Along Main Street

Lowell City Council and 4-H Board working to make '89 Fair a success

Lowell's City Council approved a tentative plan for the 1989 4-H Fair that has been reached with the 4-H Board regarding changes in leased areas for the Fairgrounds at Recreation Park.

Board members Red Snyder, Ron Wenger and Ray Hawkins were on hand to discuss the matter and further concerns the 4-H board may have.

One concern expressed by the 4-H members was what the city's plan is for that area over the next 10-15 years. Lowell City Manager David Pasquale said that beyond the fire barn he did not see a need on the City's part for use of the land.

Snyder said with the plans for the fire barn, the 4-H Board has reorganized and believes it still can put on a good fair. "However, the 4-H Fair will not be able to put on a good Fair for the youth if it loses much more land," he said.

A change of location for the carnival was of particular importance, since it was directly affected by the fire barn plans. The carnival grounds for the Fair will be moved from the south of the DPW building to the south of Bowes Road.

"I and other city officials have worked with the 4-H Board on the reorganization," Pasquale said. "I must say they have been most cooperative."

YMCA Board member Jim Reagan gave an update on the pool situation. Reagan noted that the pool should be ready for swimming by Friday, June 9.

Reagan also pointed out that monies remaining from the pool

project will be put in an improvement fund and used toward the pool. "Time constraints have inhibited us from sandblasting at this time," Reagan said. "However, we believe this can be done in the fall."

Dave Baerwalde updated the City Council on the H.O.O.P.S tournament scheduled for June 16-18. "Currently everything is going well. We are pleased with the support H.O.O.P.S. has received."

The 3-on-3 basketball tournament has changed its site. The tourney will be played at the Bushnell Elementary parking lot. Parking will be at the Lowell High School.

There will be 116 teams participating, that's roughly 450 players, an increase of 35 percent from last year.

Lowell Boosters and the Knights Of Columbus will provide food booths. Lowell rescue will again be on hand in case of injuries.

There will be a special appearance by Michigan State basketball star Matt Steigenga. The Grand Rapids native will be putting on a clinic from 12 until 2 p.m. on Saturday, June 17.

A water consumption rate increase was also approved by the council. The rate will increase from \$1 to \$1.50 per thousand gallons, eliminating the large user discount (over 50,000 gallons, currently 88 cents per thousand). The non-resident rate will rise from \$2 to \$2.30 per thousand. These added revenues are needed to provide a positive balance for the Water Fund and also help with the new by-pass

well and the painting and reconditioning of the waste water treatment plant.

The resolution also contains a provision requiring remote water meters. Currently, the program is voluntary, with 300 more meters to be installed. The resolution requires meters at a charge of \$15 per service as being assessed currently. "The \$15 cost is a third of the cost of the meter (\$45). The city is actually taking care of the other two-thirds," Pasquale said.

Public Works Director Tony Siciliano said it will take roughly 9 months to a year to install the rest of the meters.

In other council news:

* A variance requested for the Yogurt Station by Ivan Blough for two wall signs was approved. This will provide identification from both street and walk directions, the total amount of wall signage will be reduced from 70 to 64 square feet.

* A variance was approved to allow David Cadwallader to put an addition to garage which would attach the structure to the dwelling.

* The board deleted an ordinance that states individuals must be under the age of 17 to use a pool hall without the company of an adult. The suggestion was brought forth by Gary and Kathy Yeoman who have proposed a pool hall which will be operated at the old Pfarrer's building at 103 E. Main.

* The council adopted the operating millage and budget for the fiscal year 1989-90. In compliance with the State Truth-In-Taxation Act the council held a

hearing to set the current millage at 12.383. The levy was reduced to 11.753 mills, so that the same revenue is generated as in last year's SEV. While the current millage is retained, increases in the SEV amount to an equivalent .630 mills. These additional funds are necessary to meet the increasing costs of operation.

Local boy dies in drowning

A 2 year old youth from Vergennes Township died Friday night from complications, after falling into a family pool on Thursday evening, June 1.

Gregory Dale Williams, was pronounced dead at 6:30 p.m. at Butterworth Hospital.

The boy was missing about 5 to 10 minutes. William's father, John searched all around the home and the road before discovering his son at the bottom of the deep end of the family's new pool which had just been filled on Tuesday.

The boy was pulled from the pool and his father immediately started CPR. Lowell Rescue and Ambulance crews took over when they arrived and were able to get an erratic heartbeat again.

The child was taken to Blodgett Memorial Medical Center and then transferred to Butterworth Hospital. He was listed in very critical condition on Thursday and passed away Friday, June 2.

Williams is survived by his parents, John and Barbara Williams; his brothers, Dennis, Michael, Brian and Jerry; his sister, Cindy, all at home. Complete obituary is listed in that section of this issue of the Ledger.

He said he plans on opening other Rock Bottom stores in other small towns.

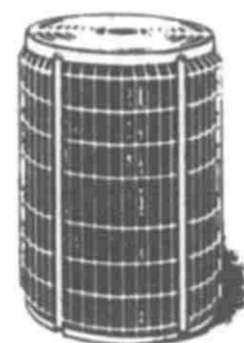

Buffalo roam the range on farm near Smyrna

At 10605 Button Road in Smyrna, a piece of history still roams over 207 acres of the countryside. At a distance the large, shaggy-maned, short-horned American Buffalo look peaceful enough, but as they sort of rumble toward Lon Heintzleman who holds an armful of corn cobs, their size becomes intimidating. They stand anywhere from 4-5 feet off the ground. Their weight varies anywhere from 2-3,000 pounds.

"I'm very cautious when I'm around them," Heintzleman warns. "Although, I trust the smaller buffalo of the four, but she is like a family pet." While Heintzleman trust all of them enough to take corn out into the field and feed them, he holds a high dosage of fear and respect for the buffalo.

Unlike cows and pigs, Heintzleman says you don't chase buffalo down. "You don't get buffalo to go in a certain direction by chasing them. I'm most effective when I'm carrying a bag of corn," he says. "Not only that, but they run at a good rate of speed for quite a distance and they can turn on a dime."

Lon and his brother Dave pooled their money together 4-5 years ago and purchased some buffalo from Johnny's Pet Farm in Cadillac. "My brother was already raising beefalo, which are a crossbreed of cattle and buffalo," Heintzleman says.

The beafalo come in various degrees. "Any cattle with over one-eighth buffalo bred into it is considered beafalo. This can be measured through the animal's bloodline," he says. Heintzleman breeds Charolais, a beef cow with his buffalo.

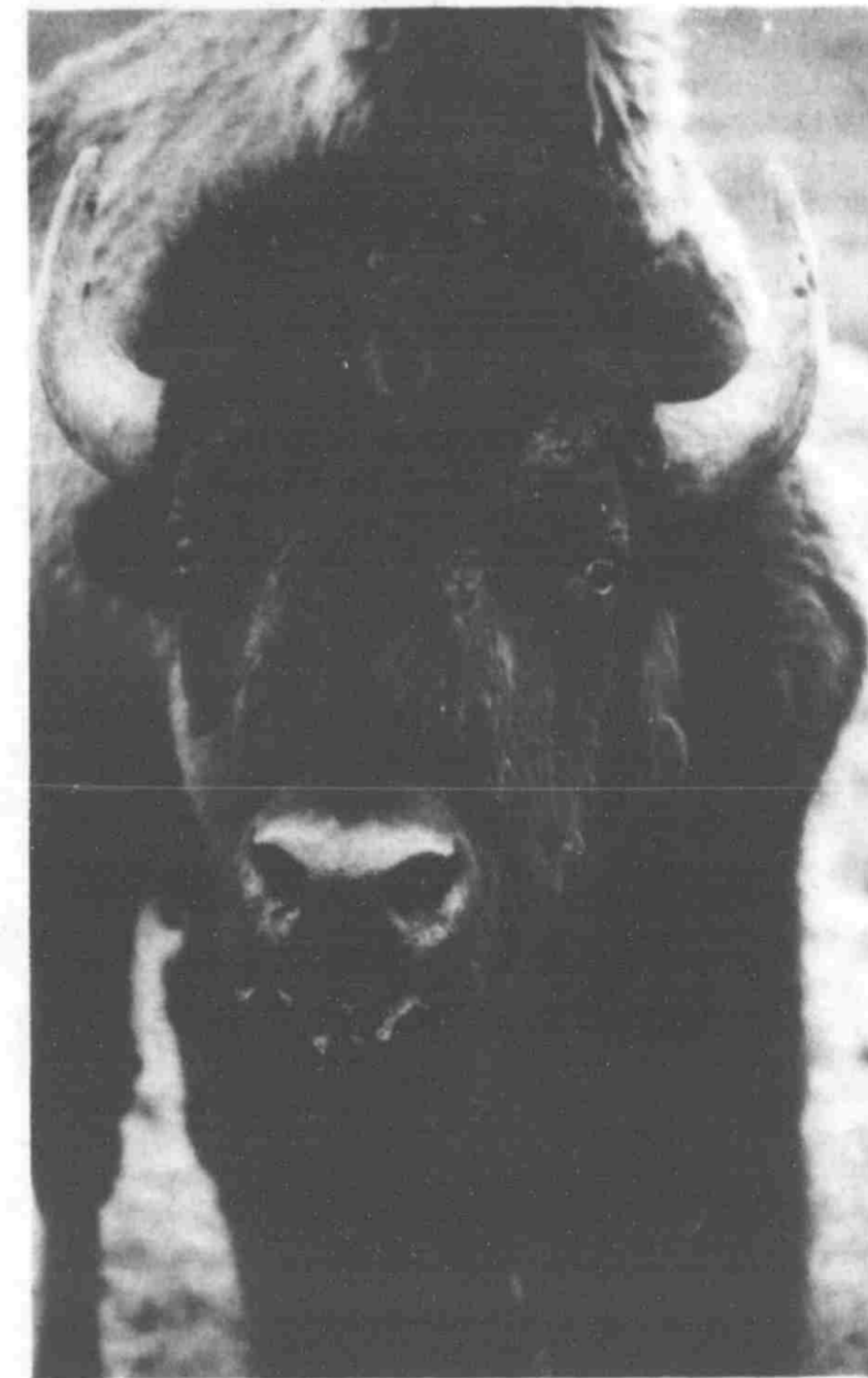
Heintzleman, who has been raising beafalo for six years, is sold on its flavor and cholesterol count. "It's got more flavor than regular hamburger and more importantly, it has low cholesterol, low fat and high protein," he says. "I no longer shop for beef in stores."

While he enjoys the flavor of beafalo, he does not care for buffalo meat. "It's a dry meat and tastes a lot like venison."

Heintzleman doesn't raise the buffalo because of his like for beafalo meat. The buffalo roam his 207 acres because he enjoys their history. "Having buffalo on your land is like owning a piece of history," he says. "I see people stop in their cars to take a look. I have people pull in our driveway when I'm out in the yard and ask questions."

Heintzleman is not alone in his thoughts. There are many small herdsman throughout the state who own a few buffalo. There are also a few big farms - e.g. The Renegade Farm in Cheboygan and Olson's (owner of the biggest herd in Michigan) in Traverse City.

The 22-year employee at Belding Tool and Die hopes to spend more time farming in his retirement. "I enjoy it. It's like a hobby," he chuckles. Other than raising cattle and buffalo, Heintzleman also grows corn, oats, wheat, alfalfa and hay.

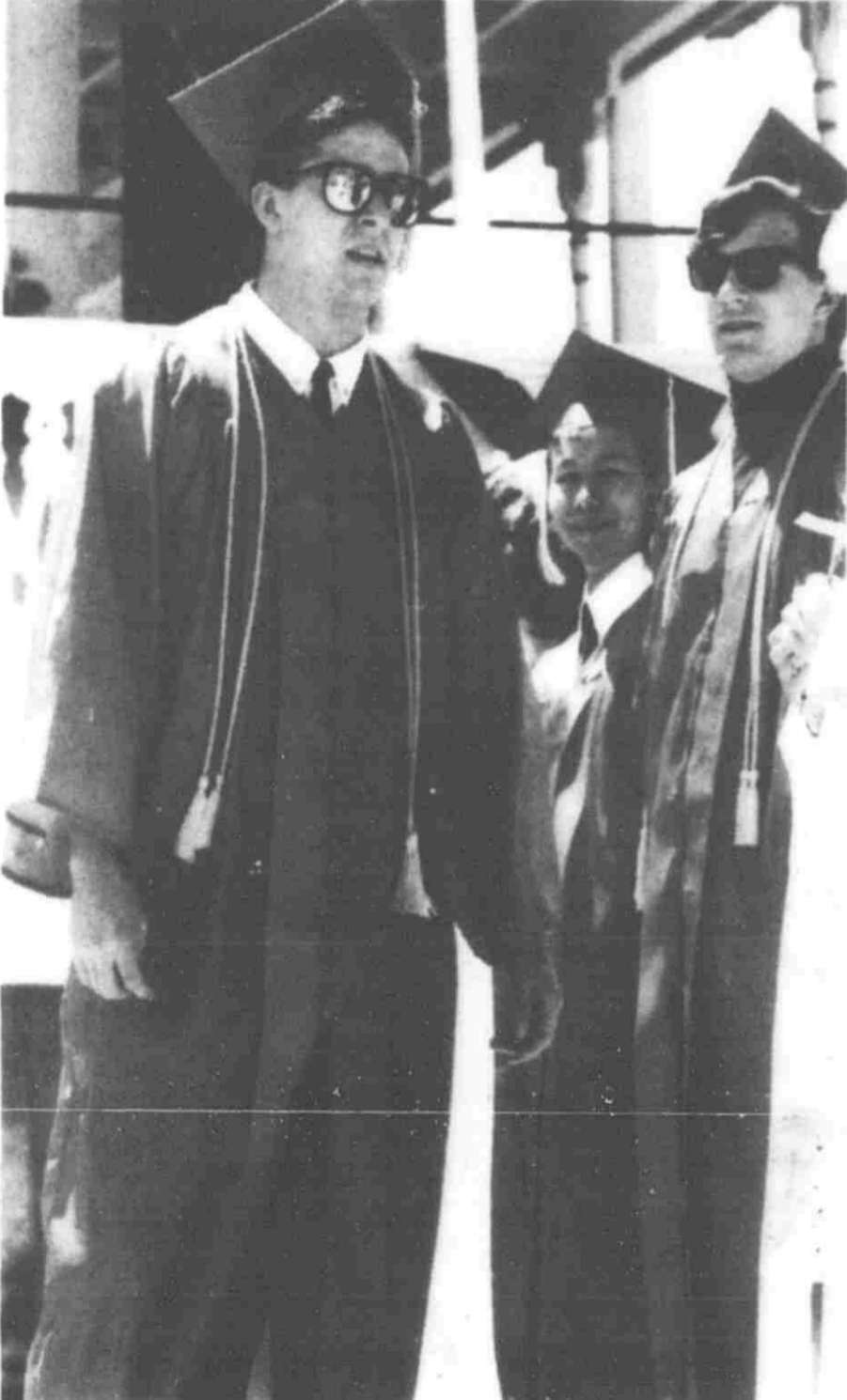

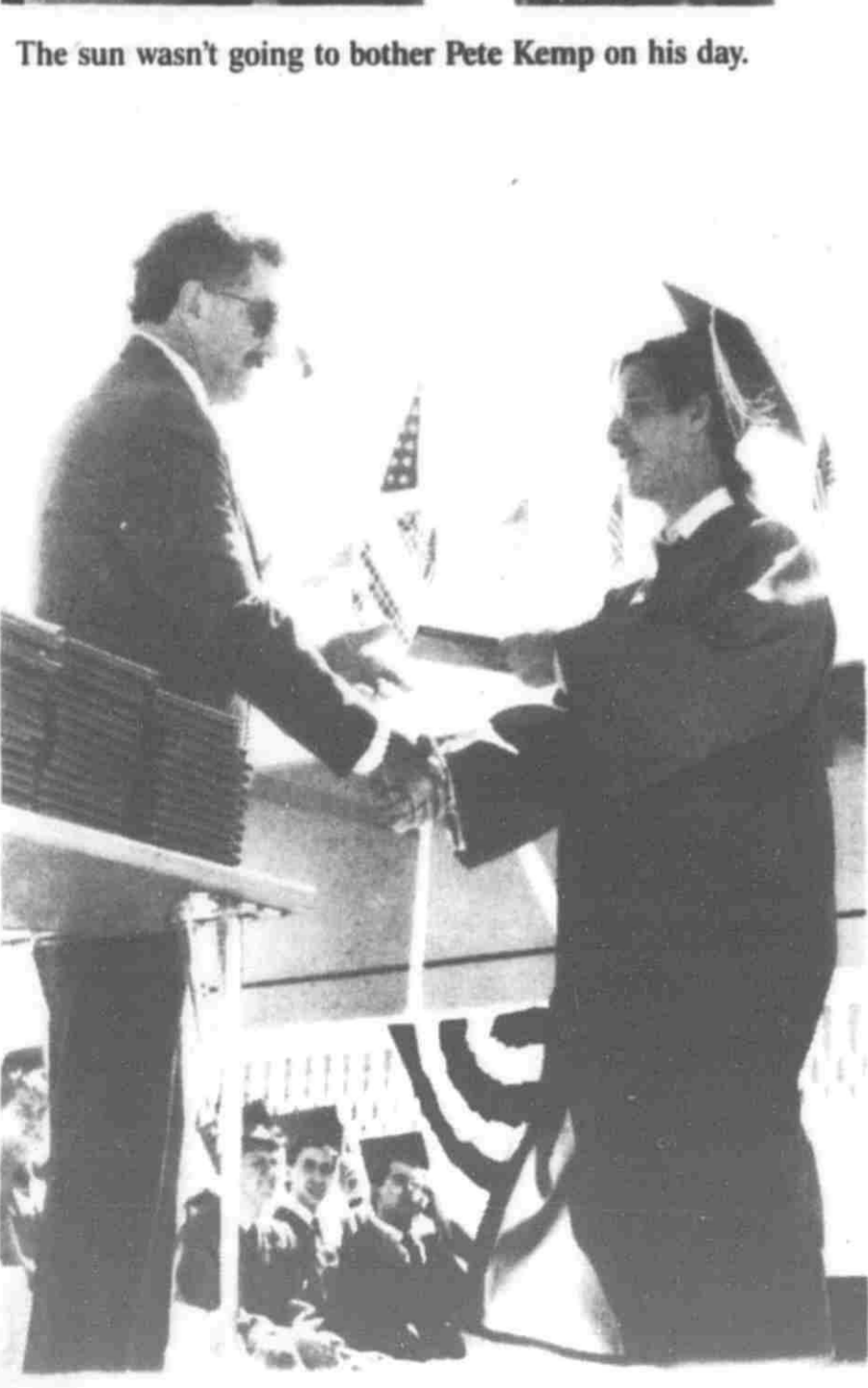

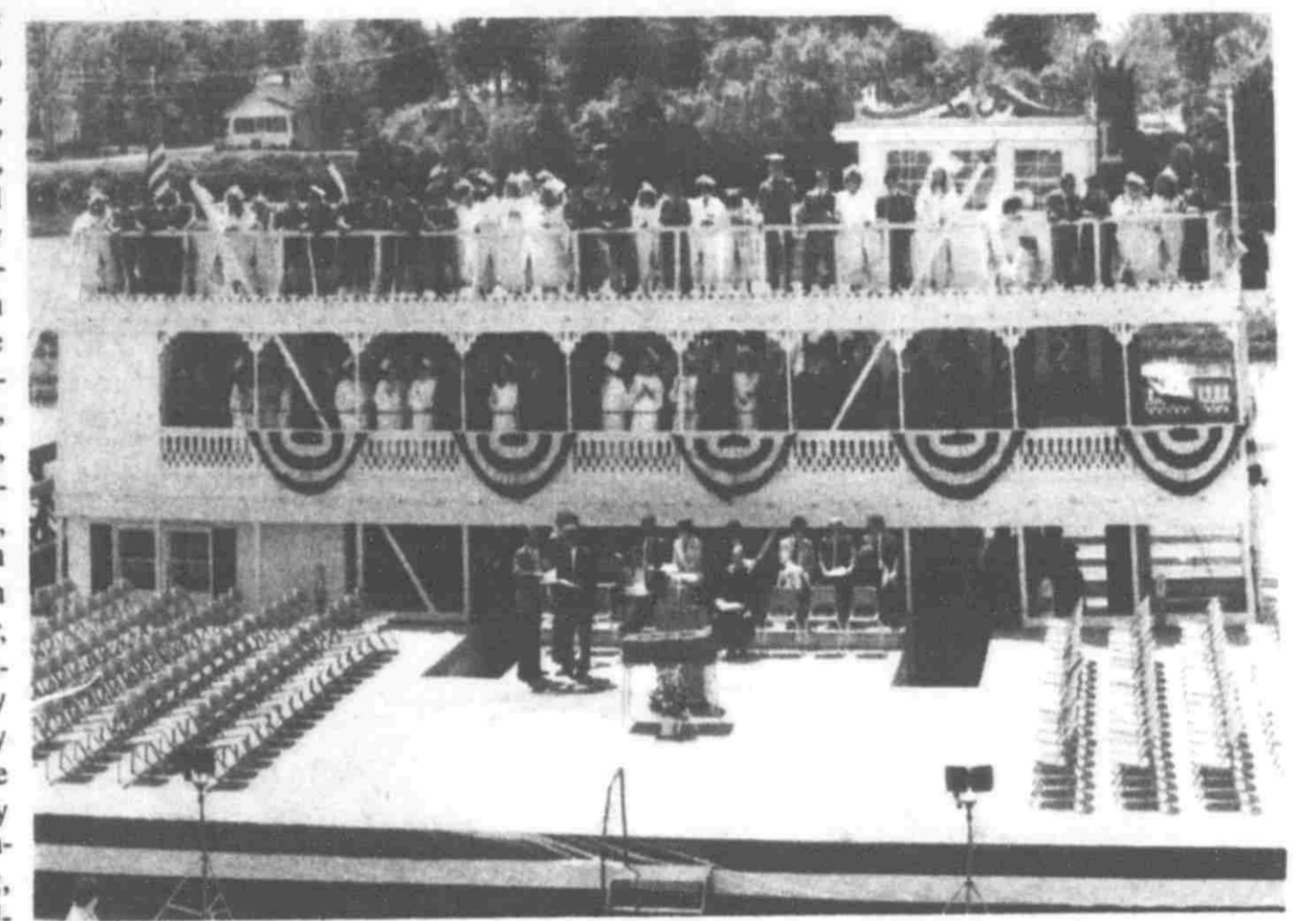

The class flower was the red rose and the class colors for 1989 were light blue, silver and black.

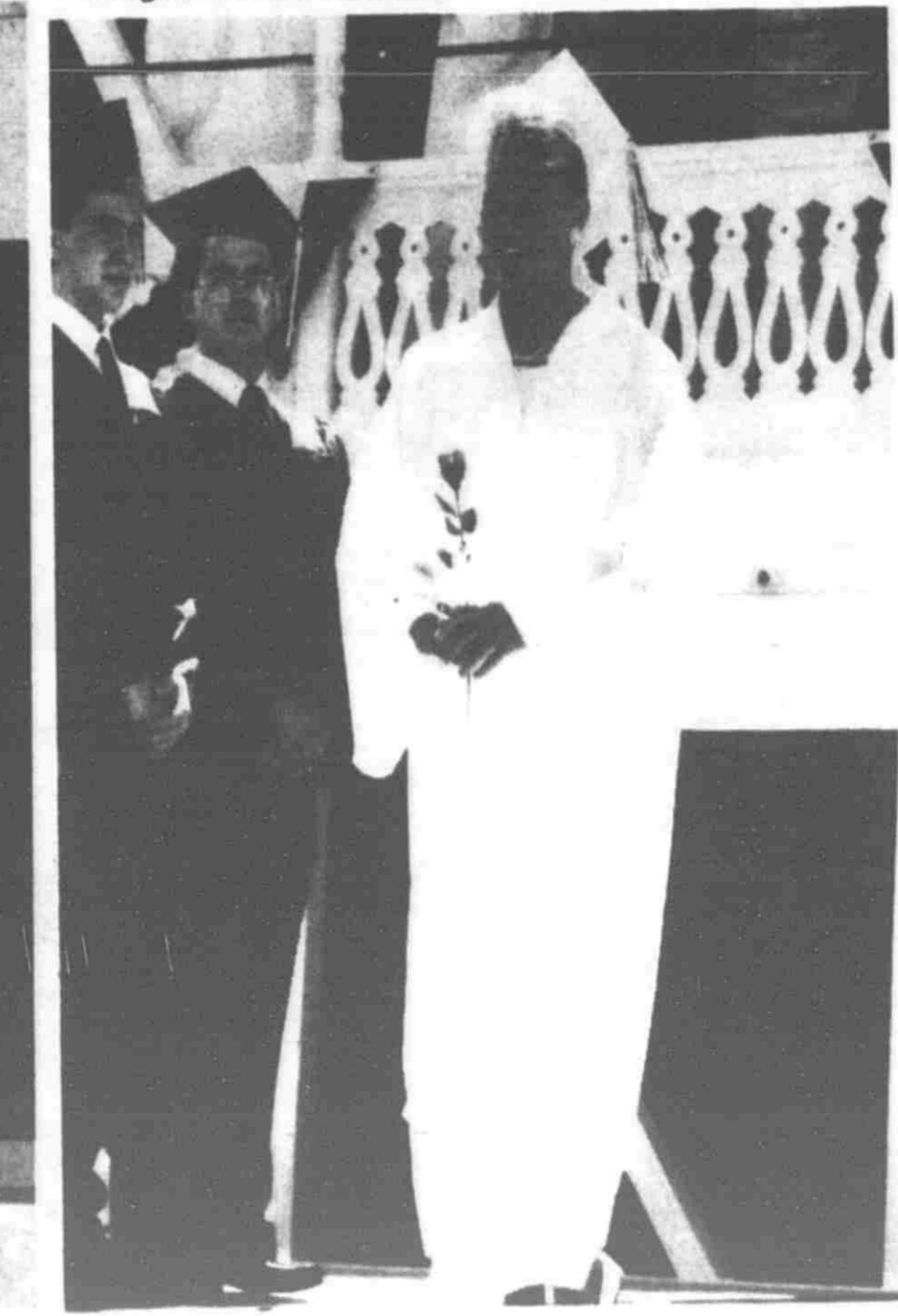

New reference service at the library

The Kent County Library System is introducing a new dimension in reference service called FOCUS, a computerized information retrieval system. The new fee-based service will be invaluable to patrons who need information in addition to what is available in ordinary printed resources. Computer data bases can be searched for a wide and ever-expanding variety of topics. For example, one database provides online directory information for nearly 8.5 million businesses and professionals throughout the United States.

Another contains information on more than 133,000 U.S. manufacturers, 50,000 classes of products, and more than 106,000 brand or trade names. A third database allows access to government sponsored research, development, and engineering, plus analyses prepared by government agencies, their contractors or their grantees. By using online searching, reference librarians are able to retrieve the most current, comprehensive data available quickly, efficiently and accurately.

FOCUS provides access to reference sources not otherwise available through the library system, or available only in online format. FOCUS is located at the Wyoming branch library, 3350 Michael SW, but a computer search can be initiated at any one of the Kent County Library System's 17 branches. Before a search is made, a librarian will estimate the cost; fees are charged to recover the costs of retrieving in depth information.

Bruce Zillmer earns U of M Merit Award

Bruce Jeffrey Zillmer of Lowell has been named a Regents-Alumni Scholar Merit Award winner by the University of Michigan.

U of M has selected 523 top high school seniors from 396 schools throughout the state to receive Regents-Alumni Scholar Merit Awards for "outstanding academic achievement, scholarly promise and potential contribution to the University community."

A total of 1,256 students were nominated for the merit award (financial need is not a consideration), based on their grades, class ranking and test scores. Nominees were interviewed by U-M alumni representatives in their hometown area and final decisions were made by the University Regents-Alumni Award Committee.

Students selected as Regents-Alumni Scholars will receive a \$1,000 (non-renewable) scholarship when they enroll in the University of Michigan at Ann Arbor in the fall of 1989. In addition, recognition certificates have been provided to the recipients' high schools for presentation at spring awards convocations.

Approximately 500 U-M alumni participated in the Regents-Alumni Scholars Program this year. The program is administered by the Alumni Association of the U-M in cooperation with the Office of Undergraduate Admissions.

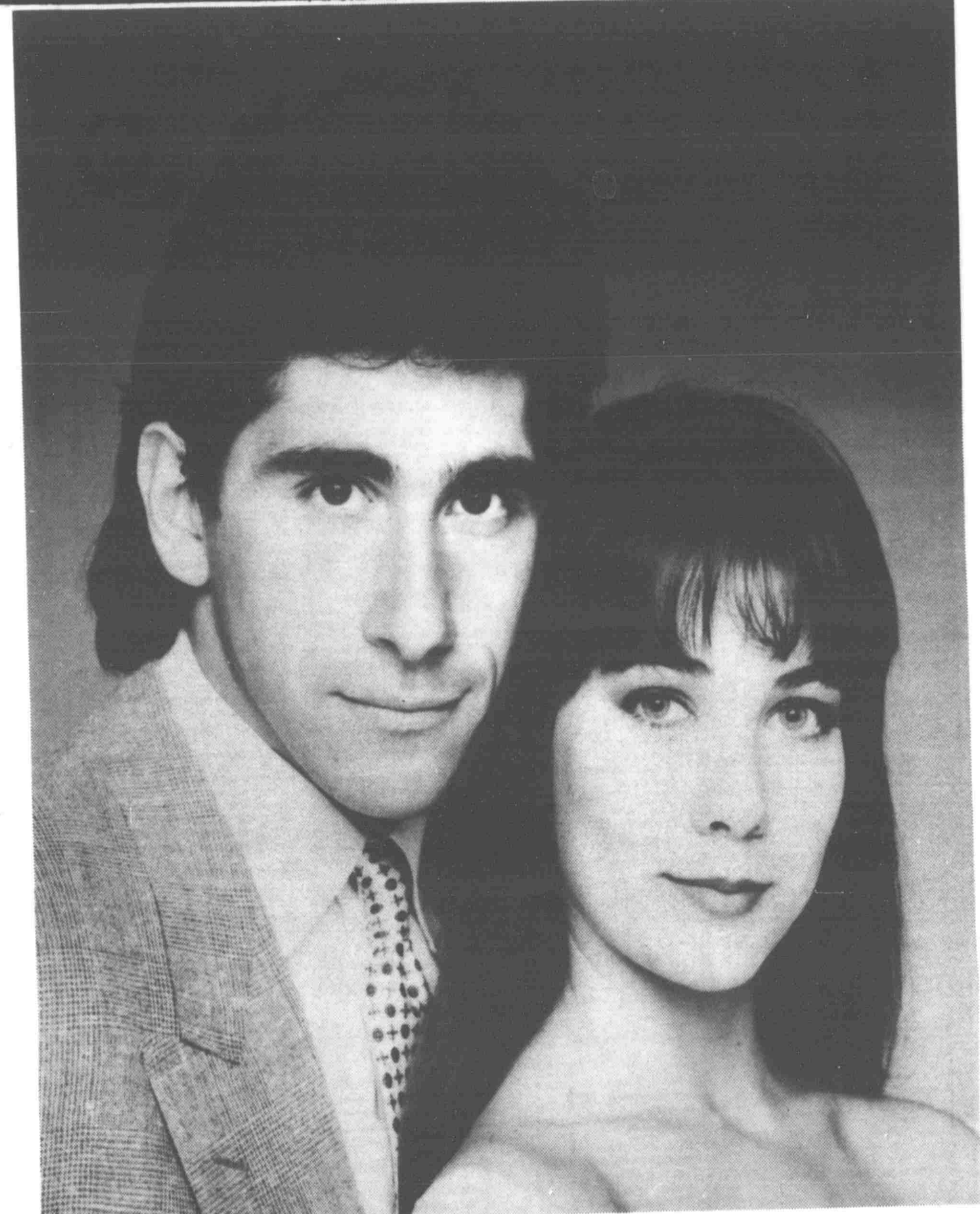

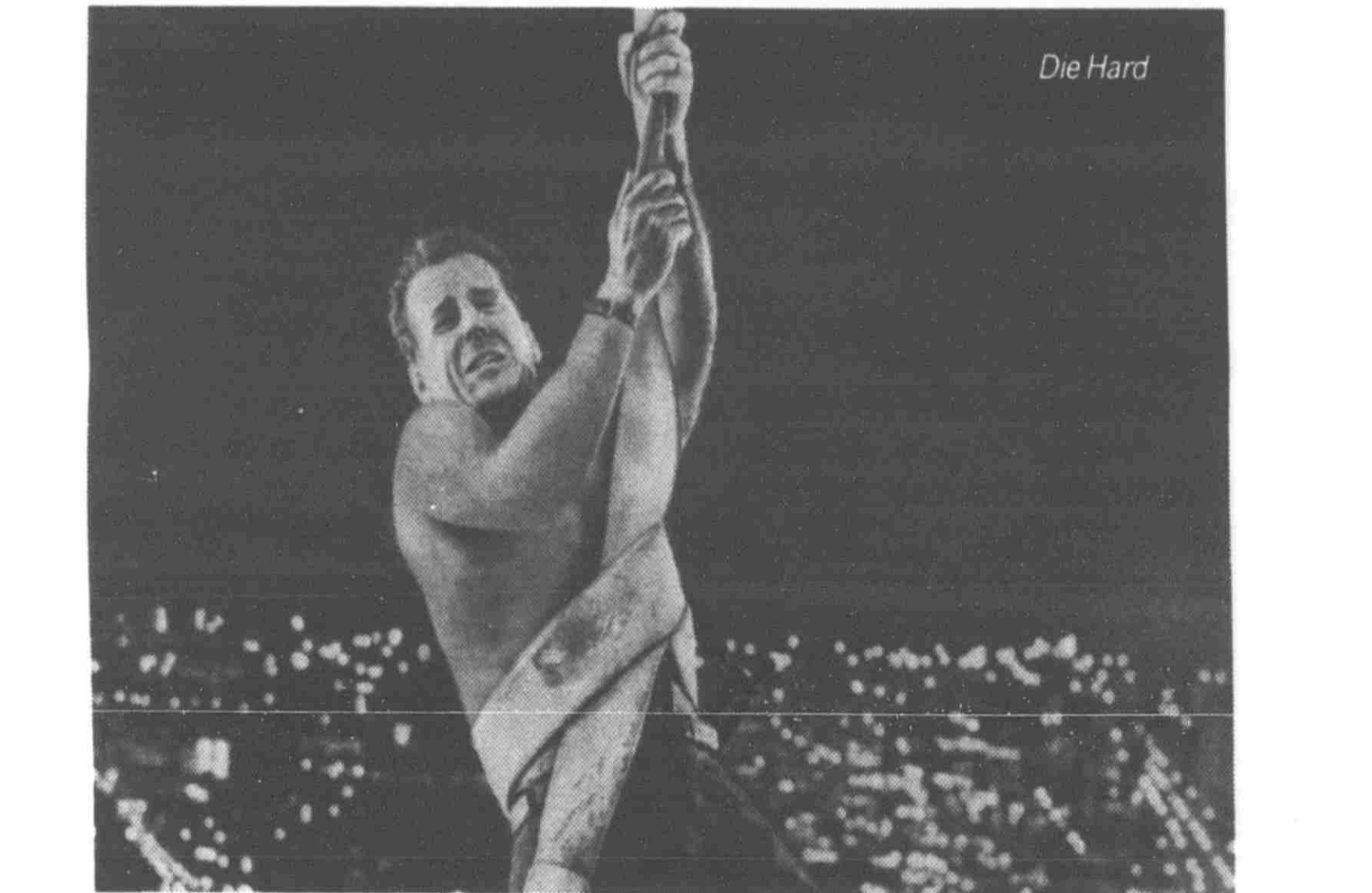
