Statistical data, which is based
on what history has shown, foretells of growth over the next 3-5 years in grades Kindergarten through fifth and grades six through eight.
The same statistics show the high school grades leveling off with growth starting back up in 1992-93.
"It's.
"It's important to realize that because a school system's middie school can hold an increase, that doesn't mean there will be level " Hoom at the high school level, Heckar said. This is due in part because of the room needed for special education, computers and specialty courses.
Of all the births in Kent County, 3.23 percent attend Lowell schools. Heckar adds that in the last three years there have been more children migrating in than going out of Lowell schools. "There are 108 more students this year than last year," he said.

Heckar adds, "The question is, will the growth of the future be average, steady, or high?" The birth residence of mothers was at a high in 1960 and bottomed out in 1974, but since that time it has been going up, according to Heckler.

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## Area youths trek Venus at Veen Observatory

seven Veen Observatory memseven Veen Observatory memgers of the junior section have
gathered with he ebservatory director Dave DeBruyn, on an early spring evening, to zero in on a view of Venus.
"It should look like a half moon tonight," said junior fouryear member Greg Collins.
The scope used to bring the half-moon shaped Venus into focus will be the Jeffery Bor 12.5 telescope reflector.

There are approximately 60 Tunior Veen Observatory members, "The junior section is the healthiest its been in a long time," DeBruyn said. "It's to sec the enjeyment the beys to see ine enjoyment the boys get from the observatory and the inthusiasm they show."
Junior member, Ken Clarke says his interest was irrst tapped came along. came along.
"I first became interested through the Grand Rapids Public Museum," Lowell resident Scott Maloley said.
Of the six members present
this evening, Maloley is the only one from Lowell.
"Collins is from Grand Rapids, Mike Johnson is from Grandville, and we have a boy hat travels from Hudsonville," DeBruyn said.
The group may have focused its attention on Venus (Friday April 11) however, this coming year Mars will grab most of its planet mill grab most of "This fall Mars is scheduled to be as close to the earth as it has been since 1971," DeBruyn said. "We will be trekking and charting its movement."
Right now, members spend time trekking galaxies "In the summer we focus on planets and star clusters," Collins said "In star clusters," Collins said. "In and in the winter fer nebulae nebulae and dust clouds."
DeBruyn has been the director
the Roger B. Chaffee Planetarium for over 20 years. He has been involved with the Veen Observatory since its fostering in 1965. "Jim Marron leased his property for the construction," he said.
DeBruyn also heads up its adult section, which has approxmately 125 members.
"One of the biggest misconceptions people have, is they hink they have to know somehing about astronomy to be nember," treasurer, Ron VanderWerff said. "You need not know thing. People may join to earn."

DeBruyn adds that he believes owell has one of the best equip ped amateur observatories in the country. "It was built in 1965 by members of the Grand Rapids Public Museum," DeBruyn said. The only other one in the area is the Muskegon Astronomical Society."
The outside telescope, the 17.5 inch Dobsonian, is used for galaxy, nebula and deep sky obervations.
The Veen Observatory will once again resume visitor nights this spring. These nights will be conducted by members of the Grand Rapids Amateur Asronomical Association, a group of astronomy hobbyists, in cooperation with the Roger B. Chaf fee Planetarium of the Grand Rapids Public Museum.
The observatory, at 3308 Kissng Rock Rd. near Lowell, will ng Rock Rd. near Lowell, will and last Friday of each month and last Friday of each month clear enough for viewing The facility will be closed The facility will be closed to the public at all other times, exept for groups by appointment. There is a recorded message with further information about the observatory and its activities available by calling 897-7065. This year, an all new slide show about the observatory and its activities is being developed. Also new this year is a nominal admission charge for visitors; $\$ 1$ for adults, 50 cents for children under 12 , with a maximum of $\$ 3$ per carload.
