## Kirby crowned Bellevue Superintendent

### Bushnell Elementary principal resigns

The principal wheels at Lowell Schools keep spinning. Unfortunately for Lowell Superintendent Fritz Esch some of the spokes are falling off.

In June, Linda Zaczek resigned as LCTK Community Education Consortium so that her husband could accept a new promotion in Chicago. In July, Dick Korb resigned as Lowell High School Principal in order that he could assume Zaczek's vacancy. It was learned last week that Bill Kirby, Principal of Bushnell Elementary had handed in his resignation so that he could accept the Superintendent's position at Bellevue Schools.

Kirby went back to Western Michigan University in 1984 for his doctorate so he could qualify for a superintendent position. The opportunity came to surface in June when Bellevue learned its superintendent would not return in the fall so that he could accept another job offer.

Bellevue contacted placement bureaus and school personnel they knew in an effort to fill the spot. Kirby, an elementary principal at Bellevue from 1970-75, was still fresh in the administration's minds.

"As far as the position is concerned, there was never a hesitancy in accepting the job," Kirby explains over the phone after his first day on the new job. "Leaving a community (Lowell) after spending 14 years of your

life there and sending two children through school was a tough decision. It's like leaving home - that's not as easy to do as it is to say."

While at Lowell, Kirby has seen just two administrative positions open up. "Like any principal, when a promotion is out there, it's nice to be considered. No, I was not interested in LCTK Community Education Consortium position with the job description the way it was. But, if the primary interest in the position was redirected, then, yes, I may have been interested."

He continues, "However, that had no motivating factor in my accepting the Bellevue Superintendent's position. I leave Lowell Schools very much pleased with the support that I received from the staff and the community. The district has a school system it can be proud of."

The opportunity to participate in teacher negotiations and to be active in a quality public relations program (association with employees, millage, communications with the public and the newsletter) are two valuable experiences Kirby believes will be of great benefit at Bellevue.

## Homelessness: A visible national disgrace

Michigan State AFL-CIO President writes "It's a problem that just won't go away. Some people may avert their eyes to it,

but homelessness continues as a visible national disgrace. The problem may get worse before it gets better."

Unfortunately statistics aren't lying in the homelessness case. Housing NOW Steering committee member Diane Siciliano of Lowell explains, "Since 1981, budget authority for all Federal housing assistance programs has been cut 77 percent - from \$32 billion to less than \$8 billion per year."

A coalition of 75 organizations have endorsed the Housing NOW program, which is an awareness program concerning the problem with the three million homeless and 30 million working poor and their struggle with the non-availability of affordable housing.

"It's reaching critical proportions. The average apartment in Grand Rapids is \$440 a month, and the average house in Grand Rapids sells for \$74-\$79,000. In order to qualify for a loan a person must earn \$35,000," Siciliano says. "Rental property right now in Lowell is at a prime rate."

She adds that years ago more than a fourth of a person's wages went toward housing - now it's half.

Siciliano is thankful that there seems to be a growing consciousness among Americans about the plight of the homeless and the

lack of decent, affordable housing. "If a person is interested in helping spur action on these problems, there are two events you can participate in over the next three months," she says.

The first is a "Run for Shelter, Walk to Help" event sponsored by the Michigan State Housing Development Authority

(MSHDA) to be held Aug. 12 in Lansing's Riverfront Park. Governor James Blanchard has proclaimed the week of Aug. 6-12 to be Homeless Assistance Week in Michigan, and this event - featuring a four-mile race and a two-mile walk will raise money to establish a Homeless Children's Fund that will help Michigan shelters meet the needs of infants and children in their care.

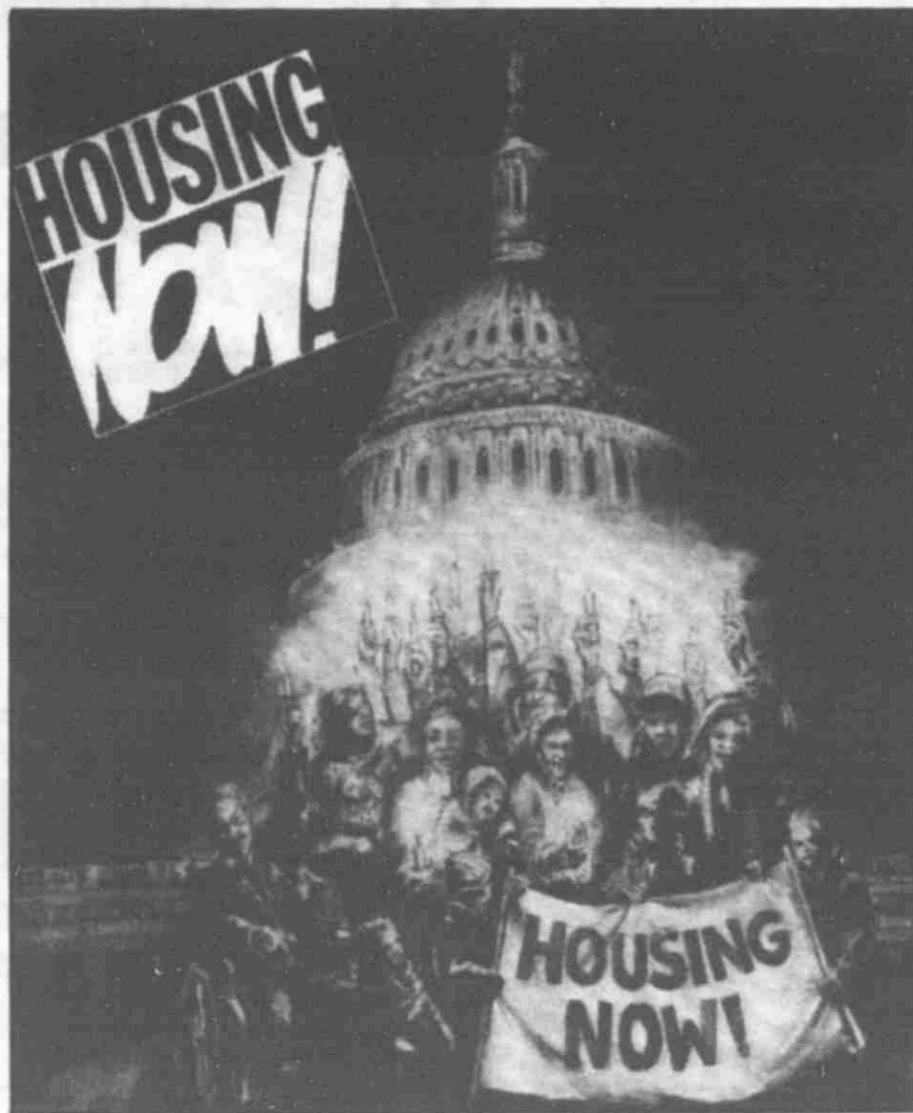
The second event is a large national rally called "Housing NOW" which has over 80 national sponsors including the

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# DNR acquires 1,279 acres along Saginaw Bay

Following is a summary of actions approved by the Natural Resources Commission (NRC) Thursday at its monthly meeting, held in Lansing.

**Land Acquisition:** The purchase of 1,279 acres of wetlands along the northwest portion of Saginaw Bay and adjacent to the Au Sable State Forest was approved. The parcel has 6,600 feet of Lake Huron frontage and 1.6 miles of frontage along the old channel of the Rifle River.

Acquisition of the wetland, four miles east of the Wigwam Bay Wildlife Area, will secure a large tract of valuable wildlife habitat within an ecologically sensitive area, state officials

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mississippi Flyway Council and U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service to obtain additional controls on fast-growing local goose populations.

The daily limit for the early hunt will be three (3) Canadas and six (6) in possession. Shooting hours will be one-half hour before sunrise to sunset, local time.

Hunters will be required to

have a current Michigan license (sportsman, senior hunting, small game, junior small game, or non-resident small game) and all hunters 16 years and older must possess both the state and federal duck stamps.

Use of non-toxic steel shot is required statewide for all waterfowl hunting this year. All joint state-federal rules will apply to this early goose season as in the

regular waterfowl season.

There will be some closed areas on state game lands during this early hunt because federal authorities are concerned about unintentional harvest of early arriving migrant geese from Canadian breeding grounds.

A substantial portion of the state recreation areas and parks in southern Michigan will be available for early season goose hunters.

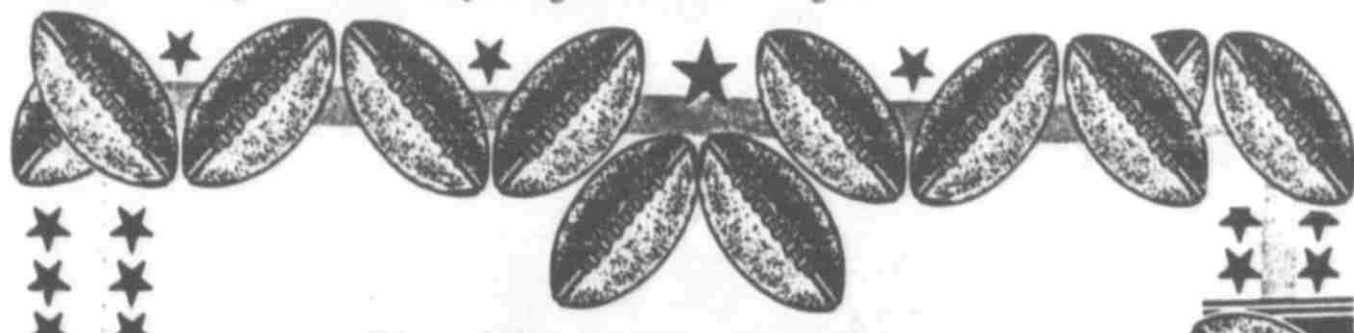

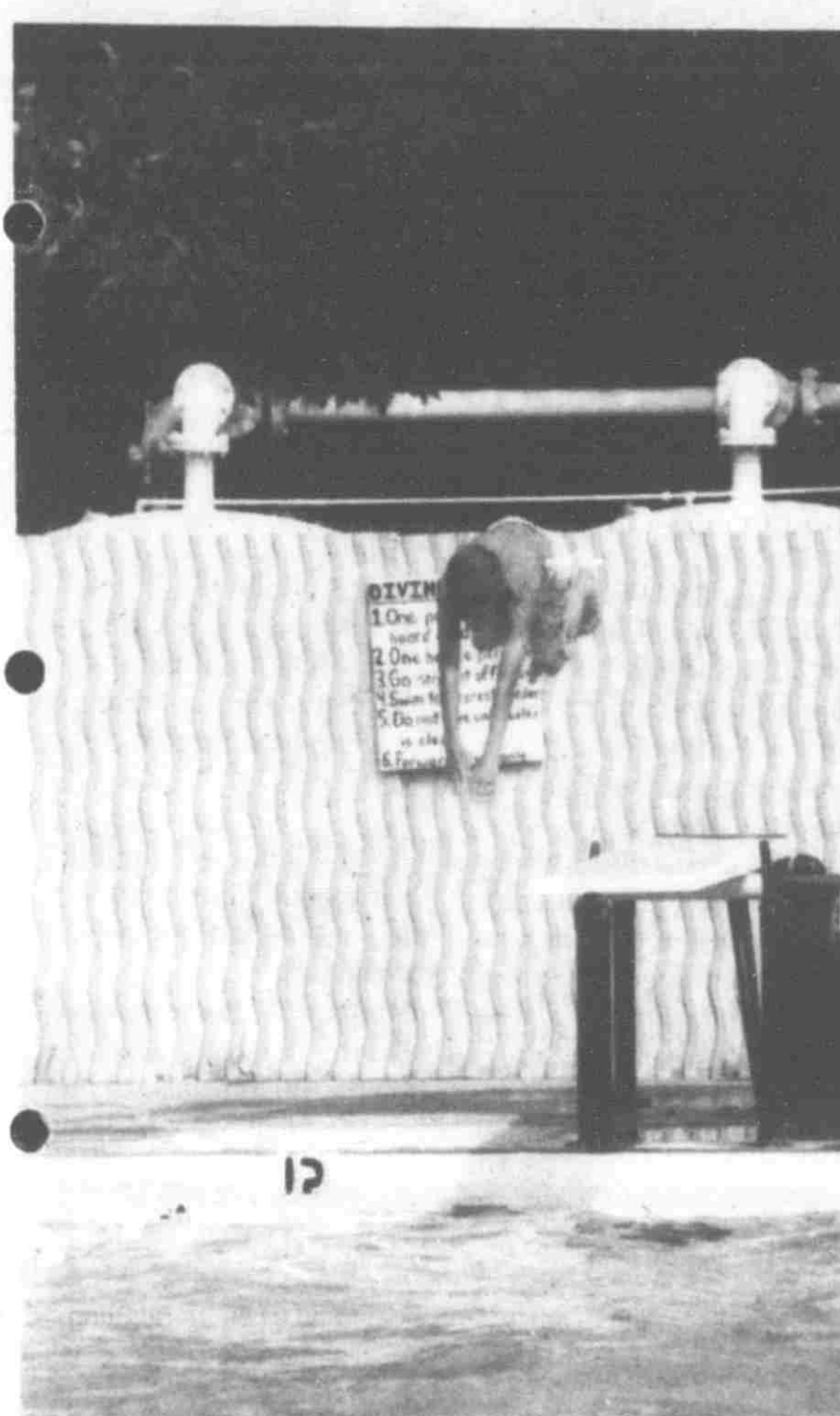

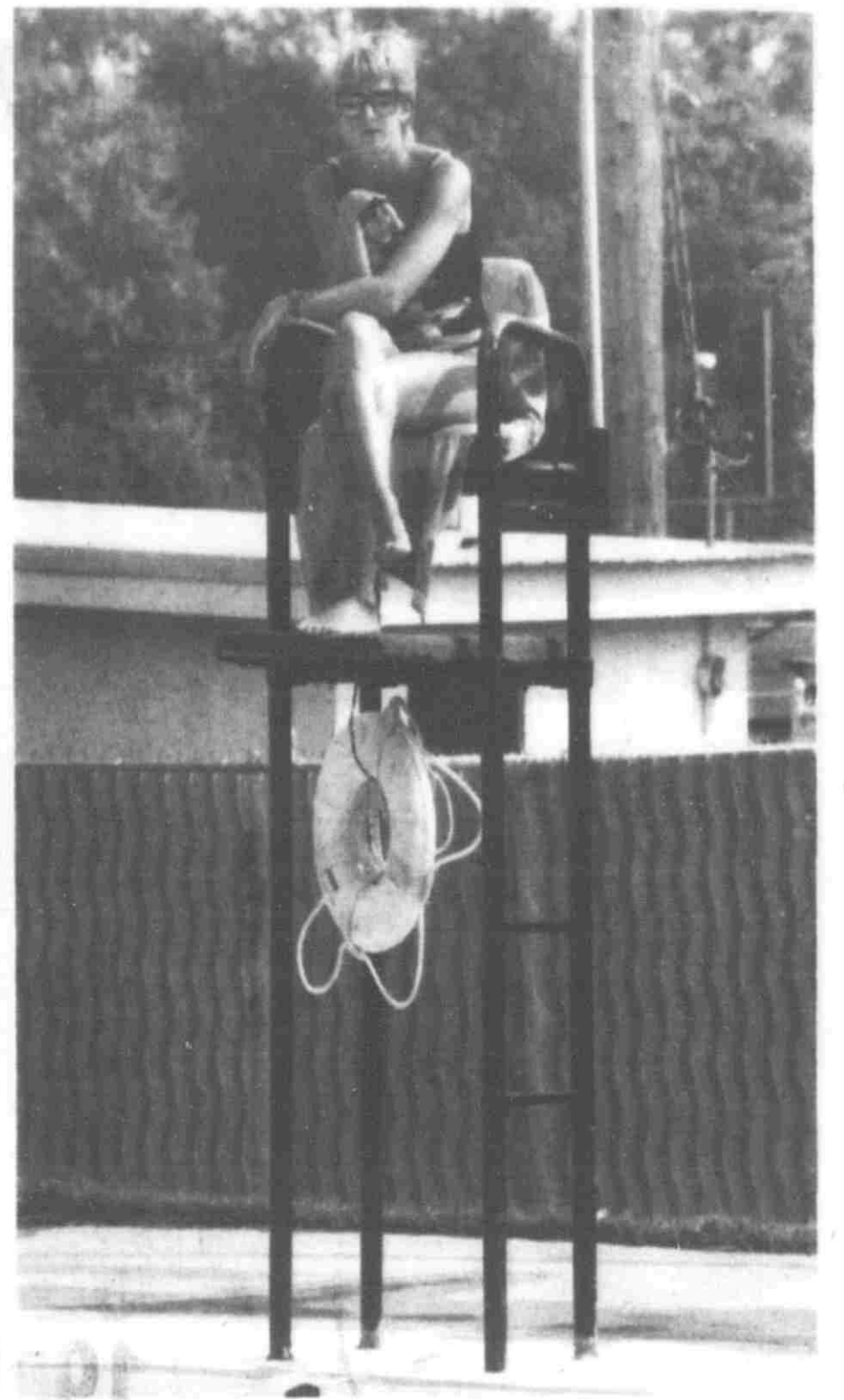

## Groundbreaking ceremonies at United Methodist Church

Members and friends of the First United Methodist Church of Lowell gathered on Sunday morning, July 30, to break ground for a new connector building. Rev. William (Bill) Amundsen officiated at the ceremony.

The proposed addition will connect the present sanctuary with the education building and provide more classroom, office, and dining space. Additional parking will be made available by the removal of the small preschool house at the northeast corner of the property. Nearly all areas of the Methodist Church

will be made barrier-free. Ground was broken using a one-bottom, horse-drawn plow owned by Arie and Ruby Leeman of Lowell. By attaching a long rope to the plow, many people were able to participate by pulling the plow. Since the Church was established here in 1855 by area farmers, the historical presence and significance of the Methodist Church in this community was strengthened by the use of the plow.

With the connector addition, the First United Methodist Church plans to continue its ministry to the community in and around Lowell. The United Methodist Pre-School and the expanded availability of church facilities will continue to be important to local families and groups.

The cost of the building is estimated to be \$450,000. Through the generous donations of mem-

bers, friends and families, nearly \$350,000 has already been pledged. The builder and general contractor will be Ivan Blough of Lowell. Howard Thumser will be the church trustee liaison with the builder.

The House Republican Task Force on Children at Risk has scheduled a series of public hearings to examine Michigan's child preventive and protective services.

The first hearing was held July 24 in Mount Clemens, and focused on recently introduced legislation dealing with sexually abused children.

Sexually abused children are so vulnerable that they need special protection. The "Sexually Abused Children's Bill of Rights" sets guidelines for prosecution of sexual abuse cases and treatment for sexually abused children and their abusers, including:

--court-prohibited contact, unless the parent completes a court-approved treatment program, and the court determines the child is emotionally ready to have contact with the abusive parent.

--a mandatory training program for judges on the diagnosis and treatment of child sexual abuse

--the admittance of evidence about sexual abuse of another child by the parent.

--the allowance of new evidence

of sexual abuse of a child even if previous allegations of sexual abuse were not proven
