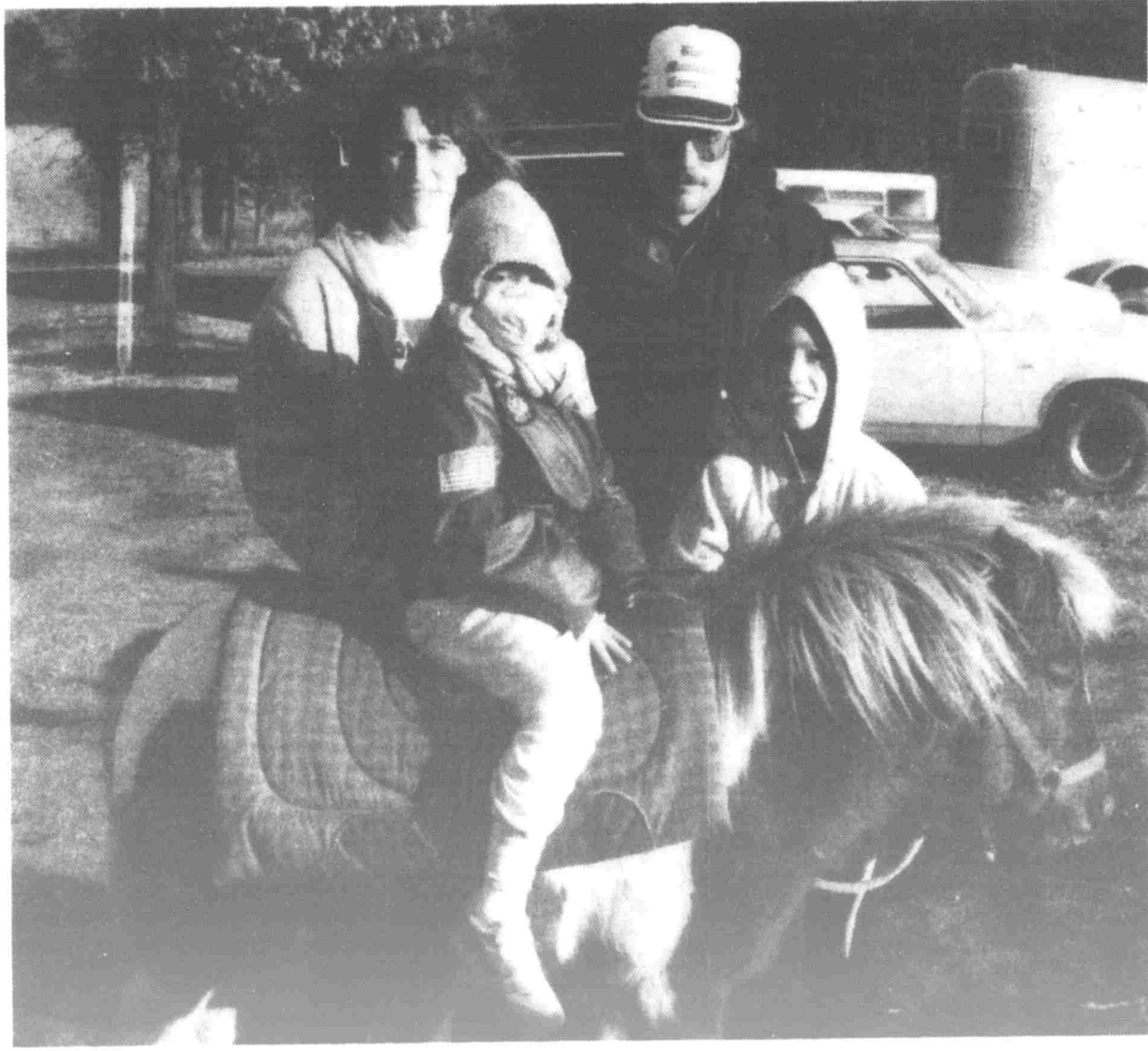

## Bieri retires from Township position

After serving 15 years as trustee on the Vergennes Township Board, Rich Bieri has stepped down to make room for younger blood and new ideas.

Roughly 40 people attended an open house Tuesday, Nov. 29 to say "Thank You" to Bieri for his outstanding and dedicated service to Vergennes Township from 1973-88 as a board trustee.

Bieri also spent five years as a member of the board of review. He is currently serving in his 13th year on the Vergennes Township Planning Commission.

Bieri's interest in the board and its duties was first tapped 21 years ago by the then Supervisor Fred Roth. "He got me started," Bieri explains. "I've decided to quit now while people still appreciate me."

The Lowell excavator has enjoyed his work with the current board; Jim Cook, Supervisor; Al Baird, trustee; Carol Nauta, treasurer; and Jean Hoffman, clerk.

"I also enjoyed the zoning and building plans involved in being on the board," he said. "It pleases me that the master plan will be finalized come February or March. I think with this plan the township will be set up for another 10 years."

The 1945 Lowell graduate is not surprised by the lack of outside interest at the meetings. "People are not interested until there's a problem or until they want something," Bieri said.

Roger Roberts, chairman of the planning committee, took the spot vacated by Bieri. The change took effect Nov. 20.

Bieri has been married to his wife, Phyllis, for 35 years. The couple has four children, Janet, Virginia, Nancy and Dale. Bieri said, "I would like to see the Vergennes Township Board continue along the same way - it's doing a good steering job."

The following is a letter received by Principal of Lowell High School from the Department of Civil Rights, State of Michigan:

Dear Mr. Korb: This will acknowledge receipt of your letter regarding the listing of the Lowell Red Arrows in the Appendix as a Michigan high school with an Indian-related name. You have also enclosed copies of materials with the Red Arrow logo.

You have also enclosed a brief history of the team name. The history does establish some connection to Indian names during the mid-40's but distinguishes this use after 1947. Your explanation regarding the identification with the Red Arrow Division is a rational one and it appears that your logos reflect this interpretation.

Your school was listed because other schools have related to color of red (and maroon) to Indian culture and people and to implements of war which are commonly identified with Indians.

Please monitor any future use of the logo to make sure that the military based concept is maintained. You may also wish to monitor the characterization of the logo in the context of fight songs, skits and cheers, because caricatures of American soldiers may also offend community sensibilities.

We will remove Lowell from the list of schools in the final printed edition of the report which will be issued in the next few weeks.

Thank you for your response and the work you committed to developing the history of the school name.

Several years ago I dug in my heels, and vowed to lose some weight. I had quit smoking, gained an extra 20 pounds that I really didn't need, and was determined to take it off. I even went so far as to write my weekly column about my plan to lose weight, and boldly published my poundage at the top of the column every week. The first few weeks went along alright. I experienced some moderate weight loss, and proudly published my weight as promised.

I soon began to slip back into my bad eating habits, the weight crept back up, and the idea was scrapped before total humiliation was achieved.

I've dug in my heels several times since, and each time I have more weight to dig them in with. Three weeks ago, my wife talked me into joining a "Weight Watchers" "At-Work" program where she works. There are 18 women and myself in the program. I've been told there is another guy in the class, but so far he hasn't shown his face. So, every Tuesday, I attend the weigh-in and listen to the counselor tell all those women how men lose weight faster. Talk about incentive.

Everybody thinks we're nuts to begin a weight-loss program here at the beginning of the holidays. I figure I'll be doing good just to maintain my weight if things continue the way they've gone so far. The very first week on the program Terese and I were faced with a dinner party in honor of a friend's 60th birthday. There's nothing like a big steak, baked potato, dessert and an open bar to knock the props out from under a diet plan. We did pretty well, in spite of the temptations, and we both weighed in the following Tuesday with significant weight losses. The next week was horrible.

We were served roast pork, mashed potatoes, gravy, dressing... the works, at Rotary on Wednesday. Terese was faced with a smorgasbord luncheonette dinner for one of the girls at work. Thursday was Thanksgiving at my Mother's. Friday night the kids ordered pizza, and it smelled better than any pizza ever made. We attended a wedding Saturday morning, followed by a big sit-down breakfast brunch reception. Later in the day I tended bar for cocktails at the home of the bride and groom. Still later in the day we attended a Thanksgiving dinner at my mother-in-law's home. On Monday we hosted a going-away-dinner for the newlywed friends who were moving to Washington state.

I would be lying if I told you Terese and I followed our program flawlessly throughout all that. In fact, we fell right off the wagon and were run over on a couple of occasions. Still, when weigh-in rolled around on Tuesday, I had lost a half pound and Terese was down another two pounds. We were both even at seven and a half pounds each in two weeks. Considering the parties we had attended, it's lucky we weren't up that much.

Today is Tuesday, and time for our weekly weigh-in. I weighed myself this morning, and if my calculations are correct, I should be down another two, possibly three pounds. That should put me real close to a ten pound loss in three weeks. Ten pounds may not seem like much to you. If not, try this little trick. Have your butcher weigh out ten pounds of chicken fat in a plastic bag for you. Then carry that bag around all week. Then see if you don't agree that ten pounds is a pretty significant hunk of blubber.

According to "Weight Watchers" height to weight chart, I should weigh between 158 and 189 pounds. I haven't weighed 158 since the third grade. In my opinion, the other end of the scale is even out of reach. Realistically, I'm aiming for 200 to 205 pounds. That would be about a sixty pound total weight loss. Now, imagine walking around with that ten pound bag of chicken fat, plus a fifty pound bag of dog food over your shoulder. That gives you an idea of the burden I'm hoping to get rid of over the next six months or so.

I'm not making any promises in print, but when you see my picture at the top of my column again, you'll know I've reached my goal.

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There is also a 3rd choice everyday of a chef salad for the middle and high school.

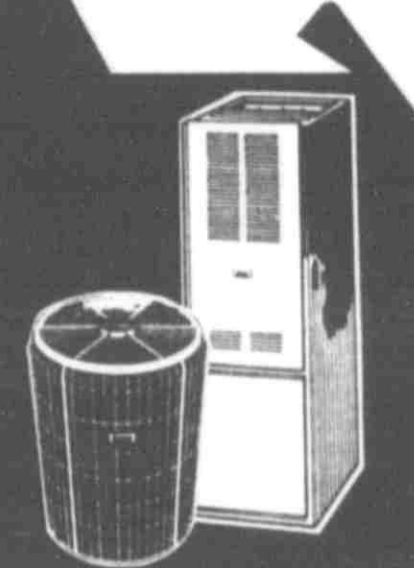

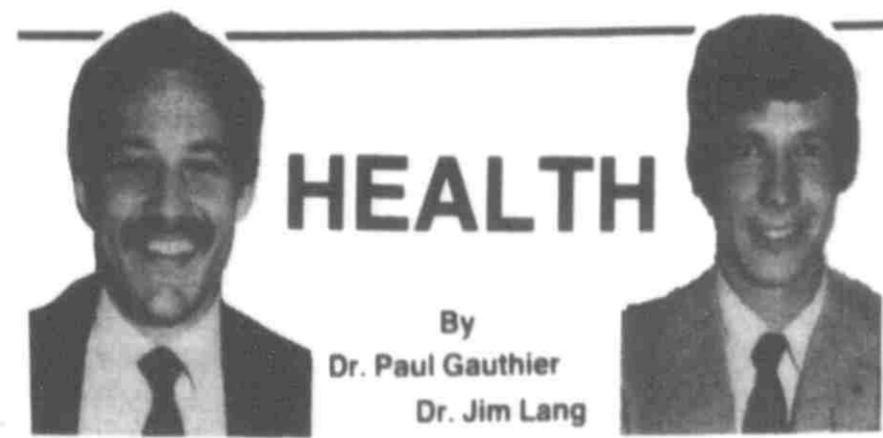
## Lowell Middle School students adorn "The Giving Tree"

#### PMS-SYMPTOMS AND TREATMENT OPTIONS

The Premenstrual Syndrome (PMS) has been well identified over the last fifteen years. In fact, it was first categorized as a medical syndrome back in 1931, but was not adequately addressed by the medical community until the last two decades.

There does not appear to be a well described definition of PMS, rather it is a myriad of physical, emotional and behavioral changes that cluster uniquely within each woman, and vary widely in their intensity and timing. The classic symptoms of PMS seem to emerge in most women ten to fourteen days before the onset of menses. The huge array of symptoms may include irritability, mood changes, bloating, weight gain, breast tenderness and headache. These symptoms tend to abate within a few days after the onset of menses and should be absent for at least one week during the menstrual cycle.

There does not seem to be a single discernable cause for PMS. Many potential causes have been investigated. These include ovarian hormone imbalances, abnormal prolactin levels, nutritional deficiencies, alterations in glucose (sugar) intolerance, and a variety of psychosocial factors.

Once a doctor has confirmed that you are suffering from PMS, several modes of therapy can be considered. Regular exercise may reduce breast tenderness and water retention and provide an overall sense of improvement. Changes in diet may also help; women with PMS should eat three well-balanced, regular meals and a nutritional snack between meals and at bedtime. Vitamin B (Pyridoxine) 50 to 100 mg. two to three times a day has been effective in many women.

Drug therapy for PMS includes natural progesterone twice daily either as a rectal or vaginal suppository. Oral contraceptives have been tried in women with varying degrees of success. Diuretics, particularly Spironolactone, have offered quite a bit of relief to women affected with PMS. Tranquilizers and anti-depressants are used less frequently, and should only be used when there is a strong suspicion that the patient is additionally suffering from some sort of affective disorder.

PMS is a confusing, many times misunderstood female affliction. Currently, however, there is more therapy available for this syndrome than ever before.

The street has been badly in need of repair. But since King Milling uses the roadway almost extensively, it was questionable to allocate City funds for upgrading.

Item No. 3. **DISCUSSION OF WEST M-21 TRAFFIC LIGHT.** City Manager Pasquale mentioned that there have been continuing problems for motorists to enter into the West Main Street traffic stream. The State has so far not approved the installation of a traffic light on M-21, nor have they approved any decrease in speed limits. City Manager Pasquale also said that the State is concerned over Main Street parking in the downtown area. He urged the council to begin preparation of strategy for downtown parking should the State force the issue.

Chief of Police Emmons addressed the Council with his observations. He stated that a traffic light is needed at West Main and Center Street intersection. This intersection is the last four-way intersection heading west out of town. A traffic light at that corner could be used by Valley Vista residents wishing to access Main Street as well as traffic from Bowes Road. He noted it has been argued that traffic lights cause accidents, because they force traffic to stop and start again. Chief Emmons pointed out that it is true a large percentage of the City's accidents occur at the existing traffic light, but only one personal injury accident has occurred there all year. On the other hand, a large number of accidents on West Main are spread out over a larger area. But a very large percentage of these have involved personal injury, and even fatalities, because of the higher speed. High speed traffic leaves few safe gaps into which motorists can enter. A vast majority of accidents on West Main are caused by motorists becoming impatient. Chief Emmons also felt that the proposed West Main Street widening would only serve to speed up traffic and worsen the problem.

Several Councilmembers questioned the need for a light. They stated that a patient driver can gain access to West Main, and acknowledged that it is best to avoid the area between 3:30 and 6:00 in the afternoon. The basic problem is speed, and the State has the final say in the posting of speed limits on M-21.

City Manager Pasquale said that the State Transportation Department is currently finalizing a speed study of West Main and the results are expected soon. The Consensus of the Council was to defer further discussion of the problem until the study is completed.

Item No. 4. **MONTHLY REPORTS.** No comments provided from the Council from the materials provided.

2. In order to close out the Sewer Rehabilitation job by Nagel Construction, a final change order that decreases the contract price \$38.40 is necessary. The final contract for Nagel amounted to \$86,104.20.

## Council OK's site for fire station

Lowell City Councilmen seemed able to agree on only one thing at Monday's meeting, and that was to disagree. After hearing a review and subsequent proposal on a location for a new public safety building, a South Hudson St. site was selected by a three to two vote. Mayor James Maatman was forced to break the deadlock.

A new public safety garage has been a priority project for some time. The recent acquisition of a new fire truck and the introduction of Lowell Ambulance Service has left emergency vehicles literally, "out in the cold". Lowell fire trucks are currently stationed in three loca-

tions, and have pushed police and D.P.W. vehicles out of space previously designated for them. The proposed five bay, drive-thru fire station would house the ambulance service and the four primary trucks in the fire department's fleet. Small sleeping quarters for the on-duty ambulance drivers will also be designed into the 8,700 sq. ft. building.

Lowell City Manager David Pasquale says no monetary figure has been attached to the project, but funding has been obtained for Lowell Township, Vergennes Township, the city's general fund and the Look Memorial Committee. Three sites had previously

been discussed. The South Hudson site is located south of the existing Public Works Garage in Recreation Park. The architectural engineering firm of Robert Lee Wold and Associates was hired to review the merits of all three sites, and recommended the South Hudson site. Lowell Fire Chief Frank Martin had also endorsed that location. The site ranked very high in all aspects except site development costs (much fill is required) and possible traffic obstructions (railroad tracks). Wold noted that since the Lowell Fire District is dissected by railroad tracks, that particular aspect would be a problem at any location.

Other sites under consideration were city property at the northwest corner of Sibley and Ridgeview Drives and a site just west of the existing water treatment plant on Bowes Rd. The rating system took into account area for current needs, area for expansion, area to accommodate "drive-thru" plan, geographic location, proper zoning, accessibility to major roadways, potential obstructions, compatibility with neighboring property, appropriate land use, site improvement costs and convenience and economy of shared city services (refueling maintenance, etc.). The Sibley site scored 35 of a possible 55, and the Bowes Rd. site scored 37, the Hudson St. location 44 points.

After hearing a presentation from Dan Durkee and Chuck Jylha of Robert Lee Wold and Associates, Councilman Charlie Doyle motioned that the Hudson St. site be approved. Councilman Bill Thompson seconded the motion. Councilman Jack Fonger disagreed with the decision to move so hastily, and protested making a decision at this point. Doyle asked the mayor to call for action on the motion. Doyle and Thompson voted yes while Fonger and Councilman Dean Collins voted no. A ye vote from Maatman passed the issue.

The Council finally took action on a long debated resolution in which the city will relinquish control of Hudson Street to the County Road Commission. In exchange for the Federal Highway dollars that are generated by Hudson Street, the County will assume maintenance and repairs of the Hudson Street bridge. The package also includes a letter of understanding regarding cost sharing of eventual improvements to Fun St. According to the letter, any improvements for drainage, widening, better vision or gravel surfacing would be shared 27 1/2% City of Lowell, 27 1/2% Vergennes Township and 45% County. Doyle and Thompson voted yes on the resolution, Fonger voted no and Collins abstained. Again, the mayor passed the resolution with a ye vote.

Jim Sowle owns property adjacent to the Lowell Airport, and has an access agreement with the city to pay 1 1/2 times the normal tie-down fee per airplane hangared on his property. The Lowell Airport Board recently raised tie-down fees from \$8.00 to \$20.00 per month, which in turn raised Sowle's right to use the airport to \$30.00 per month per airplane. Sowle appealed to the Airport Board to lower the rate to a simple one times the tie-down rate. The Airport Board agreed to recommend to the City Council a reduction in Sowle's contract to \$20.00 per plane per month. The Council approved the recommendation with only Thompson casting a no vote.

A proposal to vacate a portion of S. Water St. to the King Milling Co. died for lack of support. A sign variance request from Action Auto was scheduled for public hearing on Monday, December 19. The Council agreed to sign and guarantee a \$2,600 contract with WOTV to produce and air a "visit and shop in Lowell" promotion. The request came from Lowell merchant Brenda Schaefer, who told the Council she has 37 merchants signed up to pay for the promotion.

In his manager's report, Pasquale informed the Council that the City of Marshall had accepted an invitation to exchange mayors in May of 1989. Pasquale told the Council that Mike Jones of the Michigan Department of Transportation hopes to have an M-21 traffic study ready for presentation in January.

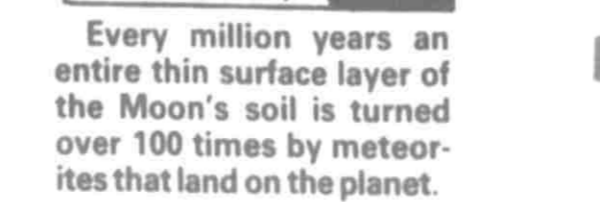

HELPFUL HINTS FROM EXPERTS AT CREDIT UNION NATIONAL ASSOCIATION

**How to Design Your Own Budget**

Budgeting needn't mean having less—it means doing more with what you have! Here are several suggestions to help you design your own budget and avoid financial trouble.

- Use your share draft or check book register and current bills to determine your small and large expenses over time.
- Figuring expenses on a yearly basis can help you gain perspective on smaller expenses. For example, if you spend a dollar each working day on two cans of soda, it can add up to \$250 a year! When you see the sum from a small cost item over a year, you may want to cut back.
- Once you're able to find some fat in your budget, don't make the mistake of saying you'll save what's left over—that means you won't save at all. Instead, decide on a goal (a vacation? a new car?) and put enough money aside weekly or monthly to meet your down payment. Or decide how much you'll need, then meet your goal by arranging for payroll deduction at your credit union.
- Include an entertainment category. If your plan doesn't make room for fun, you won't stick with it.
- You can spend and be thrifty by using credit wisely. However, as a rule of thumb, your personal debt-to-income ratio should be under 20 percent of take-home pay for installment credit. When you include rent or mortgage, the ratio should be no more than 40 percent of your take-home pay.
- If you have trouble making monthly rent or mortgage payments, try putting aside half each payday if you're paid bi-weekly, or one-quarter if you're paid weekly.

**Rivers, grapplers look to fill graduation void**

**Red Arrows strong at both ends of scale**

There's a void left in the Lowell wrestling program by the loss of four impact wrestlers (Mark Anderson, Kyle Gildea, Tom Nugent and Mike Rivers) to graduation.

For many programs the loss of 173 wins and 98 pins would hint that a less than competitive year is in the offing. Many schools, however, don't have the wrestling program that Lowell wrestling coach Gary Rivers has established in 29 years at Lowell High School.

"I look forward to the challenge of coaching and finding new kids to fill those spots," Lowell wrestling coach Gary Rivers said.

One of the new kids on the block will be freshman Todd Swanson, a wrestler Rivers has watched progress through Lowell's freestyle program and the Middle School wrestling program.

While the mentor of 29 years may be looking into the eyes of some fresh faces this year, he has a quartet of wrestlers returning who posted some quality numbers last year. Tony Stepek, one of four captains for 1988-89, didn't get a lot of ink a year ago, thanks to the big three (Gildea, Nugent and Rivers) but his numbers speak loudly. He recorded 35 victories, of which 33 were pins.

Add to that list of 1987-88 quiet achievers the names of Todd Nauta and Bart Olin (1988-89 captains). Both wrestlers were responsible for 32 victories apiece last year.

Then there's the only returning Red Arrow conference champ from last year, Aaron Adams. The quad-captain recorded 28

wins, 21 of which were by pin.

A year ago the Red Arrow strength was in the middle weight classes, Rivers added he felt the team's strength in 1988-89 would be at the ends - 130 and 150 pounds.

Kirkbride and Chad Hull. Other matmen expected to contribute include Craig Mersman and Jon Pratt.

"We have a lot of good athletes at Lowell," Rivers added. Although Rivers has been offered other wrestling coaching positions over his 29 years that have a constant (good athletes) has kept him at LHS.

"This year's club should be as good or stronger a dual team as last year's," Rivers said. "We may not be as strong a tournament team as in the past."

Rivers, an advocate of the team tournament more than the individual tournament that follows the regular season, believes that Lowell can put 13 wrestlers on the mat that are as good or better than most schools. "I still believe that having both the individual and team tournaments on rotating weekends is too much," Rivers realizes his Red Arrows have a big gap to fill in 1988-89, but after talking to Rivers, one senses that the gap will be closed come Dec. 8.

Rivers doesn't see a change coming. "There are enough coaches who like the individual tournament that it will continue," he said.

The Lowell coach likes Zeeland, Northview, Sparta and his Red Arrows to be among the O-K White Conference elite. "Zeeland has a very strong program.

# Lowell basketball will run at "Race Horse" speed

Putting 12 players in a position where they are able to contribute; establishing a continuity of good work ethics; and establishing pride in their work are the immediate aims of first-year Lowell boys' high school basketball coach Mark Thomas.

"I want our young men to establish some confidence, to feel like they're an important and positive member in the Red Arrow basketball program," Thomas said. "As a coach it's my job to treat everyone with respect."

Thomas, who prefers to teach not coach, admits he has been influenced a great deal by the way Phil Christensen has run the Lowell football program.

"If the players aren't taught in practice how to get open, how to react to certain situations, you can't expect them to make the correct choices in a game," Thomas said. "Practice should be tougher than games. That way there are no surprises."

One choice the first-year coach won't encounter is whether to take a jump shot or go inside to a big man. If there is one thing the 1988-89 Lowell team isn't, that is big. The tallest player comes in at 6-4 - Dennis Wissman. "We will live and die by the outside shot," Thomas said.

"I prefer to turn that negative into a positive, while the players may not be big, the Red Arrows are good athletes and have good mobility," Thomas said. "With our athletes and mobility we may be able to run by the big men."

Thomas described the 1988-89 style as "race horse" basketball. The offense will be a motion and passing style, while the defense will consist of man-to-man pressure. "Which means we will play 12 men, enabling us to keep the pressure on. We don't want the opposition's offense manipulating us."

"I want to develop a team concept where the team comes first

over everything else no matter what the player's role is," Thomas said.

There are no seniors returning with starting experience from a year ago. Pete Kemp and Tim Weststrate are the only two players who saw substantial game experience.

If the outside shot determines Lowell's fate, then Thomas will need big years from Weststrate and Jason Douma. "They are our best two shooters," Lowell's coach said.

State of Wyoming transfer Joel Manion and senior peer Jeff Gurney should also help in the leadership role.

# Consumers Power warns of hypothermia

As temperatures dip down around the freezing mark, Consumers Power Company has issued an alert about hypothermia, or low body temperature.

Temperatures so not have to be extremely low for hypothermia to be a threat, says Vern R. Hatch, Alma/Greenville District Manager for Consumers Power. Most hypothermia victims suffer the problem at temperatures between 30 and 50 degrees, he says.

Older adults are more susceptible because they have difficulty conserving body heat. However, infants and individuals weakened by injuries or diseases may also be at risk, Hatch notes.

For most people, mild exposure to cold will not cause hypothermia because their bodies' defenses are equal to the task. The average normal body temperature is 98.6 degrees Fahrenheit. A body temperature below 95 degrees is considered hypothermic.

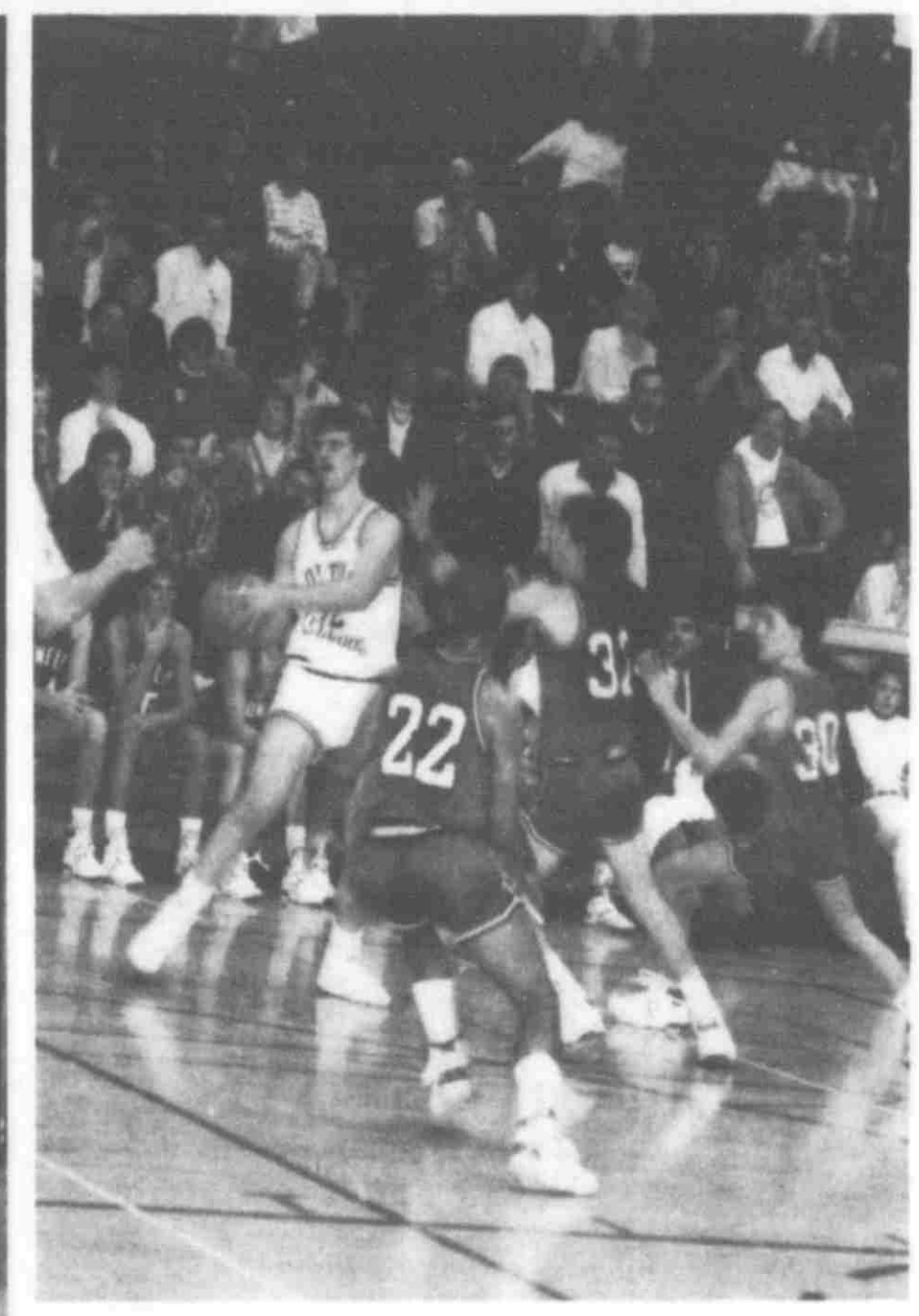
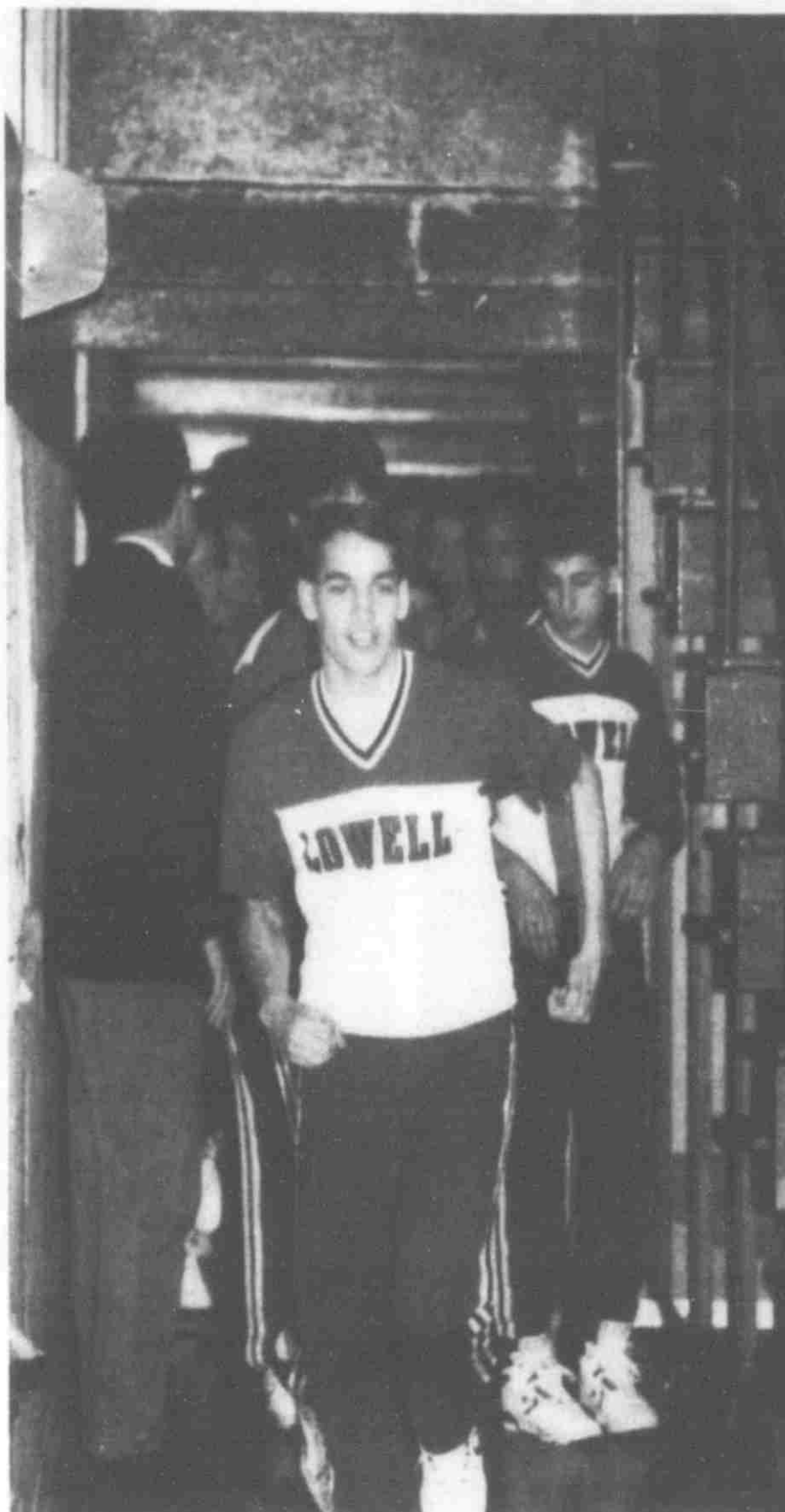
The condition requires medical attention because it can endanger the victim, even to the point of being fatal.

Hatch suggested some signs that could indicate hypothermia: \* Cool or cold skin, particularly on the stomach, lower back, arms, legs, hands and feet. The skin may be very pale, but also may have large, irregular blue or pink spots with a puffy or swollen face sometimes accompanied by a fine trembling on one side of the body or in a limb. \* Slowed breathing and heart rate, perhaps to the point of being difficult to detect. \* Mental confusion or disorientation. \* Decreased physical energy and activity. \* Irritable, hostile or aggressive behavior.

If no professional medical help is readily available, Hatch recommends the following: \* Insulate the person's head and neck; use blankets, quilts, clothing or whatever is available as covering. Don't try to have the

person remove or put on additional clothing. \* Do not try to rewarm the person; techniques such as a hot bath or shower can cause shock and heart failure. Rewarming is a complicated process and should be done only by trained medical personnel. \* Do not try to administer food or liquids and be very gentle. Hatch says that dressing properly and getting good nutrition are vital to avoiding hypothermia. He urges having hot, nourishing meals and warm beverages and wearing loose layered clothing and a hat and neck scarf. Taking such precautions will minimize the risks of hypothermia, he says.

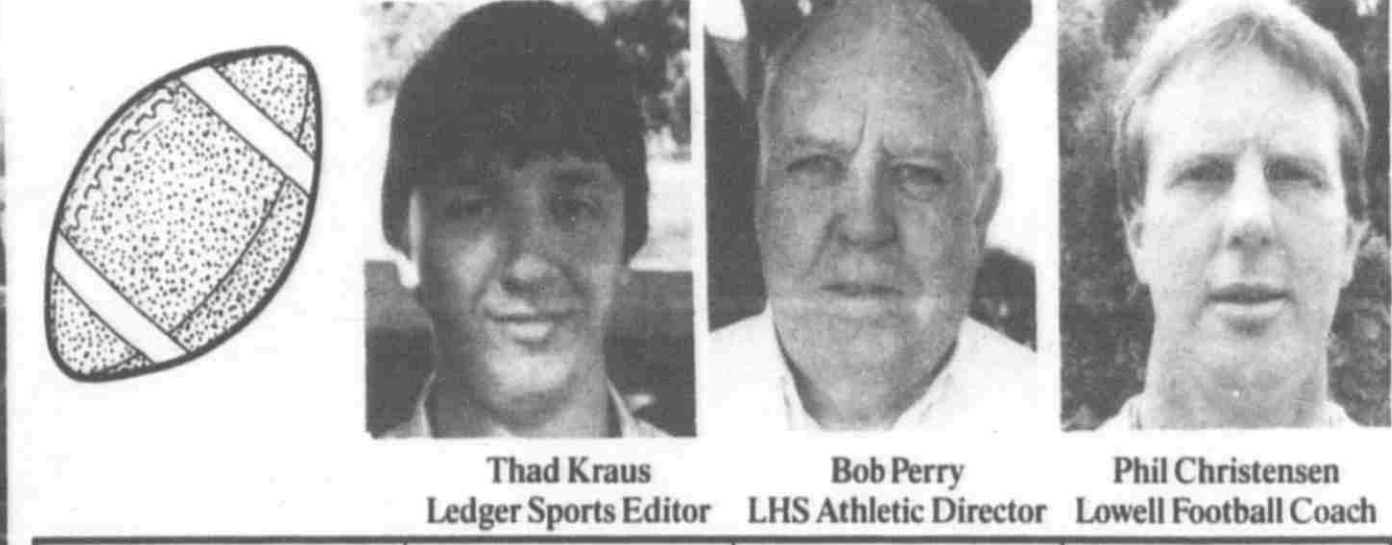

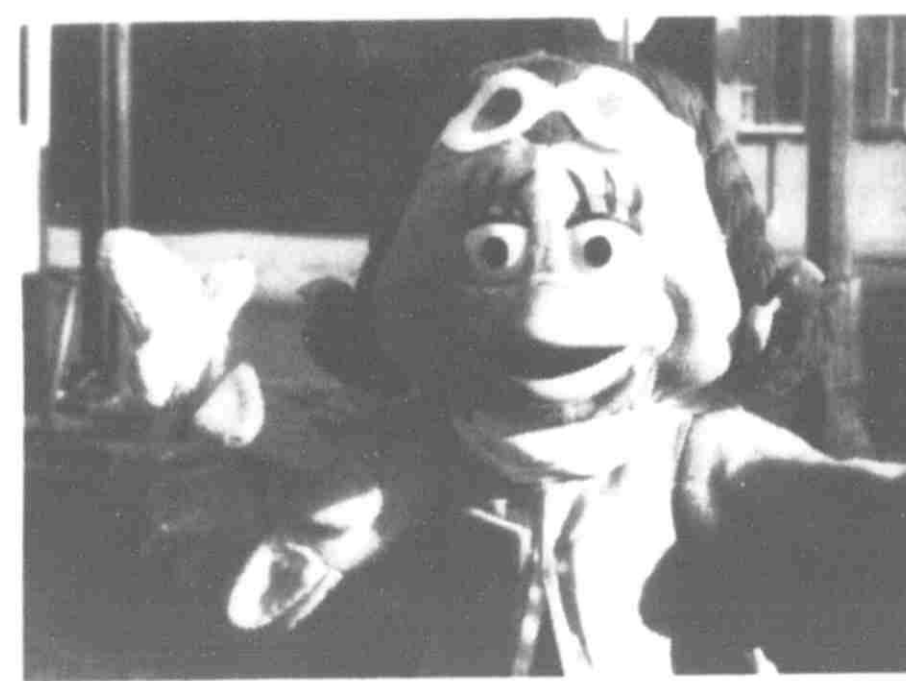

**100 YEARS AGO IN THE JOURNAL - DEC. 7, 1888**

# New Waste Water Treatment Plant cleanses water

Lowell's \$5.7 million new waste water treatment plant is completed except for painting and some minor details.

The installation of the secondary plant, replacing the primary plant, is removing 95-98 percent of all the pollutants. Prior to being put in only 25-30 percent of the pollutants were removed before being returned to the Flat River.

"The primary plant was designed as a settling tank clarifiers while the secondary plant was designed as an activated sludge process where the bacteria and

micro organisms remove pollutants from the water.

"It's nice to come in to work and be able to do your job. We were coming to work before and doing our work, but there wasn't anything we could do about the pollutants being put back into the river," Waste Water Treatment Plant Operator Frank Martin said.

The new system processes around two million gallons of water a day. The process which takes the inflow of a rusty brown substance (sludge mixed with water) and sends it back into the

Flat River "Probably cleaner than the river water," Waste Water Treatment Plant Superintendent Scott D. Smith said. "There are 100 parts per million of solids coming in and one in five are going out."

But what shape is the river in if since 1966 all but 25-30 percent of the pollutants have been put back into the river? "Many people don't realize that rivers and streams clean themselves naturally," Smith adds. "They are not hurt permanently."

He continued "It's not the waste itself that kills the life in

the streams but it's the oxygen that the waste uses up, lowering the oxygen level which in turn kills the plants and the fish

The secondary plant has bar screens which remove large de-

bris, grit, and heavy material.

The oxidation ditches do the bulk of the treatment. "It adds oxygen so that the bugs can breathe, which removes the pollutants," Smith said.

From the ditches, the water goes to the clarifiers where the water is separated from the solids. "The water flows out over the top to the chlorine contact area where it is disinfected" Smith said.

The final step flows the water down the cascade aerator and then into the Flat River.

Part of the sludge is returned to the ditch. The rest of it is taken out of the system by pumping out of the clarifiers and into the digesters where the solids are treated further and the bugs are more heavily concentrated.

From that point, it is shipped

out to farm lands and injected into the soil to grow corn.

The project was started in September of 1987 and will be fully completed in full by February of 1989. The engineering was done by Fishbach, Thompson, Carr and Huber. The general contracting work was done by Triangle. Hertel Plumbing and Heating was the mechanical contractor while Johnson Electric took care of the electrical aspects. Lakeside Equipment out of Bartlett, Ill. designed the ditches and clarifiers.


For the general public, this new plant means the use of cleaner water, cleaner streams and better fishing.

Martin said there will be an open house for the general public in May or June of next year.
