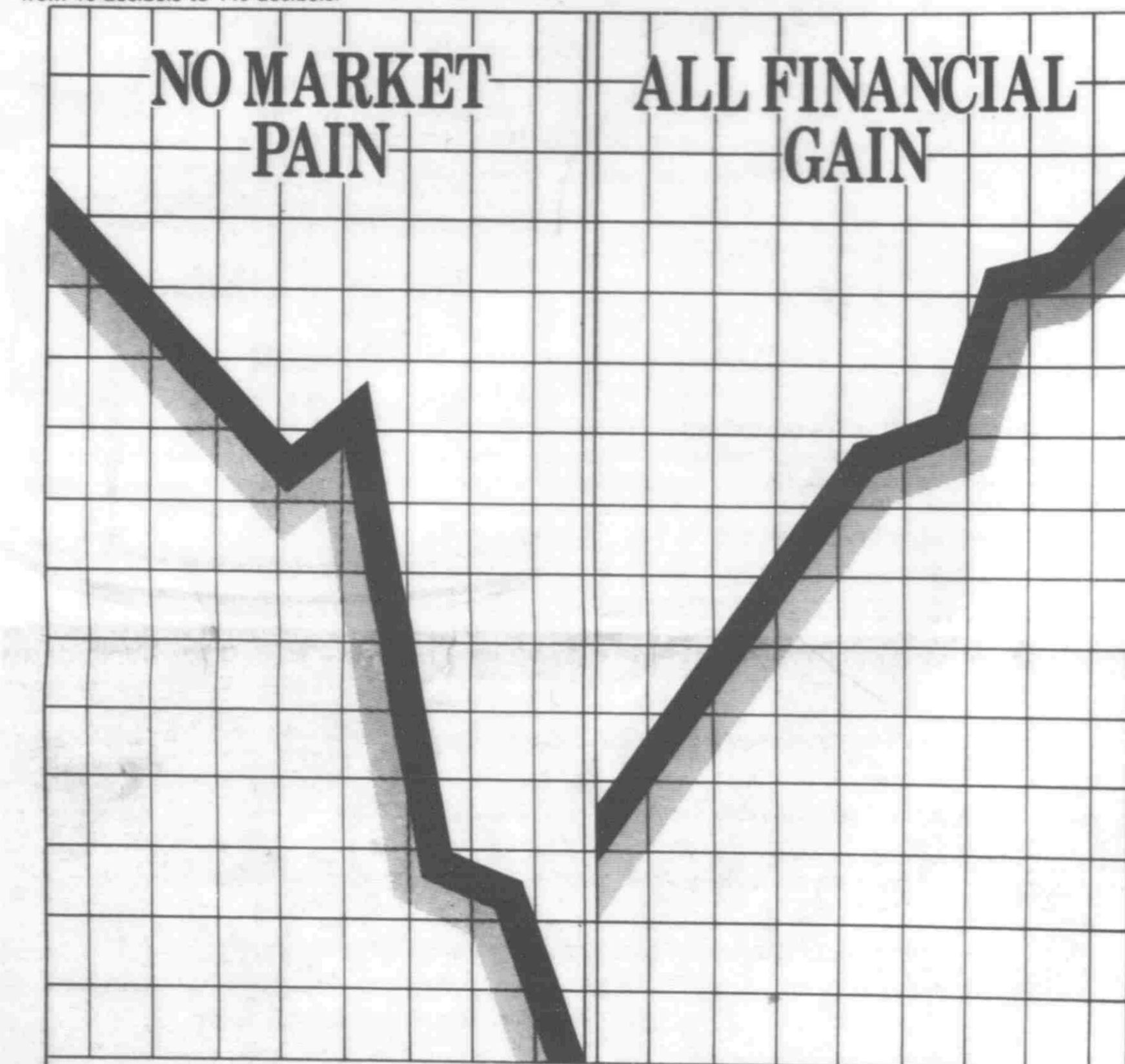

Cranbrook will notify the 33 winners in June. A public exhibition of the finalists' work will open at Cranbrook on July 30, 1988. Beginning in September, the 1988 Michigan Wildlife Art Award Exhibition will tour the Upper and Lower Peninsulas of the state through August 1989. One of the 1986 winners of this award was Amy Elizabeth Bliss of Ionia, Michigan.

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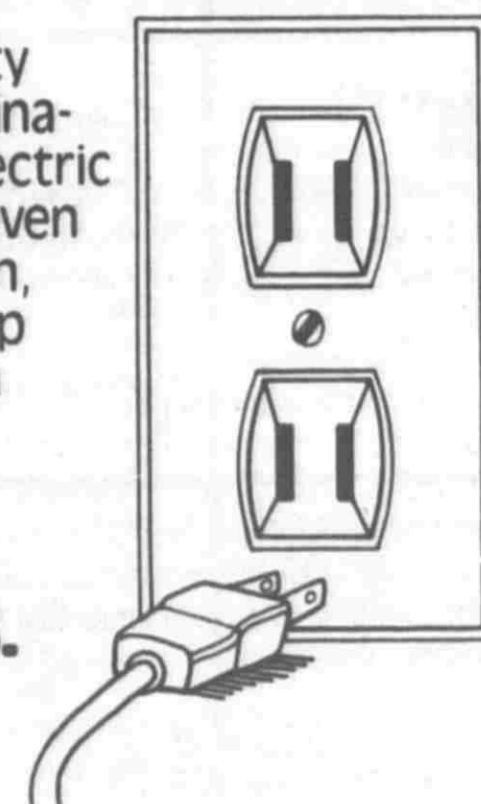
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# Bushnell and Runciman/Riverside spelling bee results announced

## World Day of Prayer...

The Lowell United Methodist Church, 621 E. Main St. Lowell will be hosting the World Day of Prayer on March 4, 1988 at 1:00 p.m.

World Day of Prayer begins its second century of celebration on Friday, March 4, 1988. A prayer movement of global dimensions, World Day of Prayer is a worldwide expression of mutual prayer and Christian unity. It began 101 years ago in the USA as a day of prayer for mission. It has now expanded until today it is celebrated as a common day of prayer by thousands upon thousands of Christians in 170 countries and regions of the world. The same theme and worship materials are used worldwide translated into hundreds of languages and dialects. In many countries, the event serves as a catalyst for women to come together to bring about changes in their lives.

The theme of this 101st World Day of Prayer is "Open Doors." Written by both Protestant and Roman Catholic women from Brazil, it reflects the background and concerns of South American women who are struggling both to achieve greater freedom and to elevate the quality of life for themselves and for all people. Church Women United (CWU), since its founding in 1941, has been the official sponsor of World Day of Prayer in the United States and has assumed responsibility for the preparation and distribution of World Day of Prayer resources and materials. CWU is the ecumenical movement that brings Protestant, Roman Catholic and Orthodox women together into one Christian community of prayer, advocacy and service. It represents a broad spectrum of religious tradition, race, age, economic status and ethnic background and works through a national unit, 52 state units (including ones in Greater Washington D.C. and Puerto Rico) and 1,800 local units.

Unified by a common faith in Christ, the women of Church Women United work for the elimination of poverty of women and children and issues of peace and justice. World Day of Prayer offerings make possible, in part, the mission of Church Women United including the Intercontinental Grants for Mission program that funds national and international self development and teaching projects for women, as well as community services and disaster relief at home and abroad.

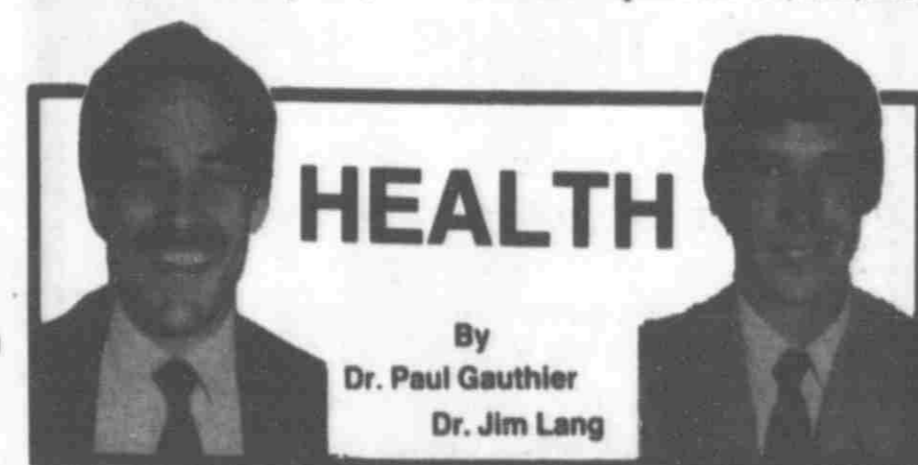

STROKE

Stroke is the third leading cause of death in the United States behind coronary heart disease and cancer. In the next couple of years we will be reviewing this broad topic.

It has been estimated that there are a half-million new cases of stroke each year in the U.S. In those that have experienced strokes, 1/3 to 1/2 will die within 30 days, 40% will require special assistance and up to 10% may have to be placed in extended care facilities. Stroke is a devastating occurrence in any family. Surgical and medical therapy is much more effective in preventing strokes than in limiting or reversing the effects of stroke, once it has occurred. Fortunately the incidence of stroke has decreased in the last 25 years.

Stroke is a syndrome of altered brain functions leading to varying degrees of neurologic deficits. Symptoms can range from local tingling and numbness to profound coma, depending on the amount of brain damage. The onset of stroke is usually quite rapid, from seconds to hours. Stroke is usually due to occlusions of blood vessels by blood clots or actual bleeding into the brain tissue.

Over a long period of time the arteries which lead to our brains can become narrowed by build up of plaques along the walls of the artery. These narrowed arteries lead to irregular blood flow which can promote the formation of clots resulting in cerebral infarction or stroke. Abnormalities of the heart can also lead to small clot formation. A small piece from this clot can break off, travel down stream and wedge into the distal artery, effectively blocking blood flow to critical parts of the brain.

Several risk factors of stroke are reviewed below:

- Age - The risk of stroke increases with age, over 80% of strokes occur in those over age 65
- High Blood Pressure - This is probably the greatest stroke risk factor. As blood pressure increases so do the chances of stroke.
- Sex - Stroke is more common in men. However, women who use oral contraceptives and smoke also have an increased risk of stroke.
- Heart Disease - As stated previously, clots can develop in those with abnormal valves, previous heart attacks and irregular rhythms.
- Diabetes - Uncontrolled blood sugar damages blood vessels
- Race - There is a higher mortality in blacks probably due to increased incidence of hypertension.
- Heredity - You are at increased risk if one of your parents has had a stroke.
- Smoking - Smokers have twice the risk of suffering a stroke as non-smokers.
- Previous Stroke or Transient Ischemic Attacks - Next week we'll discuss this important risk factor and how it helps us intervene to prevent a full blown stroke.

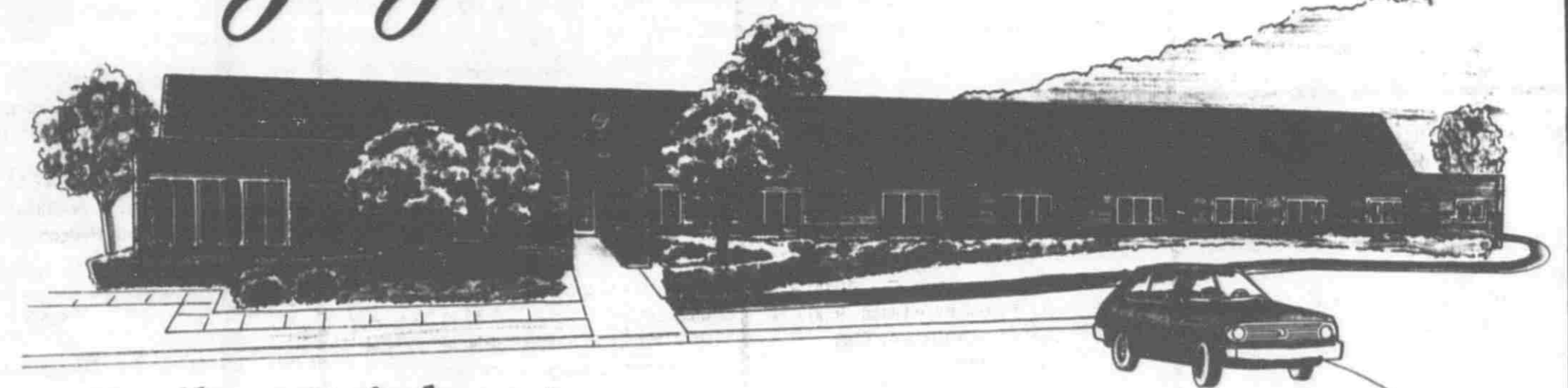

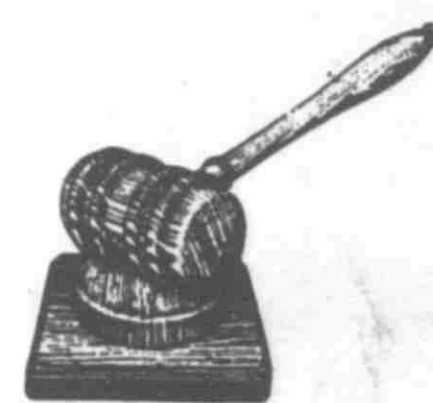

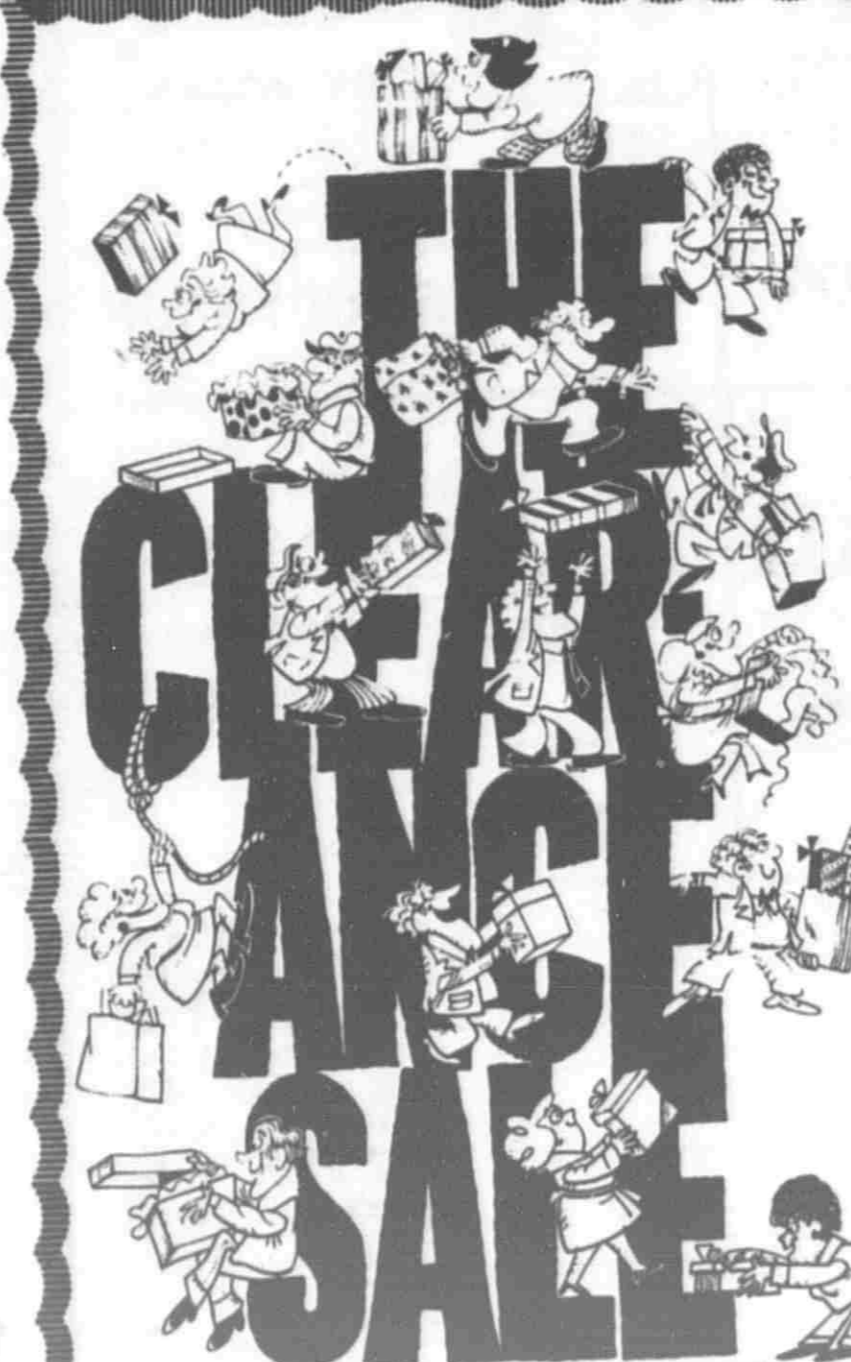

In the regional individual tournament on Saturday, Feb. 20, three Red Arrow grapplers advanced to state competition.

It should come as no surprise, they were Rivers (2-1), second;

Gildea (3-1), third; and Nugent (2-2), fourth.

"I expected those three to advance, but I thought possibly someone else might sneak in there," Rivers said.

The three grapplers will compete Feb. 26 and 27th at Battle Creek Lakeview in individual state competition.

"I think all three wrestlers have a chance to come home with medals," Rivers said.

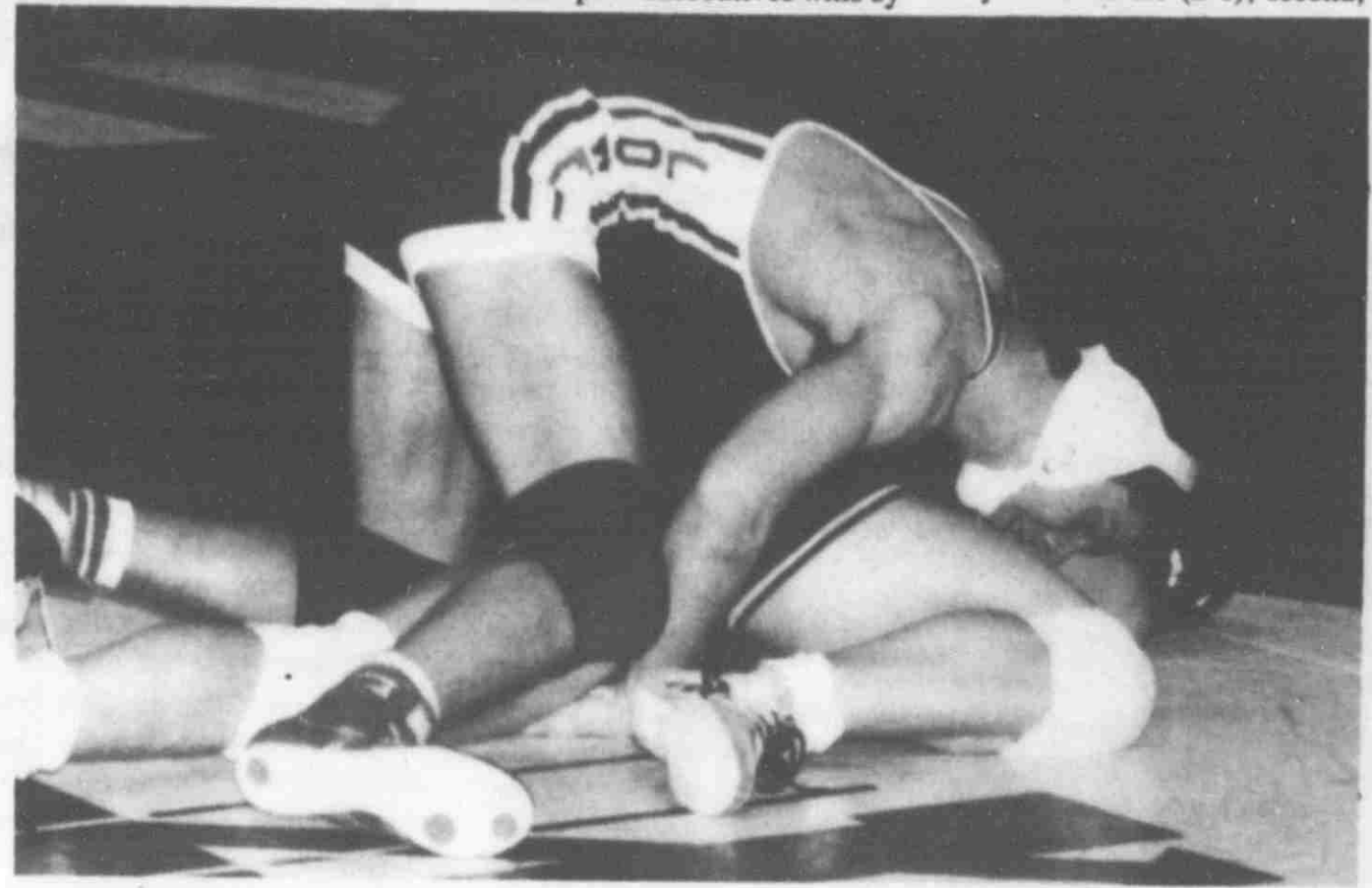

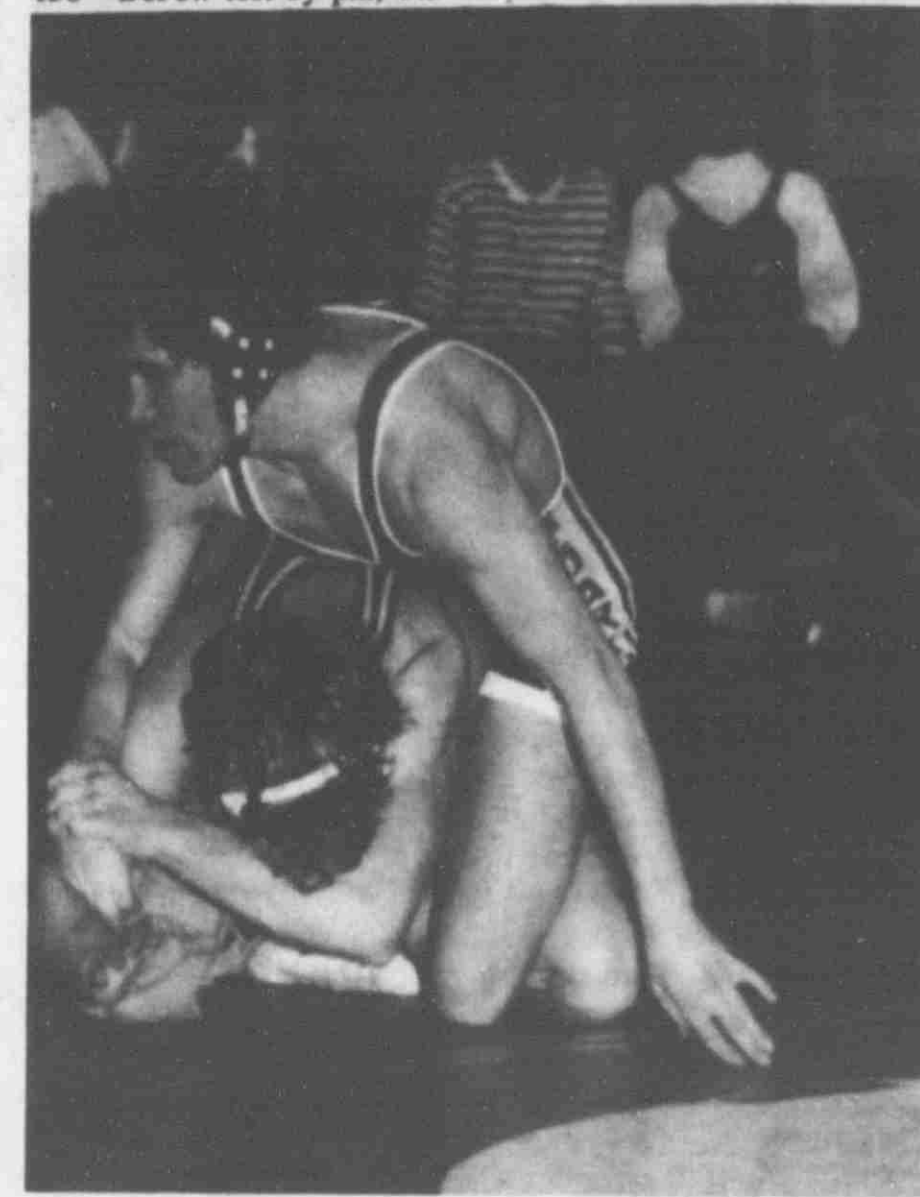

**Item No. 1:** Request a sign variance for Ye Olde Curiosity Shoppes (219 E. Main) to allow a projecting sign over the city right of way. The Public Hearing was opened by Chairman Thompson of the Zoning Board of Appeals. Helen Schaefer (as owner) stated she needed the sign to protrude so that east and westbound traffic can see it, mounting the sign on an existing bracket. Councilman Collins felt that the same request has been brought up once or twice before by previous owners of that particular store and it was denied. He also mentioned that this ordinance was put there for a reason. Once a sign has been taken down, another one is not to be put back up. Councilman Doyle said that other businesses have changed their signs since the ordinance has been in effect pointing to the Speerstra Agency and Sneaker's Sports Bar as examples. Chairman Thompson thought those fell under the Grandfather Clause. Doyle made the motion that the Zoning Board approve the sign. No support was given for

this motion. Leonard Jackson (605 Birchwood Ct.) as a former member of the Planning Commission said that the main reason for this ordinance was to clear the main street of all the different array of signs protruding over the right of way. He noted that the sign portion of the ordinance required more time to resolve than any other issue, and suggested that the Council carefully consider variances to it. Maatman suggested that the petition be postponed for two weeks so that staff could check into if there are signs that have been erected since the ordinance went into effect. The matter was tabled for the next meeting.

**Item No. 2:** Request for Keiser's Kitchen (521 W. Main) needing setback (front and both side yards) and parking space variances so that the restaurant may be rebuilt on the present site. The Public Hearing was opened by Chairman Thompson. Variances petitioned were: front yard set back requirement of 25 feet to be reduced to zero; side yard set back requirements of 10 feet east and 7 feet to the west, also be reduced to zero; and parking space requirements decreased from 53 spaces to 35 (reflecting the current lot size). Darlene Westcott asked permission to rebuild her restaurant, Keiser's Kitchen, on the same location that it occupied prior to a fire that destroyed it earlier this year. Councilman Thompson stated that he thought they fell under the Grandfather Clause. City Manager Pasquale said that with the demolition of the existing building and reconstruction of a new facility, the restaurant would fall under the current zoning ordinance, requiring the variances. It was asked are the variances valid for a similar business if Keiser's receives the variances and decides not to build there. Councilman Doyle states his understanding is that the variance would go with the property, not the individual. City Manager Pasquale stated that conditions could be tied to the variance.

Phil Johnson, as owner of Lowell Plaza, state he had no problem with the restaurant being rebuilt, but questioned why Keiser's should have a variance of 15 to 20 spaces, but his adjoining development was allowed only 5 parking spaces. He noted that Keiser's does not have the parking spaces available for a business of that size. Councilman Thompson stated the difference here is that the business was here. Public Hearing was closed. Fonger asked how close would the building be constructed toward Lowell Plaza. Mrs. Westcott said there will be an opening where the house was, they would not go any farther. It will be where it sat right before.

IT WAS MOVED by Councilman Collins and supported by Councilman Fonger to grant Keiser's variances requested for a period of one year, subject to site plan review for a restaurant structure of similar size.

**Item No. 3:** Keiser's Kitchen (700 E. Main) additionally re-

quested a variance to expand a building up to 2,000 square feet previously occupied by Paul's Showboat Restaurant. The property is currently zoned R-3 (Residential and Apartments). The existing restaurant is a non-conforming use and cannot be expanded without a variance.

IT WAS MOVED by Councilman Fonger and supported by Councilman Collins to set a Public Hearing date for February 16, 1988, to consider a variance expanding the restaurant building at 700 E. Main on behalf of Keiser's Kitchen.

**Item No. 4:** The Council received a unanimous recommendation from the Planning Commission to approve three zoning ordinance amendments as follows:

A. The first allowed public facilities parking lots in R-1, R-2, and R-3 districts by special approval. Public facilities include such uses as churches, schools, and government buildings. This issue arose from the Congregational Church wishing to build a parking lot on two residential properties by Spring Street. Instead of rezoning, this amendment would require a public hearing and be more protective of the neighborhood.

B. The second amendment provided performance guarantees under site plan review insuring compliance for public improvements. The Planning Commission may require deposit, certified check, irrevocable bank letter of credit covering the estimated cost of improvements associated with the project.

C. The last amendment dealt with deleting the requirement for special approval for private swimming pools in residential districts. Swimming pools would be treated as permitted accessory uses without need of a public hearing. During the time of Council discussion, Councilman Thompson stated that he wished to hold a public hearing on these amendments for further input.

The Council decided to forego another public hearing on this issue.

A. All contributors will receive a certificate of recognition from the Mayor.

B. A permanent record of all gifts will be kept by the city, listing the donor, the person being recognized, the event (birthday, anniversary, etc.) and the location of the gift.

C. Request for the placement of a plaque or recognition marker at the site of the gift are discouraged because of cost and the potential for vandalism. If a donor desires a plaque, a recommended design and wording is available for their consideration. The cost of such recognition shall be the responsibility of the donor. The city will not be responsible to replace plaques.

D. The Parks and Recreation Committee shall review all contributions and discuss with the donor the appropriate placement of the gift.

E. A minimum size of 2" caliper for shade and ornamental trees shall be the standard.

F. Only trees and shrubs that are warranted by a commercial nursery will be planted. If an individual wishes to donate a tree or shrub from their own property, the cost of transplanting will be their responsibility. Proper value for tax purposes will be given for the cost of transplanting and the value of the tree. This does not imply that such an individual will be reimbursed for that value by the City of Lowell. Beyond the warranty period, plantings will be replaced with a comparable species of the minimum size (2" caliper).

IT WAS MOVED by Councilman Doyle and supported by Councilman Fonger to adopt the Commemorative Tree guidelines as recommended by the Parks and Recreation Committee.

**Item No. 10:** Consideration of Light and Power Charges. City Manager Pasquale reviewed the following proposed policy submitted by Virgil Biggs, City Auditor, regarding reimbursement of funds between the City and Light and Power for services rendered:

In any year when capital expenditures total more than \$10,000 between the City and Light and Power Funds, the excess of that amount shall be reimbursed to that fund providing services.

The policy will be evaluated at the end of the first year and then renewed for a longer period of time. A capital expenditure is any item valued at more than \$500.00.

Mr. Biggs had stated that \$10,000 represents 1% of Light and Power's operating budget, not infringing on their financial integrity.

Dr. Orval McKay, Chairman of Light and Power, stated that when the City Charter was put together there was a real attempt to separate Light and Power operation from the City functions. The Light and Power funds have been used for a lot of other things and not for the Light and Power, therefore getting into a lot of trouble. There has been a lot of give and take on both sides. He felt that the City should reimburse Light and Power for material costs involving new poles and fixtures. The Council discussed several different ideas on

how to handle the problem. But as a final resolution, it was determined to have Herb Haines, Superintendent of Light and Power, and David Pasquale, City Manager, to come up with a workable solution for Council review and approval.

**Item No. 11:** Discussion of Sidewalk Ordinance Draft. A proposed sidewalk construction ordinance was reviewed. This ordinance will be discussed further at the February 16, 1988 meeting. The ordinance establishes guidelines for construction of new sidewalks as well as the replacement of old portions of sidewalks.

**Item No. 12:** Citizens Suggestions. Gordon Hall wanted to know who will pay for damaged sidewalks due to packed ground? John Kaufman asked who would be responsible for the new sidewalks if it was damaged by who was contracted to do some street work. Council stated that anyone we contracted to do any type of work for us is insured and would be responsible to repair it if it is brought up and documented at the time it happened.

Helen Schaefer once again stated how she needed the sign for her business. She will be hanging it on an existing pole. She feels she's offering a good service to the community.

**Item No. 13:** Council Comments. Thompson stated that the tree trimming service is doing an excellent job for the Lowell Light and Power. Councilman Collins said that the 7-11 Store plows snow up over the sidewalk and asked staff to bring it to their attention.

**Item No. 14:** Manager Report.

A. Sliding issue. City Manager Pasquale discussed the proposed sliding hill to be constructed near the Boy Scout Cabin. The toboggan runs as engineered are more than what the community needs. The Council felt that the hill should be constructed without the runs and to proceed with bidding.

B. City Manager Pasquale told the Council that the City of Parchment has accepted our invitation to exchange mayors. This will take place during Michigan Week in May.

C. City Manager Pasquale introduced the new Deputy City Clerk, Betty Morlock.

D. Parks Committee minutes and Planning Commission report were given.

**Item No. 15:** Appointments. Mayor Maatman stated that he has three people for the Airport Board, and is still looking for two more, particularly non-pilots. Suggested that the City advertise to solicit applicants for the board.  
IT WAS MOVED by Councilman Collins to adjourn at 10:10 p.m.

## CITY COUNCIL CITY OF LOWELL

### KENT COUNTY, MI

The Adoption of the following ordinance was moved by Council member Thompson, seconded by Council member Fonger.

#### ORDINANCE NO. 88-4 AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING A PARKS AND RECREATION COMMISSION AND SETTING FORTH ITS POWERS, DUTIES, AND RESPONSIBILITIES

1. That the Code of Ordinances of the City of Lowell is hereby amended by adding a new Chapter to be numbered Chapter 27, which Chapter shall be read as follows:

##### CHAPTER 27 PARKS AND RECREATION COMMISSION

Sec. 27-1. Creation of Commission. There is hereby created a commission of the City to be known as the Parks and Recreation Commission to accomplish the public purpose and whose powers, duties and responsibilities shall be set forth.

Sec. 27-2. Purpose of Commission. The Parks and Recreation Commission shall advise and make recommendations to the City Council on the City park system's management, operation and use. Such responsibilities shall include:

- a. preparation, recommendation to the City Council for adoption, and continual evaluation of a master plan for development of the City park system;
- b. recommending to the City Council annually a budget covering the acquisition, development, maintenance and operation of the City park system;
- c. recommending to the City Council capital improvement projects for the City park system.
- d. recommending to the City Council policies, rules and regulations related to the use, operation and maintenance of the City park system; and
- e. preparing an annual report to the City Council on the management, operation and use of the City park system.

When undertaking its responsibilities, the Commission shall recognize that coordinated recreation efforts are needed to provide recreation programs and facilities for all citizens. The Commission shall cooperate with community service organizations in providing recreation programs.

Sec. 27-3. Composition of the Commission. The Parks and Recreation Commission shall consist of five (5) voting members, all of whom shall be registered electors of the City. One (1) of the five (5) members shall be a person currently serving on the City Council. All voting members shall be appointed by the Mayor and confirmed by a majority of the members elected and serving on the City Council. In addition, there shall be one (1) ex-officio non-voting member appointed by the local branch of the YMCA.

Sec. 27-4. Term of Office. The terms of office of the Parks and Recreation Commission voting mem-

bers shall be three (3) years, except (i) that for the first members appointed, two (2) members shall be appointed for a three (3) year term, two (2) members shall be appointed for a two (2) year term, and one (1) member shall be appointed for a one (1) year term, and (ii) the City Council member shall serve only so long as he is on the City Council. Except for the initial appointment of Commission members where a member's term shall commence upon appointment, all terms of office shall commence on January 1. If a Commission member's term has expired, and a successor has not been appointed, the Commission member shall continue to serve until a successor is appointed.

Sec. 27-5. Vacancies. Vacancies on the Parks and Recreation Commission shall be filled in the same manner as initial appointments for the remainder of the unexpired term of the appointment vacated.

Sec. 27-6. Removal from Office. A Commission member may be removed from the Parks and Recreation Commission by the City Council at any time for cause upon the City Council receiving a recommendation for removal by the Parks and Recreation Commission.

Sec. 27-7. Compensation. Members of the Parks and Recreation Commission shall receive no compensation, but shall be entitled to their actual and necessary expenses incurred in the performance of their duties.

Sec. 27-8. Meetings of the Commission. All meetings of the Parks and Recreation Commission, except as otherwise permitted by law, shall be open to the public and held in compliance with Act No. 267 of the Public Acts of Michigan of 1976, as amended, and as may be amended. Meetings of the Commission may be called by the Commission Chairperson or any two (2) of its members.

Sec. 27-9. Quorum. A majority of the members of the Parks and Recreation Commission shall constitute a quorum for conducting the business of the Commission.

Sec. 27-10. Chairperson of the Commission. The members of the Parks and Recreation Commission shall annually in January of each year elect one (1) of its members as Chairperson. The Chairperson shall be responsible for conducting all meetings of the Commission. Another member of the Commission, selected by Commission members present, may serve as temporary Chairperson for a meeting at which the Chairperson is absent.

Sec. 27-11. Execution of Contracts and Commitment of Funds. The Parks and Recreation Commission may advise and make recommendations to the City Council regarding the entering into of contracts or the expenditure of City funds in connection with the City park system, but may not itself enter into contracts or commit City funds.

2. This Ordinance shall take effect ten (10) days after its publication in accordance with the City Charter. YEAS: Councilmembers Thompson, Fonger, Collins, and Mayor Maatman. NAYS: NONE. ABSENT: Councilmember Doyle. ORDINANCE DECLARED ADOPTED.

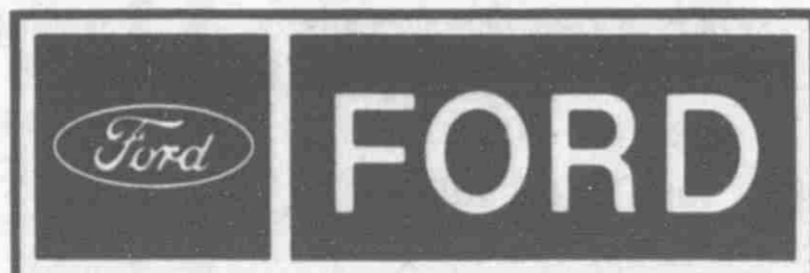
