## Heckar updates Board on district's enrollment report

Stanley Heckar, a retired employee at Stanfred Associates, provided the Lowell Board of Education with a preliminary report of the district's enrollment projections.

Statistical data, which is based on what history has shown, foretells of growth over the next 3-5 years in grades Kindergarten through fifth and grades six through eight.

The same statistics show the high school grades leveling off with growth starting back up in 1992-93.

"It's important to realize that because a school system's middle school can hold an increase, that doesn't mean there will be enough room at the high school level," Heckar said. "This is due in part because of the room needed for special education, computers and specialty courses."

Of all the births in Kent County, 3.23 percent attend Lowell schools. Heckar adds that in the last three years there have been more children migrating in than going out of Lowell schools. "There are 108 more students this year than last year," he said.

Heckar adds, "The question is, will the growth of the future be average, steady, or high?"

The birth residence of mothers was at a high in 1960 and bottomed out in 1974, but since that time it has been going up, according to Heckler.

Michigan accounts for 3.75 percent of the births in the United States.

Heckar said the first step in projecting, is looking at what the statistical data shows, the next step is talking to bankers, developers and realtors and getting an insight as to what will be happening with them.

Stanfred Associates will be spending the next couple months weeks gathering that information for the Lowell School Board.

A group of concerned Lowell parents attended the April board meeting to express their concern over the resolution (one which the board passed after the discussion) to include all kindergartners from Eastgate subdivision into the Alto Elementary boundary lines beginning with the 1988-89 school year.

"This is being done to help create space for a special education classroom, which the school must provide," Lowell Superintendent Fritz Esch said. "Also to help relieve the overcrowding that has surfaced again at Runciman. With the difficult financial decisions ahead, we're trying to

maximize the educational experience for the kids."

Alto Principal Jim White said right now there is a morning kindergarten room that sets empty in the afternoon.

All the parents there expressed that they have no problems with Alto Elementary, but hope this is the end of it and things will settle down.

the projection difficulty according to Esch is the development of the developmental kindergarten program and the explosion of special education.

He added it is difficult in terms of projections because of the situation with the crowded classrooms. Two of the reasons for

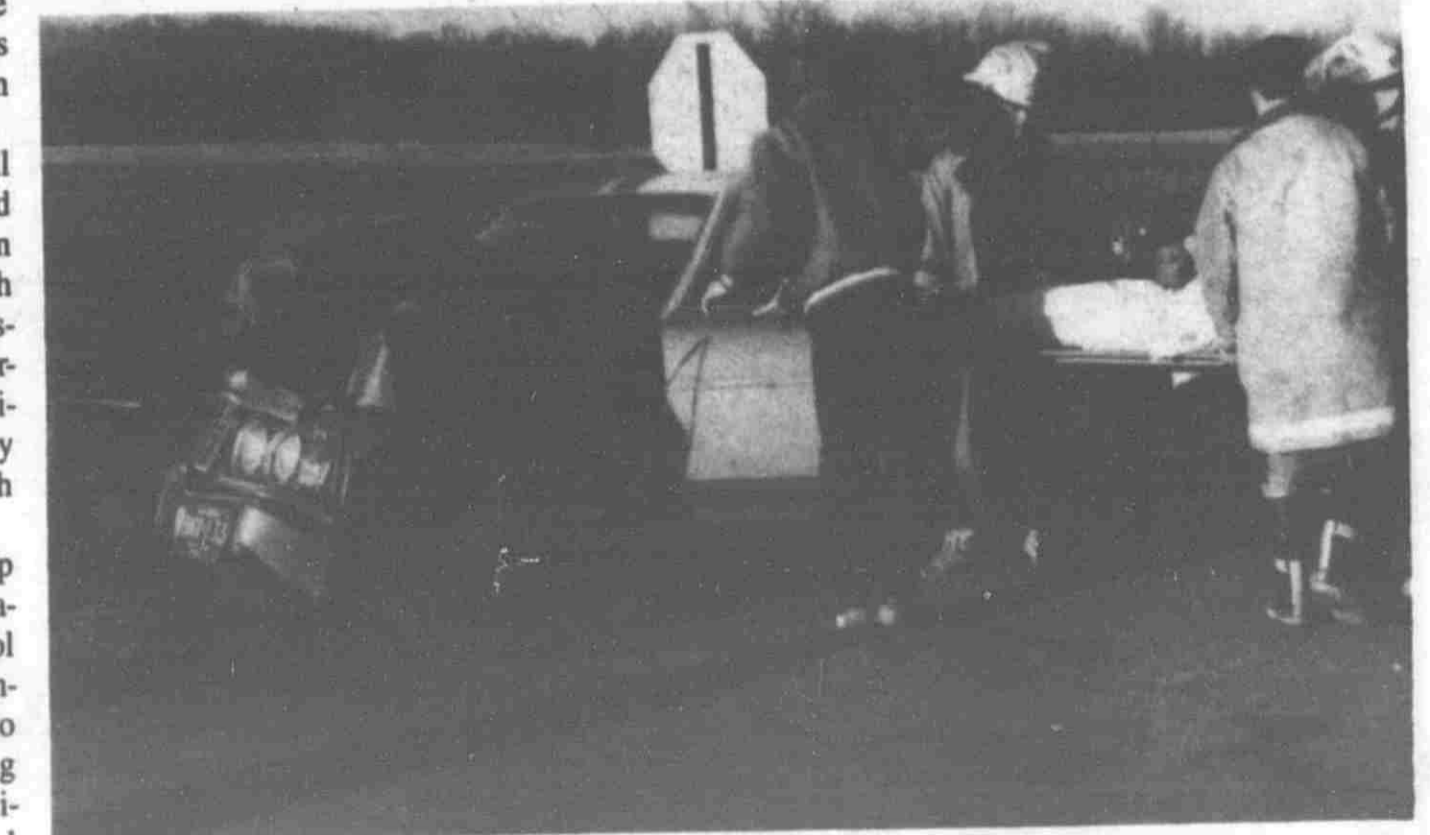

## "After School Special" by Joan Wittenbach

A MISTAKE?  
"You must find public reasons for private convictions," -- so says Sheridan Baker in his book, *The Complete Stylist And Handbook*. It almost sounds like it might come from a manual on religious insights. It doesn't. It is a manual on writing. I use it to help me write those special kind of papers that professors are always asking for. The kind I don't know how to write. The simple ones, that often turn out to be so hard and demanding.

The above quote ended up in one of my journals today. I thought of the classes that I just finished teaching at Sparta High School during Campus Day, April 5. Campus Day is sponsored every year during spring break by the Kent County Extension Office. It is an 8:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. celebration of talents and encouragements and inspiration. There were over 100 sessions to choose from.

When I got the invitation to speak again this year, on journal writing, I felt I was just too busy. I threw it in the wastebasket. Two days later, I picked it out, signed for two classes to teach, and mailed it. A couple of months later, I knew I was too busy and called to cancel out. It couldn't be done. The brochures were printed and sent out. So be it.

I am so happy that I didn't cancel out. I felt like doing a pirouette and dancing across the room (emotional, right?). I met the most wonderful, loving people. They are the reasons for my private convictions. My conviction that we need to take time to find out who we are, where we are going, what we are to do with our life, and ever so many questions we may have.

If we don't ask questions, life gets very boring and depressing. There are answers out there, even though at times some of them seem to be "On Hold". That's why I enthusiastically encourage men and women to keep a journal. Take time (and it really can be found) to become friends with yourself, and listen to what is going on around you. I know journal writing is not for everyone. But by all means, find what it is that makes you a better communicator with life.

This time, what I thought was a mistake turned out to be a blessing - to myself and I believe, to others.

I wish as much for you in the days to come ---blessings!

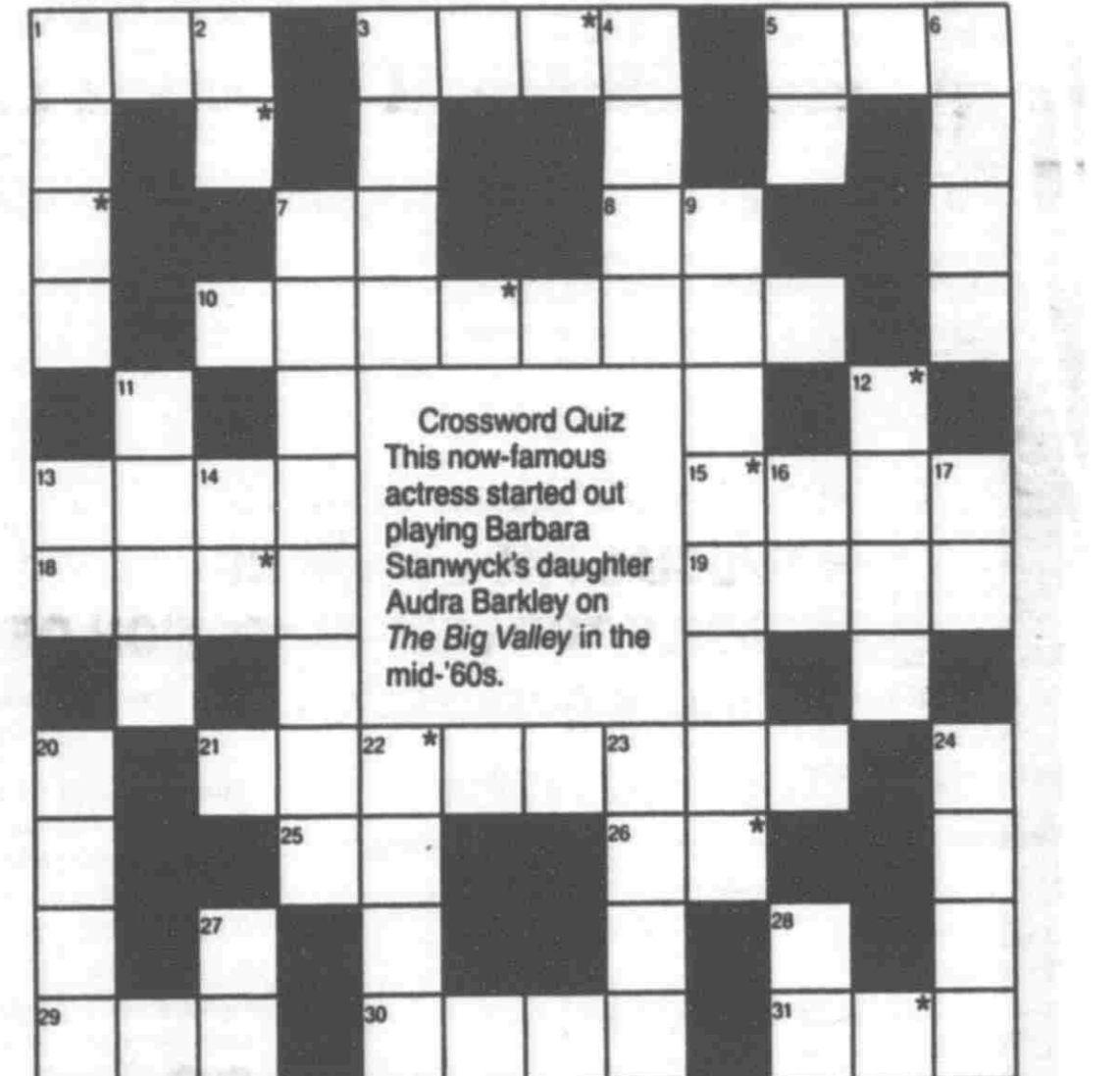

# Area youths trek Venus at Veen Observatory

It's Friday night, and six to seven Veen Observatory members of the junior section have gathered with the observatory director Dave DeBruyn, on an early spring evening, to zero in on a view of Venus.

"It should look like a half moon tonight," said junior four-year member Greg Collins.

The scope used to bring the half-moon shaped Venus into focus will be the Jeffery Borr 12.5 telescope reflector.

There are approximately 60 junior Veen Observatory members. "The junior section is the healthiest its been in a long time," DeBruyn said. "It's great to see the enjoyment the boys get from the observatory and the enthusiasm they show."

Junior member, Ken Clarke, says his interest was first tapped about the time Haley's Comet came along.

"I first became interested through the Grand Rapids Public Museum," Lowell resident Scott Maloley said.

Of the six members present

this evening, Maloley is the only one from Lowell.

"Collins is from Grand Rapids, Mike Johnson is from Grandville, and we have a boy that travels from Hudsonville," DeBruyn said.

The group may have focused its attention on Venus (Friday, April 11) however, this coming year Mars will grab most of its planet scoping observances. "This fall Mars is scheduled to be as close to the earth as it has been since 1971," DeBruyn said. "We will be trekking and charting its movement."

Right now, members spend time trekking galaxies. "In the summer we focus on planets and star clusters," Collins said. "In the fall we're looking for nebulae and in the winter season it's nebulae and dust clouds."

DeBruyn has been the director at the Roger B. Chaffee Planetarium for over 20 years. He has been involved with the Veen Observatory since its fostering in 1965. "Jim Marron leased his property for the construction," he said.

DeBruyn also heads up its adult section, which has approximately 125 members.

"One of the biggest misconceptions people have, is they think they have to know something about astronomy to be a member," treasurer, Ron VanderWerff said. "You need not know a thing. People may join to learn."

He continues, "Some first-timers come in and are intimidated by the equipment on the Borr telescope, but in time a person learns the purpose of all the

gadgets and gadgets."

DeBruyn adds that he believes Lowell has one of the best equipped amateur observatories in the country. "It was built in 1965 by members of the Grand Rapids Public Museum," DeBruyn said. "The only other one in the area is the Muskegon Astronomical Society."

The outside telescope, the 17.5 inch Dobsonian, is used for galaxy, nebula and deep sky observations.

The Veen Observatory will once again resume visitor nights this spring. These nights will be conducted by members of the Grand Rapids Amateur Astronomical Association, a group of astronomy hobbyists, in cooperation with the Roger B. Chaffee Planetarium of the Grand Rapids Public Museum.

The observatory, at 3308 Kissing Rock Rd. near Lowell, will be open on the second Saturday and last Friday of each month through October, if the sky is clear enough for viewing.

The facility will be closed to the public at all other times, except for groups by appointment. There is a recorded message with further information about the observatory and its activities available by calling 897-7065.

This year, an all new slide show about the observatory and its activities is being developed. Also new this year is a nominal admission charge for visitors; \$1 for adults, 50 cents for children under 12, with a maximum of \$3 per carload.

These donations will help continue the improvement and remodeling program at this 20-year old facility.
