## Ordinance being drafted to stop loitering

There was a friendly new face patrolling the city streets of Lowell Friday (April 8).

"It was the most positive experience I've had with the Lowell Police Department," said

Lowell resident Bill Duncan. "I had a parking problem and there was a policeman there to help. I didn't have to go find an officer."

The friendly policeman (Dave VanHoughton), was on foot patrol

for selective enforcement as part of an effort to stop and/or control the loitering problem on the city streets.

"This is the first time we've visibly patrolled the streets. Prior to this, everything has been undercover and/or incognito," Lowell Police Chief Barry Emmons said.

This is part of an effort to help Lowell merchants with the disorderly conduct on the city streets and bridge. The other part of the effort is a new ordinance that is presently being drafted by the city fathers to help curb the problem.

"The ordinance is currently in the hands of the city attorney. It will then be processed for judicial review before being enacted into an ordinance by the city council," Emmons said. "This should take a couple of weeks."

"I hope the merchants cooperate, and when they see a violation, report it. There have been cases where some merchants are patrolling the streets themselves," explains Emmons. "This type of action, we do not want."

Under the constitution a person can be any place he or she wants, but "we're concerned

with what happens while they are there," Emmons explains.

What's happening? Loitering, intimidation, trespassing, drug trafficking, littering, graffiti vandalism, harassment, reckless driving and drinking.

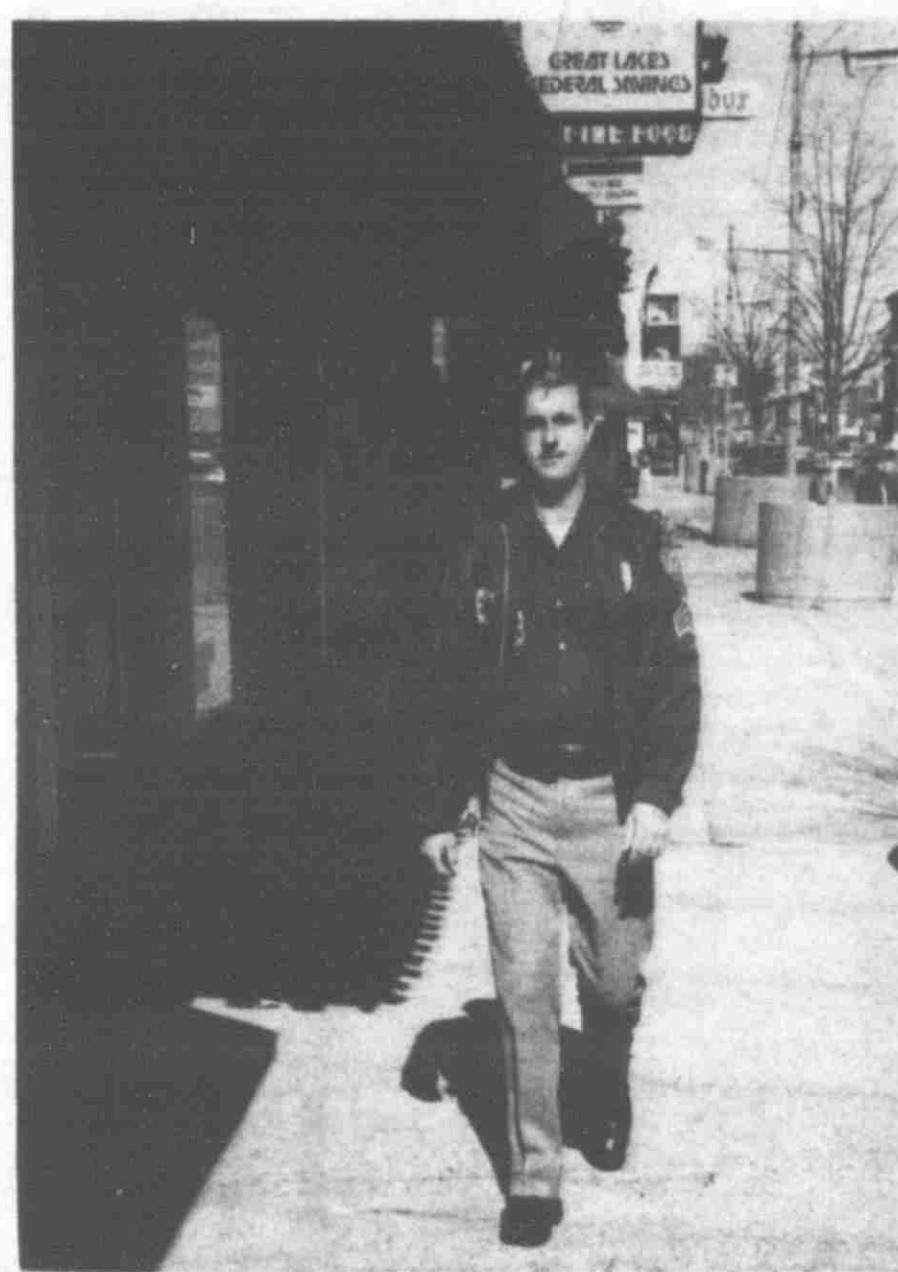
"Nice weather, evenings and weekends is when the problems surface," Emmons said. We're hoping the kids will cooperate and stay off the streets unless they have business to tend to."

The Lowell police chief said he is aware that the teenagers and young adults causing the problems represent a small percentage of the Lowell youths.

"We plan on continuing the street patrolling idea, probably once a week, with the day varying," Emmons explains. Right now Emmons has volunteers from the reserves filling the vacancy.

He continues, "We've taken the volunteer out of the second car and realigned his responsibilities."

Emmons says that many people don't realize that for the last 20 years reserves have been volunteering their time for weekend (Friday and Saturday) duty.

## Lowell City Council decides several issues during marathon meeting

The Lowell City Council took more than three hours to wade through a lengthy agenda at Monday's regular meeting. Topping the agenda was a list of adjustments to be made to 1987-88 budget. The Council is bound by state law to approve final adjustments to the previous budget before a new one can be adopted.

The 1988-89 budget is slated for approval at the May 2 meeting. The adjustments were both positive and negative. For instance, the need for a new copier at \$8,000 was a negative expense. On the other side of the ledger, Lowell City Manager David Pasquale's extensive planning experience saved the city a significant amount in planning consultant fees. All the city's various funds were affected by these final adjustments. The entire list was reviewed and approved by the Council.

A public hearing was slated for May 2 to hear a request from Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Weemhoff asking the city to vacate Pine St. west of Lafayette St. A recent survey indicates that a portion of the Weemhoff home at 632 Lafayette is constructed on the street right-of-way. The Council approved the low bid of \$6,150.00 from Reith-Riley Construction to re-pave the parking lot in front of the city's D.P.W. garage.

The Council also approved the low bid of \$21,500.00 from Pennington Bros., Inc. of Muskegon to repaint the ground storage reservoir, lime slaker silo, inlet

pipe, dock overhang and walkway handrails at the water treatment plant.

City Clerk Betty Morlock breathed, "Bless you" when the Council approved the purchase of a new Minolta copier. Morlock told the council that she spends between three and four hours of overtime preparing information packets prior to each City Council meeting. The new copier is equipped with two-side copying capability, a collator and other features that should reduce her time significantly.

The Council balked at a request to purchase a used personal computer and software for the assessor's office. Mayor James Maatman was concerned with the \$3,300.00 cost and noted that he had priced new equipment in the same price range. Pasquale said he would bring in the equipment and more details for the next Council meeting.

The Council approved a resolution for the annexation of 14.7 acres of Oakwood Cemetery lying in Vergennes Township. Pasquale said the Vergennes Township Supervisor James Cook is also in favor of the annexation. If both the city and township agree to the annexation, the state will likely approve the proposal.

Jim Pfaller addressed the Council on behalf of the Lowell Chamber of Commerce. Pfaller, and a representative from the Kalamazoo Banner Works put forth a proposal to adorn 30 utility poles in the central business

district with holiday banners. The \$4,100 project would replace what the city has done to date with more traditional lamp post decorations. Once the brackets are in place, other banners could be used to draw attention to specific events such as Fallasburg Fall Festival, Showboat, etc. Pfaller said he was not asking for anything from the Council as yet, but did ask that the city not commit to a Christmas decoration contract until the banner proposal could be thoroughly investigated.

Ron Nelson, the Executive Director of the Grand Rapids YMCA, was on hand to ask the city for \$6,000 in support for this year's program at the King Memorial Pool. The city has contributed \$3,000 for the past several years. Nelson explained that the pool has operated in the red for the past several seasons. The Council balked at the request, pointing out the fact that the city is heavily subsidizing a pool program that is used by children and adults from over a wide area, to include swim lesson programs from Ionia and Saranac. The Council asked for the formulation of a voucher system that will offset the city's added cost by reducing the rate paid by Lowell residents. The YMCA will bring a new proposal to the Council at their next meeting.

The Council approved a \$3,000 per year expenditure for a five year period to fund an ambulance based in the city and servicing Lowell, Lowell Township

and Vergennes Township. The proposal comes from the Rockford Ambulance Service, a non-profit corporation that has provided ambulance service to the Rockford area for 20 years. The program was supported by the Lowell Police Department and Lowell Rescue.

Roger Morgan, director of Rockford Ambulance said he would now seek similar support from the townships, and take the proposal back to his nine member board of directors.

The Council scheduled a preliminary public hearing to hear property owners' comments regarding water and sewer mains on West Main St. and water mains on Hunt St. west of Beech St. Engineering studies estimate that the West Main project would cost nearly \$500,000 and the Hunt St. project about \$70,000. The cost to property owners would be approximately \$90.00 per lineal foot of frontage on West and Main and \$36.00 per foot on Hunt St. The cost would likely be carried by a special assessment.

In his comments to the Council, Pasquale brought up the problems concerning a \$5.00 late fee for water and sewer bills. Pasquale explained that many people have become very upset

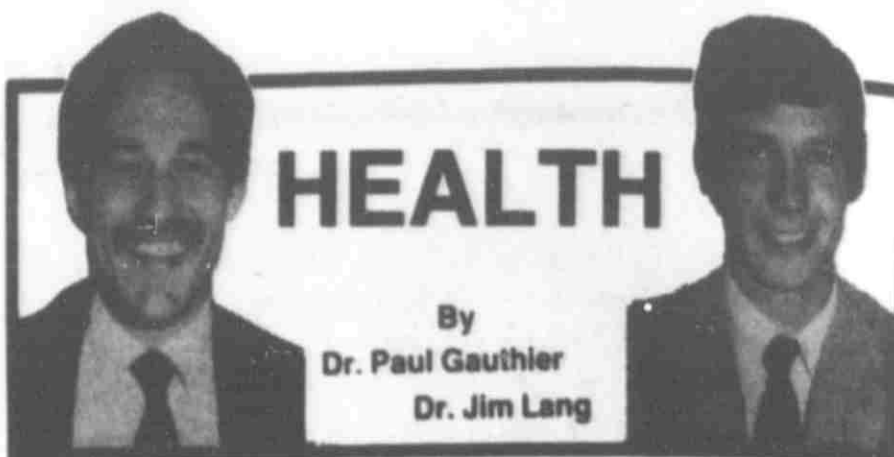

### POISON IVY

As spring and summer approach we always see many cases of dermatitis due to poison ivy and its close relatives, poison oak and poison sumac. It is estimated that 50-70% of the U.S. population is sensitive to these plants.

Poison ivy grows as a low lying shrub or a high climbing plant which has a thin pale stem and characteristic three leaflets. During spring poison ivy will have small, white, waxy flowers followed by small, hairy, green berries. The leaflets are dark green in the spring and summer, becoming red to yellow in the fall.

Poison ivy contains a resin called urushiol which causes the allergy. When this resin comes in contact with the skin an acute allergic dermatitis develops. After contact with the plant, previously sensitized individuals will develop the rash within hours to days. Those that have not been previously sensitized may not experience the rash for as long as 3 weeks. Frequently contact occurs indirectly from contaminated clothing, garden tools, or other objects such as lost golf balls.

The rash usually begins with redness and swelling followed by tiny fluid filled blisters. Itching is followed by coalescence of the blisters and eventual breakdown with oozing and weeping. Exposed areas of skin are most commonly affected, however it is not uncommon for the genitals and buttocks to be involved. Occasionally, the rash may become quite severe and generalized with swelling of the eyelids, fever, and secondary infections. Left untreated, mild poison ivy will usually run its course over a 3 week period.

Treatment consists of washing the exposed area as soon as possible with mild soap and warm water. If the area is washed within ten minutes the rash can be prevented, but if this is not possible, bathing later will remove remaining resin which helps control spreading. Fingernails should be cleaned thoroughly. Avoid using harsh soaps. Once the rash has developed, cool compresses should be applied using Burrow's solution (obtained at any pharmacy) for 20-30 minutes, 3-4 times per day for 3-4 days. Calamine lotion is often used but it should not be applied to oozing crusted areas because drying and caking of the lotion may worsen the itching. Oral antihistamines such as Benadryl® should be taken every 4-6 hours to help control severe itching. Often potent topical or systemic steroids are prescribed to hasten resolution. Presently there is no reliable method of hyposensitization to prevent dermatitis from developing in sensitive individuals. The most important means of prevention is to recognize the poison ivy plant and avoid it. Poison ivy is not spread by contact with the fluid from weeping blisters. It can only be spread by contact with the resin of the plant, this is why it is important to wash contaminated clothing or shoes.

with the late charge, especially when they have been away on vacation or only been a day or two late. Pasquale told of one customer who paid his bill, but refused to pay the late fee. When his next bill came he was charged another late fee because the first one was late. The customer is now at \$15.00 in late fees, and heading for \$20.00. Pasquale says the late fees will continue to multiply from that very first one that was not paid. The Council agreed that the system should be changed, but no one was sure as to the legality of changing the ordinance regarding water and sewer collections. The issue will be discussed again at the next meeting. In the mean time, Pasquale will review the ordinance, and if necessary, consult with the city attorney. The meeting was finally adjourned at about 11:10.

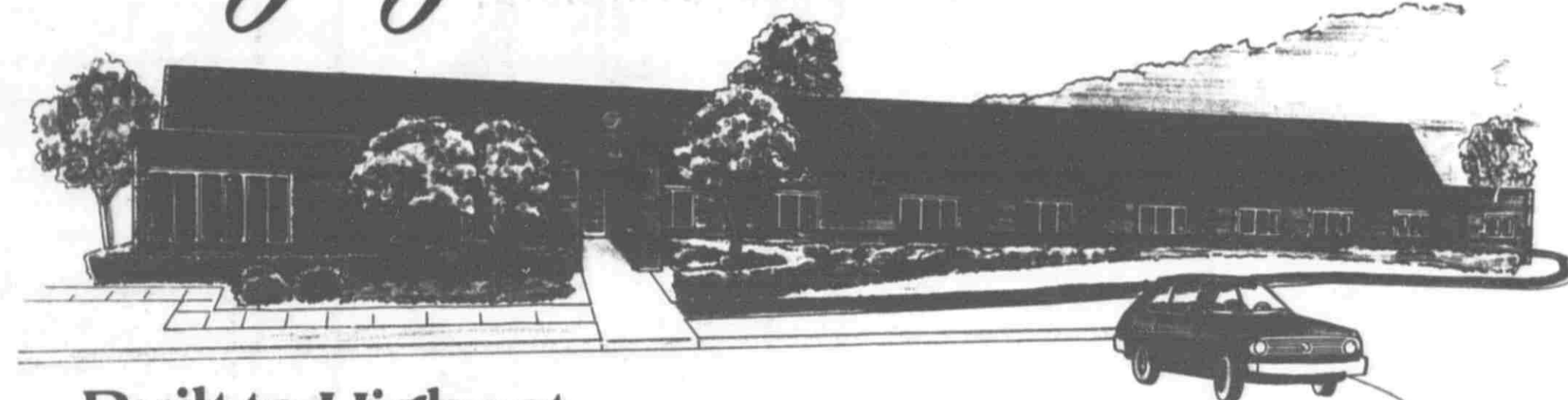

# District challenged by changing needs

**Editor's Note:** In its continued effort to help keep the Lowell community abreast of the strategic planning committee's endeavor to bring planning and practice together, The Lowell Ledger will publish the fourth of six reports on the sub-committee's progress. In this edition the Facilities sub-committee is featured.

The changing needs in our systems of education represent the challenges which confront our school district.

The requirements of expanding curriculum, extra curricular and sports opportunities place the district's physical facilities for instruction, athletic events,

industrial arts and transportation under extreme stress, according to facilities chairperson, Charlie Kohler.

"These factors, coupled with projections for increased enrollment support the necessity of this forward planning initiative," Kohler said.

To this end, the principal function of the strategic planning effort is to provide school boards of the future the appropriate focus when programs for growth and development are formulated.

A portion of this task has been delegated to the facilities sub-committee. Its purpose is twofold: 1. to assess the condition

and adequacy of existing facilities; and 2. to identify areas where changes, improvements and additions are required to both maintain and support improvements in the education systems.

The facilities committee has begun the task of touring and reviewing all facilities during school hours to obtain a clear picture of day-to-day function of building, transportation and overall facility requirements.

In general terms, the committee concluded that many areas are relying on out-dated facilities to provide broader and expanded services to an increased enrollment level.

"The need for additional class-

room, technological and athletic/recreational facilities were immediately recognized," Kohler said.

The facilities committee's goal is "to assure the existence of an adequate physical environment to meet the educational and extra-curricular needs of Lowell Area Schools and the community at large.

Some of the specific objectives the committee set were to study student population growth in relationship to present facilities; to look into new land needed and identify strategic parcels; to identify strengths and weaknesses of present facilities; to assess the athletic facilities;

and to develop a plan for new facilities.

"The committee will now complete the process by developing position statements on existing facilities, recommendations for needed improvements and alternatives for consideration by the strategic planning committee.

Kohler says that suggestions for improvement and additions are encouraged from the community.

Projections of gradually increasing enrollment are being confirmed via reports from the school board through a professional consultant.

"This, when coupled with an increased level of participation

by the student population in non-classroom activities support the need for expanded facility services, responding to existing needs," Kohler said.

He adds, "We have the opportunity to develop a first rate program for our children's instructional and extra-curricular needs."

Kohler concludes that the planning effort reflects the beginning of a long-term commitment to forward planning and community development. "This process is not only needed, but necessary if we are to provide quality preparation for our children as they prepare themselves for the challenges of an ever-changing society."

# Bernard's new job changes his 'attire' life

Charlie Bernard, owner of Bernard's True Value Hardware Store, has not only changed vocations within the last year, but has changed his attire.

"Corporate life had me in white shirts, ties and suits. It also had me in theatres and going out for dinner," Bernard said. "I enjoyed all three."

Another factor that Bernard had to consider before opening a hardware store in Lowell, was whether the town was big enough for two stores.

"I don't think anybody could move into Lowell and hurt Gurney Hahn's business," Bernard said. "Hahn's pretty much an institution in this town."

The painting and plumbing areas, according to Bernard, have really flourished. "They've taken off from the beginning," he said.

Cleaning Products Supply (CPS), in my way of thinking, stands for "customer service satisfaction," Dard said.

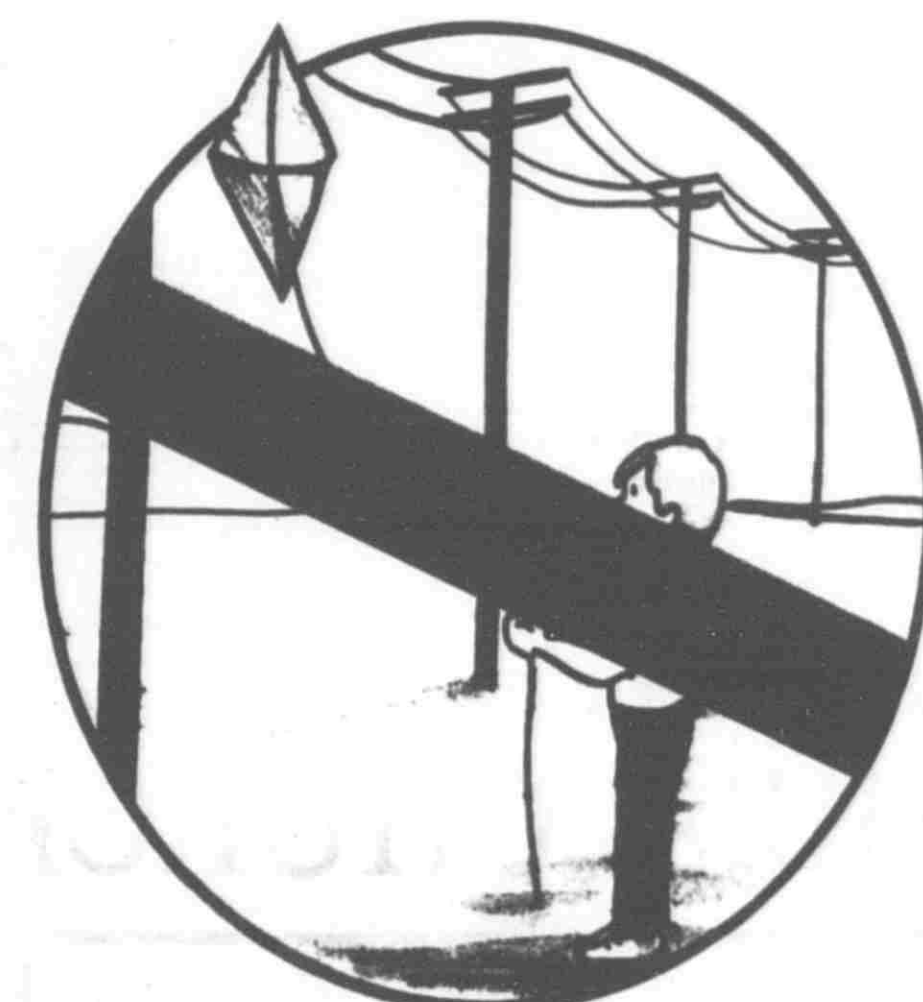

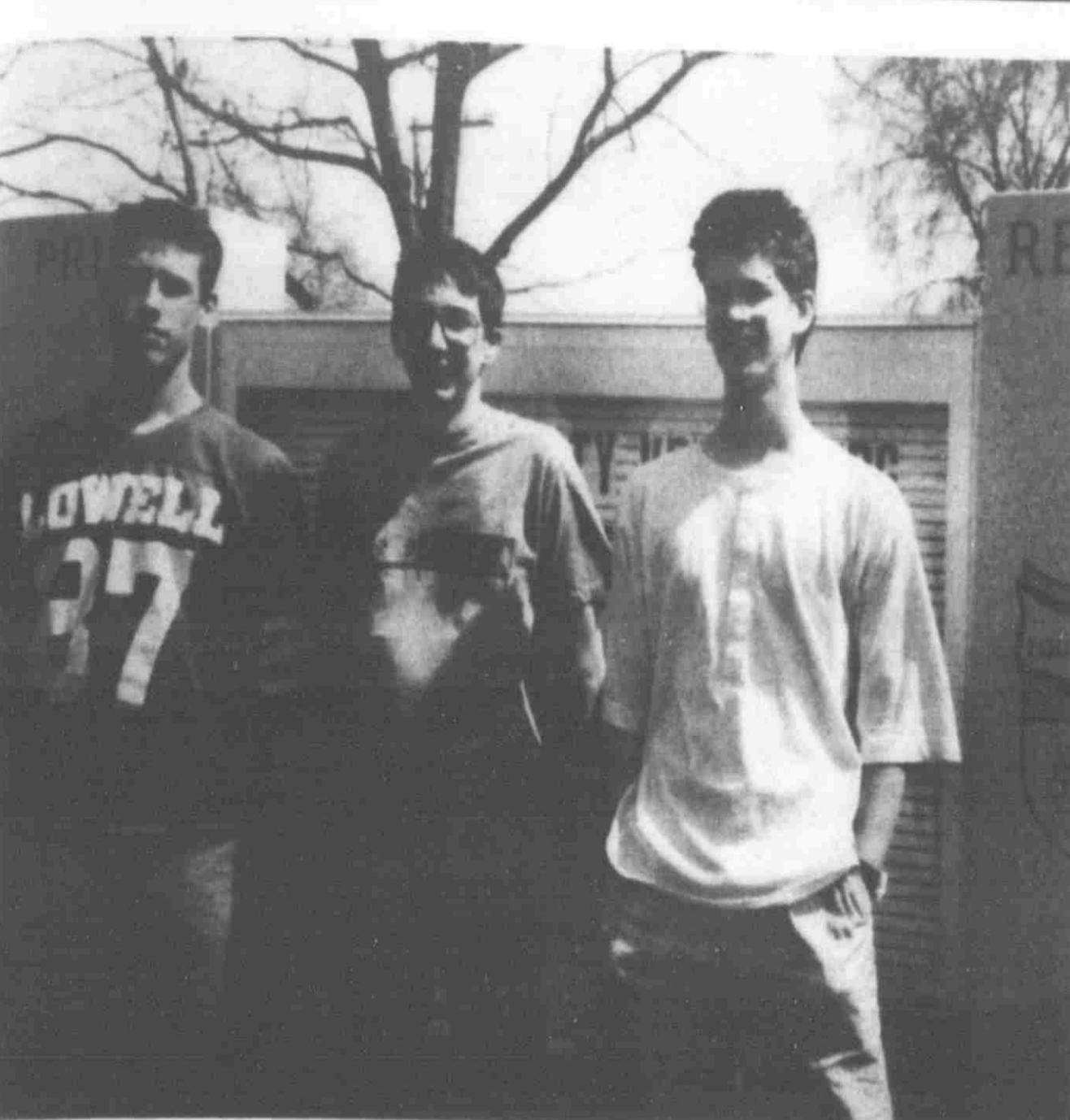

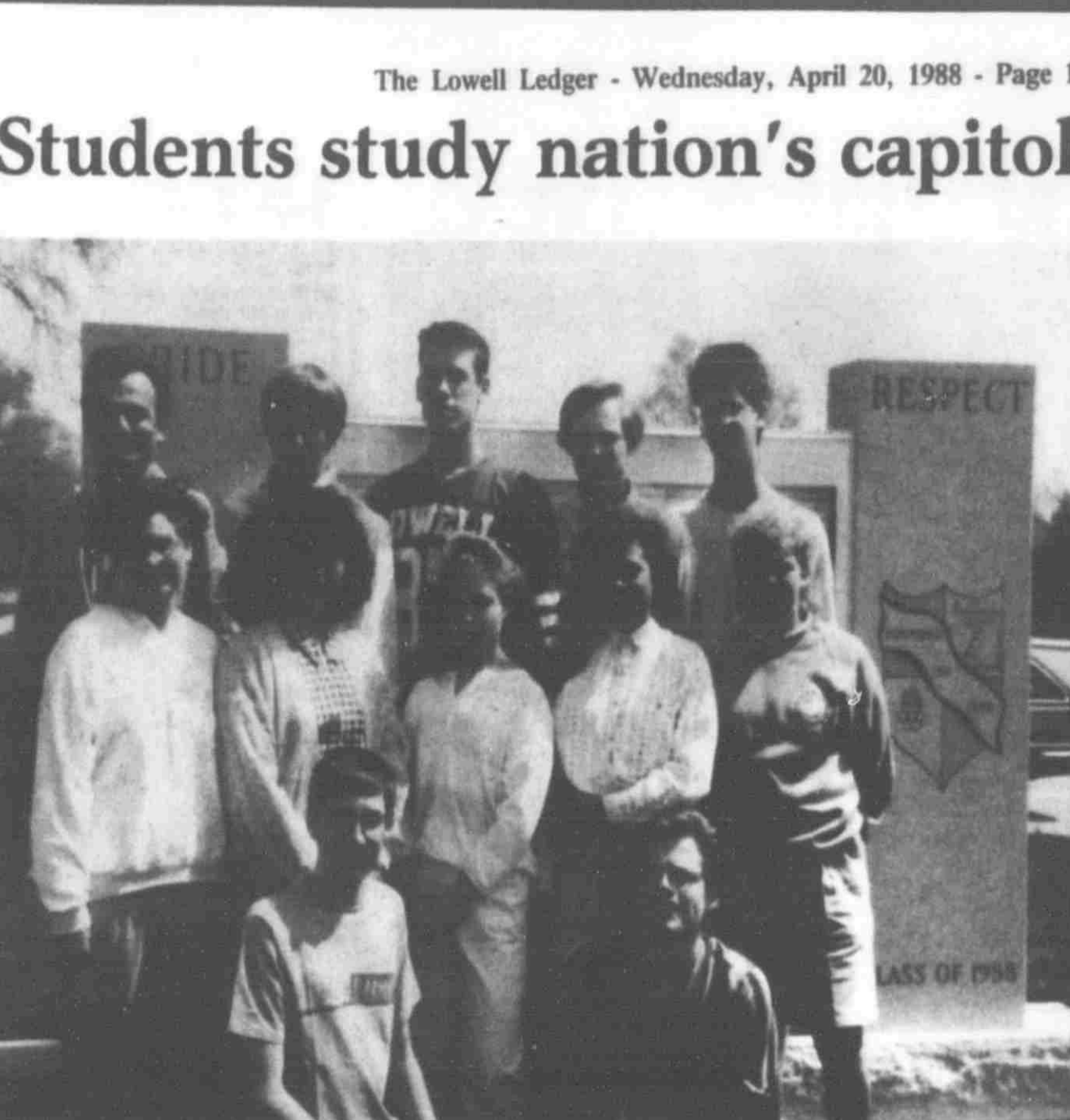

Lowell fell behind 4-0 to the Vikings from Tri County and their hurler Dana Spence.

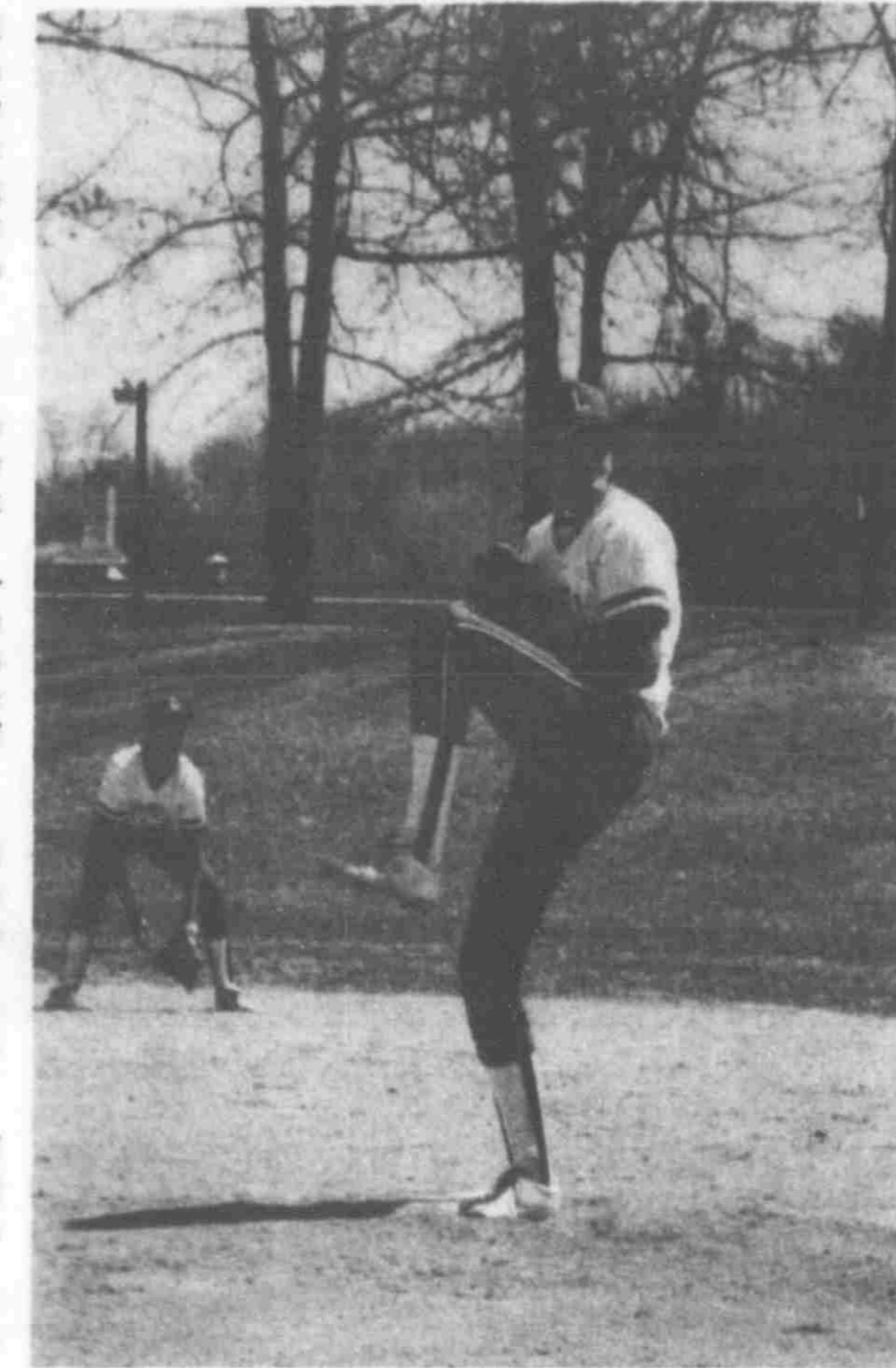
Lowell cut that deficit in half in the fourth on a walk, an RBI single by Jerry Goggins and a couple of fielder's choices.

Debbie Adams in the 400-meter dash as she finished third. Teammate, Hildenbrand, was first with a time of 1:05.8.

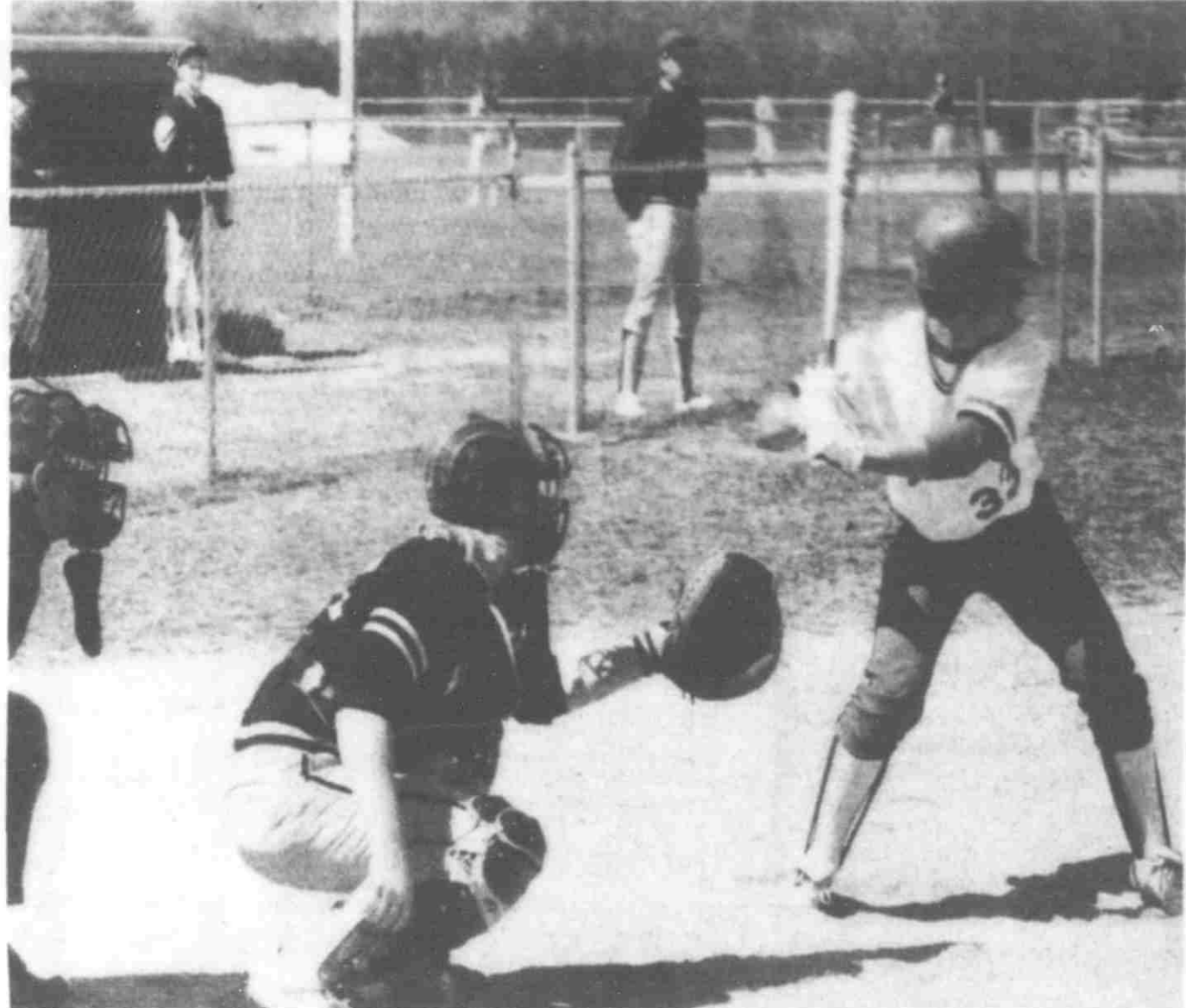

Councilmember Thompson asked if any type of survey was done on adding the new stations. Herb Haines, Superintendent of Lowell Light and Power, stated that he conducted a survey in September, 1987. He said that 53% of the respondents would be interested to subscribe if Lowell Cable TV offered PASS. Mr. Haines felt that the previous increases were not enough to cover present costs. Mr. Christiansen told the Council that the Cable TV Board added PASS and Discovery to Basic as a more cost effective measure rather than making them premium channels.

An agreement was reached to raise salaries 4.5% for the one to four year levels of the Patrolmen as well as the Sergeant position. The first two salary levels of the Patrolmen position would remain the same.

Councilmember Thompson also stated that further development of the Riverside Drive parking lot is necessary. Councilmember Collins mentioned that the City should start to develop the gravel pit area south of Bowes Road as a park. He felt the area should be available to the public. City Manager Pasquale said he would check into this and report back at the next meeting.

Item No. 10. Manager's Report. The report included the following six items:

1. City Manager Pasquale informed the Council that at the March 28 Planning Commission meeting three site plans were reviewed: Keiser's Kitchen expansion, McDonalds, and Lowell Auto Wash. The Commission has a three hour training session with Robert Hotaling from the Michigan Municipal League on Tuesday, May 24th from 7-10 p.m.
2. Police Chief Emmons, Scott Smith (City Attorney's office) and City Manager Pasquale met with Judge White on March 31 to discuss the loitering problem on Main Street.
3. As of April 1, the City had sent out 42 applications for new and replaced sidewalks and have received 21 back. With the proposed City work (Richard's Park), over 3,000 lineal feet of sidewalk construction has been proposed.
4. On Mayor Exchange Day, it has been suggested that the City of Parchment come to Lowell on Wednesday, May 25th and on Thursday, May 26th Lowell travels to Parchment. The Council approved the dates as suggested.
5. The Airport Board met for the first time on March 29th. The Board toured the GRSBM facilities and future agenda items were discussed. The next meeting was scheduled for May 10th at 7:00 p.m.
6. The owners of the burned out building at the corner of West Main and South Center have expressed interest in re-building.
