Construction of Development Center begins in spring

• The \$1.8 million, 18,800 square foot child development center to serve all ages

The opportunity for individuals and families of West Michigan to achieve a greater sense of wholeness and well-being, takes an 18,800 square foot step forward, with the construction of a new \$1.8 million Franciscan Life Process Child Development Center, in the rural setting of 11761 Downes Rd. N.E.

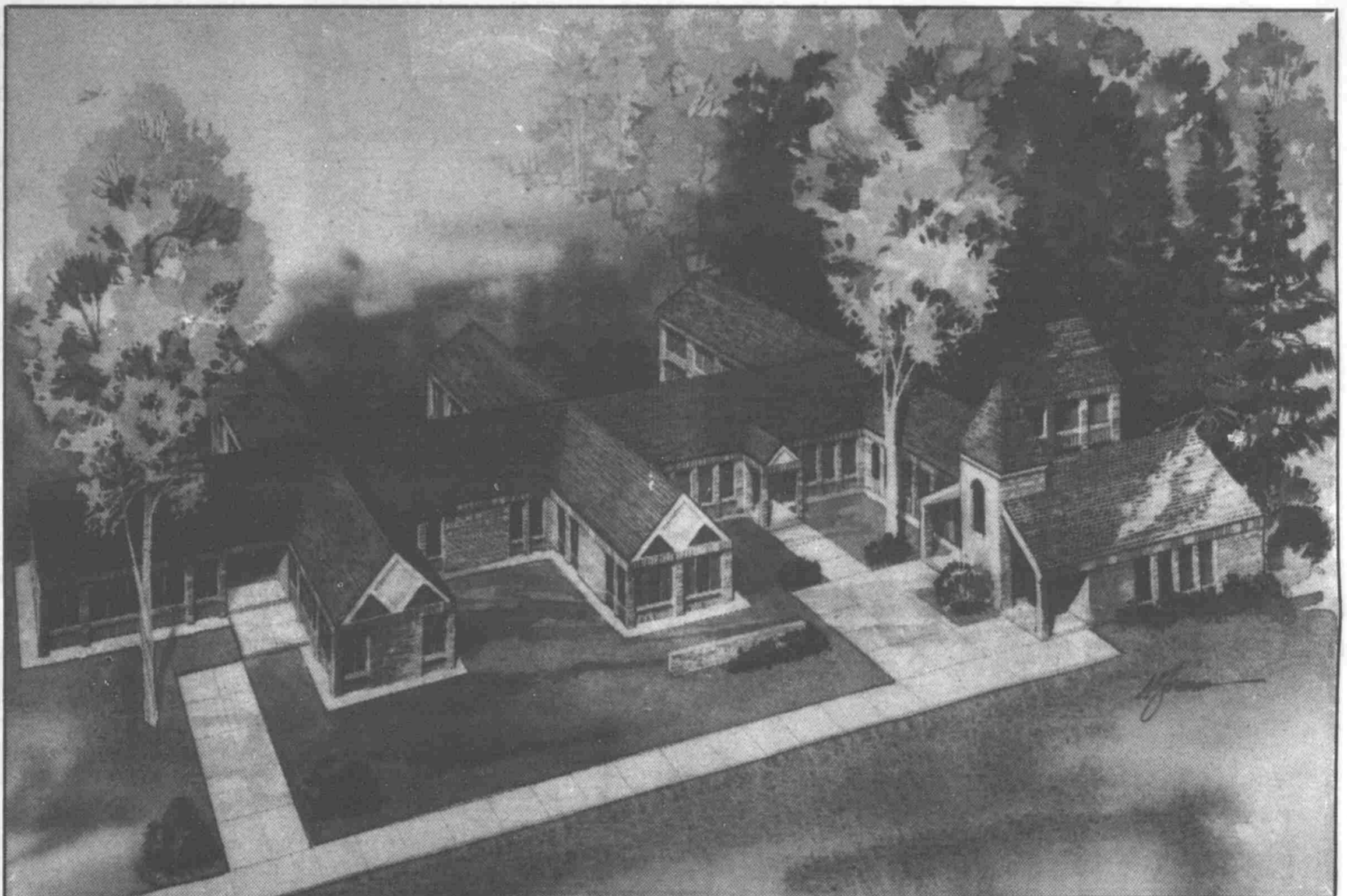
"The first spade will go into the ground when half of the two-level \$1.8 million building fund is realized," said Peter M. Wege, Chairman of the Development Center Expansion Program. "We hope to begin construction by spring of 1990."

The Franciscan Sisters of the Eucharist have been offering a comprehensive program of therapy, counseling and educational services since 1972.

Many people doubted the Franciscan Sisters could pass the rural farm test. "When the Franciscan Sisters of the Eucharist first arrived in Lowell I think people sat back and waited for us to flunk," remembers Sister Colleen Ann Nagle, Director of Franciscan Life Process Child Development Center.

On Thursday, Oct. 19, at the Press Club in Grand Rapids, Sister Nagle and Wege unveiled the plans to make possible expanded services for pre-schoolers, for the aging, and for those who seek professional help in stabilizing their relationship with the life process.

"The Franciscan Sisters of the Eucharist want to create an environment which will foster development of the 'child within,' in order to bring mind, body and spirit into greater harmony, within the spiritual and cultural heritage of each person," Sister Nagle says.

The New Development Center will also seek \$500,000 for maintenance, and scholarship and endowments for those who are economically deprived.

While the number of pre-

schoolers at the Center has tripled, The Center will not be just for children. "It's our goal to help people of all ages discover the 'child within' — those special gifts and talents within all of us,

which can be developed to make life more meaningful at every stage of the life process," Sister Nagle said.

Pre-schoolers at the Center may be watching the shearing of

sheep, however grandmothers who no longer have kitchens of their own, are baking bread in the farm ovens.

Teenagers, seeking a new sense of purpose, may be building

waist-high garden plots for the aging.

Counseling is also a major part of the child development services. In the new building, professional counselors and therapists will be able to combine advanced diagnostic and therapy facilities with gardening and animal care experiences, to meet individual needs.

Alto Bank robbed

Lowell teenagers get their Florida tickets punched at Kent County Airport

Two Lowell teenagers, Kevin L. Martin, 17, and Michael Benson, 16, had their Orlando, Fla. flight plans grounded Tuesday (Oct. 17), six hours after robbing the United Bank of Michigan in Alto.

Martin was arraigned in the 63rd District Court on Wednesday, Oct. 18 at 1:30 p.m. by Judge Joseph B. White on charges of possession of a felony firearm and bank robbery. Bank robbery with it a maximum life sentence. Martin was jailed on a \$50,000 bond.

Martin's accomplice, Benson, appeared in Kent County Juvenile Court on Wednesday on

the same charges and was ordered to be held at the juvenile detention center on a \$10,000 bond.

Kent County Prosecutor David Gersch has asked Juvenile Court for five days to determine whether to automatically waive Benson's case to Kent County Circuit Court, where he would be tried as an adult.

Many errors in carrying out the bank robbery and a camera in the bank helped police catch up with the two teen-aged bank robbers. First, as they approached the bank, they carried their .22-caliber rifles pointed skyward, raising suspicion of a

store clerk who called 911. Only one of the teenagers wore a nylon over his face; Benson referred to Martin by his first name during the heist, and they used their legal identity when purchasing the tickets.

"I don't think it was well planned," Christensen said. "It was poorly planned and poorly executed. There are not a lot of experienced bank robbers around."

Local television stations carried portions of the hidden camera tapes on the local evening news which proved helpful in identifying the suspects. Accord-

"The Sisters are highly trained professionals, with a unique holistic concept which has won the respect and cooperation of both the Menninger Clinic in Topeka, Kansas, and Michigan State University," said Wege.

"The new building will make possible internships in counseling, child development, music therapy, gerontology and will make all parts of the program available in one location."

Although Franciscan Heritage Foods and Franciscan Rhythms will continue to serve the general public in Ada, music therapy will be moved to the Center's farm program.

The new \$1.8 million Hans

Wiemer, A.I.A. building, will offer innovative programs for pre-schoolers and the elderly, as well as for families and individuals who seek professional help in stabilizing their relationship with the life process.

Fund-raising began with a Farm Festival at the Center in September, and "It's going well," Wege said. "To date, foundations and individuals have contributed or pledged a total of \$660,000 to the project."

Sister Nagle added that two years ago the Franciscan Sisters contacted Wege about offering a new beginning, allowing people to experience the movements of change.

ing to Kent County Sheriff Department's Lieutenant Jack Christensen, Lowell Police Officer Jim Valentine began receiving calls confirming the identity of the suspects.

It was also confirmed that Martin's relative had a vehicle with a "Moose" vanity license plate on the front of their Chrysler Cordova. Later, a witness in Alto (at Timpson Avenue SE and 60th Avenue) told police about a parked car that had a front license plate with the word "Moose" on it, according to Christensen.

Police also learned that during the robbery, Benson was believed to have said, "Come on Kevin, let's get going." Later in the day, detectives telephoned airport security with names and a description of the Cordova.

"We asked the airport to check the parking lot," Christensen said. It did, and it found the car, and after checking its computer security learned the two suspects

had purchased one-way tickets to Orlando, Fla.

After contacting the tower, the pilot of the plane with Martin and Benson on board, notified the passengers that the plane was experiencing mechanical problems and the flight would be delayed. All passengers were asked to get off the plane. Police arrested Martin and Benson as they came off the plane and confiscated the money taken.

Both teenagers are familiar with trouble. Martin pleaded guilty in May to a plea-bargained charge of malicious destruction of property under \$100, a misdemeanor, after damaging the McDonald's Restaurant here in Lowell, according to court records.

Records show, Benson was caught in March stealing a 12-pack of beer and candy from a convenience store in Lowell. He also broke into a house when he was 14 and destroyed a water bed, according to court records.

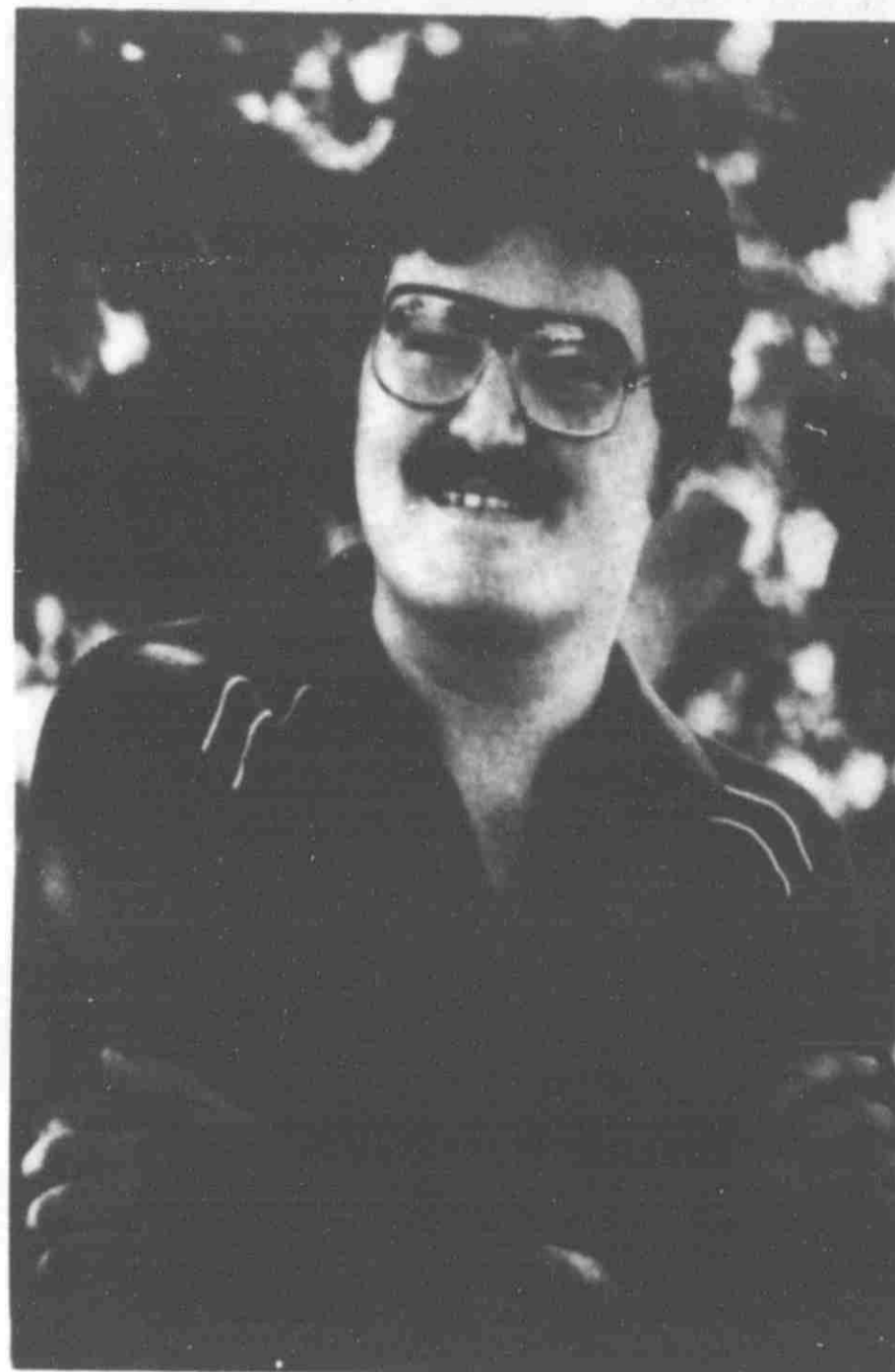

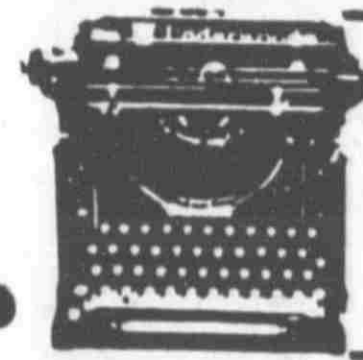

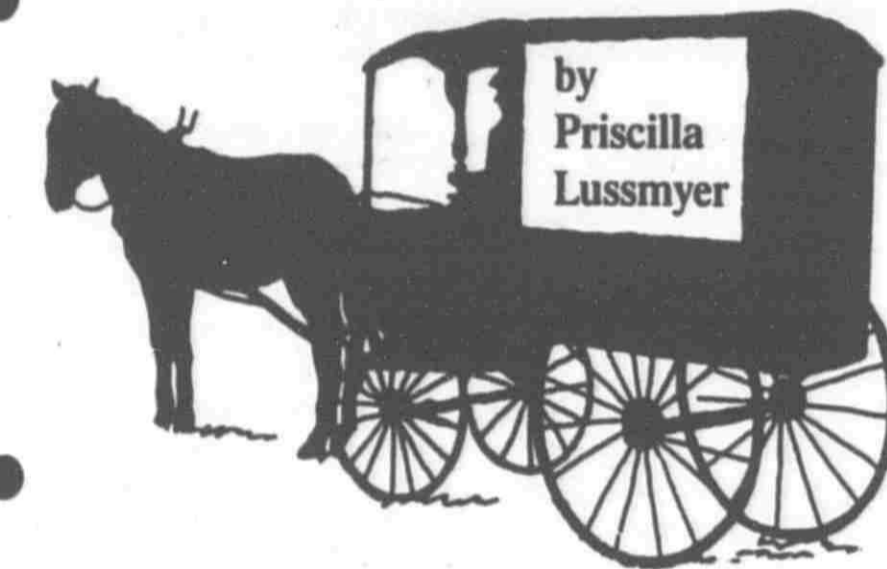

The fact that there are no cars or trucks on the Island is great. No hustle, no bustle, no noise . . . just the clippity clop of horse hooves on the pavement. I did witness a little confrontation between a woman who wanted to watch the Michigan game and two fellows who were watching the Notre Dame game. The Irish fans told the woman they'd get in

trouble with their priest if they didn't watch the Notre Dame game. The woman left in a huff. Give and take.

Terese and I had some hearty, hot soup for lunch on Saturday, bundled up and braved the elements for a carriage tour of the island. Our driver was a St. Ignace resident who spoke in a monotone "yooper" (Upper Peninsula native) dialect and reminded me of either Darrell or his brother Darrell on the Bob Newhart Show. The guy was a real treat. He went through all sorts of contortions when the horses recycled some hay and oats. He made fun of the "fudgies" (island tourists). He told some tales of island history that I suspect were stretched just a little. He made the tour very enjoyable, though I'm sure I'd have enjoyed it even more if my feet weren't frozen. Give and take.

Entertainment at the Grand is very good. There is classical piano and violin music in the parlor at high tea. There is more piano music in the Cupola Bar in the late afternoon. A small ensemble playing at dinner. And a very talented "Big Band" style orchestra in the ballroom every evening. Great stuff, but I can only take so much of it. Terese and I became acquainted with a Detroit city cop and his wife. About 10:30 Saturday night we'd all had enough ballroom dancing, changed into casual clothes, and headed down the hill to the rock 'n roll bar where the hotel employees hang out. We all agreed the rock 'n roll bar was much more fun. Give and take.

Well, that's about it. I suppose I could ramble on about many other things, like prices. I saw a pair of boxer shorts with the Grand Hotel logo silk screened on them. How about \$21.00 a pair? And that is a pair, not a box of three. I'm still wearing my Hanes. Give and take.

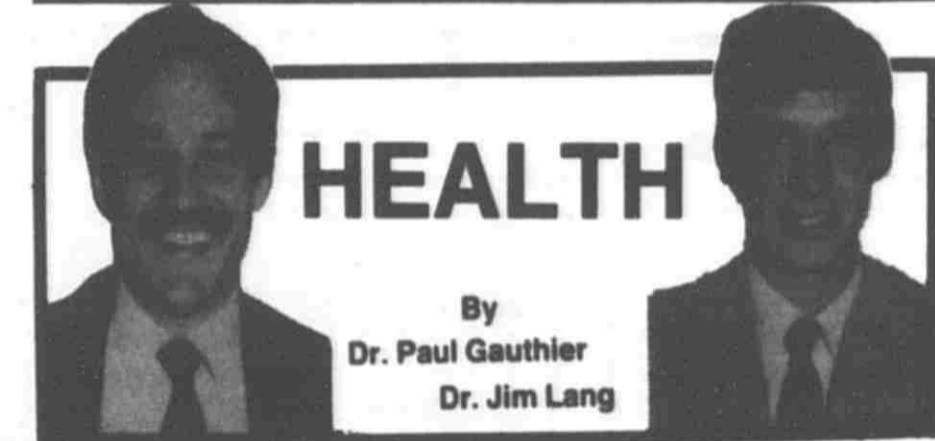

BRONCHITIS

As we approach the cough and cold season we see many patients with acute and chronic bronchitis. In today's column we'll review the current treatment of these common disease entities.

Acute bronchitis can occur at any age and is heralded by abrupt onset of a cough. The cough can be productive or dry. Cold symptoms such as a runny nose, weakness, muscle aches and fatigue will occur with acute bronchitis. Most cases are due to an infection with a virus. Less commonly, bacteria may be the cause. In most cases acute bronchitis lasts less than a week and resolves

on its own. Therapy with cough medications and decongestants will relieve symptoms somewhat. If symptoms are associated with a fever, chills, or thick sputum, or if symptoms last longer than a week, antibiotics may be indicated. If antibiotics are prescribed, you should be sure to take the complete course of therapy. Your doctor will usually prescribe 7-10 days of therapy. Occasionally an x-ray may be performed to rule out pneumonia.

Chronic bronchitis is defined as a cough associated with production of sputum on most days for at least three consecutive months for two years or longer. Chronic bronchitis is due mostly to cigarette smoking. The longer one smokes the more likely they are to develop chronic bronchitis. Chronic bronchitis is also termed a "smoker's cough." During the flu season, patients with chronic bronchitis frequently experience worsening of symptoms - an increase in cough, sputum production and shortness of breath. When these symptoms worsen, antibiotics are usually prescribed along with other medications to improve airflow in the obstructed bronchioles. Chronic bronchitis can be prevented by quitting smoking. Many physicians recommend the flu vaccine for all patients with symptoms of chronic bronchitis. Some patients may benefit by receiving the pneumonia vaccine.

Approval of proposal would close spending gap

Approval of Proposal B at the November 7, Statewide election will begin closing the spending gap between Michigan's 525 K-12 school districts.

At the same time, revenues from a 2-cent sales tax increase will bring significant reduction in school property taxes to almost all taxpayers in these school districts, according to information from the Committee for Responsible Tax Reform (RTR), backers of Proposal B.

Revenues from the sales tax increase are going to achieve two major goals in school finance reform, supporters of Proposal B said: (1) reduce school taxes on residential and farm property statewide by an average of 38 percent and taxes on business

property by 23 percent, and (2) provide at least \$340 new revenue per pupil to 85 percent of the state's K-12 districts.

Among the state's school districts, 286 will receive maximum payments of \$350 per pupil in additional revenues. It was reported by John D. Marrs, Campaign Director for Proposal B. Another 99 school districts will gain at least \$340 per pupil in additional funding.

Most of these 385 school districts are among the lowest in property tax base for school operation and, because of this, do not have the revenue to fund local education programs at the state average of \$3,400 per student, Marrs said.

GLB brings its Blues rock back to Lowell

The Rolling Stones are making music again and so are The Doobie Brothers. The Who just completed their international reunion tour, and Ringo Starr is back out on the road again—26 years after his last live gig. It's the year of the rock and roll comeback. Deep Purple, ARS, Paul McCartney, and now GLB.

GLB? Remember them? It's been a long time between gigs

for the hometown boys who make up Great Lakes Band (Chris Collins, Charlie Luscombe, Mitch McMahon, Rick Seese, and Doug Slocum). But apparently this summer's reunionmania has spread to the local scene.

It was the summer of 1975 when these friends from high school began playing locally and various places around Michigan.

What started out as a part-time summer job developed into full-time work, and for the next couple of years, music was the principle source of income for the band members.

"We had some great times, but it was tough to make decent money," says singer/guitarist Mitch McMahon. "Blues Rock wasn't as popular back then. Disco just about killed us. I re-

ally admire local, career musicians like Doug, and Dave and Pam Jones, and all the members of Alive and Well who for years earned their living playing music.

Over the years, GLB has kept their hand in by throwing a few parties, setting in with other bands at local clubs like Madame Babe's, The Silver Cloud, and the Zoo, and by getting together every now and then just to jam.

"Doug and Charlie really added another dimension with their blues background," added McMahon. "Charlie's harmonica playing and Doug's guitar work, especially on the

slide guitar, gave us a distinct sound, and their jamming set us apart. We still improvise more than most bands—sometimes unintentionally—but that's what keeps it fresh; that's why we're still at it."

Chris Collins inserts, "We've spent the better part of 10 years writing and working on our original material," says Chris Collins who sings and plays bass, "Our style has evolved. We're still very much a blues-based band, but we like to play rock and roll too—Tom Petty and U2 as well as the Thunderbirds and Stevie Ray Vaughn."

Seese adds, "We've recorded

lots of basement tapes over the years. "Our recording techniques keep improving. But we decided that we needed to do some performing again...there's nothing better for creative adrenaline than a live crowd having a good time."

So Great Lakes Band is "taking it to the streets" once again. For the next two weeks, at Larkin' "Other Place," their saga continues. The big Halloween Costume Party this Saturday night has been a GLB tradition for many years. If reunionmania is a trend for the 90's, what could possibly be next? The return of the Headhunters?

Area schools invited to participate in Close-Up program

The Close Up Foundation has again invited schools from across The Grand Rapids Area to participate in its government studies program during the 1989/90 school year. Invitations to the schools have been issued by Cassie Bell, the Foundation's community coordinator for the Grand Rapids Area, who is developing meetings with teachers in the area.

Students, including Lowell High School participants, will travel to Washington during pre-selected weeks to develop an understanding of the federal government and current events. An estimated 385 participants from The Grand Rapids Area are expected this year.

"We offer the students the opportunity to see Washington as a living city by taking them into the buildings they often see only on television and then questioning law- and policy-makers they may only read about."

"Through the experience we have found that they return home with an interest in both national and community affairs. They want to become involved," said Bell.

During the week the students will participate in numerous seminars and workshops with Washington officials where they

will question the experts and then share their views with students from other areas of the country.

Included in the schedule will be a day on Capitol Hill where they will have the opportunity to observe the legislative process and often meet with members of Congress.

A teacher from each of The Grand Rapids Area Schools will accompany the students not as a chaperone but as a participant in a program designed to acquaint them with issues and newer educational methods.

To ensure that all types of students are able to participate in the program, Close Up provides fellowship funds to each of the

schools for teachers and low-income students. These fellowships are made available through a Congressional appropriation and matching funds from a large number of businesses, individuals, and school districts which support the Foundation's citizenship education programs.

Close Up expects more than 27,000 students and teachers from across the country this year. Since 1971 the Foundation has brought more than 260,000 participants to Washington for similar programs.

The program was first introduced in The Grand Rapids Area in 1975, and has included more than 6,650 since that time.

Roof leaks corrected

At the April Lowell Board of Education meeting, the board accepted the bid of \$238,000 by TBR Roofing for the partial re-roofing of Runciman and Alto Schools.

The roofing project was started June 1 and was scheduled for completion by Aug. 15. Teachers and students may have noticed that work was still being completed on both roofs this past week. According to Lowell Maintenance Supervisor, Clare McCaul the work was to correct leaks that still exist and to repair damages, totaling \$2,300, that occurred during the completion of the project.

TBR Roofing was recommended by Progressive Architects, Engineers and Planners.

Following the job's completion, Halls of America inspected the roof project. Because of several small items, the job did not meet manufacturer's specifications. McCaul said some of the items included the roof edge fastening and missing insulation in spots.

"The Lowell Administration and the Board are aware of the problems and know that work is being done to fix it," McCaul said. "The school will hold back the balance of \$44,000 until the job is completed."

The cost for the roofing project is covered under the 1.4 mills allocated for energy and maintenance.

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Some useful Halloween safety precautions

Halloween provides "ghoulish" fun for children, but safety precautions are necessary to protect tiny trick-or-treaters from mishaps, AAA Michigan reports.

"Every Halloween, children are hurt darting in front of cars, tripping on costumes and eating tainted candy," said AAA Michigan Community Safety Services Manager Robert V. Cullen. "However, accidents can be avoided if youngsters follow our safety advice and motorists take extra caution that evening."

Thousands of Michigan chil-

dren take to the streets to "beg" for treats each Halloween. Last year, five youngsters were injured in traffic accidents during trick-or-treating hours, according to Michigan State Police.

This year AAA Michigan celebrates its tenth annual "Light Up A Life" program, which encourages Halloween safety around the state. As part of this effort, free cards listing Halloween safety tips are available at AAA Michigan offices statewide with such advice as:

- Trick-or-treat before dark.
- Wear flame-resistant cos-

tumes, bright in color and short enough to prevent tripping.

- Avoid vision-blocking masks and floppy hats. Wear makeup instead.
- Avoid oversized shoes and high heels.
- Cross only at corners. Never run out between parked cars or in mid-block. Look all ways before crossing.
- Plan a route before leaving home, bypassing unlighted houses and deserted areas.
- If there is no sidewalk on the left, walk facing traffic.
- Let parents inspect treats before eating them.

Motorists can help ensure a safe Halloween by being alert for children who may dart into the street. Drivers should turn headlights on at dusk and limit speed to 15 miles per hour in residential areas during trick-or-treating hours.

In addition to distributing safety tips, many AAA Michigan branches sponsor Halloween parties at their local hospitals, rehabilitation centers or schools for the handicapped, to "light up the lives" of children who are unable to participate in Halloween activities.

These same districts will see property taxes for school operation reduced significantly, most to the 17 mill base level as a result of the finance reform plan contained in Proposal B.

Date released in August by the Senate Fiscal Agency regarding the impact of Proposal B on Michigan school districts served as the source of information about property tax reduction and gains in per pupil revenue on a district by district basis.

Under the Proposal B school funding plan, all school districts in the state will receive from \$250 to \$350 in new revenue per pupil for 1990-91. The actual per pupil amount received varies from district to district based on a formula which supplements the per pupil expenditures in each district for 1989-90. Districts with lesser expenditures will get the most assistance and all districts now spending less than \$3,160 per pupil will receive the maximum of \$350 next year.

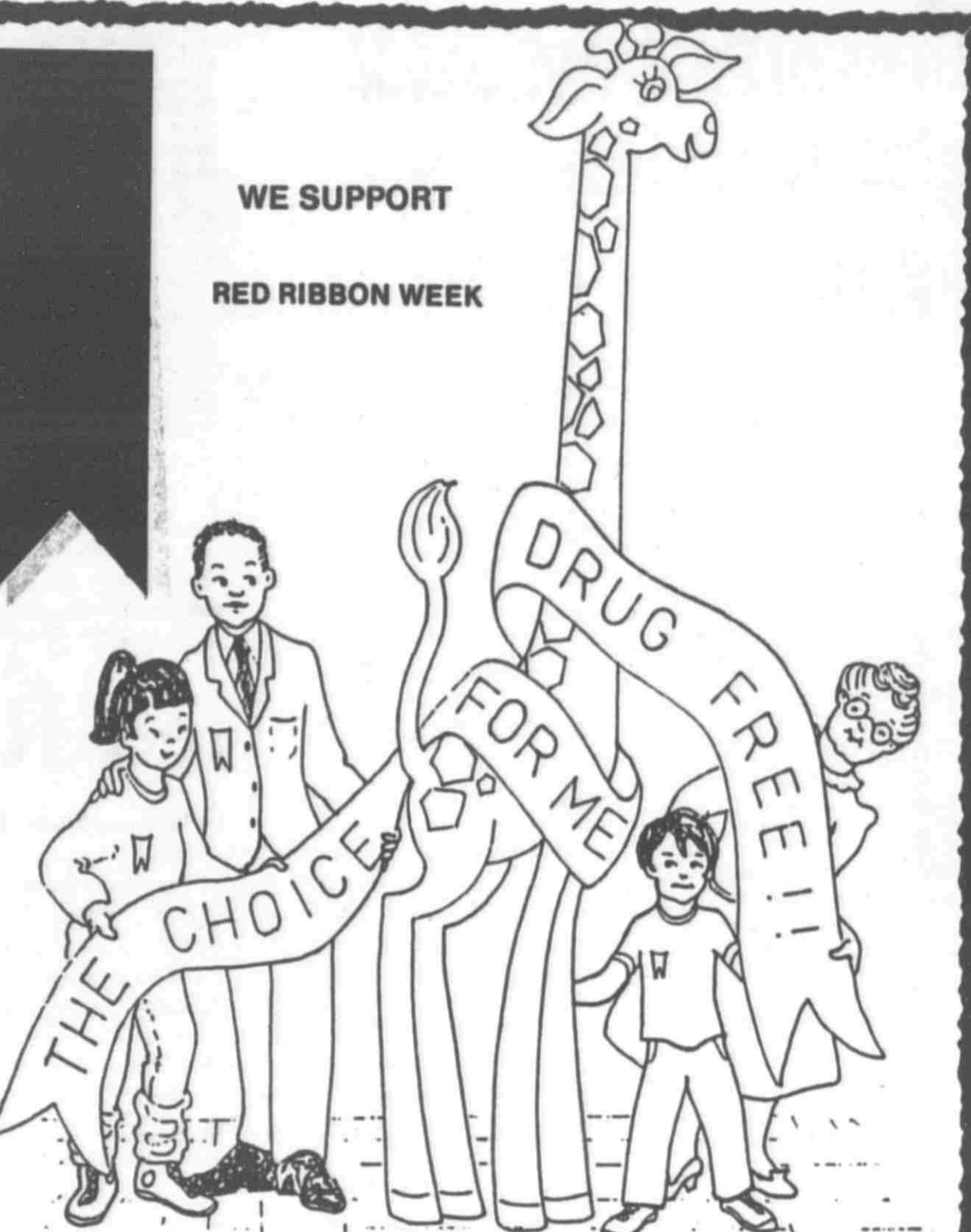

By the narrowest of margins, Lowell's boys' cross country team lost to Sparta. The race came down to which club's fifth runner would cover the Johnson Park terrain in the least amount of time. Spartans' Dan Hubert edged past Lowell's Andrew Patterson for ninth place and in doing so dropped Lowell to a 27-28 defeat.

The loss leaves the Red Arrows at 4-3 in the league and 6-5 overall.

In defeat, Lowell's Clay VanderWarf was also stripped of top honors for one of the few times this season. Spartan Andy Wilson got home four seconds ahead of VanderWarf in a time of 17:04. VanderWarf followed his footsteps in 17:08.

Sparta's Walter Roundtree was third at 17:47, finishing nine seconds ahead of Lowell's David Stouffer (fourth) who was clocked at 17:56.

Lowell's Wayne Haines moved the Arrows back within a point by placing fifth at 18:14, defeating his nearest foe, Sparta's Aaron Kamphuis (18:25).

Tom Mull tied the meet when he came home in seventh (18:29) ahead of Spartan Scott Bitley (18:31).

The race was then left up to Hubert and Patterson. Hubert won this battle, stopping the clock at 18:39 while Patterson finished at 18:46.

Still reeling from a stress fracture, Lowell's Jason VanderWarf was able to run but unable to finish among the top five Lowell runners. Prior to the injury, VanderWarf was Lowell's second

best runner. "The injury has dropped Jason a minute off his time," said Lowell Coach Tom Harper. "This was a heartbreaking loss, but now we must prepare for the conference meet."

Lowell's girls proved their supremacy over Sparta with a convincing 19-44 victory.

The Red Arrows placed girls in 11 of the top 12 spots. Other than Sparta's Angie Thomas' second-place finish, it was all "Pride and Respect" crossing the finish line.

Hillari Kirsch took top honors with a time of 19:38. Thomas followed her home in 20:35. Then, in domino fashion, it was one Red Arrow after another Red Arrow.

"It was a super run for the girls prior to the conference meet," Lowell Coach Tom Harper said. Lowell finishes its regular season at 6-1 in the O-K White and 8-2 overall. Its only loss coming to defending league champion, East Grand Rapids. "We've improved our time since running against EGR, but whether it will be enough is the question."

Rhea Bundy, who has come on strong in the second half of the season, placed third against Sparta with a season-best time of 21:29. Betsy Dommer and Karen Bussler placed fourth and fifth with identical times of 21:50.

Kristen Shuster was Lowell's fifth runner home at 22:03. Following Shuster were Sara Lesky at 22:14; Chris Decker 22:20; Kris Kniola 22:52; Stacy Beute 23:12; Christy Ponchaud 23:39 and Carrie Lipkea finished at 23:45.

all Lowell.

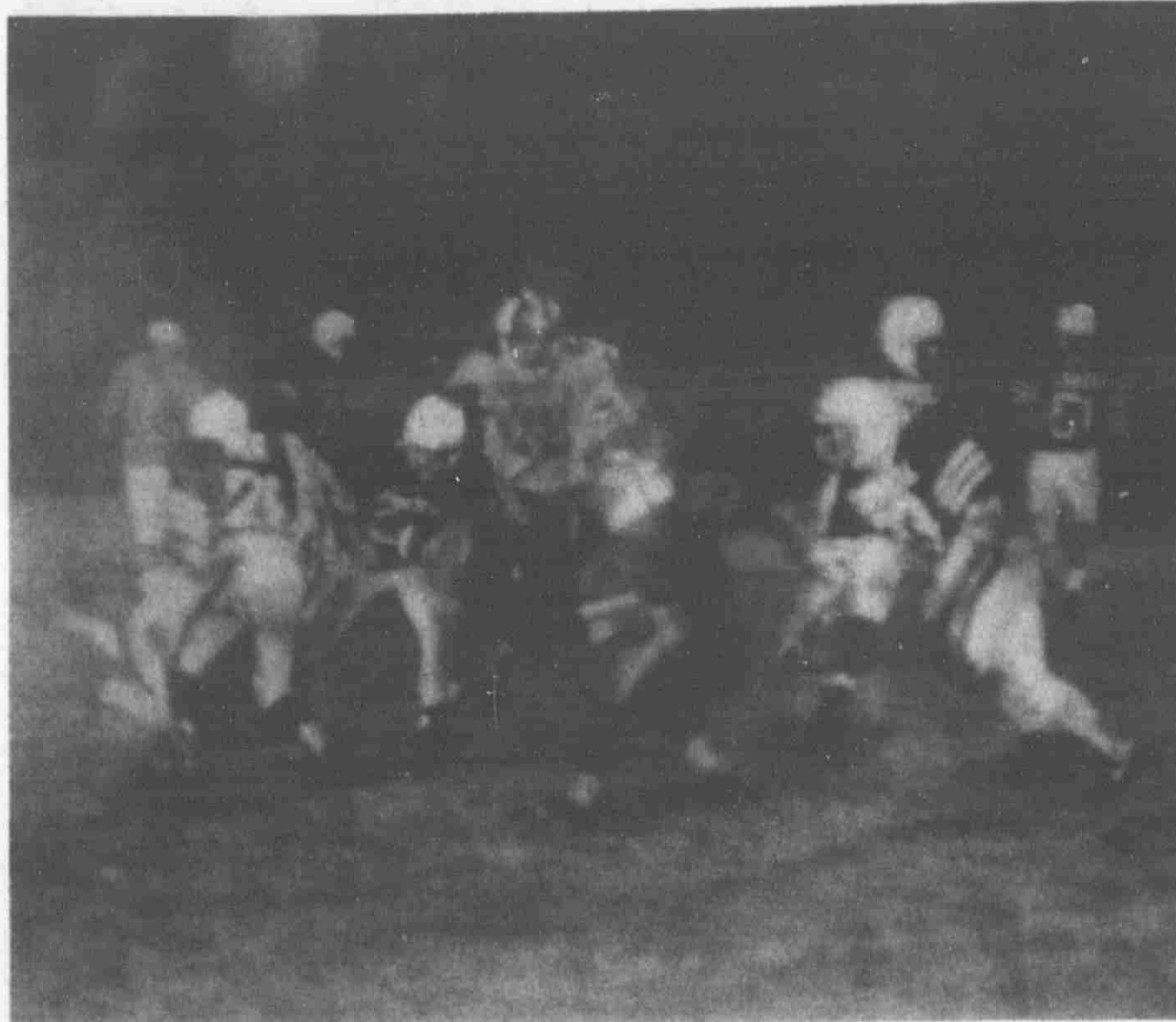
Lowell took the opening kickoff and drove 62 yards in nine plays, with a three-yard run by Kevin Goggins capping the scoring drive.

Car/Deer accident danger increasing

With two million deer roaming public and private land in Michigan—the state's largest deer herd in years—motorists face increasing danger from car-deer accidents.

According to Michigan State Police, nearly 43,000 car-deer accidents occurred in the state in 1988, the highest total ever recorded for a single year in Michigan.

These accidents last year injured 1,758 persons and caused two deaths.

In Kent County last year, the total was 1,407 car-deer accidents resulting in 57 injured persons.

To help reduce the growing number of car-deer accidents, Farm Bureau Insurance is offering Michigan motorists a car-

mounted warning device that helps keep deer off the roadway.

The animal warning device, about the size of a thumb, mounts on the front of a vehicle and is activated by onrushing air. The device emits an ultrasonic frequency, inaudible to humans, that alerts deer and usually stops them in their tracks before they cross roads.

Inc., and normally retails for much more.

"We are offering the devices at a reduced price because we believe they can help reduce car-deer accidents in Michigan and save lives," said Larry Thomas, executive president of Farm Bureau Insurance. "Even though half of all deer-vehicle accidents occur in the fall, drivers must realize that deer on the roadway are a year-round danger. We think the deer warning signals will make the roads a little safer."

The warning device starts working at 30 mph and alerts animals up to one-fourth of a mile away. Pets in the car are not affected.

Akers added he would not be surprised if Zeeland and/or Sparta snuck up on someone before the season is over.

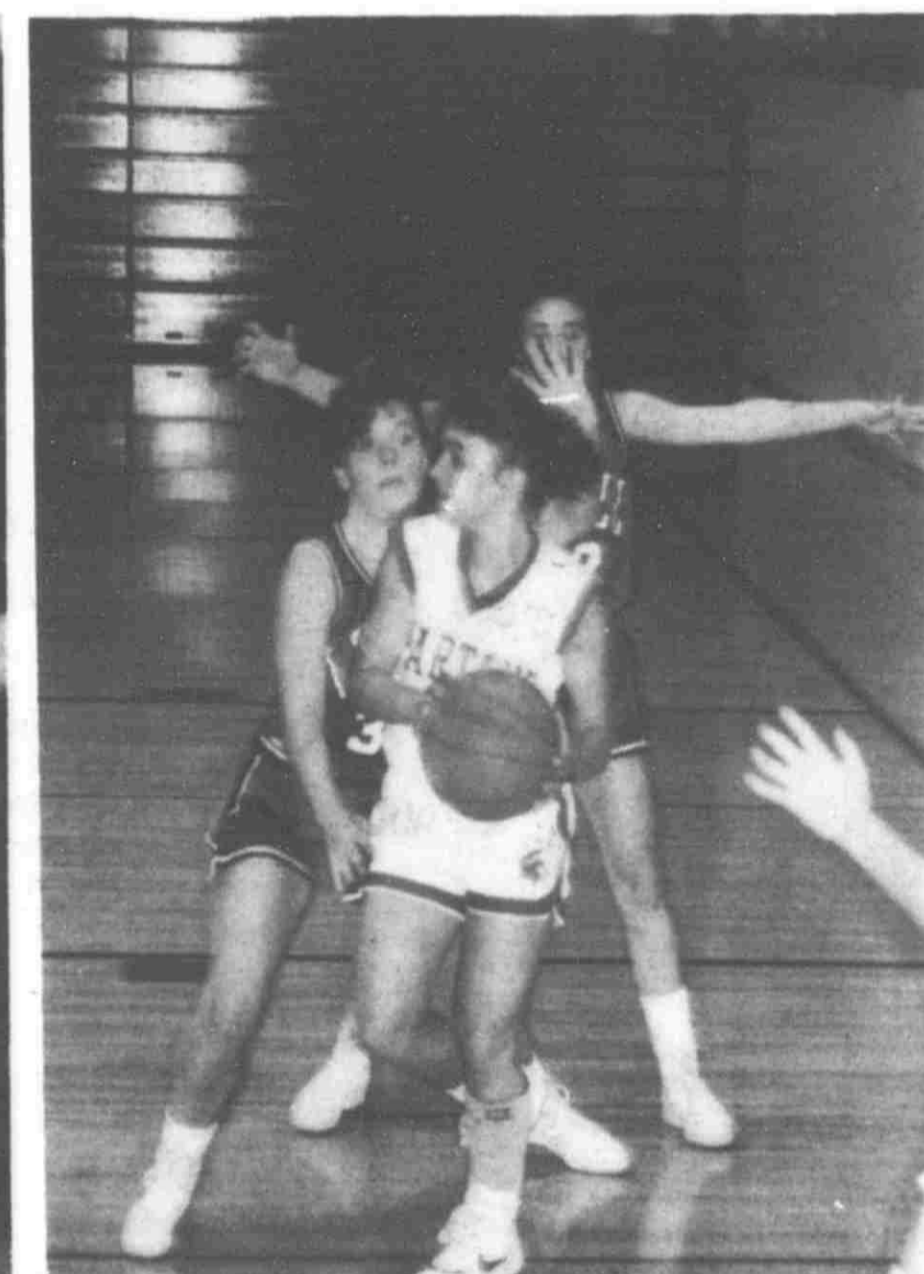
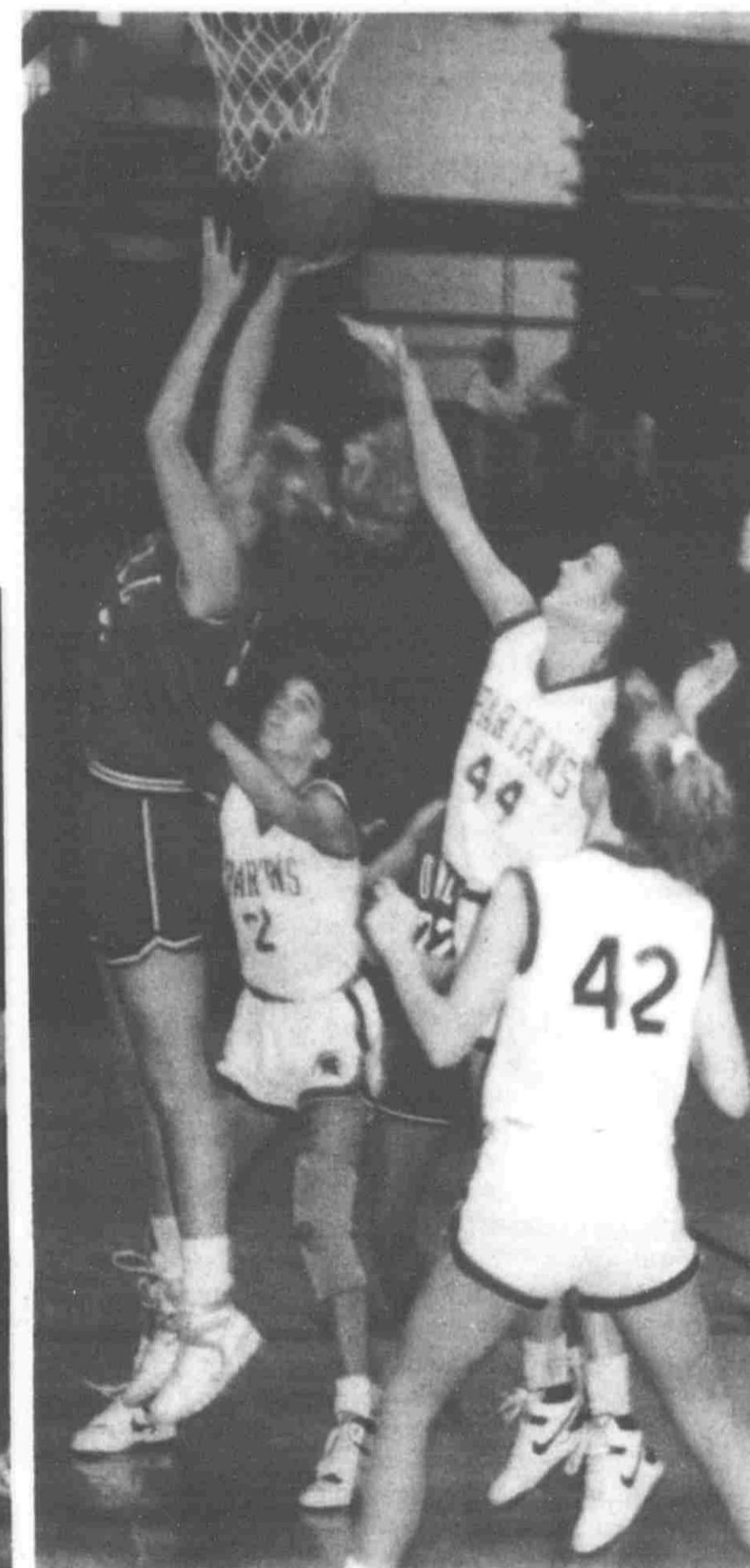
Lowell rebounded Sparta 33-20. Hackenbruch led the club in scoring with 20 points. Jennifer Murphy followed with 14

points and Kim Marvin added 13 points.

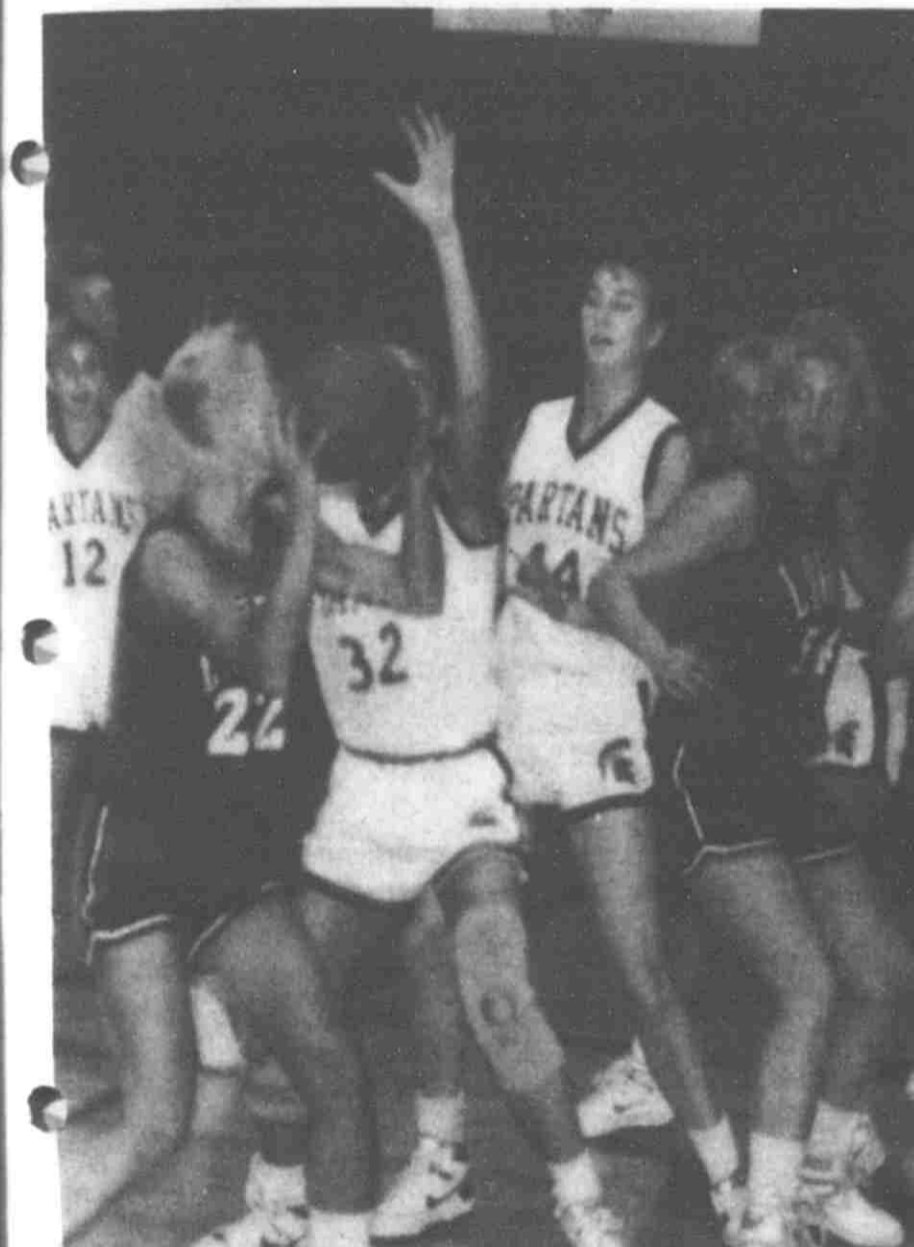
"Murphy has been a big scoring lift for us over the last couple of games," Akers said.

ected by the signal, according to the manufacturer.

Although Michigan's deer herd is the second largest of any state in the nation, sheer numbers, are not the only reasons for the increase in car-deer accidents.

Accidents involving deer are related more to traffic volumes than to deer numbers according to the Michigan Department of Natural Resources. Most deer-vehicle accidents occur in southern Michigan, where deer population is lower-but the traffic volume higher-than in northern Michigan.

The DNR also reports that most car-deer accidents occur on paved local roads, within the drivers home county. Most accidents happen at night, when it is difficult to see deer.

Serious injuries and human fatalities occur most often when drivers attempt to swerve to miss deer, then lose control of the vehicle and hit another object, according to DNR studies.

"This year the DNR expects hunters to harvest 450,000 deer out of the state's herd of 2 million," Thomas said, "but car-deer accidents will always be a danger for Michigan drivers. Last year, our company adjusters handled 2,592 claims, totaling \$2.4 million, as the result of car-deer accidents. Our goal is to help reduce accidents and make drivers feel safer on Michigan roads."

Tests indicate that Sav-A-Life deer alert device is at least 80 percent effective in keeping animals off the road and away from approaching cars.

Many law enforcement agencies, company fleets, and major corporations require the device on all their cars and trucks.

Farm Bureau Insurance, a major insurer of cars and trucks in Michigan, requires the deer alert device on its company fleet cars.

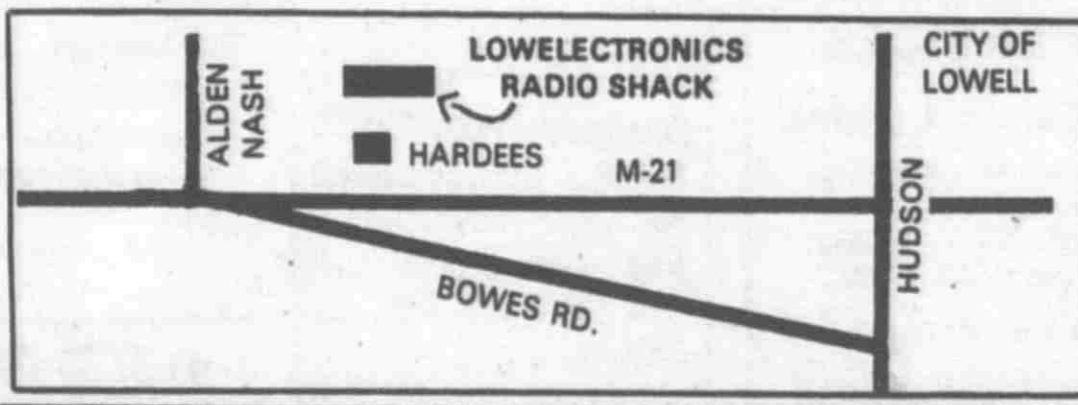
